Fishers Police to get new parking garage, headquarters

A new parking garage for the Fishers Police Department will break ground this spring, and officers will be moving into a new headquarters building before the end of 2018. That's what Chief Mitch Thompson told the Police Merit Commission this week, assuming construction schedules go as planned. RQAW is handling the architecture work and Hagerman Group appears to have the inside track to construct the building, under a public-private partnership arrangement with the City of Fishers.

Also during the meeting, Assistant Chief Ed Gebhart updated the commission on the CrimeWatch phone app, unveiled in May of 2016. Fishers police report there are now over 4,000 users. Once registered, a Fishers resident can snap a picture and report suspicious activity, with an officer in the area receiving the information real

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


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Harold E. Nicholson

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Boys swimming sectionals...

Many county swimmers easily advance to finals

The boys swimming state tournament began Thursday with sectional preliminaries, and there were no surprises among the big county schools.

At the Noblesville sectional, the Millers joined Carmel and Westfield in qualifying all 27 of their swims for Saturday's sectional finals. The defending state champion Greyhounds will have all 27 of their swims participate in the championship heat, and will be top seeded in nine events.

Drew Kibler earned the first seed in the 200 and 100 freestyles, with Wyatt Davis the top seed in the 500 free and backstroke. Andrew Couchon is rated first in the 50 free, with Stefano Batista leading the way in the breaststroke. Carmel also holds the first seed in all three relays.

Westfield has the remaining two top seeds, with Nicholas Brauer first in the individual medley and Matthew Carr the butterfly leader. The Shamrocks moved 19 of their swims to the championship heat, with the other eight qualifying for the consolation heat.

Noblesville placed 18 swims in the championship heat, with the other nine to swim in the consolation heat. Cameron Kramer is the Millers' highest individual seed, taking third in the 500 free. Noblesville's 200 and 400 freestyle relays are also both seeded third.

Hamilton Heights qualified all three relays for the championship heat, and the Huskies' outstanding sophomore Jared Holder also advanced to the championship heat in the 50 free and the backstroke; he is seeded second in the latter event. Heights also sent four more swims to the consolation heat

Guerin Catholic will have all three of its relays in the consolation heat, with senior Hugh Ross reaching the consolation of the 50 free after at 16th place finish in the preliminary race.

Over at Hamilton Southeastern, both the Royals and Fishers sent all 27 of their swims on to the Saturday finals. The Tigers advanced all 27 swims to the championship heat, while HSE qualified 26 to the championship heat, and one to the consolation heat.

Fishers has six top seeds, including two from Kyle Haflich in the individual medley and the backstroke. Other Tiger first seeds are Joseph Moser in the 50 free, Drake Stallworth in the butterfly, Nolan Yorkman in the 500 free, and all three Fishers relays.

Hamilton Southeastern has one top seed: Zack Teffeteller leads the way in the 100 free.

University is competing at the Lawrence North sectional, and a Trailblazer senior is in the mix. Brody Davison is seeded second in the 200 free and third in the 500 free.

University also sent its medley relay to the championship heat, and qualified five more swims for the consolation heat.

The Noblesville gymnastics team finished second in a three-way meet Thursday, which also finished the Millers' regular season.

Noblesville scored 96.05 points, behind Franklin Central's 101.80 and ahead of Scecina's 83.625. Esma Taylor finished third in the all-around with a score of 32.675, and also had the Millers' highest scores of the night with an 8.625 on vault and an 8.425 in the floor exercise.


