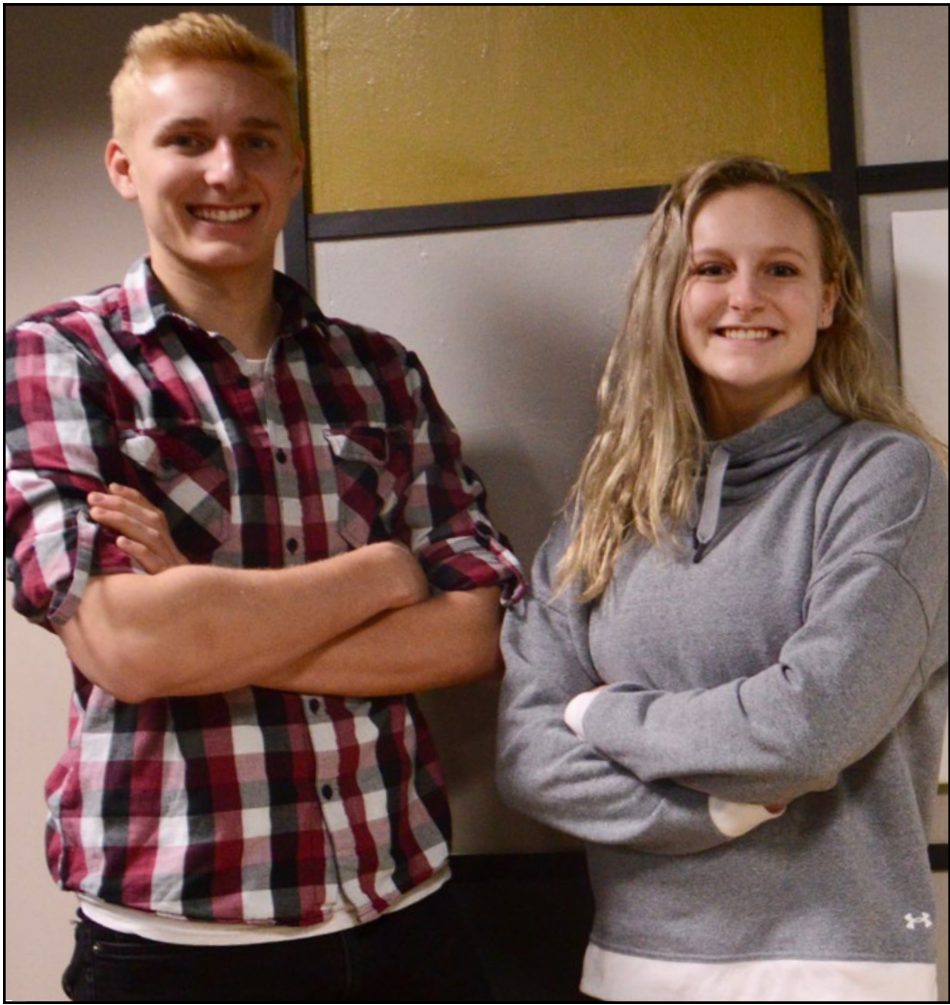

Slating, a good or bad practice in Hamilton Co.?

The slating of candidates in a primary election is a subject that fails to catch the attention of many in the general public, but it is so important to the election of our public officials that it should not go unnoticed. Should political parties in Hamilton County slate?

Slating by the political parties can be controversial. Marion County parties held slating conventions over the past weekends. It involves a gathering of precinct committee members who vote a preference for one candidate for each office at stake in an upcoming election. The party organization then works to nominate the favored candidates in the primary.

There is no slating in Hamilton County. It was tried here a



generation ago and received considerable backlash. Some of those slated won their primary contests, and some did not. It was not attempted again because of an outcry against it.

As cities and counties grow larger slating is more common because a smaller percentage of the voters know the candidates. The theory in favor of this practice involves the belief that folks within a party structure are better able to choose candidates who can win their respective races in the general election.

There is logic to this practice, but it gives political insiders great influence in the selection of our public officials. Often, a person not slated will drop out of

Deadline is Friday for candidate filing

With the deadline for candidate filing fast approaching, the stage is nearly set for the May 7 local primary election. Candidates for city and town offices must file their intentions by noon tomorrow (Friday) at the county elections office.

Two Hamilton County mayors and numerous other municipal officers are thus far unopposed in the Republican primary. Democrats have only a handful of declared candidates, and none for the top jobs.

GOP mayoral candidates in Noblesville include Vincent Baker, Mike Corbett, Chris Jensen and Julia Kozicki. Current Mayor John Ditslear is not running for re-election.

It is the largest field of hopefuls for the mayor's office in recent memory with

all candidates having significant ties to the community. Jensen, who made his candidacy known months ago, is a member and former president of the city council. Kozicki, a three-term member of the school board, serves with several community organizations. Corbett, who has run twice before for mayor, is publisher of the Hamilton County Business Magazine, and Baker, new to the political scene, is a city employee serving as urban forester.

At Carmel, Mayor Jim Brainard is running for an unprecedented seventh term. He is opposed by Fred Glynn, a banker who last year won re-election to the County Council.

