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County's top Democrat calls for investigation

Hamilton County Democratic Party Chairman Joe Weingarten on Thursday held a press conference outside Carmel City Hall. Weingarten is calling upon the Hamilton County Election Board to conduct an investigation into Carmel's mayoral election and alleged bribery claims.

"Today I am going to file a request with the Hamilton County Election Board to initiate an investigation into the possibility of a bribery or an extortion," said Weingarten.

"It's been alleged that Mayor Brainard's campaign offered a bribe to have his opponent Fred Glynn not run against him," said Weingarten.

Glynn is a current Hamilton County Councilman and is running against Carmel's longtime mayor, Jim Brainard.

At the press conference Weingarten said he would immediately be filing the proper paperwork with the Hamilton County Election Board.

Hamilton County Clerk and Election Board Member Kathy Williams confirmed her office did receive Weingarten's request.

"We received it at 11:30 a.m. and copies have been forwarded to Election Board members and Hamilton County Attorney Mike Howard," Williams said.

Hamilton County's Election Board is comprised of two Republicans, Kathy Williams and Ray Adler, and one Democrat, Greg Purvis.

Williams told the Reporter the Election Board could review Weingarten's information at their next meeting on Friday, April 5.

Greenaway charged with three felonies

Hamilton County Superior Court 2 Magistrate William Greenaway has been charged with three Level 6 felonies, which include Possession of Methamphetamine, Obstruction of Justice and Resisting Law Enforcement.

According to court documents, Greenaway was the focus of a four-month narcotics investigation conducted by officers from the Indiana State Police.

Howard County Prosecutor Mark McCann has been assigned as Special Prosecutor in the case. Hamilton County Judge David Najjar issued an order recusing himself, and Tipton County Judge Thomas Lett has been selected to replace Najjar.

Greenaway has been terminated from his position as court magistrate by Hamilton County judges.

Greenaway was booked in to Hamilton County Jail on Friday and released on his own recognizance.

Carmel Police Department's Lt. Joe Bickel said, "We would like to thank the person who quickly notified Carmel Clay School Administration and the swift action taken by school personnel. This solidifies the saying 'If you see something, say something.' As a collaborative effort, safety and security in our schools is a top priority and concern."

Polling sites will move due to school safety concerns

Thousands of Fishers residents eligible to vote in the upcoming primary election will find their precinct polling locations have moved from past elections. The change in locations comes about because of school officials' concerns about safety. Apparently fearing a terrorist might enter the school during voting,

Hamilton Southeastern has asked that no schools be used as polling sites.

Several hundred voters in Carmel and Westfield will also find their polling places changed for various reasons not related to the school safety concerns. Countywide, 39,378 voters will find their Election Day voting place has changed, according to County Clerk

Noblesville awarded \$900K for road improvements

The City of Noblesville was awarded \$920,715 on Tuesday from the Indiana Department of Transportation as part of the state's Next Level Roads: Community Crossings Initiative. The money will be used to resurface three areas of Noblesville.

"We thank INDOT and the Governor's Office for providing these funds for infrastructure improvements across the state," said Mayor John Ditslear. "This matching grant allows us to address a gateway to downtown, a minor arterial on the west side of the city and a heavily populated subdivision."

Noblesville's three grants include 10th Street, Hazel Dell Road and Mill Grove subdivision – which total \$1.84 million in investment. Each project is expected to begin

in June and be completed by Labor Day.

"Infrastructure improvement will be a major focus in Noblesville throughout 2019," Assistant City Engineer Jim Hellmann said. "This grant allows the city to go above and beyond our locally funded \$2.6 million annual street and alley rehabilitation program to address even more roadways needing repair."

Noblesville's approved grant projects include:

- 10th Street**
 - Area – 10th Street from Greenfield Avenue to Field Drive
 - Matching grant amount – \$308,526
 - Project scope – Replacement of ADA ramps, sidewalk ADA compliance repairs, repair of roadway base failures, 1.25 inches of milling, hot mix asphalt (HMA) wedge

A gathering celebrating Maurice's life was held on Sunday, March 31 at his daughter's home at 14849 Windsor Lane, Noblesville.

