

Several infrastructure improvement projects involving roadways and storm water sewers began

in Noblesville last Monday. In Downtown Nobles ville, city contractors will be reconstructing the south leg of the 14th Street and Logan Street intersection and will have that half block closed. That group will then move up one block and repeat the process for the south leg of the Clinton Street intersection the following week. All homeowners will have access to their driveways during construction, but no through traffic will be permitted.

> Earlier this month, patching was done on Greenfield Avenue. The second phase of work will be the milling and resurfacing of Greenfield Avenue from State Road 37 to Boden Road. Work is anticipated to take approximately two weeks. This project will require temporary lane restrictions and flaggers

As part of the Noblesville Utilities Long Term Control Plan Phase IV project, work will be done along Conner Street (State Road 32/38). A new storm water sewer pipe will be installed along the north side sidewalk, which will not be accessible for pedestrians. Conner Street will remain open during construction, but the three-lane roadway will be narrowed to two lanes along that block of construction. Work is expected to take two weeks.

Reconstruction of 171st Street from Willowview Road to Cherry Tree Road was completed Friday, April 20. Throughout the winter, the Noblesville Street Department made temporary repairs until this more permanent repair could be constructed.

Hamilton Heights School Corporation held a special groundbreaking ceremony recently to serve as the official launch of several new construction projects slated to take place at the elementary, middle and high schools.

The event highlighted the community's tax dollars at work and represents the next round of investment to the corporation through its well-planned Project Vision Comprehensive Facilities Plan designed to create optimal learning environments for Hamilton Heights students and staff.

These projects are being accomplished without raising the district total tax rate of \$1.0461 based on current legislation thanks in part to strong fiscal management of past and present school board members and district administration. Project construction began in 2014 and is expected to be complete in 2021.

"This is such an exciting season for the Little Husky Learning Center (LHLC) and the Hamilton Heights School Corporation Community," said Andrea Griswold, LHLC Director, of the impact of the new addition that is being made possible through Project



There she stood, on the steps of the hospital where she had just given birth to a royal son, some seven hours before. That's right, SEVEN hours. Make up done



She is royalty. She is Kate.

I am not royalty. I am Janet.

Watching the news, I had a flashback of when I delivered my kids, some 40 and 36 years ago. Brandon and his broad shoulders arrived after a 32 hour back labor with no epidural. Emily arrived on her due date during what would have been the appointment time of my doctor visit. Still no epidural. There is a reason they call it LABOR.

I will refrain from the gory details of childbirth but I can tell you ... it ain't pretty.

Seven hours after the arrival of my descendants I looked nothing like the royal Kate. I looked more like death warmed over and set on a back burner. Upon leaving the hospital I had to send for my maternity pants to wear home. Elastic waistbands tightly hugged my waist for months after giving birth. Up at all hours of the night left me too exhausted to even think about make up.

High heels? No way. I simply waddled and shuffled my way around, wearing sneakers or whatever flats into which I could wrangle my swollen feet.

Those glamour shots of Kate Middleton got me to thinking. Her reality is not that of the womthen walk out the doors of the hospital looking like she just left a royal gala rather than a birthing room.

LEONARD As I have gotten older I realize that to compare myself to anyone is a waste of time

and energy.

I have learned to accept my "I've had two kids" body. Gravity is a reality that cannot be nipped and tucked and botoxed and lasered and lyposuctioned by the average, over 50 something, woman.

I've learned that with wrinkles comes wisdom. I've learned that the best makeup trick is to LET GO of bitterness and anger. And yes, only my hairdresser knows for sure just how much gray she has washed and dyed out of my hair.

About 20 years ago I had a friend say to me, "Janet, I envy your life." I was astounded. She had no idea what was behind the forced smile. You see, I somehow had joined the crisis of the month club. It was an effort to face each and every day. What I showed the world was not my reality. I had learned how to put on the "I'm ok" mask to face the world every day.

Recently, I've had people say to me, "It's so nice to see you so happy." I will tell you that happiness is the best makeup artist that there is. It does not come without a price. I know what sadness looks and feels like.

I know my someday has arrived. You know, where some things start to make sense, where the battle scars of life are stitched together to make a tapestry of beautiful colors.

I may seldom wear high heels. I may not look like I have it all together because I don't. My battle scars are many. Life has refined my thinking. I look for the beauty in the soul of my friends. I look for the weary to give them a word of encouragement. You see, because of what I have gone through, I know what beautiful looks like in others. A woman, refined by hurt and stolen dreams, will stand before those who love her well and tell them to never compare themselves to others. You have no idea what they are going through or what they have gone through. We all simply survive. Some have survived better than others but every battle refines us. We make good choices. We make bad choices. We battle unforeseen giants and obstacles. Never measure your mistakes or your failures against your successes. Both bring you to who you are now. 

