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Interchange remains under construction through July . . .

Campus Parkway traffic pattern at I-69 Exit 210 shifts to double-crossover diamond today

The Campus Parkway interchange at Interstate 69 Exit 210 has been shifted into its new double-crossover diamond traffic pattern.

In order to implement the double-crossover diamond traffic pattern, Milestone Contractors temporarily closed Campus Parkway access over I-69 and some interchange ramps Tuesday night. Electronic message signs and police directed motorists to the Olio Road overpass to cross over the interstate during the overnight traffic pattern

Campus Parkway was expected to be open to traffic in a double-crossover diamond pattern by 6 a.m. today.

Interchange construction

continues

The Campus Parkway interchange will remain under construction and is expected to be fully open to traffic in its permanent configuration in July. Shifting traffic into the double-crossover diamond pattern now is intended to improve traffic flow during the remainder

of construction.

Multiple traffic lane shifts will be required in the upcoming months to complete remaining construction of the new interchange design. Each phase of remaining construction will bring the interchange closer to its final traffic configuration and capacity.

About the double-crossover diamond interchange

Two similar interchanges have been constructed with success in Indiana. The first was at I-69 and Dupont Road in Fort Wayne, and the second was built at I-65 and Worthsville Road in Greenwood.

This interchange design may appear unusual, but by following signs, pavement markings and traffic signal instructions, drivers find these interchanges easy to navigate.

Drivers that currently turn right at the

I-69 and Campus Parkway interchange will continue to do so.

Traffic signals, signs and pavement markings will briefly shift traffic to the left side of the road at the bridge across I-69. This allows left-turning traffic to flow more freely as it enters and exits

Through traffic on Campus Parkway will shift back to the right side of the road at the next traffic signal.

Added travel lane

construction

Reconfiguring Campus Parkway at I-69 to a double-crossover diamond interchange is part of the \$92 million I-69 Major Moves 2020 project adding a travel lane to each direction of I-69 between State Road 37 (Exit 205) and State Road 38 (Exit 219). In addition, other improvements are being made to rehabilitate existing bridges, pavement and drainage structures on the 15-mile stretch of interstate.

Two lanes of traffic in each direction of I-69 are currently shifted to accommodate construction of the additional

travel lanes. Signs direct large trucks to use the left lane while traffic is shifted toward the right shoulder through the work zone. The speed limit is reduced to 60 mph and further reduced to 50 mph when workers are present.



Lane closure starts Thursday night at eastbound I-465 exit ramp to U.S. 421 / Michigan Road

The REPORTER

Milestone Contractors plans to temporarily shift southbound traffic lanes on U.S. 421/Michigan Road and close one right-turn lane on the eastbound Interstate 465 Exit 27 ramp starting Thursday night.

Starting at 9 p.m. on Thursday, crews will close one right-turn lane on the east-bound I-465 exit ramp to southbound Michigan Road as work begins to widen the exit ramp for an additional left-turn lane. This phase of construction is expected to last until July, and two left-turn lanes and one right-turn lane will remain open on the eastbound exit ramp.

At the same time Thursday night, up to three lanes of southbound Michigan Road will be closed during overnight hours to paint temporary lane markings and shift traffic to the left, toward the median. These overnight lane closures are expected to end before 6 a.m. on Friday.

About the project

Milestone is the prime contractor on a \$1.4 million construction project adding turn lanes at the I-465 and U.S. 421/ Michigan Road interchange on the north side of Indianapolis. The project seeks to increase capacity and improve traffic flow at the interchange by:

• Lengthening the existing northbound Michigan Rd. right-turn lane to eastbound I-465,

• Adding a second left-turn lane on southbound U.S. 421 to eastbound I-465,

• Adding a third left-turn lane on the eastbound I-465 exit ramp to northbound U.S. 421

All interchange ramps are planned to remain open during the project. Some lanes at the interchange will be temporarily closed, narrowed or shifted to maintain traffic and provide space for construction.