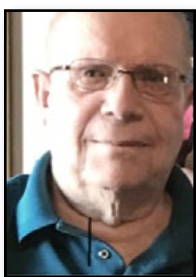

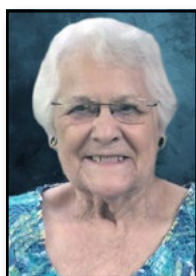

Editor’s Note: The Sheridan Student Column is brought to readers by Sheridan High School’s 10th grade English class, taught by Abby Williams.

For my column, I was pondering over topics I could write about. I was considering maybe track or psychology during my study hall. While I was thinking of topics I could use to write about, I was simultaneously going through my fellow students’ columns to gather a sense of how to format it.

Then I stumbled upon my teacher’s column, in which she was talking about why we as people can never understand what someone’s going through. It led me to question why we have to understand and what the purpose is of us feeling the need to know; and to a broader question, why we have to ask questions and why we need the answers for them.

My curiosity in neurotransmitters, as well as the brain itself, helped lead me to research it in a deeper manner. It helped me in my search of understanding my neurodevelopmental disorder, as well as overall helping my curiosity toward understanding the brain. So the question about questions stuck with me, and with the many studies as to why we ask questions, it is a promising thing to write about. Usually, we ask questions to solve something or to better increase the current amount of information we have to help us understand something.

Naturally, our curiosity tends to lead us into searching to find the answers to the questions we have.

Many neuroscientists, like Marieke Jepma, have done experiments in search of understanding curiosity in humans. According to *Psychology Today*, Marieke has done experiments that have “used functional magnetic resonance imaging (fMRI) to examine the neural underpinnings of curiosity – which parts of the brain are activated when perceptual or epistemic curiosity are induced and relieved.”

In this experiment the researchers found that “the anterior insula and the anterior cingulate cortex” were parts of the brain that gave an “itch”-like feeling when more information was required in order to understand, which in response helped the person obtain more motivation toward getting the answer.

But in another experiment, done by researchers Min Jeong Kang and Colin Camerer, along with their collaborators, they reviewed another type of curiosity. For their experiment, they used trivia questions to stimulate different parts of the brain, by asking the subjects a series of questions.

For instance, they asked the participants, “What instrument sounds most like a human?” as well as “What galaxy is Earth

located in?” Psychology Today explains what they did: They “generated epistemic curiosity by asking their subjects trivia questions.” Through this experiment the information that Kang and his colleagues took from their data concluded that the experiment “involved epistemic curiosity, on the other hand, the brain areas that were significantly energized (the left caudate and the lateral prefrontal cortex) were those known to be associated with anticipation of reward.”

The anticipation of reward can somewhat be explained by dopamine, a neurotransmitter that is known as the reward neurotransmitter. It can give us the motivation to want to learn and understand more, and in doing so get us to ask more questions. With the positive feeling people get after finding the answer to their question, it’s no surprise it helps motivate us to ask more questions.

Overall it may be that we get an “itch” and feel the need to know the answer, or we need the information to help us. It could be dopamine, the neurotransmitter which helps us gain the motivation to find the answer. Regardless of the answer, to ask a question is to seek the answers, and we’re constantly trying for one to receive the other.

Whether you look at the amazing neuroscientists that did these experiments, or the everyday questions we all have, it’s certain that asking questions is part of our nature.

Zoning board denies controversial barn project

A controversial barn project in Hamilton County will not go forward.

The landowner said the barn would be part of his agricultural tech company but some neighbors are staunchly against it.

The Hamilton County Planning Commission gave the project a thumbs up in February. It was then passed to the Board of Zoning Appeals last Wednesday. After a vote, the project was rejected which puts property owner Terry Henderson at square one.

Henderson is the president of Achieva, an agricultural technical company and communications business. He said the barn would be used for training sessions and community events. Henderson did admit private functions like weddings could potentially take place.

Neighbor Ben Cox said the land is not zoned for commercial development. News 8 asked Hamilton County Planning Commissioner Mark Heirbrandt about the property. He said the project fits within

the requirements.

“I think this truly comes down to not understanding that this is going to be an agricultural training barn,” Henderson said.

“This business is actually a sales and marketing business,” Cox said. “It has agricultural clients and that’s a big difference.

