With breweries, winery...

Westfield sees exciting economic activities

Recognized for its rapid growth in population and the success of Grand Park, Westfield is also establishing a unique reputation for itself in an unexpected way: as home to breweries and wineries.

Grand Junction Brewing Co. was the city’s first brewery, opening in 2014 in a former hardware store in Westfield’s downtown. Grand Junction quickly gained traction and in just a few short years has added a 10,000 square foot taproom and production facility on 181st Street near Grand Park.

“At this location, you will find a vast selection of incredible, hand-crafted brews to satisfy any palate in a fun, industrial

atmosphere,” said Grand Junction Brewing owner Jon Knight. “There is an outdoor patio conveniently located off the Monon to enjoy those lovely Indiana nights, award-winning craft beer, corn hole, darts, arcade games and even Brew Yoga Happy Hour on Friday evenings. How could you not have a great time?”

Westfield recently welcomed a second brewing company when Field Brewing began construction on a 5,537 square foot facility at the intersection of Main and Cherry streets. The brewery will initially produce four flagship beers, and will produce two limited-release, seasonal products on a rotating schedule. The

brewery will utilize a “farm to bottle” strategy, employing Indiana-grown malts and hops.

Field will offer a casual dining experience with indoor and outdoor seating, as well as a broad range of menu items featuring farm-to-table cuisine.

“We are excited about the Westfield community and its growth,” Field owners Greg and Jackie Dikos said. “With the city’s commitment to the development of the downtown area, this is the perfect location to execute our vision of a neighborhood brewery.”

For non-beer drinkers, Westfield recently added its very first winery. Urban

Vines opened its facility last month on 161st Street and has already seen heavy traffic. Noah Herron, the winery’s owner, credits the location near the Monon and other trail connections for that, saying those connections make it easy for people to walk or ride bikes to the winery.

“Westfield is one of the fastest growing cities in Indiana. We wanted a location where our winery can grow with the community,” Herron said.

Health care

What do you do when you are 46 years old and have Stage 4 Lung Cancer? I know the first thing everyone thinks is that you must be a smoker... No, I never smoked a cigarette in my life. I have no idea how I acquired this disease -- the doctors have no idea how it happened. However, there are lots of young people that have non-smoker’s lung cancer. Sure we do not get a lot of publicity, but I have been to a handful of lung cancer events where I have met plenty of young people with this awful disease.

The year is 2016 and we sold our business... I had a healthcare provider -- now that health care provider has decided to exit the state of Indiana. The cancer is in my lungs and my bones and I have two kids aged 14 and 12... I get scanned every 90 days, and I take a chemo pill on a daily basis that helps keep my cancer from spreading. So, now what do you do?

Well after some research, it appears that I may still have a couple of options in Indiana. What will happen if they do not replace Obamacare with something else? I would probably have yearly bills in the \$100K range. This is the reality and I am just one of thousands of people that would be in serious trouble if Obama-care is not replaced with something similar.

I do not want to get political, but there are lots of people that desperately need some type of dependable healthcare. I trust that they will come up with “something,” but obviously there are no guarantees.

Last year was kind of brutal because I tripped when I was in California and broke my right humerus. They put me in an ambulance and rushed me to the local hospital. The doctors had to put a rod in the humerus which is the bone that goes from your shoulder to your elbow. They also discovered a couple of other “soft spots” -- one in my knee and one in my vertebrae. Thus, the lung cancer had spread to my bones. They did radiation on my back and continue to give me bone shots every 90 days. Fortunately, these treatments have worked fairly well and as of right now I am doing well. However, I did struggle with some of my body’s reactions to the painkiller pills which caused weight gain, increased anxiety, and depression.

Fortunately, I have been able to overcome most of those issues by going to Orange Theory to work out four to five times a week. Yes, it is difficult to exercise when you have had a chunk of

First time in years for Indianapolis-area students...

Noblesville Speech students place highly in national competition

Members of the Noblesville High School speech team “MillerSpeech” competed in the national speech finals in Birmingham, Ala., from June 18 to 23, scoring two national placements. Over 4,000 students competed in this year’s national tournament and this is the fifth consecutive year NHS students have qualified to participate.

Jack Vastag and Abigail VanMeter are Noblesville’s first national finalists in team history, with Jack placing second in the nation in Extemporaneous Commentary, besting nearly 250 competitors, and Abigail placing fifth in the nation in Informative Speaking. Abigail also bested almost 250 competitors and earned high praise from her panel of 47 judges across 13 rounds of competition.

This is the first time in many years that any Indianapolis-area students have won top placing. Two Ben Davis students also placed in this year’s competition.

The Miller Speech team overall earned its first School of Honor commendation, recognizing the NHS program as among the Top 40 in the nation out of nearly 3,200 nationally registered high school programs.

Furthermore, I have lost a big chunk of the weight that was gained from some of the meds that I had to take to stop the anxiety and depression. Thus, life is currently good.

However, I cannot afford to go without insurance. I understand that not everyone likes Obamacare, etc... I am just hoping that our government comes up with a solution that continues to cover me and millions of other people that would be put in a very difficult situation without health insurance.

Fishers Council moves new iTown location one step closer to passage

The Fishers City Council held a rare early-morning session to allow a proposed new site for the iTown Church to move forward quickly. By passing the plan on first reading Wednesday morning, that clears the way for the Fishers Plan Commission to hold a July 12th public hearing and vote on a recommendation for the council.

The church originally planned to build a new house of worship at 126th Street and Brooks School Road, taking out the Gray Eagle golf course driving range. After complaints from residents in the area, iTown is now proposing to locate their new building at 136th Street and Brooks School Road, on a plot of land now being farmed.

Fishers had passed an overlay area near I-69 where churches and other nonprofit organizations would be limited. The measure under consideration would allow such use at the 136th Street location. The city says that area is not well suited for other types of development.

Director of Planning and Zoning for the City of Fishers, Tony Bagato, told the council this area at 136th & Brooks School Road is near the Interstate, but there is no nearby access to the highway. The nearest interchange is at Exit 210,

Once the Plan Commission holds the July 12 public hearing and votes a recommendation, the City Council could act on the new location for iTown as early as the July 17 regular council meeting.

Protect your money: There's an app for that

(StatePoint) Since the credit card made its debut as an alternative to cash over 50 years ago, more Americans are using debit or credit cards as a primary payment method than ever before. In addition to the convenience and simplicity of using a card, another reason they have become increasingly popular is because they offer certain protections for consumers.
