Investigation concludes no threat to Hamilton Heights

Reps, Dems have post-election events

As rumors circulated throughout social media and the Hamilton Heights School Corporation Sunday night about a vague threat, Heights Superintendent Dr. Derek Arrowood sent a message to Heights families about what was known at the time.

According to Heights school officials, by 9 a.m. on Monday, a second

message to Heights families followed to share that an in-house investigation had been completed finding that there was no real threat or danger to anyone at Heights.

Heights school administrators said security was increased as a precautionary measure Monday morning to help students feel safe and ensure a normal start to the school day.

“The safety of our students and staff is our top priority,” said Arrowood. “We work closely with local law enforcement and take EVERY threat seriously. Given recent events in the news and this time of heightened anxiety around keeping students safe, we will always err on the side of caution to keep families updated when possible threats are reported.”

The big 2018 election may be over, but Hamilton County Republicans and Democrats have not gone into hibernation for the winter. Both parties are planning events tonight (Wednesday) and on Dec. 8.

County Young Republicans will rally at 5:30 tonight at Donatello's restaurant in Carmel. The open house includes a toy drive to benefit the Villages of Indiana, an adoption agency that also cares for children in foster care.

Then, on Dec. 8, the Hamilton County Federated Republican Women will hold its holiday party at Matteo's, 40 N. 9th St., Noblesville, beginning at 11:30 a.m. Reservations are required for lunch.

County Democrats will gather tonight at Scotty's Brewhouse, 14741 Hazel Dell Crossing, for a thank you party for all who aided the party in the recent election. Candidates will be recognized. There will be a discussion on planning for future elections.

The next election, now less than six months away, will be the municipal primary in all Indiana cities and towns.

GOP candidates for mayor of Noblesville have gotten a jump-start on the city election. Three have announced their intentions including Julie Kozicki, Chris Jensen and Mike Corbett. Incumbent mayor John Ditslear is not running for re-election, and a spirited contest for the city's executive position seems certain.

The county's other mayors: Andy Cook of Westfield, Scott Fadness in Fishers and Jim Brainard, Carmel, are running again, and to date have no announced opposition. City and town council members, municipal clerks and judges will also be elected next year.

All current city officials are Republicans. Democrats can be expected to run in some of the municipal elections, but usually find it a tough assignment. The last Democrat elected mayor was Robert Wical, winning the Noblesville mayor's office 44 years ago.

HSE unveils “preferred” redistricting plan

After months of work, data-crunching, community meetings and internal discussions, Hamilton Southeastern school administrators have released what they describe as their “preferred” redistricting plan. This is the **K-8 school boundary map** that will be submitted to the school board as the recommended plan, to be presented to the board Wednesday night by Superintendent Allen Bourff.

New redistricting maps will take effect for the 2019-2020 school year.

The newly-drawn boundaries will move 2,265 students, including 1,208 at the elementary level and 1,057 at Inter-

mediate/Junior High buildings. The plan will reduce the number of portable classrooms and make way for the new Southeastern Elementary, set to open in August 2019, located at Cyntheanne Road and Southeastern Parkway.

There were some last-minute adjustments from the map presented at a school board work session held Nov. 20.

Some of those changes include:

- Moving areas of Sunblest Farms and Sunlake Apartments from Cumberland Road to New Britton, eliminating the need for school buses to cross State Road 37/Interstate 69.
- The Anderson Hall neighborhood near 136th Street and Promise Road moves back to Cumberland Road from Harrison Parkway.
- This plan will grandfather students in grades 3, 5 and 7 only, but no transportation will be provided to those choosing the grandfathered option.

There are a number of other changes in this “preferred” plan from other redistricting maps considered through the process.

It should be noted no redistricting plan is final until the school board votes to approve, and that is scheduled to happen Dec. 12.

Anyone wishing to speak at this Wednesday night's school board meeting, slated to start at 7 p.m., may do so, but you must register in advance. Here are the rules on how to request three minutes to speak before the board:

At each Board meeting, the Board of School Trustees will accept comments from persons in attendance on the scheduled agenda, subject to these guidelines:

REDISTRICTING PLAN

1. A person who desires to speak to the Board, about a scheduled public agenda item, must register before the start of the meeting. A registration sheet will be available at least thirty (30) minutes prior to the start of the meeting. Registration will close five (5) minutes before the scheduled start of the meeting. Required registration information will include the name of the person(s) providing the comments, the organization represented (if any), and the agenda item to be addressed.

2. Statements may not exceed three (3) minutes.

3. No person may speak more than once on the same topic.

4. Comments will be directed to the Board, not to an individual Board member.

5. Comments may not reference specific employees, patrons or students of the school corporation.

6. Routine agenda items such as approval of minutes, certified and support staff and conference reports reviewed by the Board at each meeting are not matters subject to comments by the public during the Board meeting.

7. If the information is readily available, and is not confidential, Board members or administrators may provide answers to questions. Under most circumstances, questions will be noted and answers returned to the speaker at a later time.

8. Statements will not be abusive or argumentative. Persons making comments will not debate statements made by other persons.

9. The Board president will enforce these rules and may take actions necessary to maintain order at the meeting. Such actions may include, but are not limited to:

A. Stopping the speaker if the statement is too lengthy, unduly repetitive, or otherwise violates this procedure; and

B. Limiting the total amount of time devoted to public statements based on the number of people wishing to make statements and the length of the agenda.

The policy which is already in effect for addressing the Board on any matter will remain in effect. This means that a person may be placed on the agenda by notifying the Superintendent or Board president at least one week prior to a scheduled Board meeting.

State Rep. Cook to file hate crime legislation

State Rep. Tony Cook (R-Cicero) released draft legislation on Wednesday that would create a statewide hate crime statute.

Cook's proposal would allow courts to increase criminal sentencing if a perpetrator commits a crime because of his or her bias against the victim's perceived or actual characteristics. These characteristics include age, race, religion, ethnicity, national origin, ancestry, color, gender, gender identity, sexual orientation, disability, status as a police officer or service in the U.S. armed forces.

"The increase in these crimes of hate in our communities, across the state and throughout the nation indicates that now is the time to act and provide judges and prosecutors with more clarity in sentencing," Cook said. "This legislation is important to adequately address the severity of these crimes and

to help protect all Hoosiers."

Cook's bill was created with input from prosecutors, judges and a variety of interest groups, ranging from religious and minority coalitions to business and university organizations. He said the proposal would outline individuals and groups that are targeted most frequently as hate crime victims while staying carefully inclusive.

According to Cook, law enforcement would report hate crimes to the FBI and Indiana's central repository for criminal history information at least twice a year to help officials identify trends. The proposal would also establish training standards for law enforcement officers regarding identifying and responding to hate crimes.

Indiana is one of five

states without a hate crime statute. Earlier this year, Gov. Eric Holcomb voiced support for a new law after a Carmel synagogue was vandalized with anti-Semitic graffiti and the recent shooting in the Tree of Life Synagogue in Pittsburgh.

"It's not possible to eliminate discrimination and this bill is not about criminalizing thought, or First Amendment free speech," Cook said. "There is still a lot more to be done moving forward, but I am hopeful that by working together with my House and Senate colleagues, we can present a solid framework for hate crime legislation that can help support victims and hold criminals accountable."

Lawmakers will have a chance to consider the proposal when the 2019 legislative session begins in January.

Behind clutch shooting from beyond the arc, the Pacers knocked off the Suns 109-104 in Phoenix to improve to 2-0 on their current West Coast road trip. Despite the Pacers maintaining control for three quarters, this one came down to the final moments as the Suns refused to quit.
