Legendary lawman, Dick Russell dies

Former Noblesville Police Chief and Hamilton County Sheriff Deputy Richard “Dick” Russell, 68 of Cicero, died Friday morning at his home after an extended illness.

Russell, a 36 year law enforcement veteran, was well known throughout Hamilton County, as well as, being recognized nationally for his accomplishments in the criminal justice field.

His career began with the Cicero Police Department and

included serving 23 years on the Hamilton County Sheriff’s Department, holding many titles including Chief Deputy under then Sheriff Dan Stevens.

After retiring from the Sheriff’s Department Russell was appointed Noblesville Chief of Police in 1996 by Mayor Dennis Reddick. Russell’s 13 year stint as Noblesville’s Chief of Police ranks him as the longest serving Chief in the department’s history.

Russell graduated from Hamil-

ton Heights High School, Lees College, the National Sheriff’s Association Institute of Management, the 132nd Session of the FBI National Academy, and the FBI Law Enforcement Executive Development Academy.

Russell served on the Law Enforcement Training Board originally appointed by the late Governor Frank O’Bannon and reappointed by Governor Joseph Kernan, as well as, being appointed by former Governor Mitch Daniels

to the board of trustees for the Indiana Criminal Justice Institute. Russell was also past president of the FBI National Academy Associates of Indiana and the Hamilton County Fraternal Order of Police.

In 2009 Russell received recognition from the Indiana House of Representatives for the many contributions he made to his country and state.

As of press time funeral arrangements had not been announced.

Cicero sailor continues 75 years of Seabee tradition

PORT HUENEME, Calif.- “We Build, We Fight” has been the motto of the U. S. Navy’s Construction Force, known as the “Seabees”, for the past 75 years. Cicero, Indiana native and Hamilton Heights High School graduate, Petty Officer 3rd Class Jacob Raines, builds and fights around the world as a member of a naval construction battalion center located in Port Hueneme, California.

Raines works as a construction electrician in the Navy. “We provide power and electrical maintenance for the jobs we have overseas,” said Raines.

The jobs of some of the Seabees today have remained unchanged since World War II, when the Seabees paved the 10,000-mile road to victory for the allies in the Pacific and in Europe, according to Lara Godbille, director of the U. S. Navy

Carmel addresses use of homes for ‘Airbnb’ rentals

In response to an increase in the number of homes listed on various “Airbnb” websites, offering overnight accommodations for travelers, has prompted the City of Carmel to send letters (attached) to homeowners alerting them that they are in violation of city zoning laws and that they have 10 days to cease operations or file for a zoning variance.

City officials have received a number of complaints from local residents, Homeowners Associations and representatives of local hotels about the issue, prompting today’s action. The letters were mailed by the City’s Department of Community Services, which oversees planning and zoning matters.

“Although we share in the

excitement and appreciation of the many new ways in which we can connect with each other globally and do business by using modern technology for travel and entertainment purposes, we must also be sensitive to the impact these new things are having on our community – including your neighbors and our local businesses,” the letter states. “Businesses such as our local hotels must invest a lot of money to meet the requirements of their zoning and be able to legally operate as a hotel. Because of that, we don’t believe it is fair to our hotels to allow someone to operate a competing business when they are not held to that same higher standard of construction because

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Indiana American Water accepting applications for 2017 Environmental Grant Program

Indiana American Water, a subsidiary of American Water announced that it is accepting applications for its 2017 Environmental Grant Program.

Established in 2005, the company’s Environmental Grant Program offers funds for innovative, community-based environmental projects that improve, restore or protect the watersheds, surface water and/or groundwater supplies through partnerships.

Several grants for a combined total of approximately \$10,000 will be awarded in 2017.

The program is designed to support diverse types of activities, such as watershed cleanups, reforestation efforts, biodiversity projects, streamside buffer restoration projects, wellhead protection initiatives, hazardous waste collection efforts, and surface or groundwater protection education.

“Ensuring we have clean water now and in the future is an important issue we can all do something about,” said Indiana American Water President Debroah Dewey. “This program encourages municipalities, schools, environmental organizations and civic groups to apply for a grant that will benefit their watersheds and the communities we serve all across the state.”

To qualify, proposed projects must:

- Address a source water or watershed protection need in the community
- Be completed between May 1, 2017 and November 30, 2017
- Be a new or innovative program for the community, or serve as a significant expansion to an existing program
- Be carried out by a formal or informal partnership between two or more organizations
- Provide evidence of sustainability (continued existence after the American Water grant monies are utilized), and
- Be located within one of Indiana American Water’s service areas across the state.

Information and application requirements can be found online on the Environmental Grant section of the company website at <https://amwater.com/inaw/about-us/environmental-grant-program>.

Applications must be postmarked by March 27, 2017 and mailed to Indiana American Water, 555 E. County Line Road, Greenwood, Ind. 46143, ATTN: Joe Loughmiller. Award recipients will be notified by April 19, 2017.

Projects will be judged based on criteria that include clarity of project goals and projected impact, strength of collaboration with other community and/or municipal organizations, and evidence that the project will provide sustainable environmental results after Indiana American Water’s funding ends.

In 2016, a total of four projects throughout Indiana American Water’s service areas received grants totaling more than \$10,000. The projects included creating a rain garden/nature scape project in Franklin, expansion of the Wildcat Experience school educational program in Howard County, installation of a bottle-filling station and development of a water-related education program in Muncie, and supporting an NICHES Land Trust water sampling program in both Montgomery and Tippecanoe counties in Indiana.

of their zoning classification.”

