

Nobiesville's iviegan wiles seeks Luke Kenley's seat

Monday, Noblesville Common Council President Megan G. Wiles announced her intention to run in the Republican caucus to replace Senator Luke Kenley in

State Senate District 20. "Hamilton County has been very fortunate to have Senator Kenley's leadership at the Statehouse for many years," said Wiles. "After careful consideration and discussions with my family and several community leaders, I have decided to run for the Indiana District 20 Senate seat."

Megan Wiles has been an active volunteer with many Hamilton County organizations for decades. "I am seeking this office because I believe it's important that we have local leaders serving us at the Statehouse who understand the challenges that are facing our communities," stated Wiles.

Wiles cited her role on the Noblesville Common Council as an important perspective to take to the Indiana General Assembly. "I understand how Statehouse decisions affect local communities and our citizens," explained Wiles. "I am committed to listening to diverse points of view and ultimately making decisions I believe are in the best interest of our community

and our State."

Stating her priorities, Wiles continued, "I intend to focus on job creation, keeping taxes low, and making sure our growing schools and communities have the resources they need."



Wiles The Indiana Republican State Committee will oversee the caucus as Republican precinct committee members will vote to select the next State Senator for District 20. "I look forward to talking with the precinct committeemen and women, as well as voters of District 20, to discuss their priorities and how I may use my experience and skills to best serve this district and the State of Indiana," Wiles concluded.

Megan G. Wiles grew up and is raising her family in State Senate District 20. She is currently serving as the President of the Noblesville Common Council after taking office in 2016. Megan is also the Executive Director of the Riverview Health Foundation which benefits Riverview Health, the

county hospital of Hamilton County. Prior to joining Riverview Health Foundation, Megan was President of Legacy Fund, the Community Foundation of Hamilton County for more than eight years. While in that role, Megan worked with community leaders to identify and address local issues and help direct resources to provide a positive impact in Hamilton County. Megan is a member of the Noblesville Mid-Day Rotary Club and DG Chapter of the P.E.O. Sisterhood. Megan has been a community volunteer with such organizations as the Conner Prairie Alliance (past Board Chair), Girl Scouts of Central Indiana (Cookie Mom), numerous committees with the Noblesville Schools and Guerin Catholic High School, and her lifelong church, St. Michael's Episcopal Church in Noblesville.

Megan is a graduate of the Hamilton County Leadership Academy as well as a graduate of Noblesville High School and Ball State University. Megan and her husband of more than 20 years, Greg, live in Noblesville with their high school aged children Garrett (Guerin Catholic) and Grace (Noblesville High).

No decision expected soon in fate of Nickel Plate Rail Line

One thing became clear at Monday night's Hoosier Heritage Port Authority meeting - the future of the Nickel Plate Rail Line will not be decided anytime soon. A fifth proposal for a rail

operator from Iowa Pacific was originally rejected as late filed, but documentation was provided showing a snafu in filing the paperwork at the courthouse.

The first four proposals have been scored and the Iowa Pacific proposal now must be scored. The Authority will conduct a special meeting at 5:30 p.m. on Tuesday, July 18, releasing the scores of all five proposals received.

Authority President Mike Obergfell says once the scoring is completed and the Authority approves it, the proposals will go to the owners of the line for final approval. The owners include Hamilton County as well as the cities of Noblesville and Fishers.

That means we are at least weeks, maybe longer, from a final decision on the future of the Nickel Plate Line.

Fishers and Noblesville have announced plans to create a trail along the rail line from 96th Street north to Pleasant Street in Noblesville. The Authority sent out requests for proposals so that all the options on the future use of the rail line can be considered.

Meanwhile, the Indiana Transportation Museum has filed a request for a restraining order from the federal 7th Circuit Court of Appeals allowing them to run the Indiana State Fair Train between Fishers and the state fairgrounds this year. A decision by the court is expected within 10 days.



Noblesville: "No merit in HUD investigation"

Federal authorities with the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) are investigating housing discrimination complaints against the city of Noblesville and Hamilton County over the lack of low-income housing.

