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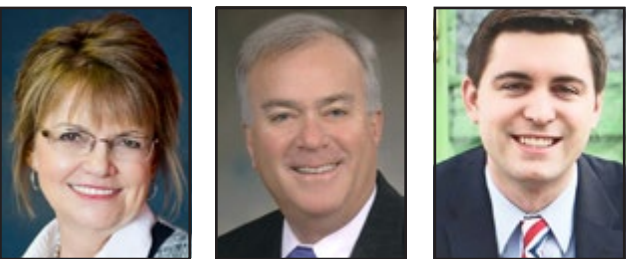
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# Westfield, Janus join forces

# Carmel approves mosque

A public meeting held last Monday about a proposed mosque in Carmel ended in a Board of Zoning Appeals approval after more than five hours of public comment.  
The board approved the proposal 3-2; one board member remarked the proposal was consistent with other places and worship and required no special variances.

So many people were expected to attend the 6 p.m. meeting that it was held at the Palladium. More than 200 attended.  
The Al-Salam Foundation's proposal was to build an Islamic Life Center near 141st Street and Shelborne Road.  
People who wanted to make public comment were given one minute each to speak about the proposal. While many were in favor of the mosque, some said they were concerned about added traffic and property value changes to the area.  
More than 300 people attended the Board of Zoning Appeals meeting about the proposed mosque last month.  
Last month's meeting was held at the Monon Community Center and could not accommodate everyone who wanted to attend. Those that could not speak at last month's meeting were given a chance to speak — roughly 200 people.  
Some that live in the area expressed concern about increased noise and traffic.

# Noblesville Schools receives national recognition for STEM, career learning

Noblesville Schools announced last Wednesday that three of their schools, Noblesville High School, Noblesville East Middle School and Noblesville West Middle School, have been nationally recognized as Project Lead The Way (PLTW) Distinguished Schools for providing broad access to transformative science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) learning opportunities for students. With only 12 schools in the state receiving the distinction, Noblesville schools account for 25 percent of Indiana honorees.  
Noblesville Schools offers 13 different PLTW courses for middle and high school students including classes like robotics, biomedical, and aerospace engineering, and is one of only a

few districts in the state to offer PLTW programming K-12.  
"Students develop critical STEM knowledge as well as in-demand, transferable skills through this programming that will serve them both in future educational opportunities and in a variety of careers," said Annetta Petty, Noblesville Schools executive director of learning. "The coursework aligns well with our culture of empowering students to lead in their own discovery and uncover a range of paths and possibilities for their future."  
The Distinguished School recognition honors schools committed to increasing student access, engagement and achievement in their PLTW STEM programs. To be eligible for the designation, schools had to offer a variety of PLTW

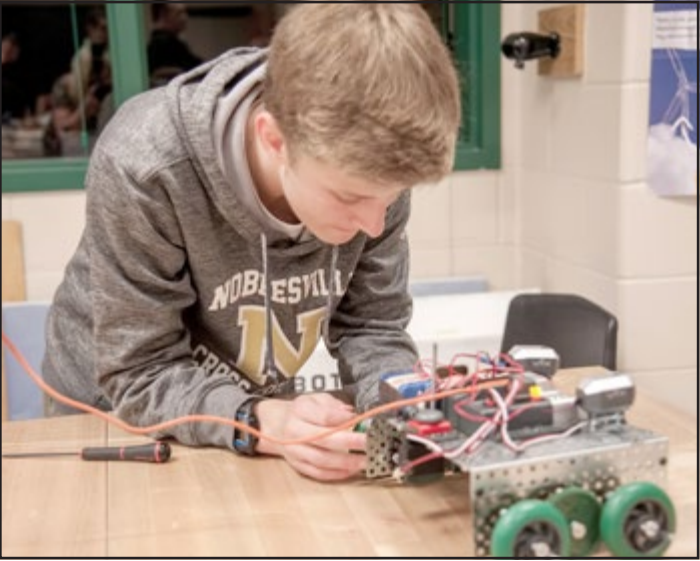

STEM courses and have a significant portion of students participating in them, while students had to demonstrate mastery in the content and continuation in the programming.