Homes located in a “Residential Single Family” zoned area must be used as a single residence, not as a business. Homeowners are not able to “suddenly turn it into a restaurant, a dry-cleaning business, factory or – as is apparently the case now – a hotel or bed-and-breakfast.”

Doing so would be unfair to neighbors and local businesses and would be contrary to the community’s zoning laws. The letter explains the legal process in which a homeowner can ask for a legal zoning variance to allow for a different use.

The city has now notified homeowners that they must cease operation as a commercial user – including the removal of their home from any websites advertising such things – within the next 10 days in order to avoid any further action by a Code Enforcement Inspector, until such time that a homeowner obtains a zoning change or legal variance.

If residents of Carmel suspect such activity is taking place in their neighborhood, they should report it to the City of Carmel, Department of Community Services by calling 317-571-2417.

For the past 75 years Seabees have served in all American conflicts. They have also supported humanitarian efforts using their construction skills to help communities around the world following earthquakes, hurricanes and other natural disasters.

“I am proud of the hard work that Seabees do every day,” said Rear Adm. Bret Muilenburg, commander, Naval Facilities Engineering Command. “Their support to the Navy and Marine Corps mission is immeasurable, and we look forward to the next seven decades of service.”

Seabees around the world will take part in a yearlong celebration in 2017 to commemorate the group’s 75-year anniversary. The theme of the celebration is “Built on History, Constructing the Future.”

“Seabees deploy around the world providing expert expeditionary construction support on land and under the sea, for the Navy and Marine Corps, in war, humanitarian crisis and peace,” said Capt. Mike Saum, commodore, Naval Construction Group (NCG) 1. “Seabee resiliency, skill, and resolution under hostile and rough conditions prove our motto ‘We Build, We Fight.’ The Seabee patch we wear on our uniform signifies to the warfighter and civilian alike that they’re in good hands.”

Serving in the U.S. Navy has allowed Raines to continue learning about himself and the legacy he wants to leave to future Seabees.

“It’s important to recognize our heritage and honor those Seabees who have paid the ultimate sacrifice serving our nation,” said Raines.



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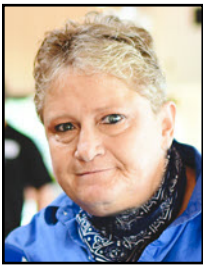
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Peggy Sue Pace

Pacers make big comeback in Sacramento

Through two quarters on Wednesday night in Sacramento, the Pacers looked like they were falling into an all-too-familiar pattern. Indiana trailed the Kings by 19 points at halftime and appeared well on their way to their 15th loss in 20 road contests this season.
But the Pacers (22-19) mounted a major charge in the second half, stunning Sacramento (16-25), 106-100, in the first stop of a three-game Western Conference road trip.
"I thought we came out the second half and we scrapped, just took it one possession at a time, got stops defensively," said Pacers head coach Nate McMillan, who collected his 500th career victory on Wednesday. "(We were) able to get a rhythm, spread them out offensively, and just fight our way back into this game."

For the Kings, it was a disappointing close to a frustrating seven-game homestand during which Sacramento managed to win only once.
Bit by bit, the Pacers clawed their way out of the hole, and a pair of free throws by Jeff Teague with 2:52 remaining cut what was once a 22-point deficit to one.
Kings forward Matt Barnes answered with two foul shots on the other end, but Paul George followed that with a fadeaway jumper on the next trip down the court.
After DeMarcus Cousins missed a spinning layup on Sacramento's next possession, Teague raced down the court and drew another foul. The former Pike High School star hit both shots from the charity stripe to put Indiana in front, 99-98, the Pacers' first lead since the 9:32 mark in the first quarter.
After a Cousins turnover, George buried another jumper to extend Indiana's cushion.
In the final minute, Cousins drove into the lane looking to make it a one-point game, but Thaddeus Young rose up and swatted the All-NBA center's shot off the backboard. On the ensuing fastbreak, Teague found Myles Turner all alone under the basket for the game-sealing dunk.
George led the Pacers with 24 points on 8-of-15 shooting. Teague added 22 points, seven rebounds, and 11 assists. Al Jefferson was the third Pacers player to score at least 20 points, setting a new season high with 20 on 9-of-12 shooting in just 16 minutes off the bench.
The Kings got off to a hot start on Wednesday. Sacramento went 13-for-22 (59.1 percent) from the field in the first quarter, jumping out to a 34-21 lead.
The Pacers managed to mount a bit of a charge in the second quarter, thanks to Jefferson providing a nice boost off the bench and some sloppy play by Sacramento.
Jefferson connected on his first five shots and scored 14 points off the bench in the first half.
"I got in the right spots, they made good passes," Jefferson said. "They were easy shots for me. Once (I) hit a couple and I did get the ball on the block, I just went to work."
The Kings, meanwhile, committed seven turnovers in the first seven minutes of the second quarter, allowing Indiana to cut the deficit to eight points.
But Sacramento responded with another strong spurt, outscoring Indiana 20-9 over the final five minutes of the half to open up a healthy halftime lead.
The Pacers started second half strong, scoring the first six points of the third quarter. Thanks in large part to Teague, who scored 11 points and dished out three assists in the frame, Indiana hung around and closed the period with a 12-5 run to trim the Kings' lead to eight.





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
