Westfield Washington Township board votes down parks bond series

The Westfield Washington Township board last Tuesday voted 2-1 to cancel the parks bond series to acquire land for open green space and natural areas within the township. Board members David Gill and Erica Strahm voted against the bond and land acquisition, while board member Danyele Easterhaus voted in favor of both.

This decision comes after the board unanimously approved two real estate purchase agreements on Dec. 20 pending the outcome of the petition drive to approve the bonds.

"I'm confused by this odd move to rescind the bonds," said Westfield Washington Township Trustee Danielle Carey Tolan. "It's disappointing that the will of the people cannot be heard and acted upon through the democratic process set forth through the remonstrance."

The Westfield Washington Township board voted 2-0 on Dec. 12 to move forward to petition in favor of the \$15 million park bond series after a remonstrance against the bond was filed. The bonds would have provided funding for land acquisition to preserve open spaces and natural areas, specifically near MacGregor Park, as land became available for sale. The 30-day period in which petitions in favor of or against the proposed park bond was set to begin Jan. 16.

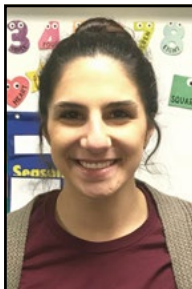
The program kicks off for January 2019 highlighting three teachers at Hinkle Creek Elementary.

Noblesville Fire, family remembers John Dashiell . . . Dash leaves his mark

John Dashiell – “Dash” to his friends – was a Navy veteran who served on the Noblesville Fire Department from July 15, 1968 to June 29, 1998. He had his last Thanksgiving with his family in Omaha, Neb., went to the hospital on Nov. 24, and passed away Dec. 8, 2018. This reporter was fortunate enough to spend time talking to his wife, Melissa Dashiell, and several of the men who served with him in the fire department about the Dash’s life and his influence on the lives of others.

“We met on a blind date in early 1970,” Melissa said. “My friend was having a little party. It was a little bitty party because the whole thing was to get us together. It was just six of us. I noticed John had a really neat car. He had a ’66 Chevelle, it had a 397, 4 on the floor, and he had great hair. I used to tell him, ‘You got a second date because you had a car and you had great hair.’”

Melissa and John married in 1971. They had two children, Abe and Karen. Abe Dashiell lives in Indiana and Karen Seymoure lives in Omaha, Neb. with her husband and a five-year-old son, Colin, who was adopted from China.

The Dashiells traveled to all 50 states as well as Canada and Mexico. Melissa told The Reporter she has a refrigerator magnet purchased from every state they saw together.

She speaks of John with a smile in her voice and often with laughter.

“He had all kinds of hobbies,” Melissa said. “He went from one to another. He grew gourds and painted them, he carved wood, he was a watercolor painter, he had a coin collection and he made jewelry from stones that he polished. You know those stone polishers that kids can get? He had four of them going at once – about drove me nuts! They had to do a different grit for each one. They went through coarse, then through finer and finer grits.”

John even panned for gold in White River.

“He built his own sluice,”

Melissa said. “Anytime we were on a trip that the area had panning for gold, well, we had to go do that. He had so many interests.”

Both Melissa and members of the Noblesville Fire Department talked about John as a man who was always doing something with his hands – always building or fixing or improving things.

“He liked a lot of stuff, but it was always stuff he could do with his hands,” Melissa said. “He barely ever read. I read a lot. He’d ask me, ‘Are there any pictures in that book?’ I’d say, ‘Nope.’ And he’d say, ‘Well, that’s a waste of time.’”

“Most people would say he was shy and reserved,” Melissa said. “He loved to travel, but I did all the talking, so there you go. He let me be the outgoing one. He could sit back and watch or comment when he wanted to. He was always thinking, but rarely said what he was thinking. The guys from the fire department will say the same thing.”

The men from Noblesville Fire Department did indeed say that same.

“John’s father, Gilbert Dashiell, was Assistant Chief for the Noblesville Fire Department for 25 years, but they never worked together,” Assistant Chief Matt Mitchell told The Reporter. Gilbert Dashiell did spend time in the station with John after his retirement, however. “He and his dad could both be sitting there, and you might not hear 10 words out of them. They were both very quiet. Reserved.”

According to Fire Chief Greg Wyant, though quiet, Dash was exceptionally well-liked.

