Caucus to fill Kenley's spot should be public

It is beginning to look like a crowded field of candidates later summer when precinct committeemen choose a new state senator to fill out retiring State Sen. Luke Kenley's term. But, if tradition maintained



the public and the press won't be witness to it. Kenley announced earlier this month he will resign Sept. 30 from the Senate where he has been an influential member for 25 years. Up to a half-dozen local Republicans have either announced they want the District 20 seat or are considering running

The new state senator will be selected by a caucus of the precinct committeemen and women of the district. And, due to the lack of state law guaranteeing a public and open caucus, the selection process will likely be closed to the public.

file for the vacant seat, win in the caucus and be be sworn into office before the public knows who that person is. There is no public call for interested persons to file, no requirement that names of candidates be public, and no requirement that the caucus vote be public.

State law allows political parties to hold private meetings to discuss political strategy, elect officers, and apparently by omission, hold closed sessions to fill vacancies in public office. It is a glaring example of the lack of transparency that most politicians claim to oppose.

In the current case, five candidates have come forward to announce their intentions. Megan Wiles, Victoria Spartz, Sue Finkam, Brad Beaver and Joe Morris have made their plans known. Others may do so, but are not required to tell anyone except the party leadership which will notify committee members and hold the caucus at a yet to be determined date. In the past, Hamilton County Republican Chair Laura Campbell must be credited with revealing the date and location of a caucus, names of those running, and the winner, none of which she would be required to make public.

Mrs. Campbell has said, however, that doors will be closed because she believes such action could prevent undue influence being exerted on committeemen.

This writer believes an office as important as state senator, and any public office for that matter, should not be filled in secret. The law that seems to allow it should be amended to open the doors when choosing a public official who will be representing all the people of his or her jurisdiction. It is the right thing to do.

lifting and hauling.





Hildebrand, who is soon to start his junior year as a Boilermaker, first garnered medalist honors in qualifying at Sand Creek Country Club in Chesterton early this week to advance to the 116th U.S. Amateur Championship.

Later this week, Hildebrand stamped his name on an elite list of golfers - including more than a few professionals - by winning the Northern Amateur, which also took place at Sand Creek in Chesterton.

At the US Amateur qualifying, Hildebrand earned medalist honors after shooting identical rounds of 69 for a 36-hole total of 6-under par 138. He defeated his first US Amateur Championship, played Aug. 14 to 20 at Riviera Country Club and Bel-Air Country Club (stroke play co-host) in Los Angeles.

Hildebrand recorded nine birdies, 24 pars and three bogeys during the day and was tied for second after 18 holes. His final round 69 was one of just two rounds in the 60s during the afternoon session. Hildebrand won medalist honors out of 80 players competing for three spots.

Hildebrand will be among 312 players competing at Riviera and Bel-Air. The top 64 through 36 holes of stroke play advance to match play, beginning Aug. 16.

But Hildebrand wasn't done yet. He won the prestigious Northern Amateur, a 54-hole tournament that finished on Friday, with a dominant 11-under par 205. Hildebrand's score was four shots ahead of second place.

Hildebrand started slowly, with a twounder 70 effort for his first round. That included four birdies and put him in the lead pack. In the second round, Hildebrand shot place, making five birdies along the way.

The champions list at the Northern Amateur includes several players that have gone on to PGA careers, including another Indiana native, Bo Van Pelt. The Richmond graduate won the 1995 edition, and went on to a successful pro career, getting as high as No. 20 in the Official World Golf Rankings.

Speaking of rankings, Hildebrand is making an impact on the World Amateur Golf Rankings. He currently holds a rank of No. 162. The rankings rate over 10,000 players in 4,000 tournaments across the globe. A complicated point system is used to rank the golfers; Hildebrand currently holds a point average of 890.2044, the top ranked man is Joaquin Niemann of Chile, with an average of 1293.0334.

Last year's Northern Amateur counted Charles Waddell by one shot to advance to in the rankings as a category "F" tournament. Events are listed in schedule strength beginning with Elite, then by a letter ranking from "A" to "G." The NCAA Division I and the U.S. Amateur are considered Elite events.

> Only players who finish in the top two "F" events earn points, so Hildebrand could see a jump in his ranking when the new list comes out Wednesday morning.

> The rankings are maintained by the Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St Andrews in Scotland - known as the "Home of Golf." The R&A publishes new rankings every Wednesday at noon British time, which is 7 a.m. Eastern time.

> Meanwhile, Hildebrand wasn't the only player at the Northern Amateur. Johnny Watts, a Hamilton Southeastern graduate and incoming Ball State senior tied for 10th at Sand Creek, finishing with a one-under par 215. Watts totaled nine birdies and also made a hole in one - Watts aced the Par 3 hole No. 13 in the first round.

Allgaier leads opening day of practice for Lilly Diabetes 250

Justin Allgaier came to grips with the new equipment package for the Lilly Diabetes 250 faster than any other driver, turning the top overall lap of two practice sessions for the NASCAR XFINITY Series on Friday at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway.

Allgaier led the second practice at 166.485 mph in the No. 7 Breyers Chevrolet. Elliott Sadler was second overall at 166.420 with his session-leading lap in the first practice in the No. 1 OneMain Financial Chevrolet.

NASCAR XFINITY Series cars are using an engine restrictor plate and an aero duct for the first time at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway at this event, in an effort to create closer racing and more passing on the 2.5-mile oval.

"There are still a lot of unknowns, but I wasn't as on board with it before we got here," Allgaier said of the new technical package. "I have a fast race car, so I'm not disappointed in the package. For us, we need to put on a good race for the fans. This racetrack, this area of the country, Indianapolis is a racing town. We talking about Racing USA in Mooresville (North Carolina), but Indianapolis is built on that racing foundation.

"I feel like, if nothing else, for the fans that come and the fans that watch on TV, this race is going to be exciting, and we're trying to put on a great race."

Matt Tifft was third at 166.291 in the No. 19 Surface/Fanatics Toyota. Kyle Busch, who has won this race the last two years, was fourth at 166.162 in the No. 18 NOS Energy Drink Rowdy Toyota.
