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Sheridan Community Schools to host forum on referendum

On May 2, 2017, the Sheridan Community School district will be holding a special election to renew the district's operational referendum. After several parent and open meetings, it was determined, due to several factors accumulating on the district simultaneously and reducing its current funding, that it was important for the district to run the renewal this year in order to maintain

current programs and levels of achievement. While the district will be asking for a slight increase in the referendum rate itself, it will still maintain an overall tax rate below that of just three years ago and well below the rate at which the district first ran the referendum in 2012. In fact, the overall tax rate for SCS has dropped 15 cents since 2014. Very few districts have been able to show such a significant drop in such a short period of time.

The district is looking to renew its referendum for several reasons. Over the last several years, the district has lost over \$430,000 from state dollars and is projected to lose another \$330,000 in the upcoming three years. Overall, the district is looking to recoup a small portion of these losses. The increased referendum rate does not recoup all of this

money; it is closer to only a third of overall losses. The focus of the referendum funds will be continued excellence for the district as they look to maintain class sizes, enhance existing and needed programs, and continue the success they are seeing in graduation rates and student accomplishment.

The district will be hosting a public forum in order to answer any and all questions more in-depth for those interested. The date of the open forum will be April 18 starting at 6:00 at the Sheridan Public Library. All my life I have been an athlete; however, cancer has put a glitch in that. I find a lot of peace and good thoughts from working out on a regular basis. However, I still struggle with my memory and with complete concentration.

I exercise at Orange Theory and it stretches me, but it is something that I can complete. I might not be anywhere close to the way that I used to be able to exercise, but I am moving forward and getting in shape. Orange Theory

is a one hour workout split between a treadmill, a rower, and the weight floor. My ultimate goal is to lose the weight that I have gained from the occasional lack of activity due to the treatments. As I have covered in previous articles, I faced a major setback when I broke my arm last August -- a simple fall from having to go to the bathroom in the middle of the night.

My cancer progressed to my bones so they can be weak. However, I take a bone strengthener on a regular basis, and this seems to help. Over Spring Break I wanted to stay in shape so I scheduled workouts at Orange Theory on a regular basis. Unfortunately, it was about a 45

Westfield recognized as Tree City for 10th year

Fishers BPW approves 116th street resurfacing

The construction contract to resurface 116th Street from I-69 west to the city limit was approved Monday.

The Fishers Board of Public Works and Safety gave the okay to award the \$1.58 million dollar project. Construction is expected to begin in July or August of this year. The contract includes installation of ramps compliant with the provisions of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). A Community Crossing Grant awarded last year will pay up to \$1 million of this work as a matching grant.

The city's Director of Engineering, Jeff Hill, told the board detours and rerouting of traffic along 116th Street between I-69 & Cumberland Road ended at noon Monday. The work took over a week, in order to repair an

energy line. The construction was scheduled during HSE Schools spring break in order to minimize complications with school buses and because many families schedule out of town vacations during that time.

In other news from the Monday Board of Works session:

—A design services contract was awarded for a planned widening of 96th Street between Lantern and Cumberland Roads.

—In a last minute addition not on the board's published agenda, a \$65,000 design project was approved for the Department of Public Works new additional building to be constructed near the current facility on Eller Road.

—The police department will receive uplifting equipment for 10 new police interceptors in the amount of just over \$63,000.

minute drive from where we were staying. However, I decided to make the drive up there on a regular basis because the exercise is very therapeutic for me.

On this day, I had a lot on my mind because I had a close friend who was having a medical procedure. It was not a big deal, but it was on my mind. I kept trying to calculate when he was getting out of surgery vs. when I would be done with my workout. While my mind was wondering, I would quickly realize this was going to be a challenging workout. It was the kind that would exhaust you. Towards the end, I was to go from the weight floor to the treadmill. The person in front of you is "supposed" to shut down the treadmill before the shift.

I can remember my last thought was, "I hope everything's going ok with the procedure." With that thought, I put my foot on the treadmill... I suddenly realized that the treadmill was moving and I was going to fall. I subconsciously know to avoid my right arm because that is the one that I previously broke.

The treadmill starts moving and I am going down. My body somehow shifts to make sure that I fall on my left side so that I avoid my previously broken right arm. I

hit hard and it continues to run and it spits me out on the floor. I feel like one of those cupcakes from an old "I Love Lucy" film... Boom, I hit the floor. I am hurting but now I have 40 people looking at me...