Specific schedule updates and traffic restrictions will be announced in advance of each phase of the project. Construction is anticipated to be complete by November.

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

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Safe summer driving tips for teens, young adults

Warm weather means more young drivers on the road as they head to summer jobs, parties and embark on road trips. Often, young drivers feel invincible, but they shouldn't take their safety for granted.

Many experts say driver safety begins with tires, as they are the only thing connecting a car to the road. To help teens and young adults stay safe on the roads this summer and all year long, Cooper Tire & Rubber Company and the National Organizations for Youth Safety (NOYS) offer these tire safety tips.

· Check tire condition. Damaged tires can shorten tire life and even cause tire failure. Visually check tires for cuts, cracks, splits, punctures and bulges. If any of these conditions are spotted, or if there are any doubts about the condition of the tires, have them professionally inspected.

• Check tire pressure. Proper air pressure improves fuel consumption and helps prevent uneven wear of tires. It also offers drivers better control, which is important for those with less experience behind the wheel. More than 50 percent of American vehicles have at least one under-inflated tire, according to a Rubber Manufacturers Association

To test pressure, wait until tires are cool -- a minimum of three hours after driving. Then, remove the tire's valve cap and press the top of a tire pressure gauge firmly on the valve stem. A reading will pop up on the gauge. If the reading is lower than the recommended level, add air and check again. Once the recommended pressure is reached, replace the valve

• Check tire tread. Proper tread depth helps maintain traction, improves handling of the vehicle and prevents hydroplaning. To check it, insert the edge of a penny into the most worn groove of the tire tread, with Lincoln's head down and facing the driver. If the top of Lincoln's head is covered by tread, there is at least a minimum acceptable amount of tread. If the top of his head is visible at any point, it's time to replace

• Make it a habit. Technology can prepare young drivers for safer driving. For example, the free Tread Wisely app from Cooper Tire and NOYS, informs users how to check their tires using helpful videos and allows them to set automatic monthly reminders to perform tire checks. Other videos on the app instruct young drivers how to change a flat tire, what to do if they are in an accident, and how to handle other issues on the road. The app also includes a unique "I got there" feature, which reminds young drivers to let parents or friends know after they make it to their destination safely, using pre-loaded text messages.


"I think I played really good," said Compton. "Obviously there's a couple shots left out there, a couple putts left on the edge. Overall, I think it was a pretty good round,"

In addition to the top three finishers in each event, the next best four times from all the sectionals that feed into the Lafayette Jeff regional also get to move on.

Fishers had two event wins. First up, the 4x100 relay team of Amaya Poole, Danielle Harrison, Kayla Crose and Perryman won that event in a new sectional record time of 47.61.

"It's honestly crazy," said Crose, a senior. "I've grown up being an alternate freshman year, and being able to actually improve and get better. It's an amazing feeling to be able to come out and do this. We work hard at practice for this."

Kamya Lapsley, a junior, joined the Tigers' relay team in the winner's circle with a first-place finish in the 800 run.

"That's been a big goal of mine for a while, and my coaches keep pushing me with it," said Tyler, "and it really helps to have their support."

Abi Little took the 1600 run, while Maria Millers also ran on the 4x8 with Susanna Sharples-Gordon and Kat Dombroski

Little and Anderson ended the meet how they began it - with a win in the 4x400 relay. The two joined Anna Hazelrigg and Lillian Walter to give Noblesville blue ribbon No.

Westfield took home two events. Emily Robertson edged out Mackenzie by .01 seconds - 14.86 to 14.87 - to take home the 100 hurdle race. Jada Caldwell finished first in the shot put with an impressive throw of

Sheridan's Brittany Welch also got in on the record fun. Welch set a new mark in the long jump, leaping 18 feet, 1-1/2 inches to run away with the blue ribbon.

"Last year I went to the regionals and I get 18 and a quarter, so this is definitely my longest jump," said Welch. "I did really well. In the trials, I kept improving by an inch, and my last trial run I improved by two inches."