The Havana Lounge will take up some prime retail space at The Yard culinary project, according to developer Thompson Thrift. The cigar and cocktail lounge will be located next to the 1933 Lounge by St. Elmo and be adjacent to Sun King Brewery and the culinary incubator space.  
Those four tenants will form the anchors for the public Greenspace area of The Yard.  
"The upscale cigar and cocktail lounge will be built with urban-industrial inspired materials, comfortable furnishings and lavish appointments in décor

and privacy," according to the Owner and President of Havana Lounge Inc. Omar Barham.  
Havana Lounge will feature more than 4,700 square feet of total space, an outdoor patio, a 12-foot ceiling and what the owner describes as a state-of-the-art ventilation system.  
According to Thompson Thrift, The Yard will include 252 luxury apartment homes, roughly 120,000 square feet of retail, two hotel concepts and a three-story podium-style parking garage.  
The Yard will be located in the same general area near 116th Street and Interstate 69, near IKEA and TopGolf.

# GEICO plans Carmel expansion

GEICO, one of the fastest-growing automotive insurers in the U.S., announced plans last Tuesday to expand its operations in central Indiana, creating up to 1,474 new jobs by the end of 2022.

Established in 1936 as an automobile insurance company, GEICO (Government Employees Insurance Company) is the second-largest private passenger auto insurer in the country, serving more than 16 million auto policies and covering more than 27 million vehicles.

"This is very exciting news for GEICO and the city of Carmel. We have worked closely with GEICO over the years to expand their presence in Carmel, ever since their arrival to our Meridian Corporate Corridor a few years ago," said Carmel Mayor Jim Brainard. "It is good to see that their investment is paying off with their continued success. We look forward to assisting in their efforts to fill these job openings by continuing to build a community focused on a high quality of life for all." Pending approval from the Indiana Economic Development Corporation (IEDC) board of directors, the IEDC will offer GEICO up to \$16 million in conditional tax credits and up to \$500,000 in training grants based on the company's job creation plans. # Heights kindergarten, preschool registration set

Kindergarten registration and screening activities for children who will be attending kindergarten at Hamilton Heights Primary School in the 2018-19 school year will take place from 4 to 6:30 p.m. on Thursday, March 15 at Hamilton Heights Primary School, 25350 State Road 19, Arcadia. Parents with students living within the Hamilton Heights School District can register their child and upload required information for the upcoming school year online from March 8 through April 13 at [hhschuskiies.org](http://hhschuskiies.org). Computers will also be available to register during school hours (9:30 a.m. to 3 p.m.) or at the March 15 round-up.

To enroll for full-day kindergarten, children must be 5 years old on or before Aug. 1, 2018. Parents/legal guardians need to bring the following to ensure registration:

1. Original birth certificate from the county health department (hospital or Xerox copies are not acceptable).
2. Immunization records (required by state law).
  - DTP/DTAP – five doses (four doses are acceptable if the fourth dose was given on or after the fourth birthday)
  - IPV/OPV – four doses (if the four doses are administered prior to age four, a fifth dose must be given)
  - MMR – two doses
  - HEPATITIS B – three doses
  - HEPATITIS A – two doses
  - CHICKEN POX - two doses or written documentation of history of chickenpox disease (including month and year of the disease) **from a PHYSICIAN**
3. Any pertinent or safety information regarding your child (change of

Leanne Carol Trebilcock, 76, Noblesville (formerly of Michigan), passed away on Tuesday, February 27, 2018 at Riverview Health Hospital in Noblesville. She was born on January 17, 1942 to Norman and Elmira (Euler) Trebilcock in Grosse Pointe, Mich.