I have scrapes on my hands and my knees. It is a major shock to the system. However, I quickly realize that none of my bones are aching so this is just a "scrape fall" -- thank goodness. It scared me to death, but I was having a great workout. This is the SECOND time I have fallen like this... How do I do this? Wait, why did the person in front of me not turn off the treadmill? Why does this happen to me?

Suddenly a guy comes up to me and is apologizing like crazy that he did not turn off the treadmill. I tell him not to worry about it. He obviously did not do it on purpose, but I am secretly thinking, "How can one get off the treadmill and go to a different station and not turn off the treadmill?" I am in some pain, but I will be fine. A small part of me is mad and wants to say, "Do you realize I have Stage 4 Cancer?" That's just the part of me that is feeling sorry for myself. I would never say that, and I just have to realize that this is just another hiccup in the cancer journey.

Blower Pac Inc., a long time existing Noblesville business, is experiencing fast paced growth and the immediate need to expand. We want them to stay and grow in Noblesville."

The new economic revitalization area projects include:

Noblesville Assisted Living Group

Location: 9600 East 146th Street

Project: Noblesville Assisted Living Group, LLC proposes to build a new four-story, 105,145-square-foot senior housing development on 3.67 acres in Noblesville Business Park. The facility will consist of 124 units (100 assisted living and 24 memory care/dementia) with a commercial kitchen, activity space, large dining room and other resources.

Finances: Total estimated capital investment is \$23 million for land and building construction, staff, fees and reserves. The real property new construction cost is approximately \$14 million.

Job impact: 56 new full time employees will be hired with an overall payroll of \$2.15 million.

Estimated Tax Savings: \$1,012,320 over four years for real property. Beginning in the fifth year and thereafter, the city estimates the tax payment to be \$389,354.

Timetable: The project is expected to begin this summer and be completed by the summer of 2018.

Universal Blower Pac, Inc.

Location: 440 Park 32 West Drive

Business Background: Universal Blower Pac, Inc. was founded by Ray Fiechter in 1979 and opened its current Noblesville Corporate Headquarters location in 1984. All of the company's

growth has occurred in Noblesville. They provide innovation for manufactured blower systems and engineered solutions nationally and globally.

Project: Universal Blower Pac, Inc. has purchased two acres to the west of its current footprint and plan to build a 8,925 square foot of warehousing and distribution space. The personal property to be added will consist of manufacturing equipment -- machines, welding equipment, testing stand and associated equipment, overhead crane and hoist. Logistical distribution equipment will consist of forklifts, racks and shelves.

Finances: Total new capital investment in real estate and personal property is \$1,140,325 to expand its headquarters, manufacturing, fabrication and assembly facility.

Job impact: The company anticipates hiring 16 new employees and will retain its 31 employees with an average salary of \$75,000.

Estimated Tax Savings: \$71,001 over five years for real property and \$5,472 over two years for personal property. Beginning in the sixth year and thereafter, the city estimates the tax payment to be \$23,667.

Timetable: The project is expected to begin in May.

As part of the resolution, the land is eligible for a declining tax phase-in for real and personal property investment. April 11 was the preliminary resolution, which is the introduction to an economic development project and lays out the initial request for approval with council. Because the "first look" resolution was passed, a public hearing and confirmatory resolution will be held at the next council meeting on April 25.

Turn lanes project at I-465/US 421 interchange begins Monday

Milestone Contractors plans to begin work on or after April 17 on a \$1.4 million project to add turn lanes at the Interstate 465 and U.S. 421/Michigan Road interchange on the north side of Indianapolis.

The first phase of construction will temporarily shift all lanes of southbound Michigan Road to the right, shift the alignment of the eastbound to northbound left-turn radius, and shorten the northbound to westbound left-turn lane to accommodate partial removal of the concrete median curb. All lanes and turn motions will remain open. This phase is scheduled to last through the end of April, weather depending.

Subsequent phases of construction will temporarily shift traffic and restrict one lane on the eastbound I-465 Exit 27 ramp to Michigan Road as the ramp is widened for an additional lane.

