Voter registration officers now full county employees

The Hamilton County Voter Registration Board, a quasi-independent, two-member board consisting of one Republican and one Democrat, has been eliminated in order to bring the two members under the jurisdiction of the County Clerk where all other election administration is handled. The registration board members were appointees of the two party chairmen and answered to them rather than any elected official.

County Commissioners voted Monday to do away with the board because all county employees need to be guided "by the same rules," said Commissioner Steve Dillinger. "There has been no problem, it's just the right way to operate, it was my idea and the other commissioners agreed," he said.

The state legislature established voter registration boards in 2004. More recently the law was amended to allow counties to essentially opt out of the separate registration office. Some counties have abolished the boards while others continue to maintain

County Democratic Chairman Joe Weingarten is critical of the commissioners' ac-

tion, and said neither of the major political party chairmen were consulted. He worries that a Republican clerk would not now be required to have a Democrat involved in registration. Dillinger confirmed that the political leadership was not consulted, but said the action was not taken for political reasons. It is purely a personnel matter, he said.

Republican Chairwoman Laura Campbell confirmed she was not notified in advance, but believes the move "makes sense from a Human Resources point of view." She said having the County Clerk "supervising a county employee is fine with me."

County Clerk Tammy Baitz who now assumes supervisory authority over voter registration, said she did not suggest the action taken by commissioners. She has said there would be no changes in personnel or location of the registration office.

It is housed in the lower level of the Government and Judicial Center and processes all registrations, making sure voters are in the correct precinct and notifying voters of any change in their polling place. By law, the clerk is the chief election officer of the county.

Democrats respond...

"On August 14 the Hamilton County Commissioners abolished the Board of Voter Registration and placed the voter registration function in the office of Clerk of Hamilton County. This was done without any advance notice and removed voter registration from a bi-partisan environment to one that is purely political. The measure was not even on the Commissioners agenda, leading us to suspect that it was agreed upon secretly in advance.

Neither the Democratic nor the Republican County Chairs knew about this change until after the fact. No reason was given as to the need to make this change, no complaints have been lodged against the current system.

In response to our inquiries, Tammy Baitz, County Clerk, has said there will be no change in operation while she is County Clerk. Joe Weingarten Chair of the Hamilton County Democratic Party stated "While she has said nothing will change, I fear this is the start of a long term effort to limit voters in the county." He continued "What worries me the most is that a new Clerk could remove the Democratic workers and starts a process of voter intimidation and efforts to limit certain voters in a partisan way, or even to start to remove voters from the rolls on a partisan basis".

In the 2016 election the Democrats of Hamilton County saw an approximate 5% gain in voters. Maybe the Commissioners, all Republicans, are taking this action as part of the nationwide move by their party towards voter suppression. Mr. Greg Purvis, the Democratic member of the County Election Board stated "This is not right and I want to hear from the Commissioners why this was needed if not for purely political reasons."

Hamilton County usef all three of its trucks to spray in the affected zones Monday night and the Noblesville Street Department will continue to larvacide breeding

Mosquitoes testing positive for West

Nile is not unusual, as 15 sites throughout Hamilton County have been confirmed in the past three weeks. Also, there has been no reported case of a human contracting West Nile in Noblesville this year. Human infection is rare and less than one percent of those infected have serious symptoms, typically older adults.

West Nile Mosquitos are active from evening to morning. Single vehicle accident leaves one injured

The Hamilton County Sheriff's Office Crash Team is investigating a serious injury crash which occurred shortly after 3 a.m. on Sunday morning, Aug. 13. Dispatchers with Hamilton County Public Safety Communications were notified of a single vehicle crash on 236th Street just west of Cammack Road in the north central part of the county with the caller initially stating that the driver could not be

Deputies and crash investigators working at the scene stated a white 1995 Chevrolet Suburban was traveling eastbound on 236th Street when, for unknown reasons, it left the pavement on the north side of the roadway and continued east paralleling the street. The vehicle struck a concrete

post and a rock causing it to roll over. The driver, identified as Joseph L. Burrow, 21, Noblesville, was located outside the vehicle when deputies arrived at the scene of the crash. The crash report notes that Burrow was not restrained in the vehicle.

Burrow was taken by ground ambulance to St. Vincent Hospital on 86th Street with injuries listed as broken bones and internal injuries. There were no other occupants in the vehicle, nor was anyone else injured in the crash. As with all serious injury crashes, toxicology tests were conducted with results pending at this