Mayors Andy Cook in Westfield and Scott Fadness in Fishers are unopposed, as are city clerk Evelyn Lees

the race, leaving voters fewer or sometimes no choices in the primary election.

In many areas voters still have a choice in the general election between Republican and Democratic candidates.

But, generally Hamilton County is a different situation. Traditionally, public officials are chosen in the Republican primary because the county is heavily Republican and, at the local level, the fall election simply makes the GOP candidates official.

So, voters get their real chance in the primary, and with the one exception 25 years ago, our local officials have chosen to keep the wide open primary where every candidate (at least in theory) has an equal chance to win.

It's a good choice for Hamilton County.

of Noblesville and candidate Sue Wolfgang of Carmel. Fishers city clerk Jennifer Kehl is opposed by Jackie Bowen, and Westfield city clerk Cindy Gossard is opposed by Tammy Havard.

Unopposed for city judge is Matt Cook in Noblesville and Dan Henke in Fishers, whereas Carmel city judge Brian Poindexter is opposed by Angela Swenson.

So far there is one contest on the Democratic ballot: Gary Bartunek and Jason Myers have both filed to run against current Republican Noblesville City Councilman Greg O'Connor, who represents District 5.

An updated list of all filings as of the close of business Wednesday appears on Page 4 in today's paper as it has each day since filing began.

Proposed bill would bring sports betting, casino riverboats on land to Indiana

Changes could be coming to the gambling industry in Indiana, including the addition of sports betting, live table games and even riverboats on land. A bill moving through the statehouse might bring all of that to Indiana.

For the last quarter century, Hoosiers have been able to gamble – it just had to be on the water or at the local racino. Senator Mark Messmer's bill could be changing the landscape

across the state. Messmer says his bill would not add more casinos but would change the regulations restricting some, including the riverboats in Gary.

The bill would allow those boats to move on land to free up space for industrial development, yet still keep the revenue from the casinos in those local communities. It would allow live dealers for table games. It would also legalize sports betting in the state, something Messmer believes Indiana is behind on.

"Almost every state has

got plans in place or has approved. The majority of the states are moving forward with it," said Messmer. "If we don't our citizens of Indiana are just going to neighboring states and it's legal through Las Vegas and New Jersey and dozens of other states that have adopted or will adopt."

Betting on esports is not in the bill and the live table games could be added to casino floors as soon as this year. The bill has moved onto the public policy committee and was heard by that committee Wednesday.

Millers celebrate Senior Night with season-high score

NOBLESVILLE - In all high school sports, Senior Night is always worth celebrating.

The Noblesville gymnastics team had plenty of reasons to celebrate its two seniors, who were honored prior to the start of the Millers' meet Wednesday evening at Noblesville East Middle School. Noblesville then went on to finish second in a three-team meet, marking its highest team score of the year with an 88.55.

Appropriately, the highest score and place of the meet went to a senior. Devyn Palmer took fifth in the floor exercise, scoring an 8.40 for her high-energy routine. She also competed in all four events, giving her an all-around score of 29.45. Palmer had been injured for the first half of the season, so she was back and ready to go.

"She is back in gear with all-around, so it was wonderful to see her perform all four events today," said Millers coach Jody Ramey. "She did a great job."

Noblesville's other senior, Racheal Glasener, competed in the uneven bars and the vault, earning her high score of the night in the latter event with a 7.25. Ramey noted that Glasener has come a long way in three years on the team.

"This girl had never done the sport of gymnastics, ever, in her life prior to high school," said Ramey. "That in itself is monumental. Most of the girls that do high school gymnastics have been doing gymnastics in some way, shape or form their whole life. And Rachel didn't even know how to do a cartwheel by the time she got into high school."

Noblesville had its highest team score on the vault, traditionally its strongest event. Palmer led the way there with an 8.275, while junior Olivia Mangin and freshman Kiley Reisner both scored 8.25s, giving the Millers a total of 24.775.

"This is Devyn's first time back in the vault competition, so she was only doing a handspring vault today," said Ramey. "Come Saturday, she'll be back into the twisting vault, which should bump our team score back up to the 25 mark."

Noblesville has three more meets left in the season, starting with Saturday's participation in the Connersville Invitational. When asked if getting the team back into the 90s was an immediate goal, Ramey said it absolutely was.

"I think we'll get there by sectionals," said Ramey. "Unfortunately having the injuries, especially from Makayla and Devyn, that gave us a big hit." Makayla Kauzlick made a grand debut as a freshman last year, but has been unable to compete this year due to injuries. Of course, that has meant other girls have had to step up.

"The positive here is that the girls that maybe wouldn't have had the opportunity to compete are able to compete and we're seeing some growth out of them, so that's exciting as well," said Ramey.

"At this point, it's a matter of personal

bests and being able to increase our team score on each event and get back up into at least a 90 by sectionals. And that's still a decent season for us," said Ramey.

Noblesville will compete in the Lafayette Jefferson sectional, which always has strong teams, with Harrison, Northwestern and McCutcheon having good seasons.

"Those probably will be your teams moving out, but maybe we can sneak in an individual somewhere in there," said Ramey.

