## Noblesville Council hears mixed opinions on Levinson

The Levinson, a project the City of Noblesville first announced on social media late month, has caused a social media debate among members of the community. Noblesville's Facebook page lit up with several hundred comments following the announcement of a \$24 million public-private partnership involving an underground parking garage, apartments and retail space.

Last Tuesday, area residents packed the Noblesville Common Council meeting which offered an opportunity for the public to hear from the project developer and city officials.

Following the presentation from project developer Shelby Bowen, Noblesville City Council member Mary Sue Rowland expressed her concern the project did not fit the historic downtown Noblesville theme.

"I drove through Carmel and I saw a building just like this, and I hear there is one in Fishers that looks just like this," said Rowland. "I don't think that's a good idea if that is the case."

# Nickel Plate Express equipment to arrive in Hamilton County

Experts will labor this week to move in three more passenger cars, a generator car and a F9 locomotive to enable Nickel Plate Express to begin operations Sept. 15.

The first passenger car, a 1956 Santa Fe El Capitan Hi-level, was successfully moved Aug. 30 from Lapel to Arcadia.

Schuman Transport Service, LLC of Minnesota and Paddock's Transport of Westfield are overseeing the movement of the 16-foot tall cars. The immense height and weight of the Santa Fe cars make them a challenge to move.

"It's not every day you get to move a piece of historic equipment like this," said Tom Schuman, owner of Schuman Transport Services. A lifelong rail enthusiast, Schuman has enjoyed the opportunity to lend his expertise. "We're always up for a challenge. When you have a good crew like Paddock's and I do, it makes everything run much smoother."

Previously, the 1956 cars underwent restoration in Tennessee before moving to Lapel in July for temporary storage. The cars will officially re-enter service on Sept. 15 during the Nickel Plate Express Grand Opening.

The inaugural ride and ribbon cutting ceremony will begin at 12:30 p.m. in Atlanta. Tickets for the historic event can be purchased at [NickelPlateExpress.com/tickets](http://NickelPlateExpress.com/tickets).

Mayor Scott Fadness had a lot on his mind as he spoke to the Fishers Youth Mentoring Initiative (YMI) fundraising breakfast Thursday morning at the Ambassador House grounds. The mayor and his wife Aunna were expecting their second child to be born Friday morning, so that was clearly on his mind. (Editor's note: Fadness announced Friday on Twitter the birth of their son, Hudson Philip Fadness.) But he also took the opportunity to laud the work of YMI mentors.

The mayor talked about the work by the city and school corporation that continues to improve mental health throughout the community. Fadness cited a ride-a-long he recently had with a Fishers Police officer and responded to a call about a 34-year-old man threatening suicide during a fight with his girlfriend.

The outdoor meal will be \$8 per person, which includes cornbread, and CrossRoads Youth has teamed up to assist in serving a variety of soft drinks. Desserts will be available at extra charge. Both the society and Crossroads are not-for-profit 501(c)(3) organizations.  
Chair Laura Stapleton-Robbins has invited bluegrass jammers to bring their instruments to Pioneer Hill for the evening to enjoy the historic setting. George Boxley's pioneer cabin was built in

1828 by the Virginia abolitionist who escaped jail and operated the surrounding grounds as a farm with country schoolhouse. The log cabin is on the National Register of Historic Places, and Pioneer Hill is one of Hamilton County's highest elevations.  
The Sheridan Historical Society has been developing funds for its new museum, now being remodeled at 315 N. Main St., and much of the work is being done by members and volunteers, per Ron

Stone, society president.  
"The building has served as a vintage motorcycle shop and a dime store/license branch, but originally the structure was constructed in 1917 to serve as the site of the Hippodrome movie theater," shared Stone. "The cabin is a great place for this first-time event because the society preserved it as a landmark restored in 2008."

The Sheridan Historical Society was incorporated in 1969 and features genealogy, a collection including a 1909 Black motor buggy, Civil War memorabilia with a restored American flag carried in Tennessee battles by then local Lewis Kercheval, and other features highlighting pioneer years.  
Funds raised will be dedicated to the museum relocation and expansion and Crossroads Youth, a private youth initiative, will share in some of the proceeds donated.

"It really irritated me that we have done all this work over the last four to five years and we could not figure out how to help that individual," the mayor said.  
Fadness argues that it is important to "get to these people earlier, in the simplest, subtlest ways." He told those attending the fundraising event that organizations such as YMI make subtle interjections into the lives of local young people. He calls this early intervention "impactful."  
"It was only a few years ago when I sat down John DeLucia and Darren (Heil) to talk about this [YMI] concept, and look what it's become," said Fadness. "I can only imagine the impact [YMI has] had on young people."

YMI provides mentors for young people in the Hamilton Southeastern School District for students in need of an adult to help them. Most mentors commit to one hour a week with a mentee.

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# Carmel planning to enforce current zoning on Lucas estate

A hearing last week on the zoning for the Lucas estate “party barn” is off the table, and the city of Carmel said it plans to enforce zoning to the fullest extent of the law.