“The interesting thing about Dash is that if you went out and found every

person that knew him and lined them up, I don’t think anyone would say anything bad about him,” Wyant said.

Assistant Chief Mitchell agreed.

“Everybody says this, and it’s a cliché, but in this case, I think it’s true: I don’t think Dash had a single enemy,” Mitchell said. “Everybody liked Dash. That’s pretty rare. When somebody passes away, they always say, ‘Oh, he was the greatest guy in the world,’ but with Dash it was actually the case.”

Dash and Donuts

One story that brings laughter from men who served with him is about donuts.

“He loved donuts,” Chief Wyant said. “Am I wrong? But Melissa didn’t like that he loved donuts.”

According to Mitchell, there was a watch room that Dash would spend some time in when he wasn’t fixing something at the workbench.

“He’d go up there and he’d have his donut,” Mitchell said. “We would have someone open the back door in the evening time, so he’d think it was Melissa and he’d scramble to hide all the evidence. ‘Donuts and Dash’ is pretty legendary.”

According to Captain Joel Musselman, Melissa did catch him with a donut at least once.

“It was summer, so we had all the bay doors open,” Musselman said. “He had literally just taken a bite and here she comes walking in the door – just the look on his face alone was just priceless. He knew he’d been caught and there was nothing he could do.”

Always Calm

“He was my first captain,” Musselman said. “We went to our first fire on South Street off 10th. He said, ‘Just follow me. We’re going in.’ We’re going in this fire and

“I’m frustrated by the vote and outcome of today’s meeting that ends this process for the public to have their voice heard and the project to acquire land at this time,” said Tolan. “Despite this setback, I look forward to continuing the vision set forth in the township’s strategic plan and carrying out the desires of the residents of Westfield Washington Township.”

More than 40 people attended the board meeting where board member Easterhaus invited them to share their opinions on board member David Gill’s motion to rescind the bond. A total of 11 people spoke, with seven people sharing opinions in favor of continuing the petition drive and four people opposed.

The Westfield Washington Township Trustee’s Office thanks residents for their interest and participation in the process.

County gets \$500K to fight opioid abuse

Hamilton County has been awarded two state grants from the Department of Mental Health and Addictions as well as a federal grant from the Bureau of Justice Assistance to help individuals in Hamilton County struggling with opioid abuse.

The federal grant is a two-year grant totaling \$490,343. It runs through Sept. 30, 2020. The money is earmarked for the creation of Opioid Quick Response Teams (QRT).

“The QRTs will work with overdose patients that have been revived with Narcan,” said Monica Greer, Executive Director for the Hamilton County Council on

Alcohol and Other Drugs. “They will visit their homes within 48-72 hours to check on the individual, identify needs and provide recovery support. The goal of the program is to get the patients into treatment.”

QRT members will also canvas communities, going door to door to provide opioid resources to the community. The QRT will consist of a law enforcement officer, firefighter and certified peer recovery coach.

“The recovery coach will be someone who is in recovery themselves,” Greer

noted. “So, we’re hoping they’ll be more effective in encouraging patients to seek treatment.”

Federal grant money will be used to pay staff as well as to purchase Narcan, provide prevention kits, and create school resource guides, pamphlets and brochures.

The two state grants, awarded by the Indiana Division of Mental Health and Addictions, provide \$50,000 each for training QRT members in Westfield and Carmel. The grants run through April 30, 2019. The grants will create a Community

Opioid Prevention Effort (COPE) coalition. Members will also compile program data and provide community mapping for areas with a high frequency of opioid abuse. The cities of Westfield and Carmel were selected for these grants because they already have health programs in place to build upon.

Hamilton County first-responders administered 300 doses of Narcan in 2017 alone. Greer hopes these grants will help keep offenders out of jail and off the streets. “We don’t want to punish them for their behavior,” she said. “We want to get them the treatment they need. We want to save lives.”

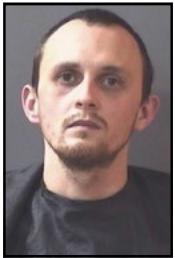
vate sector in that we perform budget forecasting 10 years out to ensure that we can accomplish our goals and keep our tax rate among the lowest in the state.”

Candidate filing underway for 2019 municipal elections

It’s another election year, and candidates for city and town office have begun filing at the county election office. The filing period runs until noon on Feb. 8. Candidates must file their intent to run in the May 7

primary election. Winners will advance to the November general election.

