News briefs: Sen. Young to speak at Lincoln Day Dinner

The County Line comes this week in the form of news briefs, hopefully of interest to our readers.

U.S. Sen. Todd Young will be a featured speaker at this year's Hamilton County Lincoln Day Dinner. To be held April 19 at the Ritz Charles, the price for single admission is \$50. The annual dinner party, held in most counties throughout the U.S., is a Republican Party event, and a "must" for aspiring politicians. Sen. Young, who spent his youth in the county, is a 1990 graduate of Carmel High School.



The Indiana Office of the Public Counselor said today that a new law on the books provides for a civil fine of \$100 for the first proven violation of the state's Open Door Law. A second offense brings a \$500 fine. The City of Noblesville could have been one of the first to be assessed a fine when a closed meeting was held to discuss the sale of Seminary Park last month. But, Mayor John Ditslear said such a violation would not happen again, and so there will be no pursuit of the matter, the counselor said.

The annexation of Home Place by the City of Carmel is far from resolution. The case is pending before the Indiana Court of Appeals. The city filed its final brief March 15 in the case that began a decade ago. Carmel wants to add the unincorporated community of about 5,000 to the city, but Home Place residents have long resisted. Stephen Buschmann, attorney for the residents, estimates a decision

in four to six months.

County Commissioners and County Council members were told on Friday that the estimated cost of the planned expansion of the Government and Judicial Center is \$23.3 million. County Deputy Auditor Dawn Coverdale said officials were told that taking bids on the project can be set for the spring of next year. Design work needs to be completed between now and then. When the project is bid, an alternate for building out offices on the first floor will be included.

Debby Knox, Indianapolis TV anchor, will emcee a May 6 fundraising gala to benefit the Youth Assistance Program. The dinner and program will begin at 6 p.m. at the Ritz Charles in Carmel. The theme of the event is Design Bright Futures. Tickets are available at www.CarmelGala.org

New ADA ramps to be installed throughout Westfield

Some of Westfield's sidewalks are about to get a makeover thanks to funding through a grant.

Over the next four months, around 40 new ADA-compliant ramps will be installed throughout the city.

The construction is being paid largely through an INDOT and Indianapolis Metropolitan Planning Organization grant, with a majority of the construction cost being covered by the grant and the additional cost being picked up by the city.

The work is designed to make Westfield's pedestrian areas more accessible to all residents and visitors. The project is also part of the Safe Routes to Schools for Oak Trace Elementary School.

Construction will begin the first week of April and continue through July. Some sidewalks may be closed up to 10 days during construction.

First in Old Town, then into subdivisions...

Noblesville begins street sweeping throughout city

The Noblesville Street Department began street sweeping of the entire city this week. Using two sweepers, the street department will start in Old Town before moving away from the downtown area into the subdivisions.

The entire process can take two months to reach every street and neighborhood. Street Commissioner Patty Johnson said the spring sweep will take place in April and May and another sweep will occur in July and August.

"In addition to having clean roadways, street sweeping improves air standards and storm water quality for the citizens of Noblesville because it picks up nutrients and sediments from street surfaces before they can be washed off in storm water run-off," said Johnson. "These operations are vital to our total city structure."

If you own property in Hamilton County, you 2017 property tax statements will be mailed Friday, April 7.

The spring installment of your payment is due by Wednesday, May 10 and the fall installment is due Monday, Nov. 13.

You can pay with an online Echeck for a \$1.00 convenience fee or online with your credit card for a 2.5% convenience fee.

If you prefer to pay in person with a check, banks accepting payments (only at local Hamilton County Branches) include BMO Harris, Citizens State Bank, Farmer's, Fifth Third, First Farmers, First Merchants, Merchants Bank of Indiana and Star Financial.

You can also mail your Hamilton County Treasurer, 33 N. 9th Street, Ste 112, Noblesville, IN 46060 Please know that the payment must be US postmarked on or before (Spring) May 10, 2017 and (Fall) November 13, 2017. You may also make a payment at the Treasurer's office Monday – Friday from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Offices will be closed on Friday, April 14th for Good Friday and Friday, November 10th for Veteran's Day.

and other wildlife once they reach our creeks and rivers.

"Residents are asked to assist in the cleaning effort by removing any loose limbs found on roadways and by keeping bagged leaves on their property. Because of the damage they cause the equipment, sweepers go around limbs on streets and do not return once passed," Johnson said. "Also, if you have the option to park your vehicle off the street that would assist us."

When severe weather conditions exist, street sweeping may be postponed if it is deemed not beneficial to the public. This cycle also will not interfere with Downtown Noblesville being swept at least once a week.