In 1960, Leanne was voted the top-ranking National Honor Society student and was Valedictorian of her graduating class. It was the only time in the history of Washington High School in Milwaukee, Wis., for those two things to happen concurrently, and the rules changed after that.

She was a 1964 graduate of Michigan State University, where she was the top Sorority graduate and top women’s graduate. While attending college, she was President of Alpha Lambda Delta; Freshman Women’s Honorary; Sophomore Tower Guard Honorary; Senior Mortar Board Honorary; President of Panhellenic Council (a sorority governing body); member of Phi Kappa Phi and Delta Gamma Social Sorority; and served as Rush chairperson. Throughout her life she remained involved with Michigan State University, including in 1999 establishing the “Honors College Award for Distinguished Contributions to Honors Students” which has recognized 26 faculty members since its inception.

After college, Leanne worked as a columnist for the Lapeer County Press, working under former Lapeer County Press editor and late Free Press columnist Jim Fitzgerald. From there she went on to become the Owner/Publisher of the Manistique Pioneer-Tribune, where she spanned a 20-year career as the only female publisher in the state of Michigan at that time.

She also served in many other capacities while living in Manistique, such as President of the Women’s Club and Schoolcraft Memorial Hospital Auxiliary; advisor to Manistique High School year book; Sunday School teacher at Redeemer Presbyterian Church which also named her Mother-of-the-Year; Girl Scout leader; Den Mother; advisor to Junior Class; Athletic Director at St. Francis de Sales School; founding member of the Manistique High School Academic Booster Club; first woman member of the Manistique Rotary Club and was a Paul Harris Fellow. She also was active in Cadillac, Mich., where she started a branch of the women’s hospital auxiliary to work with student nurses; and Christian Education Director for the Presbyterian church.

In Delta County, she was the first secretary of the Rapid River Kiwanis Club and a Hixon fellow; she later became a member of the Bay Shore Kiwanis Club; founding member of Rapid River Schools Scholarship Foundation; newsletter editor and member of Bay de Noc Community College Bay Sages; U.P. Director of Mothers Against Drunk Driving; member of Retired and Senior Volunteer Program, including serving in the founding group of the after-school program at Jones School; and worked in the nursery, started the after-school program and was newsletter editor at First United Methodist Church of Escanaba.

In the Corunna/Owosso area, she started Funfest – a neighborhood outreach program which grew to 80 children; and served as church newsletter editor and treasurer of the United Methodist Women at the United Methodist Church of Corunna; and was a member of the Corunna Rotary Club. Later Funfest moved to Redeemer Lutheran Church, where 24 children in the program were baptized. Leanne was also a member of the Memorial Hospital Auxiliary and Redeemer Golden Gems; a volunteer at Swords into Plowshares Gallery at Central United Methodist Church in Detroit; was an archivist for the Detroit Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church; and was a board member of the Michigan United Methodist Historical Society; and was a recipient of the Redeemer Award.

She is survived by her children, Elizabeth Ann (Peter Pignanesi) Senger, John Peter (Courtney Robinson) Senger, and Christopher Michael (Susan Duerr) Trebilcock (who opted to use his mother’s maiden name); brother, John Scott (Mary Curran) Trebilcock; three granddaughters, Cora Trebilcock and twins Faith and Hannah Senger; a grandson, Topher Trebilcock; niece and nephew, Julie (Eric) Swager and James Trebilcock; six great-nephews; and one great-niece.

In addition to her parents, she was preceded in death by two grandsons, Joshua and Isaiah Senger.

Breathing ... if you are reading this you are most assuredly breathing! It is the most important job of our bodies, yet we seldom give thought to this necessary function. Our first official act after leaving the womb is to – what – breathe! That most important activity is priority No. 1 in the delivery room! As our little bodies face the world we actually begin life breathing correctly. (In this article I will not address either child or adult breathing diseases and issues.)