All eight of Hamilton County’s municipalities will elect officials this year. This includes mayors, city clerks, city judges and city council members in Noblesville, Fishers, Carmel and Westfield in addition to

town council members and clerk-treasurers in Sheridan, Cicero, Arcadia and Atlanta.

Noblesville is certain to have a new mayor since incumbent John Ditslear is not running for re-election. Mayors Jim Brainard of Carmel, Andy Cook in Westfield and Scott Fadness

at Fishers have announced they will seek re-election.

All current officeholders are Republican, and it will be in the GOP primary where the most activity is expected. Democrats may run for some municipal offices after making a strong if unsuccessful bid for several county offices in last fall’s election.

With the beginning of filing, more candidates are expected to announce their plans to run soon. Most of the incumbent city council members in Noblesville and Carmel have indicated plans to run for another term. Carmel, which is now a second-class city, will have a nine-member council instead of the current seven.

Officials elected this year will take office on Jan. 1, 2020. The Reporter will run the names of candidates as they file.

Chuck learned that my breakfast choice was biscuits and gravy ... at Ginger's Café.

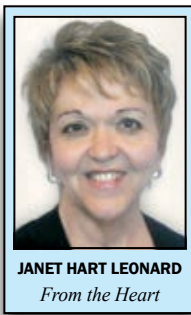

Great schools

One of big reasons why people move to Hamilton County – and Carmel specifically – is because of the

school system. My wife is a Carmel High School graduate (I graduated from North Central, just down the road) and my mother-in-law is a retired CHS teacher. I'm a board member for

the Carmel Education Foundation and I currently participate in a program called Expedition, which informs members of the community about everything going on in the school system. So I've become familiar with how great Carmel Clay Schools are. The district is rated A by the Indiana Department of Education and has been awarded 10 National Blue Ribbon Awards. CHS was ranked as the fifth best high school in the state for 2018, according to U.S. News and World Report.

Safe city

Almost every year, Carmel ranks among the state's safest cities. In November 2018, a website called Safewise analyzed crime data and ranked Carmel as the third safest city in the state,

with Fishers ranking second and St. John taking first. In 2017, the same website listed Carmel as the fourth safest city in the entire United States for raising children. The website looked at graduation rates, violent crime reports, sex offender concentration and more when tallying up the score.

Not only does Carmel have low crime rates, but it's also a safe city for motorists. Because the city has 122 roundabouts, as of January 2019, there are fewer auto accidents with serious injuries. In the past two decades, Carmel's population has tripled but the number of serious injury accidents has remained the same, which means a dramatic drop when you crunch per capita numbers. Sure, there are side swipes that take out a side mirror but the design of roundabouts reduce the likelihood of a head-on collision which makes a father feel safe when he has his newborn daughter in the back car seat.

Amenities galore

For me personally, I couldn't live in a really small

town. I'd be too bored. But a big city would be stressful for me. I hate sitting in traffic or dealing with large crowds. I think Carmel is the perfect size for my family. Busy enough that there's plenty to do but not as crowded as downtown Indianapolis.

It's amazing to think that when Carmel Mayor Jim Brainard took office in 1996 there were only 40 acres of park land in the city. Now there's nearly 1,000 acres.

you can feel the hair on your ears start to stand up – it's that hot. We just kept going until finally we're at the scene of the fire. He just opens up, puts it out and says, "Well, okay."

There was an apartment fire in downtown Noblesville that Mitchell responded to with Dash.

"Dash was just as calm as he could be," Mitchell said. "He was on the radio saying, 'Hey, Noblesville, we've got a little smoke showing. Yeah, I see a little flame. Yeah, somebody just jumped out of a window.' I'm in the back just freaking out. A downtown fire with people jumping out of windows! He was just as calm as he could be. I don't know if his blood pressure ever got above 120 over 80."

Deputy Chief Chris Gellinger's story about Dash's ever-calm demeanor involved Ken Gilliam.

"Gilliam was driving and Dash was his captain," Gilliam said. "They were going out Pleasant Street toward 37. They cleared the hill and the light turned red. It was a slick night. Gilliam slammed on the brakes and the truck did a complete 360, slid out

on to 37 going the right direction and they just kept going. So Gilliam looked over and said, 'Pretty fancy driving, wasn't it?' All Dash said was, 'I've seen better.'"

