Goodrich to seek District 29 seat

Charles (Chuck) Goodrich, Noblesville resident and president of Gaylor Electric, has become the second candidate to file intentions to run for the District 29 State Representative seat, long held by Kathy Richardson. She announced earlier this month that she will not seek another

term in the House of Representatives.

A principal reason for Goodrich's decision to run is his interest in assisting in providing training for individuals wishing to enter the skilled trade job market. Goodrich has taken the lead in starting a job innovation center locally and actively supports Indiana Work Force Development. Gaylor Electric has an internship program for high school and college students. Gaylor is a major electrical contracting firm. Their Noblesville office is headed by Goodrich.

The candidate this week filed his campaign committee declaration which allows him to begin collecting contributions. Candidates can officially file for office starting Jan. 10 for the May 8 Republican primary. Previously announcing intentions to file was Noblesville City Councilman

Greg O'Connor.

Goodrich, his wife and family have lived in Noblesville 20 years. He is member of the Noblesville Chamber of Commerce, Associated Builders and Contractors, the 50 Club and the White River Christian Church. He has participated in church mission projects in Panama where church members work to upgrade living standards for the native population.



HSE Schools move closer to branding, website redesign

June of this year, the Hamilton Southeastern (HSE) School

District agreed to hire the private firms of MilesHerndon and BitWise to work on branding the school system and updating the district's web presence. Nearly six months later, MilesHerndon is presenting some concepts to the school board. BitWise is not quite ready to preview website concepts until the branding decisions are made.

School board members grappled with the choices of logos for the entire school district and individual schools at a Tuesday morning work session. After a lengthy discussion, MilesHerndon was given

Holidays affect trash, Christmas tree pick-up schedule in Noblesville

Because of the upcoming holidays falling on a Monday, there will be a single-day delay during trash collection for the next two weeks.

Services Republic employees will be off Christmas and New Year's Day and will work Tuesday through

Saturday from Dec. 26 through Jan. 6, 2018. Noblesville residents' regular trash and recycling pick-up schedule the weeks of Christmas and New Year's will be delayed one day. For instance, if your usual pickup day is Wednesday, it will be Thursday due to the holidays.

In addition, Republic Services will collect Christmas trees from Tuesday, Dec. 26 until Friday, Jan. 12, 2018. Trees will be collected on the same day and in the same location as residents' trash/recycle collection. Please note that trees must be cut into four feet per section and placed inside the trash cart so that the automated arm of the trucks will be able to place them in the truck. Trees lying on the ground besides trash containers will not be collected.

Big Woods restaurant coming to Westfield

Those familiar with the Big Woods restaurants Bloomington, Franklin, Nashville and Speedway will soon be able to enjoy those menu items in Westfield.

Big Woods Restaurants has announced plans to build an 8,000 square-foot facility in Westfield next year. The restaurant will feature the familiar timber frame construction, full

menu and outdoor seating. The restaurant will also feature their own Hard Truth Distilling Company spirits and Quaff ON craft beers.

"Our intent is to take the best of everything we've done so far in our other locations and bring that to Westfield," said Jeff Mc-Cabe of Big Woods.

The new, stand-alone location will be located on the southwest corner of State Road 32 and US 31.

"Grand Park is a wonderful facility that is bringing people from all over the country to Westfield, so it will be great to be close to the new development that is happening in that area," said McCabe.

"Once again our community's investment in Grand Park is doing exactly what it was intended to do," Mayor Andy Cook said. "From its inception, Grand Park was seen as a way to spur long-term economic development for the surrounding area that will cater to our burgeoning hospitality industry."

"The more people we've talked to from Westfield, the more confident we've become in our decision to build here," McCabe added.

The restaurant is expected to open next winter.

ThyssenKrupp Presta bringing engineering jobs to Fishers

ThyssenKrupp Presta is coming to Fishers, bringing 86 existing jobs and expecting to create 64 more positions by 2020. The firm will spend \$7 million to renovate 47,000 square feet of space once occupied by Comcast.

The Fishers City Council approved a five-year tax abatement for the ThyssenKrupp Presta as part of the Economic Development Agreement, along with a \$50,000 commercial grant, conditioned on the

jobs promised. The State of Indiana is also providing incentives, \$950,000 in conditional tax credits and up to \$200,000 in training grants.

Company officials say all these jobs coming to Fishers will be engineering positions. The Fishers facility will be aimed at high-tech steering systems and other technologies tied to the automotive industry.

ThyssenKrupp Presta has about 500 employees in the Central Indiana area, and is an international firm operating in 79 countries throughout the world.



The Indiana Department of Transportation announced Tuesday the agency's new mobile app is available for free download for iPhone or iPad users through the **App Store** and Android users through **Google Play**.

The INDOT mobile app offers statewide, real-time traffic information. Features include:

"INDOT is excited to be able to offer this tool for motorists, especially as we approach one of the busiest weeks for travel of the year," Indiana Department of Transportation Commissioner Joe Mc-Guinness said. "The new app is one more example of INDOT's commitment to providing great customer service and the features can help travelers plan ahead, avoid delays, and have a safe trip to their holiday destinations."

The INDOT mobile app also makes it easy to report roadway hazards, repair needs and other concerns. Customers can also opt-in to receive email alerts on current and future INDOT construction projects and maintenance activities right from the app.

INDOT's mobile app reports information for interstates, U.S. routes and state highways in Indiana. It does not include information on county roads or city streets The primary responsibility of every driver is the safe operation of his or her vehicle. Indiana law prohibits individuals from using a handheld electronic communication device to write, send or read a text message while driving. Drivers under the age of 21 are prohibited from using any electronic communication device while driving.

When in a vehicle, mobile communication devices should only be used by a passenger; or as a driver, when your vehicle is at a complete stop, at a safe location, out of the roadway. Don't text and drive or use this app while driving.







'Rocks finish strong in victory

In order to have a chance against a tough team from Anderson, Westfield coach Ginny Smith said that her Shamrocks tried a strategy that was "very out of the ordinary for us."

"We played a zone," said Smith. "We've never played a zone."

It was a different kind of defense from the 'Rocks, but it worked in the end: Westfield finished the game on a 7-0 run to secure a 46-40 victory over the Indians Tuesday at The Rock. With the win, the Shamrocks improved to 10-5.

Westfield trailed 40-39 late in the fourth quarter. Sophia Kreag tied the game with a free throw, then later gave the 'Rocks the lead with a layin. Westfield's defense did its job on the other end, and Jade Shipley made four consecutive free throws to clinch

"I'm glad that Jade hit those free throws down the stretch," said Smith. "That's been big. We had struggled from the line all year long, so I'm never comfortable if that's what it's going to come down to. But I will say, Jade went up there, she was confident and she knocked down her free throws, and that was big for us."

The Shamrocks led 12-8 after the first quarter and 24-19 at halftime. Ryann Bunting helped out big-time in the second period, hitting two 3-pointers on her way to eight points in the quarter.

Anderson began to make its way back into the game in the third quarter, and caught up to the 'Rocks into the fourth before Westfield made its big finish.

"At this point, we're relying on our defense, just trying to keep us in games and then hoping that we can get some buckets down the stretch, which we did," said Smith.




