

Riverview Infusion Center to expand thanks to major gift

Riverview Health Foundation announced that it has received a major gift of \$500,000 from Dave and Jackie Cox, Courtney Cole, and Darren and Monica Peck for the expansion of the Infusion Center at Riverview Health.

More than 10,000 patients are being treated annually in the Infusion Center.

“While the patients receive wonderful care from the dedicated physicians, nurses and staff, the current facility doesn’t offer the right kind of environment,” said Megan Wiles, executive director of Riverview Health Foundation.

“When accompanying Courtney on many of her treatments, we were in close quarters with other patients and their families,” said Jackie Cox. “We had the opportunity to share ideas for facility improvements. In conversation with Riverview Health leaders, we expressed concerns about the current facility and the potential impact of new and improved surroundings. There is a need for privacy at times and sharing with others when feeling better. The staff is outstanding in providing care and comfort. Now the relocated and updated center, complete with beautiful aesthetics and furnishings, will enhance the infusion experience for patients and families. We are thrilled to support the Riverview Health mission and are so grateful to them for embracing our suggestions.

It’s a blessing to have this level of care close to home.”

The expanded Infusion Center will be located at Riverview Health in Noblesville and will have private rooms, semi-private rooms and community seating to allow patients to select an area based upon how they are feeling and availability. The new Infusion Center will have an open floor plan with windows and natural light. Construction is expected to be completed later this year.

“As a patient receive-

ing treatment for hours at a time, it would have been wonderful to have windows,” Courtney Cole said. “The lighter colors and outdoor views will help the time pass and make treatment more pleasant.”

The Cox, Cole and Peck families have a long history and connection with Riverview Health. Jackie served as the executive director of the Foundation from 1988 to 1997, Dave served on the Foundation Board and as Chair in 2011 and 2012, Monica has served as a

member of the Foundation Philanthropy Council, and Courtney has been a patient and advocate for Riverview Health and the Foundation for many years.

“Riverview Health has been such a blessing to our family throughout my sister’s health battles,” said Monica Peck. “Being able to do frequent treatments so close to home, to have smiling, familiar faces here to greet us, brings joy to an otherwise not so pleasant

New Indiana law requires phone CPR training for 9-1-1 dispatchers

In the coming months, every 9-1-1 dispatcher in the state will be trained to guide callers through CPR over the phone.

That’s the goal of new legislation that Gov. Eric Holcomb recently signed into law.

Lakisha Goins is in her element at work. She’s helped countless people over her more than 10 years as a 9-1-1 dispatcher.

“It’s exhilarating,” Goins said Monday. “I love the fact that I never know what I’m walking into.”

She knows how to help people who call in on the worst days of their lives.

“Oh, I feel a little bit of anxiety for myself, just because trying to convince ... because a lot of times, people are very nervous about trying to perform CPR on someone else,” Goins said. “Even if it is a loved one. So I just try to reassure them keep them calm, let them know I’m here with them.”

The bill Holcomb signed into law requires 9-1-1 dispatchers to become trained

in telephone CPR.

“In some of the more rural areas, it can be quite a time before an emergency crew arrives on scene,” said Jeff Schemmer, the executive director of Hamilton County Public Safety Communications.

“If we can get CPR started immediately, it increases the chances of survivability for an individual suffering a heart attack or cardiac arrest.”

Schemmer said his team is already trained in telephone CPR and has been for at least 10 years.

“We have to have 24 hours a year to keep up our certification,” Schemmer explained. “So, there’s a lot of classes we have to continually go through whenever they update protocol.”

Goins showed the step-by-step CPR cards that dispatchers read aloud to callers, organized by the age of the person who needs CPR.

“I think that’s awesome (that dispatchers statewide will train in phone CPR),” Goins said. “There’s such a big significance in doing CPR, even if we are over the phone.”

Bids to be taken June 28 for removing Nickel Plate rails

Bids will be taken June 28 by the Hoosier Heritage Port Authority on removal and sale of the Nickel Plate rails, thus marking the beginning of the end of the railroad between downtown Noblesville and Indianapolis. The port authority is owned by Hamilton County and the cities of Noblesville and Fishers.

