## Deputy Jon Tindal receives national award

Hamilton County Sheriff's Office Deputy Jon Tindal was presented with the Regional Exceptional Service Award by the National Association of School Resource Officers during the organization's annual conference in Washington, D.C. on July 25. The award is a competitive process which recognizes outstanding contributions to the school resource program and dedication to the school community.

Deputy Tindal, who serves as School Resource Officer for Hamilton Heights Middle School in Arcadia, was nominated for the Regional Exceptional Service Award by Indiana School Resource Officer Association 2nd Vice President, Sgt. D.J. Schoeff of the Carmel Police Department. In nominating Tindal for the award, Schoeff com-

mented not only on Tindal's daily work with the students, teachers and parents, but also on the creation of the "Dawg Pound" at the school.

During his duties as SRO at the school, Deputy Tindal observed many of the students had little personal interaction with each other. Even during lunch time in the cafeteria, Tindal noticed an unusually quiet atmosphere which he attributed to students focusing almost exclusively on social media devices and cell phones. Tindal decided to use his creativity and passion for promoting positive behaviors to encourage students to interact with each other and to include those often left on the fringes.

Coordinating with school administrators, Deputy Tindal obtained permission to transform an empty storage room into what is

now called the Dawg Pound. Several local businesses provided donations of materials and finances as Tindal and a group of volunteers cleaned, painted and furnished the room. The room transformed from an unused space into a vibrant room, painted with school colors and the school mascot. At no cost to the school or taxpayers, the room now boasts a popcorn maker, two Xbox units, a large screen TV complete with a surround-sound system and numerous games.

The Dawg Pound is a "device-free" zone where students are not allowed to use cell phones, tablets, or other similar devices. Tindal encourages students to use the games and equipment as a means for direct interaction as they engage

## Mental health in Fishers, the real issue

Mayor Scott Fadness began his Mental Health Initiative Report to the Community Monday afternoon with some statistics and stories from the previous week. When police arrive at the scene of a resident suffering a mental health episode that is serious, that person

is subject to what is termed in law enforcement parlance an "immediate detention."

The mayor said one immediate detention run was for a person suffering from depression and schizophrenia, feeling down and seeking help. Another run involved a woman reporting her daughter had sent suicidal messages that were "concerning," finding a gun on the stairway. In yet another, a suicidal man was attacking himself with a knife and was bleeding. Another man was threatening suicide over the recent breakup with his girlfriend.

So there was a total of seven immedi-

ate detentions in Fishers during one week in July. The mayor said there were 11 suicides in Fishers during 2016 and five so far in 2017.

That set for the stage for the panel discussion led by the mayor to talk about the accomplishments of his two-and-a-half year initiative to deal with mental health issues in Fishers.

During the panel discussion, Dr. Suzanne Clifford of Inspiring Transformations said suburbia, in general, is ignored

## 'Flyover' road coming to 146th Street

Hamilton County motorists who drive 146th Street and wish to head south on Keystone toward Indianapolis should be happy to hear that a new section of roadway to access southbound Keystone from 146th will be well underway by this time next year.

The elevated link, sometimes called a 'flyover' will be less than a half-mile long, but will make a critical link essentially extending Lowe's Way to the south over northbound Keystone and then curve into the southbound lanes of Keystone where drivers encounter no stoplights until reaching 96th Street.

(Currently it is more difficult to get onto the popular parkway, with motorists having to use 151st Street in order to get on U.S. 31 which has an exit for Keystone.)

County Highway Director Brad Davis prefers to call the project a Lowe's Way extension. Bids will be taken in February, and likely be awarded in March. He reports that about \$4 million in federal funds will help pay the estimated \$12 million cost of the Lowe's Way connection.

## Hamilton County recognized for e-government solutions

HAMILTON County has been honored by the Center for Digital Government and the National Association of Counties for its efforts to streamline delivery of government services using technology.

The county placed eighth in its size category in the 15th annual Digital Counties Survey, which recognizes the best technology practices nationwide.

"Digital counties are leveraging technology to improve the ways they conduct business and engage with citizens in increasingly innovative and exciting ways,"

Center for Digital Government Executive Director Todd Sander said in a news release announcing the honorees. "The Center for Digital Government congratulates this year's winners for their work to reduce costs, encourage citizen engagement, increase efficiencies and proactively address citizen expectations."

Ten winners were named in each of five population categories. Hamilton County competed in the third-largest group, against other counties with 250,000-499,999 residents. Douglas County, Col., placed first in the category. No other Indiana counties

placed among the Top 10 in any category.

The 2017 winners were recognized July 22 at the National Association of Counties conference in Columbus, Ohio.

"As technology continues to grow in all facets of our lives, county governments are adapting and innovating," said association Executive Director Matthew Chase. "The Digital Counties Survey spotlights how counties deploy technology to enhance services and benefit residents while being responsible stewards of taxpayer resources."

Hamilton County government has long

recognized the value of technology as a cost-effective way to enhance services. Over time, the county has been judiciously implementing e-government solutions.

It has been recognized with a Digital County Award in 14 out of the last 15 years. Hamilton County did not enter in 2016.

each other in friendly competition and social situations. Students of all ages and abilities come together without exclusion as they enjoy the company of new friends and acquaintances. Tindal notes he has observed students that typically struggle socially now blossoming and thriving with other students in the Dawg Pound.

Use of the Dawg Pound comes in various ways with students rewarded with lunch in the room in return for positive behaviors in the classroom. Teachers also use the Dawg Pound as a reward for students completing tasks and work. One teacher had several missing assignments by a student successfully completed after students learned time in the Dawg Pound was a potential reward.

The Hamilton County Sheriff's Office partners with the Hamilton Heights School Corporation to assign three full-time school resource officers. The deputies not only offer security and threat prevention but also seek to foster positive relationships with the school community as the deputies provide educational and outreach programs throughout the year.

A second, future phase of the project will take the improvement to the north end of existing Range Line Road to allow direct access from 146th to Range Line, the main route into downtown Carmel. There is also good news for the highway department from Purdue University estimates of revenue coming to the county from the state increase in gas tax and other fees adopted by state legislation this year.

Davis said estimates show about \$3 million next year for the county. Actual disbursements will reportedly start in August of this year, and would appear to amount to something over \$1 million yet this year. This money is for the county unit only, and does not include disbursements to the eight cities and towns in Hamilton County. The formula used for these additional payments is the same that is used for disbursement of currently allocated gas tax revenues.

in the area of mental health services. She added that, of all places, Silicon Valley in California contains a "cluster" of suicides.

Dr. Bernice A. Pescosolido was the keynote speaker for the luncheon, held at Launch Fishers. She described how stigma devalues a person as a human being, separating the stigmatized person from the rest of society. She has worked to deal with the stigma felt by those needing treatment for mental health issues.

to improve the lives of people with mental health is to do multi-level, long-term changes, because societies change slowly," Dr. Pescosolido said.

Dr. Pescosolido has worked nationally on the issue of mental health stigma, even working on such stigma that exists within the medical profession.

Mayor Fadness said the issue of mental health in the growing suburban city of Fishers is "real." He made clear his initiative to address mental health in his city is far from over.
