Buckingham: “No comment” on County Treasurer’s Office investigation

Hamilton County Prosecutor Lee Buckingham remains quiet on a State Police investigation into the County Treasurer’s Office.

The Treasurer’s Office was the focus of an investigation, requested by Hamilton County Commissioners in December, after a former employee alleged penalties were waived for late tax payments made by family members of the Treasurer’s Office.

Hamilton County Prosecutor Lee Buckingham has refused comment on the investigation.

In April, Buckingham stated it was his policy not to comment on an investigation.

Last week when asked about the status of the investigation, Buckingham again replied, “No comment.”

Reports have surfaced

that Hancock County Prosecutor Brent Eaton has been assigned as Special Prosecutor to the case by Hamilton County Judge Paul Felix. Buckingham did not respond to a request to confirm Eaton’s assignment.

“I trust Lee Buckingham, but this is becoming frustrating,” said Hamilton County Commissioner Steve Dillinger.

Dillinger expressed his frustration stating, “We may need to make some changes in the Treasurer’s Office, but until the investigation is concluded we can’t.”

Dillinger told The Reporter earlier this year the Treasurer’s Office was in “upheaval,” and surveillance cameras have been installed to help monitor the handling of cash.

Commissioner Mark Heirbrandt said, “This has went on longer than expected. I would have

Commissioners cut traffic woes, now you can get there from here

Motorists in and around US 31 and 146th Street now have a traffic fix that should make getting to and from the area easier.

This project began seven years ago with a call from then newly sworn-in Commissioner Mark Heirbrandt. During the ceremony on Friday, Altman told the crowd that Heirbrandt had been stuck in traffic on Smokey Row Road and called her, saying he’d found a serious problem the commissioners needed to fix. Now, after innovative financing and co-operation from INDOT, the city of Carmel and Hamilton County, driving in this area

Clint Wilson named to HSE School Board

The Hamilton Southeastern (HSE) School Board appointed Clint Wilson last Wednesday to fill the remaining term of Mike Bottorff, through Dec. 31, 2020. Wilson was approved by a vote of 5-0.

Board member Janet Pritchett chose to abstain, saying she has nothing against Wilson, but abstained out of “principle.” After the board meeting, Pritchett chose not elaborate on what she meant by “principle,” but may say more later.

Wilson will be sworn in as a member of the school board at the July 10 meeting. Former Board President Bottorff announced his resignation from the board in late May.

There were 24 applications filed to replace Bottorff, and the board named four finalists that were publicly interviewed June 18. The other three finalists were Travis Brown, Peter Griffin and Jeff Lantzer.

During his public interview, Wilson told board members he has three children, with two enrolled in

County jail overcrowding solved

Hamilton County held a ribbon cutting for its expansion of the county’s current jail Friday morning.

The \$13.5 million project added over 100 beds and allows for future expansions as needed. The jail was built 25 years ago to hold 296 inmates. It currently holds nearly 400 inmates.

“We are adding 126 beds in this facility,” Sheriff Dennis Quakenbush told The Reporter. “As of today, we have a little over 400 inmates. This will put us at a 537-bed capacity. We have the ability to add capacity in the future if we need to, but there are no current plans to in the works.”

A change in state law in 2016 added to the county’s woes. House Bill 1006 requires lower-level felons to serve their terms in county jails rather than state prisons.

Quakenbush said there are multiple reasons this project, which was begun under Sheriff Mark Bowen, was necessary.

“The two primary factors are the exploding growth and success

of Hamilton County – the number of people coming here over the last 20 years – and those prisoners who would be housed at the state level, due to House Bill 1006, are now being housed here in our facility,” Quakenbush said.

While 537 beds may sound like a large number, relative to other parts of Indiana, that is a low number. Hamilton County

Commissioner Mark Heirbrandt said he is proud of how small the county jail is, relative to the population of Hamilton County.