Noblesville and Hamilton County governments receive federal funding aimed at helping communities reduce poverty. The complaints allege both entities violated the fair housing requirements associated with

Hamilton County has a total of 330

subsidized housing units. Of those, Noblesville has 325. Hamilton County Area Neighborhood Development (HAND) operates 96 subsidized units throughout the county, with most of those servicing

According to the complaint a recent study by a development and consulting firm estimated Hamilton County communities need approximately 11,000 additional housing units.

"The City of Noblesville does not see any merit in the claim against the city filed with HUD," Robert Herrington, Public Aftold The Reporter. "Noblesville has more subsidized housing than any other community in Hamilton County even though we have less than 25 percent of the total county population. Also, the city is in the process of amending ordinances to accept certain types of federal Housing Choice Voucher Programs throughout the city. The city is home to a variety of housing levels and claims to the contrary are unsupported by the evidence. We continue to evaluate our procedures and are diligently preparing our response to the complaint."



Soccer to generate \$12.2 million for Westfield

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'More Light' at Conner Prairie

The latest creation in a growing museum theater collaboration between Conner Prairie and an Indianapolis youth theater organization begins a five-day run July 27.

"More Light: Douglass Returns" is a fulllength play written by Indiana playwright Celeste Williams and inspired by the historic return to Indiana by prominent American abolitionist, writer and speaker Frederick Dou-

The play came about after Williams, a former Indianapolis Star journalist, wrote a non-fiction piece in 2014 about Frederick Douglass for an area arts journal. That article recounted an appearance by Douglass in Pendleton, in 1843, when he was severely beaten as he attempted to give a speech against slavery. That incident of violence contrasted with the reception Douglass received in 1880 — some 37 years later — at a political rally in Noblesville.

"By then, the Civil War had been fought. Douglass gained his freedom and became one of the most famous orators of his time," Williams said. "Race relations in the 19th century were still fraught with problems but by the time Douglass returned to Indiana for a speech in 1880, he was welcomed with enthusiastic crowds of people who lauded his position as a statesman."

"More Light: Douglass Returns" is a Main Street Production in association with the Roberts Settlement and is directed by Cheryl Fesmire, a historical interpreter at the Indiana Historical Society. The play is supported by the Christel DeHaan Family Foundation and is part of the Giving Voice Initiative, which focuses on the African-American presence in Indiana history.

Performances are 7 p.m. on July 27, 3 p.m. on July 29, 7 p.m. on July 30, 3 p.m. on Aug. 5 and 7 p.m. on Aug. 6. All performances are in Lilly Theater inside the Welcome Center at Conner Prairie, located at 13400 Allisonville Road in Fishers.



Elliott, 21, from Dawsonville, Georgia, visited IMS and Gilbert Big Machine Brickyard 400 on Sunday, July 23. He took a helicopter tour of the city, threw axes at logs at Bad Axe Throwing in downtown Indianapolis, met with local media, raced a kart against IMS President Doug Boles and ties for teams and drivers to gamble on different strategies met and chatted with young USAC .25 competitors racing July 5-9 at the Battle of the Brickyard at IMS.

IMS also is special because it's one of the trickiest balancing acts between power and handling in NASCAR. The front and back straightaways require horsepower to cover their respective 5/8ths of a mile as quickly as possible. But a good-handling car is required to navigate the four turns, banked at a relatively flat nine degrees.

"Finding that middle road is important here," Elliott said. "Power is key, also aero balance in the car and long straightaways, making sure the car is not too draggy. You want to maximize that. On the same front, if you don't get through the corner well, the straightaway is never going to be good.

"It's a fine line, for sure."

Elliott also continues to learn about the razor-thin line between winning and finishing second in the ultra-competseason in the No. 24 NAPA Auto Parts Chevrolet, second only to Martin Truex Jr. in that department.

But Elliott is still searching for his first win and arguably tops the list of NASCAR's most eligible first-time winners.

If that victory came at the Brickyard, Elliott and his father would form the first father-son duo to win this race. Hendrick teammate Dale Earnhardt Jr. also has that chance this year in his final start at IMS, as Dale Earnhardt won in 1995 at IMS

"We've had some good weeks and bad weeks and everything in between," Elliott said of his 2017 performance. "We just haven't had a fantastic week yet. That's obviously the goal. We'll keep after it.