Have you ever observed a baby or small child sleeping? If so you probably noted the long, deep breaths that are a natural part of the intake of oxygen and the outflow of carbon dioxide. This is the natural breath for which our bodies are designed. This is the breath of those who are not stressed, not worried, not anxious. So

what happened? Life, it seems ... The next time you feel angry, stressed, or anxious, pay attention to your breathing. Chances are when negative emotions run high, your breaths become short and shallow. In fact, I would bet that many of us rarely take more than a couple of deep breaths during an entire day. Whether you experience stress, negative emotions or physical pain the body responds in a similar way every time and may include rapid heartbeat, tightening muscles, dilated pupils and short, quick breaths. When these emotions or pains begin, the body starts pumping out the juices (namely adrenaline and cortisol) that fuel the responses and lead to shallow breathing.

So what exactly do deep breathing exercises do for you? When you learn to take deep, slow breaths your body reacts in many positive ways. Your muscles relax, oxygen delivery improves and you will notice improved

mental concentration and physical stamina, your blood pressure lowers, endorphins are released which can help with pain relief, and detoxification improves which helps the lymphatic system function properly encouraging the release of harmful toxins. Proper breathing can also help your digestive tract, something that appeals to most of us!

When practicing deep breathing, remember to move the belly with the breath, breathing slowing and deeply from the diaphragm which is the engine of breath. Keep your upper body quiet and the upper chest muscles soft. Expand your tummy as you inhale, let your tummy fall as you exhale. Lengthen your exhalation; when we are stressed our exhalations tend to grow short and choppy. Your exhalation should be slightly longer than your inhalation. Deep breathing can offer a mini-massage for the muscles and organs of your entire body so make a point each day to practice deep, slow and mindful breathing. Soon it will become a habit.

Like many of you I

have spent the past couple of weeks watching incredible Olympians perform amazing feats of athletics; unlike anything we could imagine for ourselves. (Yes, I realize most of them are very young – thank goodness for the curlers!) However young these amazing Olympians may be, we can actually have something in common with all of them. Proper breathwork gives them the focus, strength, concentration and necessary oxygen levels to excel in their sport. As you watch them prepare to ski, skate, luge, curl, or whatever – they all practice their breathwork before their bodies engage. So that is one thing we can incorporate into our own “training” regimen! (Keep in mind that they practice proper stretching as well to help prevent injury.) Breathe!

You may have an opinion on one or more of these issues or by looking into these and other issues you may develop an opinion and then look for the candidate who shares your views.

As the candidates hit the campaign trail, we should not be satisfied to let them tell us only things like how long they have lived in the county or how many cute kids they have. They should be asked questions on the issues pertaining to the office they are seeking and qualifications they have for the position.

So, the message is: tune into the process and inform yourself because thousands of our fellow residents will not participate or even know what's going on. As a reader of this newspaper you already know much more about our political situation than most county citizens. You can very likely make a difference.

# Hamilton County increasing patrols during March

The Hamilton County Traffic Safety Partnership, a consortium of law enforcement agencies around Hamilton County, is joining law-enforcement agencies across Indiana this month to increase dangerous and impaired driving patrols for the NCAA Tournament and St. Patrick's Day.

Last year, the weekend beginning St. Patrick's Day had the highest number crashes involving impaired drivers. With March 17, 2018 falling on a Saturday, police are conducting random patrols, saturation patrols and sobriety checkpoints intended to make our

roads safer.

“If you're watching March Madness or celebrating St. Patrick's Day from a bar or pub, draft a sober driver, cab or ridesharing service to get home safely,” said Hamilton County Sheriff Mark Bowen. “Our officers are trained to spot – and there will be zero tolerance for – impaired and dangerous drivers.”

The top causes of all Indiana traffic crashes are drivers following too closely and failing to yield the right of way. Aggressive, distracted and impaired driving reduce reaction times to unexpected slowed traffic, bicycles and pedestrians.