Removal of the rails and railroad ties is the first step toward converting the rail right-of-way to a pedestrian and bike trail. The railroad south of Noblesville has not been used for train traffic for several years, and its future has been the subject of a

long-running debate between the port authority and groups that wanted to preserve the rail line.

City and county officials met Monday to discuss the rail removal process and division of proceeds from the sale of the hundreds of tons of scrap iron and wooden ties estimated at around \$2 million. But, the cost of removal and repair of dozens of streets the railroad crosses is unknown until bids are received.

The Nickel Plate north from Noblesville to Tipton will remain an active line for excursion trains operated by the Nickel Plate Heritage Railroad. The railroad was built in 1851 and was key to the development of communities through which

it passed. Commercial use of the line ended in the 1990s and was taken over by the port authority, created to save the railroad from abandonment.

Monday’s meeting, following a regular county commissioner session, was called a work session where no final decisions were made. Other matters of mutual concern were also considered, including an update on the State Road 37 upgrading project now getting underway through city and county jurisdictions.

Also considered was Noblesville’s plan to improve Seminary Park with facilities accessible under the Americans With Disabilities Act., better lighting, sidewalks and signage.

Sheridan Library gaining STEAM, adding discovery

STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Math) programs are all the rage these days in schools and libraries. Not to be outdone, the Sheridan Public Library has its own version.

The library’s year-long STEAM program is geared toward kindergarten through fifth grade students. Each quarter there will be a live Discovery Event program presented to participants aimed toward one particular aspect of STEAM. At 7 p.m. on Thursday, June 13, STEAM members will explore space and astronomy by being involved in hands-on learning exercises and experiments as well as instructor demonstrations.

To participate in the program, youngsters must join the STEAM club by signing up at the library.

Registration is free and includes two take-home space/astronomy experimental kits. Youngsters can sign up for the program anytime, including at the door on Thursday evening, and receive their take-home kits.

STEAM programs are planned for each quarter of the next year. The next quarterly program scheduled for September will feature topics related to oceanography. The third quarterly topic will be chemistry, and the last quarter’s topic will be construction engineering. Each topic will include take-home kits for fun learning on your own.

You do not have to have a library card to be a STEAM member and the program is free. Parents are encouraged to attend as well. The library is located at 103 W. First St. in beautiful uptown Sheridan.

HSE school board receives 24 applications for vacant seat

According to Hamilton Southeastern Schools, 24 people have submitted applications to fill the school board term of Mike Bottorff, who resigned from the board citing family responsibilities as the reason. The deadline to apply was 4 p.m. last Friday. So, the question is, what happens next?

The school board met in execu-

tive session Monday in order to determine a set of three to five finalists. The names of those finalists will be announced either before or during the public board meeting to be held today after the private session. Those finalists will be interviewed by school board members at a public meeting set for 3 p.m. on Tuesday, June 18 at the school administration building. Board members plan to act as a panel in questioning the candidates.

The board will hold a vote at the June 26 regular board meeting naming the new board member. It is not known when the new school board

member will be sworn in. Under state law, when there is a vacancy on a school board, the remaining board members vote on the replacement.

There are six HSE school board members remaining. If there would be a tie vote on naming a replacement for Mr. Bottorff, or the board could not agree on the new board member, a Circuit Court judge would make the decision. The Circuit Court judge in Hamilton County is Judge Paul Felix.

The new board member will serve the remaining term for the Fall Creek Township at-large seat. That seat is up for re-election in the fall of 2020.

