Sunday morning accident in Carmel claims Indianapolis woman's life

An Indianapolis woman was killed early Sunday morning in a car accident near 96th Street and Gray Road in Carmel.

At approximately 2:50 a.m., Carmel Police responded to an accident near the intersection of 96th Street and Knights Bridge Boulevard. Officers arrived and found two vehicles involved in the crash.

Based on preliminary information, it appears that a black 2005 Ford F-150 truck operated by Hernan J. Posada-Rodriguez, 24, Fishers, was traveling eastbound on 96th Street near Knights Bridge Boulevard, which is located just west of Gray Road. Rodriguez collided with a Red 2004 Saturn 2-door operated by Monica Davila, 44, Indianapolis. It appears the Red Saturn turned in front of Black Ford as it was traveling eastbound.

Davila was pronounced deceased at the scene as result of her injuries.

Through further investigation, Rodriguez was arrested for Operating While Intoxicated (A-Misdemeanor) and Operating While Intoxicated Causing Death (Level 5 Felony). He was later transported to the Hamilton County Jail for further processing.

Accident Reconstructionists from the Carmel Police Department completed the crash investigation. 96th Street and Knights Bridge Blvd was temporarily closed during the investigation.




Society.