## New impaired driving equipment

In every state, it is illegal to drive with a blood alcohol concentration of 0.08 or higher. In Indiana, drivers under 21 with a BAC of 0.02 are subject to fines and a license suspension for up to one year.

Last year the Indiana Criminal Justice Institute (ICJI) and National Highway Transportation Safety Administration (NHTSA) purchased 1,759 new portable breath tests for Indiana law-enforcement agencies. An additional 836 devices will be purchased this year.

But unlike alcohol, there is no quick field test for the legal and ille-

gal drugs that can impair drivers. ICJI and NHTSA are issuing Android tablets and apps to assist 185 highly-trained police officers in the recognition and enforcement of drug-impaired driving.

If you're taking a new drug or higher dose, talk with your doctor or don't drive until you know how it affects you. Even over-the-counter medication such as cold medicine or sleep aids may cause impairment, especially when combined with alcohol or a second drug.

The National Human Trafficking Hotline cites more than 36,270 cases of human trafficking reported since December 2007. In 2017, 50 of those reports came from Indiana. Worldwide, sex trafficking is a \$99 billion dollar industry, with more than 1 million children exploited annually, as reported by USA Today in conjunction with its series on the topic.

Contributing to that series is award-winning jour-

of Fishers' Jeremy Szilagyi and Mulloy in that period.

Mulloy did yeoman's work in the third quarter, scoring 11 of Carmel's 13 points and making all five of his shot attempts. Jenkins' buzzer-beating layin was the only non-Mulloy score for the 'Hounds in the third.

"When we got away from getting him the ball, they made a run," said Osborn of Mulloy's efforts. "But when we got it to him, he was very efficient. He was very good today, played with patience. I thought he made good decisions when he had the ball."

"I needed to make plays when I needed to make plays, and my teammates did the same thing," said Mulloy.

Szilagyi, meanwhile, played like a senior leader the whole game, but had some big baskets to keep Fishers within striking distance. He drained a 3-pointer, then was fouled while attempting another '3' and made all three free throws. Szilagyi then made a layin to cut Carmel's lead to 34-28, then Hicks cut that advantage to 34-30 with a dunk.

But every time the Tigers got close, the Greyhounds would make another run. Carmel scored eight consecutive points, bridging the third and fourth periods and eventually going up 42-30 midway through the fourth. Jalen Whack had a solid quarter, as he scored seven points, including back-to-back baskets that put the 'Hounds up 47-37.

"He's an experienced guy that started in the tournament last year," said Osborn. "He's got a lot of experience playing in this big of a game. We're going to need him as we go through this."

Two free throws from Jenkins put Carmel up 49-38 with two minutes to go. Fishers made one last push, starting with another 3-pointer from Hicks. Mulloy answered that with a dunk, but the Tigers started rolling on their 8-1 run, with Szilagyi making a three-point play, Hicks making another 3 (a 6-foot-5 swing that can shoot the 3 - are you listening, college coaches?) and Alex Szilagyi hitting a layin. That brought the score to 52-49, but that would soon be changed by Gill's heroics.

"At that point, even though it's three, it feels probably like 10 because you've been down for so long," said Fishers coach Matt Moore. "I thought we did a really good job of staying aggressive and trying to get the right matchups, get Terry shots.

"But Carmel does such a great job of pressuring you outside our attack areas, which kind of pushes you off of where you can run your sets and where you can screen and where you enter the ball. So we just didn't have a lot of consistency in our flow today because of their defensive pressure."

Mulloy finished the game with 26 points, six rebounds and three blocked shots. Gill also had six rebounds, with Jenkins dishing out four assists.

Szilagyi scored 14 points for the Tigers, with Hicks scoring 13, including three 3-pointers. Hicks also collected seven rebounds as Fishers finished its first season with Moore as head coach.

"I don't really have a lot of expectation measuring beforehand, but our goal is to be competitive in every game," said Moore. "And I think all but three, we were competitive in every game."

