# Helping Ninjas, County Parks partner to help bees

### The REPORTER

Helping Ninjas has joined efforts with Hamilton County Parks & Recreation Native Bee Hut Coordinator, Holly Faust, to install native bee huts and reeds onto 39 trees across 100 acres of land at Cool Creek Nature Center in Carmel.

The Native Bee Hut Project is an initiative to create awareness and educate the public about native bees, and the Helping Ninjas donated the native bee huts that will be wired to trees throughout the acreage at Cool Creek Park – particularly placed near areas that have a succession of continue wildflowers.

A native bee hut has many reeds of various diameters to attract mason bees, leaf cutter bees and hole nesting bees.

"We focus on hole nesting native bees because 75 percent of our native bees actually nest in the ground. It is not feasible to dig up a groundnesting bee nest and rummage through it and expect them to survive. It is much more feasible to study native hole nesting pollinators," said Frost. While the native bee huts do provide additional habitat, according to Faust, another reason for installing them is to find out how many different species of

ing them is to find out how many different species of native hole nesters are in local habitats, which ones are not, and how they are affected by the non-native honey bees. "Interestingly enough,

"Interestingly enough, the same species may not show up every year," said Faust. "This data is gathered as part of the Native Bee Hut project and will be sent to the Native Bee Network."

The Native Bee Network of Crowne Bees is part of a larger movement called Projects For Good, and through this Crown Bees hopes to gain more funding for its Bee Ambassador program that will help them to find people, extension services and conservation districts across the nation willing to install Native Bee Huts.

The Native Bee Network saying is "Supporting Native Bees One Backyard At A Time," said Faust. "I'm thrilled to have the opportunity to help in research and contribute to getting native bees on organic farms and in the public. I'd like to find out what we have in our parks – our backyard – and then continue to support our native bees."

"Our bees need to be found, increased in numbers, and then placed back into native environments where they can thrive," says Dave Hunter of Crown Bees, Meddville, Wash. "It's not only about food for us, it's also about pollinated maples, which supply habitat for deer, or seeds for quail and mice."

Helping Ninjas has donated the 39 Native Bees Huts to help launch the Native Bee Hut project and will help to install them before the end of spring, Helping Ninjas has hopes to help Faust in the future to place more huts in surrounding areas of other Hamilton County parks.

Faust hopes that this project will help to educate the community that this is something anyone can do your own back yard.

A number of events will be held across the state. Information on Free Fishing Day events is at **dnr.IN-**.gov/fishfree.



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# Hill lauds CVS officials for drug-disposal plans

### The REPORTER

Attorney General Curtis Hill joined CVS Health officials at a press conference Thursday to discuss the pharmacy company's plans to create drug-disposal collection points at 49 CVS Pharmacy stores in Indiana. CVS Health is replicating these actions at 750 locations nationwide. This initiative complements the Attorney General's ongoing efforts to reduce the amount of unused and unneeded prescription medication lingering in Hoosier households.

"Over the years, CVS obviously has played a role in distributing medication to consumers," Hill said. "Today, the leaders of this company recognize the problems posed by an excessive supply of prescription drugs. Further, they want to be part of the solution, and I commend CVS for taking this kind of initiative."

Hill cited troubling statistics related to

the prevalence of prescription drug abuse. "Abuse of

prescription medicine is a big part of our overall drug crisis," Hill said. "Across the United States,

more than 6

Hill

million people abuse controlled prescription drugs. Here in Indiana, nearly one in 20 Hoosiers reports having used opioid pain relievers for non-medical uses, and a majority of abused medication comes from family and friends of users. We're doing good work whenever we get these drugs out of people's medicine cabinets and properly discarded."

CVS Health Chief Policy and External Affairs Officer Thomas Moriarty said



expanding the company's safe medication disposal efforts will help get unused prescription drugs out of

medicine cabinets where they could be diverted or abused.