I grew up in a home without domestic violence or assault – it wasn’t something I saw, or even heard about. 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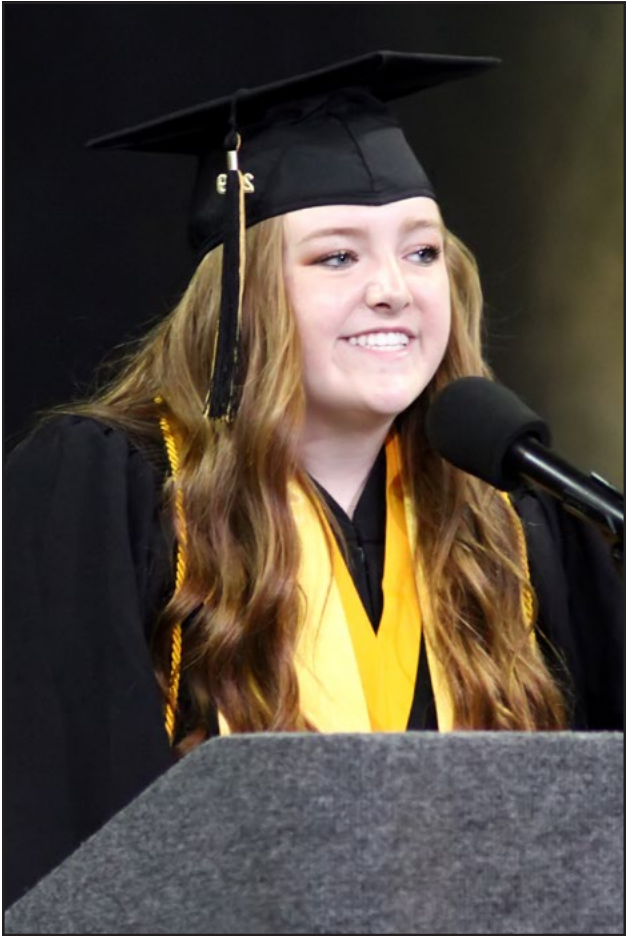

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Sen. Todd Young discusses crop progress in Indiana

On Tuesday, U.S. Senator Todd Young (R-Ind.) spoke about the difficulties Indiana farmers are facing this planting season and urged the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) to act quickly to finalize guidance to apply for payments for crop and livestock losses in 2018 and 2019 due to severe weather.

“This is a difficult time right now for a lot of our nation’s farmers, particularly those who hail from my home state of Indiana. Adverse weather conditions have complicated

the planting season. In fact, so many Hoosier farmers can’t get their crops into the ground. As of last week, only 31 percent of corn crop was able to find its way into the ground as compared to 67 percent nationally,” said Young.

The U.S. Senate and House recently passed a disaster bill, which was signed into law by President Trump last week. The disaster aid package in-

cludes \$3 billion for agriculture programs and includes provisions specifically related to livestock and crop losses. Farm country is waiting for clarification from USDA on the application process and eligibility requirements as farmers make tough decisions about planting this season.

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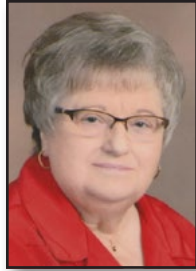
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Brenda Jill Carson

Carmel leads, Millers are close third

The first day of the IHSAA boys golf state finals was very close, especially among the top three teams.

Carmel and Center Grove traded the first-round lead Tuesday at Prairie View Golf Club, with Noblesville only a couple strokes behind. Those three schools will be in the lead group when play resumes this morning.

The defending state champions Greyhounds carded a 299 in their first round of play. Senior Nick Dentino went two under par for a 70, which puts him in a tie for the lead individually with Peru sophomore Kash Bellar. Dentino made six birdies in his round, including one each on holes 16 and 18.

"That was the kind of finish we needed from him," said Carmel coach Chard Reid.

Juniors Clay Stirrsman and Luke Prall both scored 74s, with Stirrsman making four birdies and Prall getting one. Both are tied for ninth individually.

"We feel really good, going into tomorrow, where we're at right now," said Reid.

Center Grove scored 303, with the Millers at 305. Senior Clay Merchant led Noblesville with an even-par finish of 72, including five birdies. Merchant is tied for third in the individual standings.

Senior Joe Whallon carded a 77, while senior Jacob Deakyne scored 78, both had one birdie. Senior Chris Scheib also scored a 78, with two birdies.