In addition to being its 28th overall sectional championship, this marks the third time Carmel has won four sectionals in a row. The Greyhounds' other streaks include five in a row from 1976 to 1980, and nine in a row from 1966 to 1974.

University claimed its first sectional championship since 2013 by winning the Class 1A Bethesda Christian sectional Saturday. The Trailblazers beat Metropolitan 44-41.

Zack Hodgins' three-point play with 17.8 seconds remaining provided the winning points as the second-ranked University Trailblazers won the Class 1A Sectional 58 championship with a 44-41 win over the Indianapolis Metropolitan Pumas at Bethesda Christian School.

David Howard led University with 19, including 15 in the first half. Foster Flamion had 12 as the Blazers won their first sectional championship since 2013.

Trailing 41-40 with 30 seconds remaining after the Pumas split a pair of free throws, University coach Brandon Lafferman called timeout. "We ran a play to get Zack to the rim. He beat his man on the wing and made a great finish."

"We had a huge defensive stop at the end of the game" said Lafferman. The Pumas ran the clock down and their final shot did not get to the rim. Howard corralled the missed shot and was fouled with 1.2 seconds remaining. He split the free throws for the 44-41 final as Metropolitan's long heave at the buzzer was short.

"Both teams deserved to win the game. Hats off to Metro. That is a really good, well coached team that played their hearts out," remarked Lafferman.

University jumped out early in the first quarter and took a 13-5 lead on Howard's third three pointer of the period with eight seconds remaining. The Blazers looked poised to take control of the game, but Metropolitan's Jai'onn Harlin made a half court shot at the buzzer to cut the lead to 13-8.

Harlin's shot energized the Pumas in the second quarter. Metro took their first lead of the game at 17-16 before Howard answered to put the Blazers back up 18-17. The Pumas scored the next five points before Howard's basket with four seconds left made score 22-20 at the half.

Flamion tied the game at 22 on a layup off a feed from Josh Watson. Flamion put University ahead on a reverse layup before Watson drove the lane and gave University a 26-22 lead. The Pumas called time and

scored the next six points for a 28-26 advantage. Flamion tied the game at 28 off a pass from Sam Mervis. Each team added a foul shot before Howard's baseline drive with 51 seconds remaining gave University a 31-29 lead at the end of the third quarter.

After the sixth tie of the game at 35, University senior Ethan Sickels was fouled and stepped to the line for just the second time this season. Sickels calmly sunk both charity tosses for a 37-35 lead with 5:21 remaining.

The Pumas answered with Harlin's 3-pointer and a 38-37 lead with 4:50 remaining. The game remained scoreless for over two minutes before Metro's Noah Jordan made a pair of foul shots with 2:38 left, giving the Pumas a 40-37 lead.

Howard was fouled at the rim with 2:22 remaining and split the pair, drawing University within 40-38. The 6-7 Jordan was called for an offensive foul with 2:15 remaining, his fifth of the game. With the Puma shot blocker out of the game, Mervis drove the left side of the lane to knot the game with 2:02 remaining.


Metro ran the clock down before Harlin was fouled with 48.9 seconds remaining. He made the first foul shot for a 41-40 lead but missed the second. Howard grabbed the rebound and the Blazers advanced the ball to half court before calling time out and setting up Hodgins' heroics.

University held the Pumas to 23 points under their scoring average, allowing just two fourth quarter field goals and none in the last 4:50 of the game.

University improves to 21-2 on the season, setting a program record for wins in a season.

The Trailblazers advance to the Noon game at the Martinsville regional on Saturday. University will play fourth-ranked Morristown. The 10 a.m. regional contest will see seventh-ranked Indianapolis Tindley (18-7) take on 16-9 Bloomfield.

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# Audrey Reed made history for the Blackhawks

From her freshman year to her senior year, Audrey Reed helped the Sheridan girls basketball team make history.

In her first year as a player for the Blackhawks, Reed was part of a team that won a sectional championship. Three years later, Reed will graduate as Sheridan's leading overall scorer. Along the way, there have been victories, championships, and many other of the tangible and intangible rewards that only playing Indiana high school basketball can bring.