Lasting Impact

Several men in the Noblesville Fire Department remember Dash from their first days on the job. Several also remember his last.

"When we had a retirement party for him, he wanted to do it here with his old crew," Gellinger told The Reporter. "We set up in the bay. Kind of just like in the movies, as the party was winding down we caught a house fire. We all got on the

trucks and left. As I look over Dash was standing there crying because his old crew left without him."

Chief Wyant said that was just something you didn't expect from Dash. "You know that inside he was torn up, but you'd never expect to see it," Wyant said.

John Dashiell was diagnosed with cancer in March of 2017, just a few years after he and Melissa moved to Florida.

"He never complained," Melissa said. "He went through all the chemo and treatments and finally the doctors said they couldn't do anything more for him. Ever after that he was feeling

good. He said, 'If I'm dying, I don't know it because I feel fine.' So we did as much as we could. We went to all kinds of places."

They were in Omaha for Thanksgiving with their children and their grandchild in November.

"We had a great Thanksgiving," Melissa said. "He was good the next day. Then he went in the hospital that weekend and died December 8. We had no idea that was going to happen. We were with the whole family, so that was the good thing about it."

Dash was always surprised at how many people knew him.

"That always cracked me up," Melissa said. "It's funny how a shy person thinks. But I know John would have loved this. Even though he was shy, he liked recognition – everybody does. I'm sure he would have really enjoyed the fact that he had a newspaper article written about him."

This reporter certainly hopes so.

"There are parts of Dash still here in the way some of the people worked with him and learned from him," Chief Wyant said.

Royals break away from Shamrocks in third quarter

FISHERS - After a tough first half, Hamilton Southeastern broke away from Westfield in the third quarter and rode the momentum to a 67-56 victory Friday night.

The Shamrocks scored the first basket of the game, a 3-pointer by freshman Braden Smith. The Royals' first points came from a putback by sophomore Vinny Buccilla, and that set the tone for the game, as both young stars would lead their respective teams.

Noah Smith gave HSE a 5-3 lead on a 3-pointer, after which Westfield went on an 8-0 run. Zach Banks scored four points during that time. The Royals cut the lead to 11-10 by the end of the quarter, including a 3 from Aaron Etherington, who was returning after missing some games with an ankle injury.

Smith got Southeastern ahead 15-13 early in the second period with five quick points, including a 3.

Landon Morris scored six points in the later minutes of the quarter. Banks made two free throws with seven seconds left in the half to keep Westfield within 23-21 at halftime.

HSE coach Brian Satterfield said the team tried to pick up its energy level during halftime, and did just that.

"At the defensive end, I thought we were more active and got our hands on some things," said Satterfield. "And then when that happened, that allowed us to get out and go in transition. And we definitely were more efficient offensively."

Southeastern began to roll in the third quarter, with Buccilla leading the charge. He threw in five 3-pointers in that period, which ended with the Royals ahead 49-33.

The momentum from the third quarter helped carry Southeastern through the fourth quarter, even as the Shamrocks made one last big push by finishing the

game on an 11-0 run. Smith made five 3-pointers in that quarter, he would lead all scorers with 22 points and total six 3-pointers.

Buccilla led the Royals with 17 points, while Noah Smith earned a double-double of 11 points and 10 assists. Smith also played well on defense with four steals.

Chris Grubbs led the Southeastern rebounding with six, with Smith grabbing five. The Royals had eight blocked shots as a team, with Mabor Majak making four blocks and Morris getting three.

After Braden Smith's 22, Banks and Welch each scored 16 points. Welch hit four 3-pointers and had five rebounds. Benji Welch handed out five assists.

Despite the loss, Westfield coach Shane Sumpter thought his team did "a lot of good things" during the game.

"I thought we got off to a good start," said Sumpter.

"I thought our first half went as planned. Missed a couple shots and really felt like we couldn't have been up a couple buckets at the half."

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Back in Indiana, Weatherford standing out for IUPUI

After a three-year journey that included a 1,200-mile and back detour, Grant Weatherford is finally back to playing basketball in front of the people he loves the most.

