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Hamilton County, there's a new sheriff in town . . .
Interesting primary election results

There will soon be a new sheriff in town. His name is Dennis Quakenbush, a youthful, well-educated career lawman who is new on the Hamilton County political scene. He bested his nearest opponent, Bill Clifford, by about 1,400 votes in yesterday's Republican primary election, and likely faces no opposition in the upcoming general election. Other candidates in the spirited, four-way sheriff's race to take the place of retiring Sheriff Mark Bowen were Mitch Russell and Eddie Moore.

There will also be a new judge in court come January. Mike Casati defeated Will Riley in another reasonably close race by about 2,300 votes out of 32,000 cast in the GOP primary. Finishing third in the judge's race was Jeff Heinzmann. Casati will take the bench in January from retiring Judge Steve Nation in Superior Court 1.

Retiring from office at the end of the year besides Judge Nation and Sheriff Bowen is State Rep. Kathy Richardson. Her seat will likely be taken by Chuck Goodrich, another newcomer to local politics. He finished first in a field of

four candidates that included Greg O'Connor, Brad Beaver and Garen Bragg. Like the others, Goodrich likely faces little to no opposition in November in an overwhelmingly Republican Hamilton County.

Another major result of yesterday's voting was the shift in factional control of the County Council. The current line-up has members Paul Ayers, Brad Beaver, Fred Glynn and Rick McKinney often voting together on controversial issues, while Steve Schwartz, Amy Massilamany, Jeff Hern often compose the other bloc. Since Ayers is retiring, a new council nominee, Ken Alexander who won yesterday, is viewed as likely to side with the Schwartz group. Both Glynn and Schwartz won re-nomination in the primary.

Despite several competitive races, less than 19 percent of the county's voters went to the polls. Of the 43,021 who voted, 32,100 asked for a Republican ballot and 8,300,

Democratic. The election went very smoothly and the returns were posted in record time. Moments before 9 p.m. Election Administrator Kathy Richardson attributed the rapid count of votes in part to new electronic poll pads along with a hard working staff and a lack of problems with the voting machines in the 221 county precincts.

In the furious statewide fight for the GOP nomination for U.S. Senator, Mike Braun rather easily defeated Luke Messer and Todd Rokita in the Hamilton County voting. Braun polled more than 42 percent of the 32,192 votes cast in the hard fought race.

Firefighters in Fishers were hindered by what one called "excessive clutter" on Sunday while dealing with a house fire.

Fire officials said excessive clutter not only impacts your safety but the safety of first responders as well. It also hinders their ability to do their job.

Fishers firefighters were called out to the Hillsborough neighborhood around 6:20 p.m. Sunday after a neighbor reported smoke coming from the back of a home.

When firefighters arrived, they had trouble get-

ting inside.

"There was a lot of personal effects in the home, to the point that firefighters weren't able to make entry with the hose line through the front door. It was just too massive an amount," said Capt. John Mehling with Fishers Fire Department.

He said crews had to enter the home through the back door. The home may have suffered extra damage due to the amount of clutter.

"Already the fire is going to travel through a room in about three minutes. When you add this kind of material, paper products ... it is just going to burn that much quicker, that much

hotter and spread that much quicker," said Mehling.

"People have personal effects that are really important to them and we understand that, but when your materials become greater than the space that you have available, look for alternative places in which to store those materials," said Mehling.

He said the best thing you can do to protect your family is ensuring there is a clear path in your home.

"Nobody plans to have an emergency happen, but when there is one firefighters have got to have access to get to you or wherever the emergency is," said Mehling.

The Hamilton Southeastern girls track and field team won the Hoosier Crossroads Conference meet Tuesday at Zionsville. The Royals scored 162 points and won eight events, including three by new meet records.

Royals win HCC meet, set three new records

Hamilton Southeastern cruised to victory at the Hoosier Crossroads Conference girls track and field championships, which took place Tuesday at Zionsville.

The No. 2-ranked Royals scored 162 points, putting them 50 points ahead of runner-up Brownsburg. Fishers tied for third place, with Noblesville sixth and Westfield seventh.

"It's good that we won by so much, but we still got a lot of work to do in certain places," said HSE coach Julie Alano. "There were some good performances, some meet records, so that's good."

Southeastern won eight events, setting three new meet records along the way. Camille Christopher dominated the 200 dash in a meet record time of 24.85 seconds. Tierra Sydnor flew to victory in the 400 dash, with her record time of 57.28 seconds

nearly three seconds ahead of second place. And Kennedy Drish broke a meet and HSE school record by winning the pole vault with a leap of 12 feet, 10 inches.

Christopher also won the 100 dash and Sydnor picked up a win in the long jump. Mia Mackenzie finished first in the 100 hurdles and Valerie Obear won the discus with a best throw of 142-1, which Alano said was a new personal best by 10 feet. The Royals were first in the 4x100 relay.

The Tigers scored 101 points and had three runner-up finishes. Danielle Harrison was second in the 100 dash, while Tamia Perryman was the 200 dash runner-up and placed third in the 100. Fishers was also second in the 4x100 relay.

"We had a lot of outstanding performances," said Tigers coach Andrew Belloli. "Kamya Lapsley ran a fantastic 800,

finished third, but that was a crazy fast 800-meter race there."

Belloli also credited Corinne Yorkman with "great races" in the 1600 and 800 runs, Harrison for her sprint performances, and Miya Wai, who was racing for the first time in a couple weeks and did well in the 3200 run - "another loaded event," said Belloli.

Noblesville had two runner-up finishes. Shelby Tyler tied a personal best by placing second in the high jump with a best effort of 5-11, while Erika Kneiper was the pole vault runner-up.

Westfield's Gabby Dilick took second in the 3200 run.
