Match short- and long-term goals with the right investments

Not all investments are created equal. Some are better suited for short-term goals, while others can help you build resources for objectives far in the future. As an investor, then, one of your biggest challenges will be to match your short- and long-term goals with the appropriate investment vehicles. How should you proceed?

For starters, identify your short- and long-term goals. Your shorter-term goals will change throughout your life. When you are starting out in your career, for example, you might aspire to purchase a home in the next three to five years. Later on, though, your biggest short-term objective might be



to save enough money for a long tour of Europe – without racking up credit card debt. As for long-term goals, your biggest one likely will be to enjoy a comfortable retirement. But you may well have other long-term plans, too, such as sending your kids to college in 10 or 15 years.

After you have a clear sense of your short- and long-term goals, you can choose the right investments to help you meet them. Let's start with the shorter-term ones. When you're saving for a down payment on a home or for an expensive European vacation, you want to make sure that a certain amount of money will be available to you at a certain time. Consequently, you may want to avoid stocks or stock-based vehicles, which will constantly fluctuate in price, because you don't want the value of your investment to be down at the moment you need the money. Instead, for short-term goals, you may want to consider a fixed-

income vehicle, such as a bond, which is designed to provide regular interest payments and return your full principal upon the bond's maturity (providing the issuer doesn't default, which, with investment-grade bonds, is generally unlikely).

For longer-term goals, such as college for your kids and a comfortable retirement for yourself, it's a different story. To achieve these goals – and especially for retirement – you generally need to accumulate as much as you can. As a result, you need investments with growth potential, which means you will need to consider stocks and stock-based instruments. As mentioned above, stocks will always fluctuate in value, and they may be worth more or less than your original investment when sold. However, building a portfolio with an investment mix that's appropriate for your risk tolerance, and that contains a reasonable amount of growth-oriented vehicles, can

potentially help you overcome short-term volatility and continue making progress toward your long-term goals.

Plus, you have some attractive long-term options available. With a 529 college savings plan, you can save for college and possibly achieve tax benefits, too. And by contributing regularly to your IRA and 401(k) or similar employer-sponsored plan, you can defer taxes while spreading your dollars among a wide range of investments. But there's one thing all long-term investments have in common: You need patience and discipline to stick with them.

So, there you have some ideas on short- and long-term investing. Keeping this distinction in mind when you invest can help boost your confidence that you're making appropriate moves for all your goals.

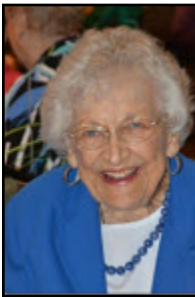

Emily Kiser commits to Michigan

Another Hamilton County girls basketball state has committed to the University of Michigan.

Noblesville senior-to-be Emily Kiser made the announcement on her Twitter account that she will be heading to Ann Arbor to join the Wolverines team. Kiser has been a starter for the Millers ever since her first game as a freshman back in 2014.

Kiser posted her tweet Wednesday afternoon, saying that she was "excited and thankful" to be committing to Michigan. Kiser is the second county girls player to announce her intentions to play for the Wolverines: Carmel senior-to-be Amy Dilk committed to the school a couple weeks ago.

Kiser averaged 19.4 points and 11.6 rebounds per game for Noblesville last season, when she took on an expanded leadership role after the graduation of two Miller greats, Katelyn O'Reilly and Alexis Shannon. But Kiser had been a good player from the moment she started her NHS career. As a freshman, she scored 5.8 points per game and was already dominating the boards with a 5.2 rebound average. Kiser's numbers continued to improve her sophomore year, as she averaged 9.2 points and 8.0 rebounds.

Michigan has continued to improve itself over the years. The Wolverines have won at least 20 games every year beginning with the 2012-13 season, and have played in either the WNIT or the NCAA tournament in nine of the last 10 post-seasons.

Michigan finished last year with a 28-9 mark and won a dramatic WNIT final, beating Georgia Tech 89-79 in three overtimes. The Wolverines will be relatively young again this year, despite graduating Siera Thompson, who became only the second player in Michigan history to reach 1000 points, 500 assists and 400 rebounds.

Pacers acquire Oladipo and Sabonis

The Indiana Pacers announced Thursday they have acquired Victor Oladipo and Domantas Sabonis from the Oklahoma City Thunder in exchange for Paul George.

"We feel very strongly about the potential Victor and Domantas bring to our team and what they mean for the future of the franchise," said Pacers President of Basketball Operations Kevin Pritchard. "Both are highly competitive, highly skilled and both are winners. That is why both were lottery picks, that is why we sought them out to be part of this deal."

Victor Oladipo was drafted by the Orlando Magic as the second overall pick in the 2013 NBA Draft. As a rookie with the Magic, he was named to the 2013-14 NBA All-Rookie First Team and was twice named Eastern Conference Rookie of the Month (December and February). He played three seasons with the Magic before being traded to the Oklahoma City Thunder in June 2016. In his four seasons in the NBA, the 6-4, 210-pound guard has career averages of 15.9 points, 4.4 rebounds and 3.7 assists per game. Oladipo played collegiately at Indiana University for three years with averages of 10.7 points and 5.2 rebounds per game.

Domantas Sabonis was drafted with the 11th overall pick in the 2016 NBA Draft, also by the Orlando Magic, before being traded

to the Oklahoma City Thunder later that evening as part of the same trade that sent Oladipo to the Thunder. As a rookie with the Thunder, Sabonis played in 81 games (66 starts) and averaged 5.9 points and 3.6 rebounds per game. He played collegiately at Gonzaga for two years with averages of 13.5 points and 9.4 rebounds per game.

"As for the trade, it was difficult both on a personal and professional level," said Pritchard. "Everyone here knows what Paul meant to this franchise; he was both a tremendous human being as well as player here for seven years. We thank Paul and his family for their contributions to the Pacers and wish him well."

George was drafted by the Pacers with the 10th overall pick in the 2010 NBA Draft. In his seven years with the Pacers, he was a four-time NBA All-Star for the Eastern Conference, as well as the 2012-13 NBA Most Improved Player. He was named the Eastern Conference Player of the Month three times (Nov. 2012, Nov. 2015 and Apr. 2017); and was a three-time All-NBA Third Team member (2012-13, 2013-14 and 2015-16). In those seven years with the Pacers, he had career averages of 18.1 points, 6.3 rebounds, 3.2 assists and 1.7 steals per game.