The barn would have been built just off 276th Street in rural northern Hamilton County. Neighbors displayed their opinion by placing signs of disapproval along the side of the road.

Kathy Williams. She and her staff have been working on the changes since January.

Affected voters will be notified by mail of their new voting location. That notification process comes at a price; the mailings and the time involved by election workers amount to thousands of dollars. The post cards being used and postage amounts to \$15,700.

State law provides that public buildings can be used as polling places if needed. Several schools in Hamilton County have been used for many years, but two years ago school officials began voicing safety concerns, Carmel Clay Schools were the first to announce they no longer wanted voting in their buildings.

County officials, apparently not wanting to debate the matter, agreed to move all voting to new locations at last Monday’s County Commissioners meeting. The changes in Fishers were approved without comment.

Williams said yesterday that she may need better locations for the 2020 general election, and asked that if any organization has a building with substantial parking space, she would like to hear from such a group. And, as is customary, workers for Election Day duty at the polls are being sought.

As the May 7 primary election nears, satellite early voting centers will be opening in the last two weeks before the election. These centers will again be located at Westfield City Hall, Fishers City Hall and the Carmel Public Library. Hours for voting may be found on the Hamilton County website under current election information.

E. FOOD SERVICE DEPARTMENT

F. SPECIFIC REQUIREMENTS

4. “Beverage” or “Beverages” means all cold carbonated and non-carbonated, nonalcoholic, natural, or artificially flavored drinks for independent consumption, but excludes all milk and dairy based drinks.

5. All vending equipment must be supplied, installed, and maintained by the successful company at no cost to HHSC. All equipment must be new, state-of-the-art and remain in that condition throughout the life of the contract. All vending machines are to be equipped with currency changers, credit/debit card readers and timers. There will be no change from the contract initiation in the number of, or location of vending machines or signs in any school without prior written consent of HHSC. The successful company is expected to provide repair service at its cost within a 24-hour time limit.

6. The successful company is expected to provide full service vending (except for the Food Service Department). The company must detail the formula for vending commission, payment, and percentages for the complete line of beverages. Appropriate accounting and inventory systems shall be maintained to assure HHSC completes accountability of all financial transactions. The right to audit these transactions is reserved by HHSC. On an annual basis, the successful company shall supply the HHSC’s Business Manager or his/her designee with an accounting of the number of cans/bottles sold, profit made by each machine for each location. Sales commissions will be paid to HHSC within 1 month after end of school year.

7. HHSC will make all reasonable effort to order Food Service product in appropriate quantities, however, in the event HHSC Food Service Department has product in inventory, which exceeds its expiration date, the company agrees to either, replace the product or, credit HHSC’s account for such product.

HHSC’s Food Service Department will be billed monthly for the product ordered.

8. HHSC agrees to use the successful company’s products for all a la carte cafeteria sales for 8 oz. to 24 oz. size. The exclusive agreement does not apply to milk products. Beverage vending machines in the cafeterias will not be operational during the lunch serving times.

9. Beverages sold at concession stands, with the exception of fresh brewed coffee, fresh brewed tea, hot chocolate, and fresh squeezed juices will be the successful company’s products. The successful company will provide the appropriate amount of equipment to support the dispensing, selling, and promotion of beverage products (post-mix, pre-mix dispensers, reach-in coolers, ice beverage carts trailers, etc.).

10. HHSC will participate in mutually agreed upon promotional campaigns; however, none of HHSC’s facilities will be redemption centers. All signage must be approved by HHSC, and it will be at the successful company’s cost to procure and install said signs without damaging school property. Any damage will be the responsibility of the successful company. Complimentary advertisements of mutually agreed upon size would be allowed in all extracurricular programs.

