Heights Middle School robotics team qualifies for State Championship

The Hamilton Heights Middle School (HHMS) robotics team is headed to the 2019 Indiana VEX Robotics State Championship at Lucas Oil Stadium after successfully qualifying four teams earlier this season.

This will be the second year in a row that Lacy Bowyer, Hamilton Heights Middle School Robotics Teacher and Robotics Club Coach, and her students will compete at the state level. Bowyer, recognized as the 2017-18 VEX Indiana Teacher of the Year by the State of Indiana, saw competition at the global level where three of out of four teams made it to state and all three teams earned an invitation to the VEX Robotics World Competition in Louisville, Ky., last year. They were the only school from Hamilton County represented among more than 400 teams from over 30 countries.

"I couldn't be more proud of this team," said Bowyer. "These kids come in every day ready to work. They set goals and chase after them. What they've been able to accomplish has exceeded my expectations by a long shot. Their passion brings excitement that is unheard of and we function as if we are one large family. I've witnessed the ups and downs many times, but I always revert back to telling them that the skills they are learning through robotics are lifelong skills that will transfer over to whatever it is that they someday choose to do. These kids are a large part of my life and exactly how I know I'm in the right profession every single day. I also must thank my assistant coach, Chad Jung, for all that he has done

IU Health contributes \$43,680 to Fishers behavioral health project

Perhaps it was the best place to present a check to the City of Fishers – the bay area of the IU Health Emergency Room in Fishers on a cold Tuesday afternoon in March. IU Health presented a check of \$43,680 to support the "paramedicine behavioral response" program.

The money will go to local efforts in providing follow-up and support help for mental health patients. This serves situations where the police department personnel and hospitals may not quickly identify mental health needs for some people encountered by first responders.

Mayor Scott Fadness pointed out that homicides are rare in Fishers but, sadly, there are many more suicides. This program will be aimed at helping those suffering from mental health issues at an early stage and provide the

help needed.

Mayor Fadness began a mental health initiative as he assumed the office of mayor in 2015 and that program continues.

"This new behavioral response program was identified by the Fishers Mental Health Task Force as an important component of the city's mental health initiative," said Alicia Shulhoff, President of the IU Health North Suburban Area in a news release.

Carmel plans new library branch in West Clay

A new Carmel Clay branch library, the first for Carmel's award winning library system, will be underway this spring. The new \$2.5 million facility will be located in an existing, but completely renovated building, in the Village of West Clay. The new branch, expected to be developed without a tax increase, is set to be open before the end of the year.

The decision to add a

branch has been under consideration for the past two years. Hamilton East and Hamilton North libraries have built new branches in the recent past. The new Carmel facility will bring to eight the number of library locations in Hamilton County.

Carmel library director Robert Swanay released details of the new branch and its anticipated services. Ratio is the architectural firm being used and the interior design of the year.

The registry is voluntary and is designed to provide advanced notice to emergency response personnel of a resident that may have difficulty leaving quickly in the event of an emergency or that may require a specific response due to a number of reasons. Those reasons can include physical, mental, medical, sensory or intellectual disability.

"The registry is a proactive approach to what has previously been reactive to our

Tree clearing underway for Noblesville trail projects

Site work for Midland Trace Trail's Phase III began Tuesday as trees along the planned trail will be cleared. Only trees from city-owned or public right-of-way land will be removed.

"Tree clearing is the first step in the construction process so the land can be prepped for site work. We're excited to build off the success of the past two years and make this phase available to residents a year ahead of schedule," Mayor John Ditslear said.

Phase III runs from Willowview to Hague roads. Construction of this section will be completed this summer. As with the previous two phases of the Midland Trace Trail, the city hired an independent arborist to review the clearing plans and the site to inventory trees that are outside the footprint required to build the trail. The city will save all healthy non-invasive species identified by the arborist and will remove the scrub or dead trees along the path.

Because of federal regulations for bat habitats, tree clearings must be done this time of the year before construction of the trails is ready to proceed. Trees will be recycled for mulch or lumber.