'Commuter tax' must be a two-way street

Hamilton County residents are likely to be hearing more about "commuter taxes" in the coming months. And, this comes from a "regional" concept that many Indianap-

olis officials and some state legislators like to talk about. The regional approach in government means Indianapolis and its surrounding counties are all part of a metropolitan area that share certain economic and social advantages and obligations.

In the short term, we will hear that a tax for commuters from this county and the others around Indy is fair and necessary to repair the crumbling streets and highways in the capital city. There is without doubt a good argument that motorists who use a road with regularity should contribute to its maintenance.

But, if some type of tax is levied on Hamilton County commuters for roads or public transportation or anything else, it should be

• Home alarm systems are great but they only work if they are armed and activated.

 Trim landscaping and avoid clutter to minimize hiding places.

• Record make, model, and serial numbers of electronics, firearms, and other items. Photos and appraisals should be kept of jewelry, artwork and similar items. Having these records on hand in the case of a theft can make the difference in recovering stolen items.

• If you arrive home and your home has been burglarized, stay outside until law enforcement arrives. You don't want to walk in with a burglar still in your home.

The Sheriff's Office has responded to several reports of burglaries and thefts in recent weeks, which is typical for this time of year. While cases are random, areas of increased population density, such as Home Place in the southern part of the county, are typically more active. Criminals often focus on small items such as electronics, cash and jewelry that can be easily transported. Thefts from vehicles most often occur with vehicles that are unlocked or parked in isolated areas.




Politics through the eyes of my (much) better half





Fishers residents, mind the rules when driving golf carts

We never thought it would ever come, but warm weather is finally descending upon Fishers, and with the warmth, Fishers Police want to remind everyone that certain motorized vehicles are governed by specific city ordinances.

Golf carts can be driven on streets under very specific circumstances only. Carts can be driven on subdivision streets when the neighborhood has all the following requirements in place:

1. Fishers has determined that golf carts may be safely operated on the streets within the specific neighborhood;

2. A threshold amount (75 percent or higher) of property owners in the neighborhood have voted in favor of allowing golf carts within the neighborhood and the results of the election have been certified; and

3. The proper signage in the designated locations has been placed.

It should be noted that only three neighborhoods meet all three criteria as I write this post. They are Britton Falls, Thorpe Creek and Graystone.

If you live within these

three neighborhoods and use your golf cart on subdivision streets, there are still rules and regulations you must obey, listed later below.

Fishers Police officers would also like to remind everyone that there are state laws dealing with mopeds, scooters and small vehicles such as motorized bicycles – all must have plates and registrations. Other requirements include:

Hoosiers could save money with new prescription drug law

A state law could soon help you save money when it comes to prescription drugs.

"This is a win for our patients, our clients and we're just very happy about that," said Hamid Abbaspour, owner of the Dr. Aziz Pharmacy, which opened in 1988.

"I've seen patients refuse to take medications because it wasn't covered, or it was too expensive," he said.

That could change. Signed into law four weeks ago and taking effect July 1, the measure will allow doctors and pharmacists to offer cheaper options for prescription drugs if you pay with cash instead of using insurance. The

Indiana Pharmacists Alliance said if patients buy medicine through their insurance, but the cash price of the medicine is less than your copay, pharmacists can tell you that the cost will be lower if you pay in cash.

Robert Widener, a customer at Dr. Aziz Pharmacy, said, "Now, since they can tell you, everybody benefits, regardless of your social class or whatever."

Randy Hitchens, executive vice president of the Pharmacists Alliance, said the law removes what is called a "gag clause."

"HB 1317, PBM (pharmacy benefits manager) transparency, goes into effect July 1, [2018]," he said Thursday. "This new law contains two key components, including the elimination of gag clause language that has prevented the pharmacist from disclosing Rx pricing options to their patient; and the elimination of prescription reimbursement clawbacks by PBMs that has forced many independent pharmacies to close their doors. This new law provides fair business practices on prescription drug reimbursement for Indiana pharmacists and their patients."

Abbaspour of Dr. Aziz Pharmacy said, "'Gag order' was something that pharmacy benefit managers put on the contract that would not allow me to talk to my patients freely about the prescription costs. What are the alternatives they have? This has given us relief to be able to do our job."

