Fishers Police Chief arrested for driving while intoxicated

The mayor of Fishers has released a statement after the apparent arrest of the Fishers police chief overnight.

According to

Mayor Scott Fadness, Fishers Police Chief Mitch Thompson, 48, informed officials that he was arrested for driving while intoxicated after being an involved in a three-car personal injury crash just before 11 p.m. in



Thompson the 9500 block of Keystone Avenue.

A police report for the incident stated that Thompson rear-ended a car, causing it to strike a third vehicle.

Fadness has placed Thompson on paid administrative leave pending an investigation. Assistant Police Chief Ed Gebhart will assume Thompson's role while the investigation is conducted.

Officials with the Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department are investigating the crash.

both being from Noblesville just seemed right," Murello said. "In 2016, the 100th Indy 500 and two drivers in Dale Coyne cars sponsored again by the same sponsor group as before – so I was sure in for that! Conor Daly actually led several laps of the Indy Grand Prix and Bryan led the 100th lap of the 100th Indy 500."

On August 7, 2016, Bryan Clauson died in a racing accident while attempting to race 200 races in one season.

After that, Murello said he was finished with racing.

"Before the 2017 Brickyard 400 and Lily Diabetes 250 Ryan Sieg Racing Contacted me about their Xfinity car and I said no," Murello told The Reporter.

Murello explained to Sieg Racing his connection to Clauson. They told Murello they also wanted to honor Clauson and if Murello was a sponsor on their car, Clauson's BC logo would be included.

Thus, Murello helped sponsor them last year. Which of course

brings us to 2018. When asked how his

sponsorship efforts for the BC39 began, Murello said, "Charlie Langenstein contacted me. He knew my history with rac-

ing and Bryan was very dear to me. I have an office in Noblesville that is close to a restaurant Bryan used to eat at where I used to see him and his fiancée, Lauren. It was a pleasure to get to help in a very small way to sponsor him in Indianapolis in 2015 and 2016."

Murello said he has known Langenstein for several years.

"He is involved in all forms of racing, and his son, Austin, is now racing dirt cars," Murello said. "Charlie wants his son to race in the first commemorative race for Bryan, the BC29 at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway. Austin is an up-and-coming dirt track racer, which is where Bryan started."

Indianapolis Motor Speedway, USAC pay tribute to Bryan Clauson

The racing capital of the world just pushed the boundaries in motorsports.

Indianapolis Motor Speedway will hold a USAC race the Wednesday and Thursday of the Brickyard 400 this fall, Sept. 5-6.

The cool thing is it will draw not just the great USAC drivers, but it's going to draw people like Rick Stenhouse and Kyle Larson and there are other NASCAR drivers you are talking about. IndyCar drivers, many of them haven't been in a midget in their lives are interested," said IMS President Doug Boles.

A quarter-mile dirt racetrack sits inside Turn 3 at the speedway and will play host to the first Driven2SaveLives BC39. The event will honor Bryan Clauson, a USAC champion and Indy 500 starter who lost his life in a USAC national midget race in 2016.

"He wanted to bridge that gap that had been created, which went shorttrack America and went this place. To see all of this come to fruition on the racing side of it is incredible," said Tim Clauson, Bryan's father.

The dirt track will be the ultimate destination for USAC drivers come the week of the Brickvard. While they are going to be competing against each other for the checkered flag, each and every driver understands the legacy Bryan Clauson left behind on the sport.

"Obviously everybody knows Bryan was one of the best when it comes to a race car driver, period. On the track speaks for itself, but I think off the track he really cared about everybody. He wanted people to do well. If he didn't win, he was excited for people and his friends who won. That's something that I've always struggled with and I think he really helped me with," said NASCAR driver Ricky Stenhouse Jr.

"Bryan loved the sport, Bryan loved the Speedway but he loved the fans more. Just being able to celebrate him at the first of the Speedway is pretty important," Boles said.

In addition to his Noblesville business and his BC39 sponsorship, Murello is also opening a new restaurant in the next few weeks.

Giuseppe's Italian Market, 1741 Hazel Dell Crossing, Suite 500, Noblesville, will open in August. The restaurant will feature 100 percent Italian food and is a business focused primarily on carry-out service. Murello, who lives in Carmel, says the new restaurant is only three minutes from his home. "It is a unique

Local storm-chaser Carl Willoughby graduated from Hamilton Heights High School in 1976, when the current middle school building was the home of the high school. On June 2, he and some of his classmates walked through their school for what they believed would be the last time. Thanks to support from Heights administration and an outpouring of interest from other alumni, there will be one last chance for Heights graduates to tour their old school before the building is repurposed.

The current middle school, 420 W. North St., Arcadia, will soon be partially torn down, except for the gyms, offices and some classroom areas.

As previously reported in our pages, Willoughby and some of his friends talk on a Facebook livestream they call Nightcast Live (NCL), which Willoughby organizes. That is where

they came up with the idea to walk through their old high school.