The Midland Trace Trail runs along the abandoned "Midland" Central Railway corridor (approximately 0.2 mile south of State Road 32). The multi-use trail is 12 feet wide. Once Phase III is completed, the trail provides a critical connection between existing and proposed trail sections that connects downtown Noblesville to Westfield, Zionsville and the Monon Trail system.

for this team. He has been a huge asset and the kids feed off his energy. We wouldn’t be where we are today without his assistance and expertise.”

The Indiana VEX Robotics State Championship is the largest state robotics competition in the nation, with 360 teams competing from around the Hoosier state. Teams are eligible to compete at the event by winning a state-qualifying award at a local competition. HHMS’s team qualified at the regular season tournaments earlier in the school year. They did so by winning Teamwork Challenges, Skills Challenges and the Excellence Awards at area events. Teams that advance from the State Championship have the opportunity at a spot to compete at the VEX Worlds Championship in April which will include 730 teams from around the world.

“Indiana has the most VEX IQ Elementary and Middle School Robotics teams in the United States, so advancing to the state championship is a commendable achievement,” says George Giltner, State Director of Robotics for TechPoint Foundation for Youth. “The best of the state’s robotics competitors will be on display, and we look forward to seeing the teams showcase their talents at the event on the largest stage Indiana has to offer.”

The Indiana VEX Robotics State Championship will be held this Saturday, March 9, at Lucas Oil Stadium in Indianapolis and is free and open to the public. The event will include hands-on activities hosted by national and local companies.

the building has been done by Rowland and Associates of Indianapolis. When completed there will be about 5,000 square feet of floor space.

A courier service will deliver certain requested materials to the branch from the main library. Digital check-outs, which have doubled in five years, are expected to be a major service.

In addition to the new branch, Carmel plans a major updating and expansion next year of the main library at 55 Fourth Ave. S.E. The building is now 20 years old and lacks the proper amount of space for certain services, according to the Swanay.

Besides the typical loaning of books and other materials, the library has sponsored or cooperated with presenting 2,200 programs in the past year. And, the library operates a mobile unit (bookmobile) as part of its outreach program.

Carmel, like all public libraries in the county, originated with an Andrew Carnegie grant. Its current building, the third since 1914, opened in 1999. It is governed by an appointed board of seven members. Swanay has been director for two and a half years.

The international United Methodist Church held a special session General Conference last week in St. Louis, Mo. The intended purpose of this conference was to find a way forward for the denomination on the issue of human sexuality. Like the culture at large, the United Methodist Church (UMC) is divided on how to handle same sex marriage and the inclusion of LGBTQ+ clergy in

ordained ministry.

"Our hope was to find a compromise that would provide for contextualization of ministry for each local church and conference given their cultural situation," said Jerry Rairdon, Lead Pastor at Noblesville First United Methodist Church.

No such compromise was found. Instead a plan

was approved with a majority vote of 53 percent that keeps in place the current restrictions that appear in the denomination's Book of Discipline.

"The plan contains a number of enforcement provisions which the UMC Judicial Council has ruled unconstitutional," Rairdon said, "so at this time we have

a plan approved which is both hurtful to the LGBTQ+ community and unenforceable by the church. We recognize that some may be relieved because these rules back their understanding of scripture, but we encourage everyone to show compassion towards the hurt this causes for LGBTQ+ persons of faith and people who desire a more inclusive church. I believe this General Conference has created a new resolve for persons who see this issue from differing perspectives, and these groups are meeting now to discuss their place in the future of the United Methodist Church. We will monitor these developments and keep our congregation and the community informed along the way. Together, we will find a way forward that is appropriate for our community."

Rairdon added, "Noblesville First United Methodist Church has a vital and growing mission to this community, and we will not let events we cannot control stop us from the important work of feeding the hungry, housing the homeless, encouraging the hopeless and offering the love of Jesus Christ to all persons, with no exceptions!"