Weatherford, a 2015 Hamilton Heights graduate, is among the stars on this year's IUPUI men's basketball team. Weatherford transferred to IUPUI last year, and after sitting out for a red-shirt year last season, he is starting for the Jaguars and already making solid contributions to what has so far been a winning season.

Weatherford had originally committed to Purdue after graduating from Heights, then transferred to Midland College in Texas after a redshirt year with the Boilermakers. He was eager to return back home to Indiana; a big reason for doing so was to be near his family, which is now able to see him play without having to catch a four-hour flight.

"It's definitely very heartwarming to look up there after the game, just seeing familiar faces, people that have been with me through it all," said Weatherford.

The 6-foot-2 Weatherford has started in all 18 of IUPUI's games this season. He is averaging 7.1 points per game, and has reached

double figures five times, including a 20-point performance back on Dec. 18 against Purdue Fort Wayne (formerly known as IPFW). Weatherford is also pulling 2.9 rebounds and dishing out 2.8 assists per contest, all of this helping the Jaguars to a 10-8 record so far this season.

Those wins have come against some solid programs, such as Eastern Illinois, Boston College, Bradley and Western Illinois; Weatherford said the team tried to "amp up our out-of-conference schedule a little bit this year." IUPUI plays in the Horizon League and is currently 2-3 in the conference, with victories over UIC and Cleveland State, and losses to Northern Kentucky, Wright State and Youngstown State.

Weatherford originally was to play at Purdue after graduating from Heights, but wound up being redshirted in what would have been his freshman year. He left Purdue, and then headed to Texas. It was a long way from home, but it would ultimately prove to be a positive experience.

"I thought it was good to just get away and focus on things I needed to focus on," said Weatherford - "get back to being myself." He wound up having a successful season at Midland, averag-

ing 6.9 points, 3.6 rebounds and 3.2 assists per game. That included two double-doubles, a 17-point performance against New Mexico Junior College and 15 points against New Mexico Military Institute.

Midland College is located in the city of Midland, about 350 miles west of San Antonio and not too far from the New Mexico border. The college was truly "deep in the heart of Texas" and an interesting experience for Weatherford, as he found himself having to recreate a support system from scratch.

"It was interesting going out there. I didn't know anyone, so it was an eye-opening experience," said Weatherford, who said playing that year at Midland not only helped him grow as a person, but also grow his game as well.

"I thought it was a good year," he said. "I would have to have team success over individual success to get to the dreams and goals I wanted to reach."

But after a year out west, Weatherford was ready to return home. He had someone who really wanted him there besides his family: IUPUI coach Jason Gardner, who had been recruiting Weatherford since high school.

"They contacted me. Coach Gardner's been a

coach that recruited me. He recruited me again when I was in junior college. We laugh about it - third time's the charm," said Weatherford.

So, Weatherford was finally back home again in Indiana. But he wouldn't be able to play right away. Weatherford redshirted again in the 2017-18 season, a medical redshirt as he was out all season due to knee surgery, but he was still a presence for his new teammates.

"Coach made sure that I was at every single practice, that I was still looked at as a leader," said Weatherford. The coaches made sure he was around the team as much as possible, and was a leader off the court.

Now, Weatherford is on the court, and he will be there for a while. Weatherford is a sophomore eligibility-wise, and was granted a clock extension by the NCAA last month, ensuring that he will be able to play for the next three years.

"Definitely looking forward for the next three years," said Weatherford. He also wants to do his part in representing the city of Indianapolis well. "We feel like there's people that want us to be there," he said.

Academically, Weatherford has been quite busy. He's already earned degrees

in general studies and business, and is close to earning one in communications. Weatherford has a Bachelor's degree in Organizational Leadership and is working on his Masters as well.

But after so much success in basketball, Weatherford wants to keep that going for as long as possible. "It's up in the air, but I'd like to take basketball as far as I can," he said.

"I feel like I can make a career out of this and hopefully when that's done, I'll have a lot of options," said Weatherford.

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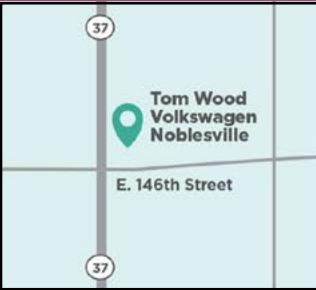


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I was born and raised right here in Noblesville. I grew up in a home without domestic violence or assault - it wasn't something I saw, or even heard about.