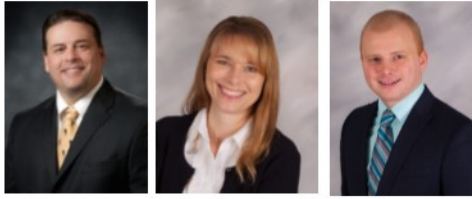
blessings on our community, schools, families, public services and churches," said Ditslear. "This event is being held in conjunction with the National Day of Prayer."

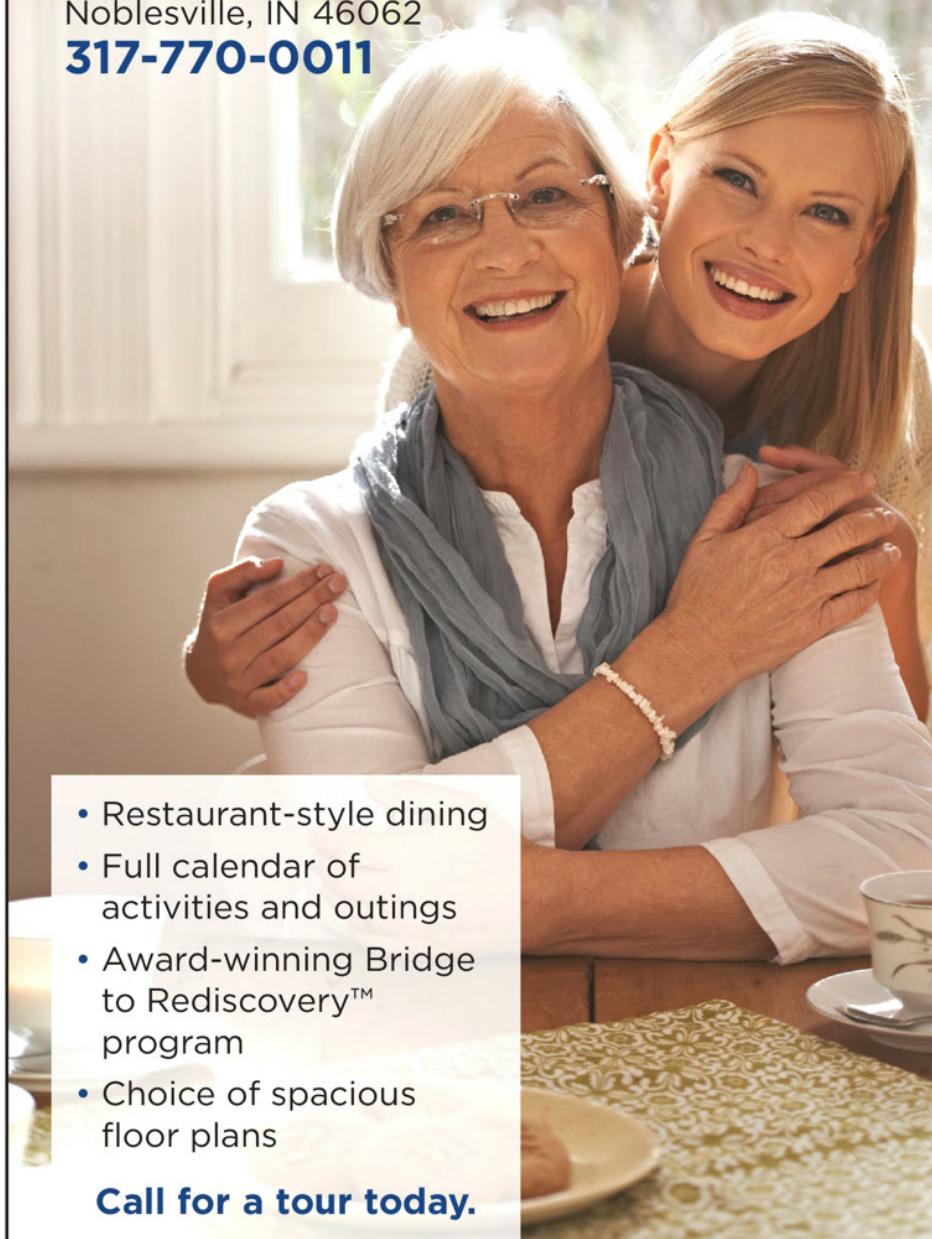

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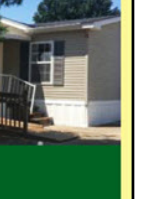
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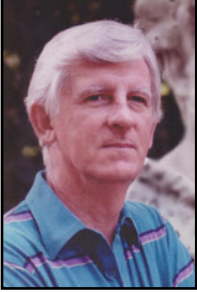
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William W. "Bill" Chesser



Royals earn sweep of Avon

Southeastern, ranked No. 4 in Class 4A, got on top right away, scoring six runs in the first inning. Carter Lohman hit a home run in that inning, driving in three runs. Brock Burns hit a solo homer in the sixth inning to score the Royals' seventh run of the game. Dalton Hutchinson, Trenton Schneider and Jack Lang all had two hits, and Jacob Daftari batted in two runs.