Specific schedule updates and traffic restrictions will be announced in advance of each phase of the project. Construction is anticipated to be complete by November.

About the project

The project seeks to increase capacity and improve traffic flow at the interchange by:

- * Lengthening the existing northbound Michigan Rd. right-turn lane to eastbound I-465,
- * Adding a second left-turn lane on southbound U.S. 421 to eastbound I-465,
- * Adding a third left-turn lane on the eastbound I-465 exit ramp to northbound U.S. 421

All interchange ramps are planned to remain open during the project. Some lanes at the interchange will be temporarily narrowed and shifted to maintain traffic and provide space for construction.

Community shredding and electronics recycling day is April 29

Last year, more than 13 million Americans were victims of identity theft. That's about one person every two seconds. To help fight fraud, a handful of community groups are joining together for a document-shredding, electronics-recycling, bulk-item and drug-disposal event on Saturday, April 29 from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. in the parking lot of Creekside Middle School, located on the southeast corner of West 126th Street and Shelborne Road.

The event is being sponsored by a team of organizations including AARP, Carmel Utilities, Carmel Police Department, Crime Stoppers of Central Indiana, Technology Recyclers, Shred-it and WISH-TV. AARP Indiana will be handing out information about their free Fraud Watch Network.

SHREDDING – Identity theft is one of the fastest growing crimes today and most identity information is still obtained through hard copy paper sources. Shredding significantly reduces your risk when disposing of confidential information. It is recommended that you shred any documents that include a signature, account number, social security number, medical or legal information. This professional shredding is sponsored by Shred-it to benefit Crime Stoppers of Central Indiana. A donation is requested of \$5 per bankers sized box or equivalent.

RECYCLING – The recycling drop-off event will be managed by Technology

Recyclers. The following items will be accepted: Computers, servers, peripherals, wiring, cable, battery backups, monitors, TVs (\$10 charge per monitor or TV); all electronics, phones, stereos, headsets, DVD players; any small appliance; IT equipment including hubs, switches, servers, routers, racks, etc; office equipment including fax machines, copiers, phone systems, industrial electronics, test equipment, medical equipment; and large appliances including refrigerators and freezers.

PRESCRIPTION DRUGS – Properly removing unused and expired medicines from the home helps protect the environment and our community by keeping them out of our water supply and reducing accidental poisoning and prescription drug abuse. Uniformed officers will be accepting pharmaceuticals for proper disposal.

BULK ITEMS – As part of the City of Carmel's trash program with Republic Services, drop-off of bulky items will be available free of charge to trash customers (This is for City Trash Customers only; an ID or utility bill required). Examples of items to drop off include lawn equipment, carpet, furniture, grills (but no propane tanks), water heaters, swing sets, mattresses, etc. Space is limited and on a first come, first served basis. No liquids, toxic, landscape waste or tires. No electronic waste in bulk item disposal. Those items will be accepted in electronics recycling.

State Road 38 paving project planned to begin in May

E & B Paving plans to begin work in May on a \$1.6 million project to repair and resurface more than nine miles of pavement on State Road 38 between State Road 32 in Noblesville and I-69 in Pendleton.

The project will include repairing aged sections of pavement on the stretch before applying a 3/4-inch ultrathin bonded wearing course between State Road 13 and State Road 32 and paving an inch-and-a-half asphalt overlay between I-69 and State Road 13.

Construction zone signs will be installed before the end of April. Crews are scheduled to begin pavement patching on or after May 1. Weather permitting, the ultrathin bonded wearing course will be applied between State Road 13 and State Road 32 by June, and resurfacing between I-69 and State Road 13 will follow. The project is expected to be complete before the end of July.

State Road 38 will remain open through the project. Flaggers will be used to direct traffic around work zones.

Ultra-thin bonded wearing courses and pavement preservation

Ultra-thin bonded wearing courses consist of applying a coat of polymer-modified liquid asphalt, which provides flexibility, immediately followed by paving a thin layer of hot mix asphalt, which provides strength.

The surface treatment is intended to preserve and extend the life of highways by an average of about 9 years, depending on traffic volumes.

The one-pass application is a fast-moving operation that allows traffic to drive on the surface treatment within minutes and causes minimal traffic delays.


Surface treatments such as asphalt overlays are intended to protect, preserve, and extend the life of the pavement below.

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
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