"CVS Health is dedicated to addressing and preventing opioid abuse in the communities we serve in Indiana and across the country," he said. "Expand-

ing our safe medication disposal program is one of the many initiatives we support to fulfill that commitment and our purpose of helping people on their path to better health."

Success in addressing challenges requires cooperation among officials from multiple disciplines, said Steuben County Sheriff Tim Troyer, president of the Indiana Sheriff's Association.

"It's critical that law en-

forcement and healthcare providers work hand in hand in tackling the opioid crisis," he said. "Sheriffs' offices statewide have long been locations where citizens can safely dispose of medications."

These sheriffs' offices, police departments and all of the new CVS locations can be found on a new section of the Indiana Attorney General's website. Go to in.gov/attorneygeneral and click on the "alert" at the top of the home page. There you can easily find a drug disposal location near your home or business.

At the event, CVS Health also announced a grant to support the Riley Children's Health Adolescent Dual Diagnosis Program. The program supports local opioid recovery efforts, providing an integrated intervention for children and adolescents with co-occurring substance abuse and mental health problems.



# **Royals edge out 'Hounds for team trophy**

It had been five years since Hamilton Southeastern had won a boys track and field sectional.

By the closest of margins, the Royals finally broke that drought Thursday. Southeastern scored 147 points to win the Carmel sectional, edging out the defending champion Greyhounds by two points. Carmel scored 145, while Fishers was a strong third with 103 points.

Westfield placed fourth with 80 points. All four schools had several qualifiers for next week's regional at Lafayette Jefferson, with many callbacks expected to be announced today. But on Thursday night for the Royals, it was all about the trophy.

Southeastern senior Madison Norris said the feeling was "really exhilarating, because I've never won a sectional championship ever in my four years of high school." Not only is Norris part of the team championship, he also picked up an individual win the 110 hurdles and was part of HSE's recordsetting 4x100 relay.

Norris joined Jack Boyd, Noah Malone and Chase Maxey to win the 4x1 in 41.93 seconds. The Royals held off Fishers, which placed second, but ran under the old record. Jason Lassic, Henry Lewis II, Trenton Mabry and Benjamin Norton clocked in at 42.10 seconds.

The relay record was one of two records to fall at the sectional. Malone powered his way to a new record of 21.83 seconds in the 200 dash. Malone had already won the 100 dash, edging out Lewis by one-one hundredth of a seconds, 10.80 to 10.81.

As for other Royal first-place finishers: Gabe Fendel got back to his winning ways by taking first in the 1600 run, Nathan Smith won the 300 hurdles and Johnny May was first in the discus.

"This is the best performance I've ever seen everybody run," said Norris. "Everybody performed really well and I can't wait to see how they run in regionals and state."

# Tigers take first game from Eagles, tighten HCC race

FISHERS - The sixth-ranked Class 4A Fishers Tigers are one step closer to their goal, and they stuck to their M.O. on Thursday night to get it done.

Fueled by senior ace Luke Albright, the resilient Tigers charged back from an early 3-1 deficit behind a decisive five-run bottom of the fourth to defeat visiting 4A No. 7 Zionsville 6-3 and tighten the Hoosier Crossroads Conference race with two games remaining

A game behind Zionsville in the standings prior to the first pitch, the defending HCC champion Tigers (21-7, 13-3 HCC) are now tied for first with the Eagles (18-6, 13-3 HCC) as the three-game series shifts to Boone County on Friday night before concluding in Fishers on Saturday afternoon.

"If you can win it outright, you want to do that," Albright remarked after the Tigers pushed their winning streak to three consecutive. "That's what we're trying to do, and if we stay focused, I think we have a good shot at it.

Albright, a Kent State recruit, was locked in during the series opener, striking out seven and walking two through six innings. The senior right-handed logged 114 pitches to earn his fifth win on the year, and after allowing two runs in the top of the first, he retired six straight as the Tigers regrouped.

"He settled in and he does because he's a workhorse. He has been the past few years.