"I feel like through the years, I've grown as a leader," said Reed. "I obviously really value basketball, and I just want to get everyone else to at least give an effort. Just try and get them to compete, go out and have fun and just do the best they can."

Reed certainly did her best for Sheridan. She scored 1,724 career points as a Blackhawk, which not only puts her on top of the Sheridan list (for both girls and boys), but it also makes her second in the county. Reed finished her career behind only Noblesville's legendary Courtney Cox and her 1,869 points.

Remarkably, Reed's record came one year after another all-time Blackhawks great established a grand total. Brittany Welch, a 2017 Sheridan graduate, finished her career with 1,649 points. So Reed and Welch are second and third respectively among county girls, and are eighth and ninth on the overall (girls and boys) list.

Reed broke the record on Jan. 9 of this year during the Blackhawks' game at Kokomo, where she scored 37 points.

"It was really rewarding since it was a goal of mine since freshman year," said Reed. "It felt good to see and feel the hard work pay off."

She also enjoyed the support of her teammates as well, something that stretched back to when she was a freshman. Reed admitted to being intimidated when she first came on the team as a ninth-grader, but said the seniors helped her fit in.

"That was the first year we won a sectional at all," said Reed. "That just made it really fun to be a part of and that showed me leadership and stuff that I needed to see as a freshman."

"To play the point on a senior-dominant team is quite an accomplishment, to be able to step in and play with those kids," said Sheridan coach Jeff Guenther. "Not only play with them, but fit in and to be a key member."

Guenther noted that the Blackhawks had gone about 30 years between 1000-point scorers, but have now had four players reach that mark over the past 10 years. "Which shows what kinds of kids we're getting these days," said Guenther.

Every year, the bar was set higher: First was Jaidlin Delph at 1,194 points, followed by Tyler Jones setting the boys' all-time mark at 1,627 points. Then came Welch, followed by Reed.

"The thing about Audrey is, Audrey never talked about records," said Guenther. "She talked about winning. She talked about sectionals and conference championships. We didn't meet all of those goals, but that was always her priority. Her priority wasn't to be at the top of the scoring list. That's a result of her competing to win. I think that's her biggest strength."

Winning the sectional was a milestone for the Sheridan girls, as they had never won one before. The Blackhawks soared past three established programs (Taylor, Tipton and Elwood) to win at the Tipton sectional, culminating in a 67-52 victory over Elwood on Feb. 14, 2015. Reed scored 24 points in that triumph.

"It felt really rewarding," said Reed. "I was excited."

While she said winning the sectional was a big goal of hers, she admitted that she didn't feel like she understood the importance of it at the time.

"Not every team gets this opportunity," said Reed. "My sophomore and junior and senior year, I didn't get the opportunity to win a sectional. So now looking

back on it, obviously it means a lot more to me. I wish I would've cherished it more in the moment."

And does she cherish it now?

"Of course," she said. Once a sectional champion, always a sectional champion.

The path to a successful high school career begins years before a player reaches ninth grade. Reed was no different in that she was a middle-school girl who saw the older girls playing high school ball, and wanted to follow in their footsteps.

"When I was in middle school, I always looked up to the high school girls," said Reed. "It was always something I was excited to be a part of, is the high school teams. Obviously I worked hard to be able to get the opportunity to play with the varsity team."

"High school basketball is about developing relationships, and I'm fortunate that I get to see these kids early," said Guenther. "I can see them as sixth graders, seventh graders, eighth graders, have them in class. And just to watch her develop and mature into just an outstanding young lady has been really tremendous for me, personally."

Guenther said that since girls physically mature earlier than boys, they're able to do things at the junior high level that boys usually can't. But once they get into a practice situation and show their work ethic, it's up to them to put in the time to develop.