"We had fun," Willoughby said when asked about the June tour. "There were a few of us who were starting to shed some tears because Heights means a lot to us. When we were in school the teachers believed in their students and made it fun to go to school."

Sept. 29, 2018 will be your last chance to tour the facility in its current state.



"Do I have to stop for that school bus?"

In Indiana, late July and early August brings hot weather, the State Fair and also the start of a new school year. Every school year, the Indiana State Police receives numerous complaints about school bus stop arm violations from school corporations around the state. The Indiana Department of Education surveys school corporations annually for stop arm violations on one given day, and reports those numbers to the National Association of State Directors for Pupil Transportation Services.

There are just over 16,000 school buses on the road in Indiana, and according to the yearly statistics, as the number of school buses on the road has increased. so has the number of school

bus stop arm violations.

The Indiana State Police would like to remind motorists of the Indiana law concerning school buses, flashing lights and stop arms. Remember, when approaching a school bus, from any direction, which is stopped with its flashing red lights activated and its stop arm extended, motorists must stop, even on multiple lane undivided highways.

Motorists who are on a highway that is divided by a barrier or unimproved median (i.e. a concrete or cable barrier or a grass median) are required to stop only if they are traveling the same direction as the school bus. If there is no unimproved median or barrier, then all lanes of a highway, in all directions must stop for a school bus stop arm.

When approaching a school bus, always be prepared to stop and watch for stopped traffic.

Disregarding a school bus stop arm is a serious moving violation and one that school bus drivers are quick to report. Violation of this law is a Class "A" infraction and is punishable by a maximum fine of up to \$10,000.

The Indiana State Police is committed to the safety of our children, motorists and highways, and will continue our enforcement and education efforts to ensure that safety. 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Fishers road construction updates, week of July 30

The REPORTER Pine Bluff Drive

Lane restrictions will be in effect this week for concrete road repair. Traffic control will be in place.

113th Street ぐ Florida Road

On July 24, the intersection of 113th Street and Florida Road closed for the realignment and construction of a new roundabout at the intersection. The closure is expected to last appropriately 90 days. See the **Detour Map**.

Southeastern Parkway

Southeastern Parkway is closed from 136th Street to Isle of Man Way (Avalon subdivision) for approximately 30 days to complete a roundabout. Traffic should detour up Prairie Baptist Road to 136th Street. See the **Detour Map**.

Allisonville Road

Allisonville Road construction is in full swing. Traffic has been shifted to the east to allow for widening on the west side. Restrictions may be in place between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. and flaggers will be on site directing traffic, as necessary. Through September, all southbound left turns from Allisonville Road onto 126th Street will be prohibited.

There will be additional lane restrictions on Allisonville Road on Thursday, Aug. 2 for bridge delivery. At times, traffic will be stopped in both directions as trucks enter and exit the site.

This will be an active construction site with reduced speed limits. For more info on this project, view the **Fact Sheet**.

131st Street

The intersection of 131st and Cumberland Road reopened on Thursday, July 26.

Expect lane restrictions, weather permitting, along 131st Street between Allisonville Road and Lantern Road for the construction of the Conner Trail from Conner Prairie to the Municipal Complex. Lane restrictions will also take place on Lantern Road between 131st Street and Municipal Drive.

Nickel Plate District

From 6 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Saturday, road closures will take place along the east side of the Municipal Circle along Municipal Drive for the Fishers Farmers' Market. Access to Municipal Drive from North Street will also be closed during this time. Farmers' Market parking is available in The Depot and The Switch garages (see the **Parking Map** for more details).

The Board of Works recently passed an ordinance for no parking in the Nickel Plate District between the hours of 3 a.m. and 6 a.m. See the **Parking Restrictions Map** for more information.

Brooks School Road

Brooks School Road is closed for 30 days south of 116th Street between Desert Glen Drive and Club Point Drive. The detour route is Hoosier Road and Fall Creek Road. View the **Detour Map**. Brooks School Road between 126th Street and 136th Street has reopened.

106th Street

106th Street is closed to thru traffic from Eller Road to Allisonville Road and from Allisonville Road to Hague Road for the **106th Street Infrastruc**ture Project. Closures for through traffic will also take place from Hague Road to the Crosspoint Boulevard/ Lantern Road roundabout. For more info on this project, view the Fact Sheet.

Interstate 69

As part of a \$92 million design-build contract, Milestone has added a third lane in each direction to the median, repaired and resurfaced existing pavement, and rehabilitated bridges and drainage structures on 15 miles of I-69 in Hamilton and Madison counties. Construction of an additional auxiliary lane between the 116th Street entrance ramp to I-69 South and the I-69 South Exit 204 ramp to 106th Street will continue through next spring.

I-69 South will be temporarily reduced to two lanes to allow space for the State Road 37 and 116th Street entrance ramps to safely merge while construction continues on the southbound auxiliary lane between the 116th Street and 106th Street ramps.

As a result, the foundation on which the Su-

preme Court built its justification for Obamacare's constitutionality ceased to exist. I hope to see the emergence of sound policies that constitutionally safeguard the

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