The Lucas estate and its attorneys have argued that having private events at the home is not a violation of Carmel zoning laws. City officials sided with many neighbors and said hosting events at the mansion is a violation of the residential zoning in the area.

The Lucases and the city have gone through mediation to try to reach an agreement. The issue, which had been pushed back a month at July’s Carmel Board of Zoning Appeals meeting, was set to be heard last Monday.

Last November, the Carmel director of community services said in a letter that the Lucas estate was not allowed to operate as an event venue and could only host four events a year.

In August, he wrote another letter to the attorneys for the estate saying he was withdrawing the previous letter, and the BZA’s order “remains in effect and can be enforced to the fullest extent of the law.”

A representative for the city of Carmel provided the following statement: “We consider this a matter of litigation because the BZA Order is valid and enforceable against the Lucas Estate. Neighbors to the estate still have a grave concern about noise, traffic

and what they believe is business use of a residential property. Any action to enforce that BZA Order by the City will potentially result in litigation. Despite this, both parties continue to discuss a potential resolution. To guarantee the integrity of these discussions, the City has no further comment at this time.”

Attorneys for Forrest and Charlotte Lucas sent I-Team 8 a statement from Forrest Lucas that reads, in part:

“Last November, the City of Carmel issued a “Director’s Determination” that sought to place restrictions on the Lucas Estate that did not apply to anyone else. The Determination was essentially the City of Carmel’s opinion about how our proper-

ty should be used. In our view, many of these restrictions were unreasonable and deprived us of the full use and enjoyment of our property without due process. We had no choice but to appeal.

“Following the mediation, the City of Carmel withdrew its Director’s Determination that ended the need for an appeal.

“We are not looking for special treatment. We have repeatedly said that we are willing to abide by the same rules as everybody else. We have committed to work with the City of Carmel to ensure that we are in compliance with the zoning and noise ordinances. We want to continue to use our property to be charitable to people who need it.”

"I agree, I don't think that is a good idea either," replied Bowen. "I don't want this building to look like anything other than the Levinson in downtown Noblesville."

Noblesville Mayor John Ditslear interrupted the exchange between Rowland and Bowen, stating, "As far as I am concerned, there may be another one somewhere else, but we are not going to be a Carmel and we are not going to be a Fishers."

Bowen replied to Ditslear, saying, "I'm not even thinking about those other communities. I am focused on getting it right in downtown Noblesville."

The council provided an opportunity for public comment.

Speaking at the meeting was Noblesville Chamber of Commerce President Bob Dubois. "I have been waiting for the right time to have a comment and today is the day. I am impressed with what I have seen and what I have heard tonight."

Noblesville resident Jeff Zeckel asked the council how Steve Holt and Brian Ayer would be compensated for their property that currently sits on the real estate to be developed. Zeckel also asked if the council would have the final decision on the proposed project.

Ayer is a council member and recused himself

from Tuesday's discussion, stating a conflict of interest.

"I have purchase agreements with both [Ayer and Holt] and they have not been provided to the council, and that is purposeful," Bowen said. "Six months ago I negotiated an acquisition price. I have not forwarded those agreements to anybody out of respect to the private land owners."

Councilman Greg O'Connor assured Zeckel the council will have final say on the project decision.

Noblesville Main Street Director Lorna Steel also spoke at the meeting in favor of the project. "We believe the Levinson is a phenomenal asset to downtown

by providing parking, housing and retail space."

Noblesville resident Mike Corbett told the council, "I agree the downtown has needed this for a long time. This is going to have a profound effect on downtown, and it is going to set a precedent that will probably set the tone for future development."

Corbet urged the city to involve local groups such as Noblesville Main Street and the Noblesville Preservation Alliance.

"This administration has a reputation of making backroom deals and presenting projects to the public when it is too late to do anything. I hope that is not the case here. I'm gratified

to hear from Mr. Cooke [Noblesville Deputy Mayor] that there will be opportunities for more public input."

Noblesville resident Brian Holcomb stated in support of the project that "Noblesville needs change. The status quo will only push for the next generation of Millers to become Royals, Tigers, or worse - Greyhounds." Holcomb also stated with this project Noblesville will have a historic downtown with modern amenities.

Downtown Noblesville attorney Harry Sauce said, "I think a lot of great thought has gone into this and I think a lot of great thought needs to be still going into it after tonight. I have some concern, but I am also very thrilled."

Following the public comment, Councilwoman Megan Wiles and Councilman Rick Taylor thanked the public for attending the meeting.

Wiles said, "I can't tell you how many times we have council meetings and there is no one sitting in the audience. To have you all come and be a part of these conversations I think is wonderful and I would encourage you to come back and do so."

Wiles then motioned for the council to take no action Tuesday. Wiles' motion was approved unanimously.



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# Defense steps up for Millers in win over Fishers

It was the first win of the season for Noblesville after lopsided losses to Cathedral and Carmel. Fishers fell to (1-2) on the season.