11. As soft drink sales increase, the annual payment will adjust accordingly.

ORDINANCE NO. 2019-02
AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE TOWN OF ARCADIA’S
ORDINANCE GOVERNING OUTDOOR FIRES

WHEREAS, it has been recommended by the Town of Arcadia’s Police Department that Sec. 93.05 of Title 9 Municipal Code of the Town of Arcadia, Indiana, be amended to set forth rules and regulations governing outdoor fires; and

WHEREAS, it the Town of Arcadia’s Town Council has determined that this is an issue of safety and public welfare and wishes to adopt the Town of Arcadia’s Police Department’s proposed rules and regulations governing outdoor fires; and

WHEREAS, the Town of Arcadia, Hamilton County, Indiana, wishes to adopt such recommendations by amending Sec. 93.05 of Title 9 of the Municipal Code of the Town of Arcadia entitled OUTDOOR FIRES.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Town Council of the Town of Arcadia, Hamilton County, Indiana, that Sec. 93.05 of Title 9 of the Municipal Code of the Town of Arcadia entitled OUTDOOR FIRES is hereby deleted and amended to read as follows:

1. Sect. 93.05 of Title 9 of the Municipal Code of the Town of Arcadia is hereby retitled CONTROLLED BURNING.

2. RESPONSIBILITIES:
No person within the Town shall burn any rubbish, trash, garbage, yard waste, leaves, construction materials, tree limbs, shrubbery trimmings, or dangerous materials at any time within the Town limits.

3. EXCEPTIONS - Fires Permitted:
(A) The following types of fires are permitted with prior approval of the Fire Chief, or his or her designee:
(1) Fires used for celebrating Twelfth Night Ceremonies.
(2) Fires used for celebrating school pep rallies.
(3) Fires used for celebrating scouting activities.
(4) Fires used for recreational or cooking purposes.
(B) All exempted fires, including fires for cooking or recreational purposes, shall be subject to the following:
(1) Only wood products shall be burned.
(2) Fires shall be attended at all times, until completely extinguished.
(3) If fires create an air pollution problem, a nuisance, or a fire hazard, they shall be extinguished.
(4) No burning shall be conducted during unfavorable meteorological conditions such as temperature inversions, high winds, air stagnation, and the like.
(5) Burning shall be a minimum of 25 feet from any combustible material or any structure.
(6) No fire or fire pit shall be greater than 3 feet in diameter.
(7) No fire shall extend more than 3 feet in height above the adjoining ground.
(C) Burning with prior approval of the Fire Chief, or his or her designee, may be authorized for the following:
(1) Burning of refuse consisting of material resulting from a natural disaster.
(2) Burning for purposes of fire training.
(3) Emergency burning of spilled petroleum products when all reasonable efforts to recover the spilled material have been made and failure to burn would result in an imminent fire hazard or water pollution problems.
(4) Burning of highly explosive or other dangerous materials for which no alternative method exists or where transportation of such materials is impossible.
(5) Prescribed burning of native vegetation, i.e., prairie grass, in accordance with the requirements of the Indiana Department of Environmental Management (IDEM) and in accordance with 326 IAC 4.
(6) Agricultural burning on agricultural properties for maintenance purposes in accordance with 326 IAC 4-1-3.
(7) Old or tattered American Flags, which are not in a condition to provide a fitting emblem for display, shall be destroyed in a dignified manner. Cotton flags may be burned in an appropriate manner by an approved organization in a Flag Burning Ceremony. Approved organizations include Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW), the American Legion, the Knights of Columbus, the Elk’s Lodge, the Boy Scouts of America, and the Girl Scouts of America. The Indiana Department of Environmental Management (IDEM) does not allow the burning of nylon flags in the State of Indiana. The Town of Arcadia Fire Department encourages the recycling of all nylon flags.
(8) Due to the unique hazards associated with the methods of burning described in this division (3), the Fire Chief, or his or her designee, may require additional measures to ensure the public safety including but not limited to:
a. Standby fire personnel.
b. Standby fire apparatus and equipment.
c. Increased minimum separation distances and/or specific burning containers.
d. The financial costs associated with these additional requirements shall be the responsibility of the petitioner.
(9) Notwithstanding this exception, no outdoor fire is permitted in any type of bum barrel.

(D) NON-RESIDENTIAL BURNING.
(1) All burning taking place which is non-residential in nature must comply with the following conditions:
a. All burning must meet the guidelines and restrictions of the Indiana Department Environmental Management on incinerator limitations.
b. All such burning must utilize a stationary incinerator and shall not take place in any portable incinerator or homemade incinerators unless approved by the Indiana Department of Environmental Management.
c. All burning shall take place between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m.
d. All incinerators in which burning takes place shall be maintained properly as specified by the manufacturer and shall be operated only according to the manufacturer’s recommendations.