Kurt Moyer, a phar-

macist and vice president of clinical services at Dr. Aziz Pharmacy, said insurance companies might be upset with the new law.

"Of course. They like to dictate everything through those contracts," Moyer said. "They don't like a lot of information getting out about pricing and discrepancies, whether it be how much a patient pays or how much a pharmacy gets paid."

Abbaspour estimated Hoosiers may save upwards of \$50 per prescription under the new law.

"There is absolutely no reason for a generic item to be so expensive," he said. "There are other alternatives to reduce that cost by \$40, \$50. We're at the forefront of that ... The community pharmacists are at the forefront of that."

Fishers High School prepares | Riverview Health purchases new teens for local tech jobs

With several technology companies looking to set up headquarters in Indianapolis, several central Indiana high schools are already hard at work training students to enter that competitive workforce.

Fishers High School in the Hamilton Southeastern School District hosts dual-credit college classes inside its building taught in part by local tech industry professionals. The program is in its third year and boasts three classes with about 15 enrolled students each. Those high school students will receive three college credits per course at Purdue University for these freshman level major courses and pay about \$25 per credit hour.

"The goal I think is to really connect kids with authentic learning and

to the students how it's a metaphor for digital certificates on the internet. He says coding and computer skills are the new form of English, and believes everyone needs to understand them. The students say they really believe this course could make a difference in their futures. "I thought it was really cool. I didn't know about this until junior year," said Jeremy Simpson, a senior at FHS. "I want to be a computer engineer so this systems analyst stuff would be helpful for my future job." "I think it's really interesting because it's a new way of learning and I know he knows his stuff because he has a job doing it currently," said Sarah Stensland, also a senior. At age 17, Jeremy Simpson already has a job in the tech industry and wants to make sure he'll be competitive once he graduates. The jobs are getting so much more technically skilled that you need training and knowledge beforehand to be competitive in there," Simpson said. "So knowing everything you can as soon as possible and preparing for that is very useful for getting a job in this field.'

"Our high school students are already telling us that they know how code websites, they know how to build apps," said Mc-Donald. "So we need to do a better job at driving this technical education into high schools so they're prepared to go directly into jobs in the IT industry." McDonald says several efforts are underway across the state, including some by Governor Holcomb to bring catered technical education to a younger population. Westfield Washington Schools' Innovate Westfield and Carmel Clay Schools' Ivy Tech Dual Credit Courses are similar programs in Hamilton County. "We're really trying to tap into the pulse of the smart, vibrant, entrepreneurial city of Fishers and have that reflected in the building as much as possible," said Loser. "This is one model that's a college level course taught by Purdue with a local expert but we have a multitude of opportunities for local experts, local companies to come into our classrooms connect with our teachers."



He's the instructor for CNIT 18000 through the Purdue Polytechnic Institute, but he isn't a trained teacher. He's the CEO of Fishers-based ClearObject and teaches the course from personal experience, with supervision from Purdue faculty.

"If we want kids to be able to be a part of this data economy that we have growing here in Indiana without necessarily loading them up with college debt or have them escape Indiana," said McDonald. "You need to have ways and pathways for kids to lean to be a part of the computer industry in a high school setting.'

b) Right-of-Way. The operator of a golf cart shall yield the right-of-way to overtaking motor vehicles.

c) Streets. Golf carts may only be used on streets designated within the establish neighborhood or other Fishers-approved neighborhood areas. Nothing in this policy shall be construed to apply to or limit the use of golf carts on golf courses or private property.

d) Fishers Property and

Sidewalks. Golf carts shall not be operated on any sidewalk, pedestrian walkway, multi-use path, or trail or any other non-designated public ways. The only exception to this use is of golf carts on Fishers' municipal property for official purposes.

e) Golf Cart Capacity. The seating capacity, normally no more than four passengers, shall not be exceeded nor shall the operator or any passenger be permitted to stand while the golf cart is in operation.

f) Parking. Golf carts may only be parked in the same manner and at the same places designated for parking of motor vehicles. The stopping, standing, or parking of golf carts in areas where parking is not allowed or in any place that impede the flow of traffic, pedestrian walkways, or a passageway is prohibited.

g) Alcohol Use. No person under the influence of an alcoholic beverage shall operate or be in control of any golf cart operated within the neighborhood. No golf cart shall have an open alcoholic beverage container aboard while in operation.

h) Valid License Required. Only persons pos-



Following Deakyne was the even par 35 from Merchent. Other Miller scores were Barnes with a 37, whileClaussen and Whallon each carded a 38.