Indoor season kicks into high gear

The high school indoor track season began in earnest last weekend, with several Hamilton County teams spreading out across the state to compete in meets.

All of these meets are designed to help athletes qualify for the Hoosier State Relays, which take place March 23 at Indiana University. The top 24 performances in the running, long jump and shot put events qualify for the relays, along with the top 18 in the high jump and pole vault.

On Saturday, Carmel, Hamilton Heights and Noblesville participated in the HSR Qualifier #2 at Indiana Wesleyan University in Marion. Several athletes won events: In the boys meet, the Millers' Andrew Herman won the high jump, while the Greyhounds' Logan Sandlin placed first in the pole vault.

Meanwhile, two-time defending state champion Shelby Tyler of Noblesville won the high jump with a leap of 5 feet, 8 inches. Tyler also was first in the pole vault, while Carmel's Phoebe Bates won the 1600 run.

With just over five minutes remaining and leading by one, a pass to Bojan Bogdanovic looked as if might be intercepted by Bulls forward Lauri Markkanen.

Luckily for the Pacers, the pass got to Bogdanovic just in time as Markkanen flew past the shooter, who calmly knocked down a three from the wing to propel the Pacers ahead by four. On their next possession, it was Darren Collison doing damage from deep, hitting a 3-pointer to extend Indiana's lead once again en route to its 105-96 victory over the Bulls on Tuesday night at Bankers Life Fieldhouse.

Despite leading by as much as 16 in the first half, the plucky Bulls (18-47) made things interesting late, turning a strong third quarter into a close game late in the fourth.

Bulls guard Zach LaVine, who racked up 27 points, made a one-man 7-0 run in the fourth to give Chicago a lead, but the

moment was brief as Indiana (42-23) slammed the door from there, running off nine unanswered points to put the game away and close their three-game homestand with a #PacersWin.

The run was triggered by Bogdanovic, who finished team-best 27 points, when he sank a pair of free throws then fired home a 3-pointer. After Collison followed suit with a three of his own, a dunk by Myles Turner all but sealed the game with the Pacers leading 95-86.

The Bulls continued to try to rally as the game entered its final minutes, getting another score from Zach LaVine, but that again was answered by Bogdanovic, who hit his fourth 3-pointer of the night as Indiana cruised to the victory.

While Indiana shot it well from long range, making 11-of-25 attempts, the Bulls were never able to find their stroke from distance, connecting on just 4-of-25 3-point attempts.

The opening quarter was a defensive showcase from the Pacers, limiting the visiting Bulls to just 17 points and taking a 10-point lead.

With both benches in the game, Indiana opened up the second quarter on a tear, going on a 7-0 run and forcing a Bulls timeout just 1:30 into the frame.

From there, however, the Bulls began to rally back, eventually getting their deficit as low as five points when Wayne Selden connected on a jumper.

Indiana scored the last points of the quarter as Bogdanovic sent home two free throws, putting the Pacers ahead 49-42 at the break.

Following a jumper from Bogdanovic to begin the second half, the Bulls opened up a deluge of scoring, running off 9 unanswered to force the Pacers into a quick timeout with the game knotted at 51-51.

For the remainder of the quarter, the Pacers weren't able to get back ahead by

more than five, with a free throw from Tyreke Evans closing the third with Indiana up 77-75.

The Blue & Gold opened the fourth quarter with a punch as four different Pacers contributed to an 8-4 sprint. The final bucket before a Bulls timeout was an offensive rebound and layup from Cory Joseph, getting the home crowd on its feet with the hustle play.

Immediately following a Bulls timeout, Chicago clawed right back, as Zach LaVine scored seven quick points to give the Bulls an 86-85 lead.

Clinging on to a one-point lead, the Pacers got just the boost they needed as Bogdanovic followed up a pair of free throws with a 3-pointer. Moments later, a three from Collison and dunk from Turner pushed the Pacers ahead 95-86, keeping the game safely out of reach of the visitors as Indiana completed the season sweep over the Bulls.