"You can tell at sixth or seventh grade that you have a kid that has the potential to be a good player," said Guenther. "But you don't know if that kid's going to be a great player. That's something they have to have inside of them. You can't teach that, you can't coach that."

As a point guard, Reed was often put in pressure situations. But she embraced it, bringing to mind the title of a book written by tennis legend Billie Jean King: "Pressure is a Privilege."

"I really enjoyed it because I'm really competitive," said Reed. "I really enjoyed leading them and just really doing my best, trying to

get everyone to just do the best for the team. Just to get a good outcome."

"There's a lot of trust involved there," said Guenther. "I trusted her to have the ball in her hands a lot for four years. There's a lot of pressure on her and Brittany as well when Brittany was here. There's a lot of pressure on those two kids, specifically on her running the point. A lot of kids can't handle that. She thrived under that, with that pressure. That's a sign of a really quality player."

Another impressive thing about Reed's record is the fact that Sheridan significantly upgraded its schedule over the past four years. Reed didn't score her points in a vacuum. She scored them against many quality teams, including top Class 4A programs such as Plainfield, Zionsville and Martinsville, all of whom were opponents at one time.

"She put up big numbers against big teams," said Guenther. "She had big nights when we needed her to have big nights." That included 33 points against Lapel on Dec. 27.

"We needed every one of those," said Guenther. "She didn't build this record on the weak part of our schedule. She built it in the most difficult part of our schedule. It's going to stand for a long time, I think."

# Carmel holds off HSE to reach championship

In a basketball game where there's not much between the two teams, any run is big and one run can make the difference.

So it was for Carmel in its semi-final victory over Hamilton Southeastern at the Class 4A Noblesville sectional Friday night at The Mill. The No. 10-ranked Greyhounds scored eight unanswered points in a run that bridged the second and third quarters, and that gave Carmel enough separation to get past the Royals, 62-56.

The game was tied at 10-all after the first quarter, with Cole Jenkins scoring seven points for Carmel and Chaz Birchfield chipping in six points for Southeastern. The Greyhounds jumped ahead 15-10 at one point in the second period, but the Royals were within one point on three different occasions late in the quarter, including after a Birchfield layin put HSE within 22-21.

Eddie Gill got the last basket of the half, a putback that put Carmel up 24-21. That would be the start of the Greyhounds' 8-0 run, although they would have to wait until the second half for it to continue.

Once the half began, John Michael Mulloy scored on a basket, then Luke Heady made four consecutive free throws. With that, Carmel led 30-21.

"You talk about the six straight points, and yeah, we scored, but I think the biggest thing was we stopped them three straight times and that's big for us," said Carmel coach Ryan Osborn. "They have some firepower over there."

But the 'Hounds went off on a 10-4 run to all but clinch the game. Mulloy converted a three-point play, then Heady added five more points, with a free throw pushing Carmel up to its biggest lead, 57-47 with 33.6 seconds left. The Royals threw in three 3-pointers in the final 30 seconds of the game, but the Greyhounds were able to neutralize those baskets at the foul line, making 5-of-6 free throws.

Jenkins led the way for Carmel with 19 points and six rebounds, while Heady's 11-of-14 performance from the line was a big part of his 16 points. Mulloy added 14 points, along with six rebounds and two blocked shots. Osborn said Mulloy "played like a veteran" at the end of the game.

"And Cole Jenkins was a leader," said Osborn. "He was a senior leader tonight that controlled the game and made great decisions and got everybody involved and knew when to back it out and take some time off the clock."

Birchfield had a sensational game for HSE, with 23 points and four rebounds. Noah Smith added 13 points, while Etherington scored 11 (including three 3-pointers) and grabbed four rebounds as well.

"The thing that I love and admire about our guys is, we played hard," said Satterfield. "We knew it would be a dogfight, but the kids played hard," said Satterfield. "They didn't give up."

Southeastern finished its season 17-8.

# Carmel gets tested by Westfield, pulls out win late