"We're close," said Millers coach Gary Sewell. "We're in the last group and you want to be in the last group on the last day and see what happens."

Guerin Catholic isn't far away either. The Golden Eagles finished the first round with a 313, good for fifth place. Freshman Connor McNeely and senior Ty Gingerich both carded 77s. All five Guerin players made at least one birdie: Sophomore Ben Burgan had four, senior Keaton Modleski made two, and sophomore Andrew White, McNeely and Gingerich all had one.

Hamilton Southeastern scored 324, putting the Royals in 10th place. Senior Daivic Akala scored a 78 to lead Southeastern, including three birdies. Senior John Cherry carded a 79, both he and senior Sam Smith made one birdie.

Fishers' two individuals both had solid days. Junior Bryce Robertson scored a 74 to put himself in the tie for ninth place, draining five birdies along the way. Senior Caleb Bopp is one stroke behind with a 75, he made two birdies in his round.

Westfield senior Ethan Lutz scored a 78, including one birdie.

Late free throws send Seattle past Fever

Two late free throws led the Seattle Storm past the Indiana Fever 84-82 in a Tuesday home game at Bankers Life Fieldhouse.

Jewell Lloyd made a pair of free throws after a foul call that was reviewed by officials with 24 seconds left to give Seattle an 83-82 lead. The second free throw turned out to be the game winner. She tacked on another free throw with nine seconds remaining for the final margin.

"A lot of times, in a one-possession game, people talk about late free throws or a last possession," said Indiana coach Pokey Chatman. "But as a coach, and tonight just like I told the players, I need to talk about the first 5-6 possessions of the third quarter. We took some 3's and gambled a little bit and it gave some added momentum to Seattle."

Lloyd and Natasha Howard combined for 44 points in the win. Mercedes Russell was the only other player to reach double-figures for Seattle.

The Fever got 28 points off their bench, outscoring the Storm's reserves by 11. Tiffany Mitchell and Kennedy Burke accounted for 26 of those 28 points.

"When you ask that question, I just close my eyes and envision a play that she made under the basket, playing defense straight up on an offensive player and swatting a shot," said Chatman. "That's instinctive. It's athletic. It's a basketball play. She's long and she helps us on both ends of the floor. She's becoming a very valuable piece for us."

Seattle went to the free throw line 16 times and made 15 of them. Indiana attempted nine free throws, five of which came from reserves. The Fever went 8-of-9 from the charity stripe.

Kelsey Mitchell finished with seven assists, setting a new career high. Mitchell's dished 13 assists in her last two contests.

Mitchell went 8-of-19 from the field and led the Fever with 21 points. It is the third time in four games Mitchell reached the 20-point mark.

Candice Dupree posted her second double-double in the last three games and now has 68 in her career. Dupree finished with 10 points and 15 rebounds. The 15 boards are the highest total of Dupree's Fever career.

Five different Fever players reached double-figures. Indiana has seven players averaging at least 10 points per game.

Rookie Kennedy Burke reached double figures for the second game in a row. Burke followed an 18-point performance against Phoenix on Sunday with 14 points against Seattle.

The Fever are 2-2 in their first four home games this season. They recorded two victories at home all last season.

Indiana is .500 or better through six games for the first time since 2016, the last season the team reached the playoffs.

Natasha Howard led all scorers and posted a career-high 26 points on 9-of-17 shooting. Howard has scored at least 12 points in every game this season.

Midway through the second quarter, Mercedes Russell set a new career-high with her 11th point of the game. Russell finished with 13 points and a season-high eight rebounds.

The Storm knocked down five of their nine 3-point attempts. It was only the second time this season Seattle shot better than 32 percent from deep.

The Storm's win over the Fever was their fourth in a row. Seattle has taken five of the last six meetings between the teams and leads the all-time series 21-19.

Sami Whitcomb set a new career-high with six assists. Her previous career-best was four against Dallas on Aug. 19, 2018.