E. OPEN BURNING PERMITS.

Prior approval from the Fire Chief, or his or her designee, is required for recreational open burning in the Town of Arcadia. Prior approval is further defined in this section as requiring an open bum permit issued by the Town of Arcadia Fire Department.

The required bum permit shall be kept at the site of the fire during burning operations.

F. SPECIAL EVENTS WITH OPEN FLAMES.

Any community or civic special events that include any type of open flame shall be approved only by the Fire Chief, or his or her designee. The Fire Chief, or his or her designee, has the authority to disallow open flames if the Fire Chief, or his or her designee, finds that the open flame may be detrimental to the safety of bystanders, the community, or emergency responders.

G. As used herein, all references to Fire Chief or the Fire Department shall be defined as referring to the agency or entity providing fire protection services to the Town of Arcadia on the date of the planned open bum.

4. Except as amended by this ordinance, all of the other terms, provisions, conditions, and water rates, fees and charges set forth in Sec. 93.05 of Title 9 of the Municipal Code of the Town of Arcadia shall remain in full force and effect.

5. The provision of all other prior ordinances in conflict with the provisions thereof are of no further force or effect and are hereby repealed.

6. If any part of this subchapter shall be held invalid, such part shall be deemed severable and the invalidity thereof shall not affect the remaining parts of this subchapter.

This Ordinance shall become effective from and after its date of passage and publication as required by law.

As the weather and outdoors begin to feel more like spring, Noblesville Parks' golf courses opened for the season on Monday, April 1. The City of Noblesville operates two public golf courses – Fox Prairie, 8465 E. 196th St., which is currently open for daily tee times and golf outings, and Forest Park, 701 Cicero Road.

"It's been a long winter that Mother Nature doesn't seem to want to let go of, but we are very excited to be able to have both golf courses open and we look

forward to a great 2019," said Noblesville Golf Director Gary Deakyne.

Fox Prairie Golf Course is a mature, traditional style course with 27 championship holes and is considered one of the top public facilities in Central Indiana. Built in 1970, the course includes a clubhouse, sandwich shop, fully-stocked pro shop, practice green and driving range. Greens fees for a round of 18 holes start at \$20 on weekdays and \$34 on weekends and holidays. Special rates are available, including a weekday and

evening weekend round with cart and twilight rate after 5:30 p.m.

Built in 1927, Forest Park Golf Course is Hamilton County's oldest golf course. The nine-hole course features postage stamp greens, manicured fairways and challenging elevated tees and greens. The golf course is free of water hazards, which makes it enjoyable and playable for novice golfers, but its green contours make it a challenge for advanced players as well. All greens fees at Forest Park include carts and start at \$14 for a round

of nine holes on weekdays and \$15 on weekends and holidays.

Season passes can be purchased for both courses and new member season passes start at \$1,000 for Noblesville residents and \$1,080 for non-residents. A 12-round punch pass also is available for those who pay up front for 10 rounds.

Noblesville residents reminded to keep signs out of rights-of-way

As primary elections approach, the City of Noblesville reminds residents that all temporary and opinion (campaign) signs are prohibited from city right-of-way through the Noblesville Unified Development Ordinance.

To enforce the code, any illegal signs will be collected and there will be a 10 business day window for candidates to reclaim them before they are destroyed.

Noblesville does not restrict the number of opinion signs placed on private property. Areas that should remain sign-free include rights-of-way, medians and vision corner clearance (signs close to the roadway

that create a sight obstruction). City owned property and right-of-way restrictions are as follows:

- Signs are not allowed on city-owned property, nor within the city's right-of-way or on utility poles.

- Generally, a sign is not in the right-of-way if it is behind the line of utility poles and/or one foot behind a sidewalk, whichever is farther. These areas are typically private property and permission should be obtained from the property owner before placing the signs.

- Landscaped medians at the entrance of subdivisions may be part of the right-of-way, or within a vehicle vision clearance area, and typ-

ically should not be used to display signs.

- Subdivision entrances are typically private property common areas and permission should be obtained from the homeowners association before placing signs.