Zach Gruver of Noblesville was the spoiler with his theft of two Fishers pass attempts, one for an 84-yard touchdown return. His second interception of the night gave the Millers a 13-9 lead late in the third quarter.

“I talked about having to make plays on defense because Fishers is so big, they can lean on you and just wear you down,” Noblesville coach Justin Roden said.

Fishers' last drive of the game ended on an interception by Noblesville's Justin Johnson-Sparks, his second pick off in the game – both his interceptions came from overthrown passes. Johnson-Sparks' first interception gave the ball to Noblesville late in the fourth quarter as Fishers attempted to come back from a 15-9 deficit.

Noblesville scored its final touchdown with 1:55 following a 33-yard reception by Gruver that put the ball on the Fishers eight yard line.

On the ground, Fishers out-rushed Noblesville 198 yards to 71 and edged the Millers 89 yards to 77 in the air. Dylan Scally of Fishers led all rushers with 101 yards on 20 carries. Collin Statz led the night in receiving with four catches for 47 yards for Fishers.

Fishers kicker Jack Phillips put up three field goals on the night, accounting for all of Fishers' points.

An up and down first half for Noblesville ended on a high note after the Miller's Zach Gruver intercepted a Fishers pass at the host's 36-yard line, returning it to the Tigers 23. Two plays later Grant Gremel of Noblesville lofted an arcing pass that found Zach Blevins in the back of an end zone. With 42 seconds to go in the half, the Millers nabbed a 7-6 lead after struggling on offense in the opening quarters.

“They are getting better, they kept battling, which is what I am proud of,” Roden said. “Noblesville teams in the past tended to let up when things went against them.”

Turnovers inflicted both teams in the first half. Both lost fumbles to the opposition and traded interceptions. Jackson Dunn for Fishers intercepted a pass in the first quarter, returning it 21 yards to the Millers 49 with 9:00 left. A 12-play drive following Dunn's interception ended in a 28-yard field goal for the Tiger's Jack Phillips and a Fishers 3-0 lead.

In the Tigers' first possession of the second quarter, Scally broke through the right side of the Miller's defense for a 15-yard gain. The drive stalled at the Tiger's 19-yard line however, leaving it up to the field goal unit. Phillips for the Tigers put it through the uprights once again, this time for 29 yards and a 6-0 Fishers lead.

Marcus Roux came in as quarterback for the Tigers, completing eight of 22 passes for 89 yards. Collin Statz had four of those receptions, totaling 47 yards.

Both teams will continue Hoosier Crossroads Conference play on Friday with big county rivalry games. Noblesville will host Westfield at Beaver Materials Field, while the Tigers travel to Hamilton Southeastern for the Mudsock game.

# 'Rocks rushing attack grounds Eagles to open HCC play with win

Following last week's disappointing loss late to Decatur Central, it was a given that Westfield would be hungry and do everything possible to get a victory in its Hoosier Crossroads Conference opener against Zionsville.

The host Shamrocks kept at it offensively with a steady rushing attack and that was exactly what it took to wear down the Eagles' defense on Friday night, as Westfield won going away at Riverview Health Stadium, 41-28.

The visitors got the ball first on the opening kickoff and they turned the ball over on their second play on offense. Josh Wagner tossed an interception to the Shamrocks' Jeremiah Edwards.

Leading rusher Nathan Nguyen was out with an injury, so it was next man up for Westfield in junior Eli Patchett. The junior tailback didn't bat an eye all night. He managed to run for a game-high 132 yards on 18 carries and scored three touchdowns.

Westfield marched down the field in eight plays for 80 yards and Patchett worked well with fellow junior in quarterback Camden Simons. The two combined for the first TD with Simons pitching a short option to the right and Patchett found the end zone with ease to get the Shamrocks on the scoreboard 7-0.

“Yeah, it just felt really good about that. Great teams start and finish games, finish halves really well,” said Westfield head coach Jake Gilbert on his team's overall play that kept Zionsville back on their heels all night long.

“That was an emphasis that we wanted. We gotta get off to a good start against these guys, but gosh, they keep you on your toes the whole time. They do not go away,” said Gilbert on Zionsville's ability to stick with them for four quarters.

Patchett scored his second touchdown of the first quarter on a three-yard rush up the middle. Alex Bales' kick went wide right, leaving the score 13-0.

Westfield had the visiting Eagles in catch up mode most of the night on both sides of the ball.

“Yeah, you could feel everybody tensed up a little bit. The players were really anxious and you could really see the 'Oh crap' mentality there. We tried to get them calmed back down and we finally did and it was just a little bit too late,” said Zionsville head coach Pat Echeverria on his team's stance throughout Friday night's game.

Zionsville turned the ball over on downs at the Westfield 38, but quickly got the football back when safety Conner Uptmor snagged an interception off the hands of Kyle Pepiot, setting the Eagles up on offense again, this time at the Shamrocks 49.



Fishers scored a 431. Caitlyn Kim led the Tigers with an 89.