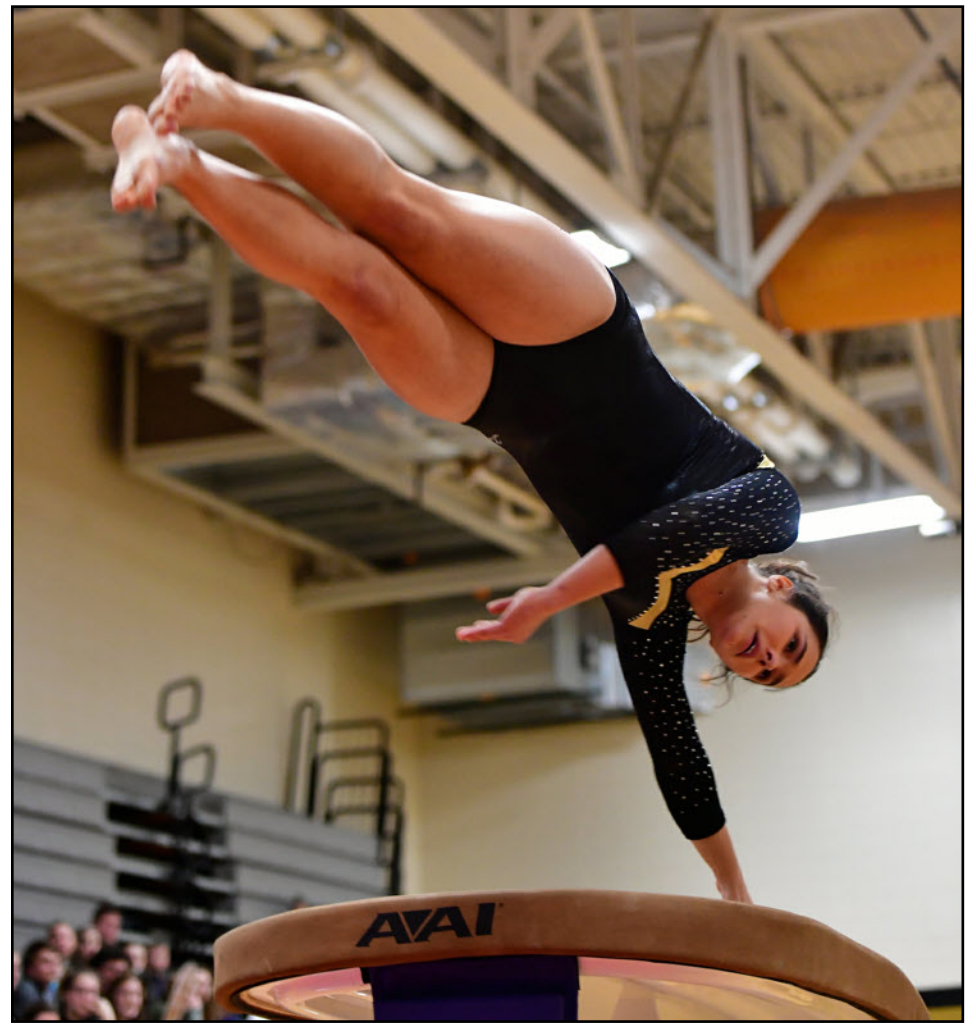

The meet begins at 6 p.m. Friday with the swimming preliminary round. Saturday begins with the first round of diving at 9 a.m., with the semi-finals immediately to follow. All swimming and diving finals begin at 1 p.m.

Advancement

The top 16 in each swimming event during Friday's prelims will return for competition on Saturday with the top eight

individuals vying for state championship honors. Those finishing nine through 16 on Friday will make up the competitors in the consolation heats.

All diving will take place on Saturday with the top 20 of 32 competitors advancing from the prelims to the semis after five dives each. After three dives each in the semis, the top 16 will advance to the final round for another three dives each.

Defending Girls Team Champion

Carmel is the 32-time defending state champion, the longest active string of state championships in the country in any sport or gender. Coach Chris Plumb, also the school's boys coach, has guided the Greyhounds to their last 12 girls titles, the most in state history.

Defending Individual State Champion

Only one individual returns to defend her state title from a year ago. In fact, Yorktown senior Emily Weiss (pictured right) is the three-time defending champion in the 100 breaststroke, the top seed (1:00.97), and is chasing a career sweep in the event. After setting the national high school record (58.40) in last year's meet, she would become the 11th different individual in state history to sweep an event and the second in the breaststroke joining Center Grove's Michelle McKeenhan who won four straight from 2005-08. Carmel senior Kelly Pash won both the 100 and 200 freestyles in 2018 but is not entered in either race this time around. Instead, she's competing as the top seed in the 200 individual medley (2:02.47) and sits second in the 100 butterfly (54.44) behind sophomore Teagen Moon (54.24) of Fort Wayne Carroll. Pash owns

eight state championship medals, the most of anyone this weekend, having earned five of them as part of Carmel's relay teams the last three seasons. Another individual to watch is Homestead senior Jackie Brenn, who will compete in the diving competition for the fourth straight year. She won the event as a freshman in 2016 and finished as the runner-up in 2017 and 2018.