INDOT also is conducting sign sweeps in state rights-of-way. INDOT personnel are required by Indiana Code 9-21-4-6 to remove all unauthorized signs within the state right-of-way. ORDINANCE NO. 2019-03
AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 92.04 OF TITLE IX OF THE ARCADIA TOWN CODE

WHEREAS, the Town of Arcadia ("Town") provides residential trash and recycling collection services to residents;

WHEREAS, receptacles for trash and recycling are placed on or near the public rights-of-way to be collected by the trash and recycling collection service; and

WHEREAS, leaving said receptacles on or near public rights-of-way longer than necessary on trash and recycling collection days can cause blocked roads, alleys, sidewalks and create other hazards;

NOW THEREFORE, be it ordained by the Town Council of the Town of Arcadia, Hamilton County, Indiana, that Item B. of Section 92.04 of Title DC of the Town Code be amended as follows:

- Chapter 50. General Utilities.** Item B. of Section 92.04, shall be amended as follows:
No person shall place a container in or in proximity to a public right of way or public area except for collection as provided herein. Receptacles shall be placed so as to be readily accessible for collection. Receptacles shall not be placed for collection earlier than 5:00 p.m. the day before collection and shall be removed from the proximity of the public right of way or public area by 8:00 p.m. the day of collection. At all other times any Receptacles that are kept outside of structures on a property shall comply with one of the following: 1. Be kept a minimum of twenty-five (25) feet from the edge of the pavement of the nearest public street. Or 2. Be kept within two (2) feet of the residence or garage located on the property. No person shall allow trash, debris, refuse or yard waste to accumulate on his or her property.
- All other Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.
- Except as amended in this Ordinance, all of the terms, conditions, and provisions set forth in Section 92.04 of the Arcadia Municipal Ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.
- This ordinance shall take effect upon adoption of the Town Council.

Kyle Archer pitched three innings for the win, striking out four. Sheridan only allowed the Achaeans one hit in the game.

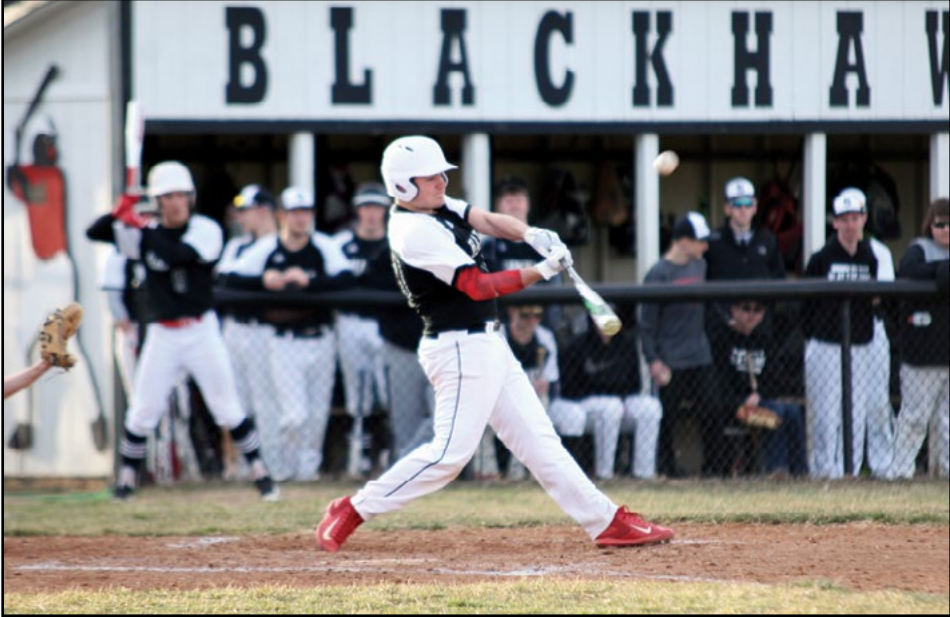
The Blackhawks are 2-1 heading into Spring Break, and will return to action on Tuesday, April 9 at Tindley.

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Revercomb using Mini-Marathon as pediatric cancer research fundraiser

Brian Revercomb has spent the past year improving his health. Now he wants to pay that forward.