Sam Bachman threw five innings for the win, tossing seven strikeouts.

Pacers rally to beat Toronto, hang on to eighth place

With their season hanging in the balance, a pair of familiar faces lifted the Pacers to a crucial victory.

Paul George had 35 points and 10 rebounds and Lance Stephenson provided an emotional lift in his return to Bankers Life Fieldhouse as Indiana (38-40) rallied from a 19-point deficit to beat the Toronto Raptors (47-31), 108-90.

George scored 18 points in the third quarter alone to help Indiana regain the lead. His old running mate then ignited the crowd with his frantic play off the bench in the fourth quarter as the Pacers pulled away for a much-needed win.

"It was fun, man," George said. "The atmosphere was amazing. I haven't felt that for a long time."

The victory snapped a four-game losing streak and pushed the Pacers temporarily back into eighth place in the Eastern Conference, a half-game ahead of idle Miami. The Heat play at Charlotte on Wednesday.

The Pacers struggled to find a rhythm offensively in the first quarter of Tuesday's game. Toronto jumped out to an 18-7 lead and took a 26-18 advantage into the quarter break. Indiana went just 6-of-24 from the field in the opening frame.

The lone highlight for the home team in the first quarter came when Stephenson checked into the contest with 4:09 remaining. The mercurial guard, who played for the Pacers from 2010-14 and signed with the team last Thursday, got a standing ovation from the near-capacity crowd in his first game back at Bankers Life Fieldhouse.

"I was very emotional," Stephenson said. "I almost teared up, but my main focus was just trying to win the game."

Toronto extended its lead to 19 points by opening the second quarter with a 19-8 run.

The Pacers' starters then returned to the game and managed to get the margin down to 11 on Paul George's layup with 23.6 seconds remaining in the period. DeMar DeRozan answered with a bucket on the other end, but Monta Ellis went coast-to-coast in just 3.2 seconds for a crucial layup

just before the halftime buzzer, trimming the deficit to 51-40.

The Blue & Gold opened the second half with the sense of urgency one might expect from a team seeing its playoff hopes slip away. Indiana quickly chipped away at the Raptors' lead.

A 9-0 run midway through the period brought the home crowd to its feet. First, Young converted a three-point play. Ellis followed with a 3-pointer from the right corner, then Jeff Teague knocked down a triple from the left wing to give Indiana its first lead of the game with 5:47 left in the third quarter.

The two teams then went back-and-forth, with each of their All-Star wings showing off their offensive repertoires.

George scored 18 points in the quarter, knocking down 6-of-8 shots. DeRozan was just as good, knocking down jumpers on five consecutive possessions at one point and reeling off 20 points in the period, including the last 16 for Toronto in the frame.

"As many shots (as he made) and as much as he was putting his team on his shoulders, I knew I had to do the same," George said.

The Raptors never managed to get within two possessions of the lead the rest of the way, as what was a somber environment only an hour or so earlier turned into a raucous celebration.

While George led the way, he got plenty of help from his supporting cast. Teague had 20 points and six assists, Young recorded a double-double with 15 points and 11 rebounds, and Ellis chipped in 10 points on 4-of-8 shooting.

Then there was Stephenson, who played the entire fourth quarter and tallied 12 points, two rebounds, and three assists — but his impact extended far beyond the box score.

"It's contagious," George said. "When he gets into that mode, he gets fired up, it's a contagious thing."


"That's him, man. That's natural. That's who Lance is and that's what this locker room lacked."

Stephenson's energy maybe went a little too far when he scored an uncontested layup in the closing seconds with the game well in-hand. The Raptors took exception to that play and Stephenson, DeRozan, and P.J. Tucker were all assessed technical fouls in the ensuing skirmish.


"I just want to say sorry to the Raptors," Stephenson said. "I didn't mean no harm. I was very excited, (it was) my first game back home, and I just wanted to do it for the fans."

DeRozan finished with 27 points on 9-of-21 shooting. DeMarre Carroll added 11 points, while Jonas Valanciunas contributed 10 points and 10 rebounds.

The Pacers return to Bankers Life Fieldhouse on Thursday night, April 6 to host the Milwaukee Bucks at 7:00 PM ET in another matchup with major playoff implications.






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