Revercomb, the head softball coach at Westfield High School, will be running in the Indianapolis 500 Mini-Marathon this year and plans to use it as a fundraiser for pediatric cancer research. With the backing of the St. Vincent Hospital Foundation and Peyton Manning Children's Hospital, he is hoping to achieve a goal of \$13,100 - \$1,000 for each mile.

Over the past year, Revercomb has lost 90 pounds and has started running. He also remembers hearing the stories of families whose children have been affected by cancer, whether is one of his players or one of their siblings.

"Truly always a tough situation for them and something that makes me appreciate my children and their health," said Revercomb.

The coach had thought of the idea of fundraising "many years ago," but said he wasn't healthy enough to do it until now. Revercomb was introduced to Nancy Frick, Vice President Development at the St. Vincent Hospital Foundation, who gave Revercomb her endorsement in January.

In addition, Revercomb's employer, Stanley Security, said it would match donations up to \$10,000, "so I have the potential to raise a significant amount of money should I reach my goal," he said.

"The money goes directly to St. Vincent's," he said.

Tigers baseball beats Homestead, battle in Tennessee

The Fishers baseball team, the defending Class 4A state champion, began its season with a win last Monday, then played four games in Tennessee later in the week.

The Tigers beat Homestead 2-1 at the Spartans' field. Both teams combined for 18 strikeouts while only allowing four hits (two from each team). The Tigers threw seven different pitchers, each for one inning and combined to allow no earned runs on two hits, while striking out 11. Fishers' pitchers did walk four and hit one batter.

The Tigers scored their only two runs within the first three batters of the game. Kiel Brenzewski delivered an RBI single to left to score JJ Woolwine. Nick Lukac was held at third on the play as the throw from left field went all the way to home plate. Brenzewski attempted to take second base on the throw home, but was thrown out by the catcher. Lukac raced home as Brenzewski was thrown out for Fishers' second run.

On Thursday, Fishers split its first day in Tennessee, defeating Beech (Tenn.) 13-12 in an offensive back and forth game before losing 2-1 to Beavercreek (Ohio).

In Game 1, the Tigers broke the game open by scoring seven runs in the second inning. Fishers led 10-3 after five innings, but Beech scored seven unearned runs in the top of the sixth to tie the game at 10. The Tigers answered right back scoring three runs in the bottom of the sixth and then held off a late rally as Beech scored two runs in the top of the seventh and left the bases loaded.

Lukac led the offense with a 3-for-4 game that included an RBI triple in the bottom of the sixth, also scoring three runs. Kaid Muth contributed a double, single, two RBIs, and three runs scored. Jack Braun reached base five times with two hits and three hit by pitches. Tristan Baker delivered a two-run triple, and Woolwine finished with a triple, two runs, and two stolen bases.

After all the scoring and offense, Game 2 was the exact opposite: A pitcher's duel. Starter Anthony Castellani was brilliant for the Fishers on the mound. Castellani took a no-hitter into the fifth inning before allowing an infield hit with two outs. Castellani left the game after the sixth inning due to early season pitch count precaution. He did not allow a run and struck out nine in his one-hitter performance.

Ahead 1-0 in the bottom of the seventh, the Tigers again fell victim to defensive miscues with two errors in the final inning. With the game tied at 1-1, two outs, and a runner at second, the Fishers misplayed a ground ball that allowed the winning run to race home from second on a walk-off error.

Offensively, Woolwine doubled to lead off the game and scored on Kiel Brenzewski's RBI single to center field. Owens and Charlie Walker both had two hits with one of Owens hits a double off the center field fence.

On Saturday, the Tigers fell to Collierville (Tenn.) 15-4 in five innings in the first of two games that day. Fishers scored all four of their runs in the fifth inning. Joey Brenzewski and Jeff Simmons both hit a double in the game.

The Tigers lost to Bob Jones (Ala.) 23-6 in another five-inning game. Dominic Oliverio and Muth both hit home runs for Fishers in the bottom of the fourth, while Kiel Brenzewski finished the game with two hits.

The Tigers are 2-3 and begin Hoosier Crossroads Conference play Thursday at Zionsville. Fishers then hosts Zionsville on Friday and plays at Zionsville again on Saturday.