“For a county of this size the inmate population is very low,” Heirbrandt told The Reporter. “When I travel all 92 counties throughout the state for my regular job, I look at the

just became a great deal less frustrating.

Hamilton County officials held a ribbon cutting on Friday at a new ramp that will allow motorists to access southbound Keystone Parkway from 146th Street by traveling south on Lowe’s Way.

Back in 2002, the county constructed a northbound off ramp from Keystone Parkway to 146th Street via Lowe’s Way, but improvements to US 31 between Interstate 465 and State Road 38 eliminated access to US 31/Keystone Parkway from Greyhound Pass, forcing motorists to use a more circuitous route. The first phase of this construction project will fix that.

“The long and short of it is you can’t get there from here,” said Hamilton County Commissioner Christine Altman. “For years motorists have had to find workarounds to get where they’re going. This project will give them a straight shot to south-

bound Keystone.”

Phase I of this project also connects the northbound Keystone Parkway ramp from 136th Street to the northbound Keystone ramp to Lowe’s Way/146th Street and changes the existing signal at the entrance to Lowe’s Way to a roundabout.

The Indiana Department of Transportation and the Indianapolis Metropolitan Planning Organization foot nearly half the cost of the \$10 million project. Hamilton County covered the remaining cost with local TIF funds.

Phase II of the project is scheduled to start in July and should be complete in June of next year. It will connect the new ramp constructed in Phase I with a roundabout at Range Line Road which will create a new connection for motorists wanting to drive east or west between Range Line Road, Keystone Parkway, and Lowe’s Way.

Fishers Council Connect centers on transportation, economic development

The Fishers City Council Connect meeting last Wednesday saw its largest crowd since the sessions began earlier this year, with more than 20 people gathering at the Reserve in the Hamilton Trace complex, a senior citizens residential facility.

Council President Rich Block and Vice President Eric Moeller answered questions from the audience for about 90 minutes.

Transportation and economic development issues took center stage, but one central issue was the lack of an up-to-date printed map of the City of Fishers. The councilmen promised to look into that.

There were a number of senior citizens on hand and they asked about Fishers’ stature as a senior-friendly city. AARP announced in early 2018 the naming of Fishers as Indiana’s first age-friendly city.

One citizen asserted that Fishers motorists’ behavior is not good, with speeding a regular thing along main arteries such as 116th Street.

The councilman pointed to the recent actions standardizing neighborhood speed limits at 25 mph. They promised to raise awareness of the speeding on main streets with the police department.

On the transportation issue, the councilmen said the bus running during rush hours between Fishers and downtown Indianapolis several years ago had plenty of ridership when gasoline prices edged up to \$4 a gallon, but when prices went down to near \$2.50 a gallon ridership declined to the point where the bus operation was canceled. The city will continue to study mini-transit operations to navigate within the city if that becomes feasible.

Questions were raised about a developer buying homes just west of the Chatham Tap restaurant along 116th Street, with development possible but none announced at this time. Block responded that those homeowners received a very good price when selling those homes, and added all that property is not now within the Fishers city limits.

Another Council Connect session will be scheduled during July or August.

WHEREAS, the Town of Atlanta, Indiana ("Town") operates a waterworks utility for the benefit of the Town's citizens and the surrounding area;

ORDINANCE NO. 2019-05-02
AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWN OF ATLANTA, INDIANA, AMENDING THE RATES AND CHARGES FOR THE SEWAGE WORKS UTILITY
WHEREAS, the Town of Atlanta, Indiana ("Town") operates a sewage works utility for the benefit of the Town's citizens and the surrounding area;
WHEREAS, the Town has adopted various ordinances regarding policies and procedures for the sewage works and the establishment of sewer rates, fees and charges;
WHEREAS, the existing rates, fees and charges are set forth in the Town of Atlanta, Indiana Code of Ordinances §§ 51.65 through 51.69;
WHEREAS, pursuant to Ind. Code § 36-9-23-25, the sewage works fees and charges must be sufficient to pay various expenses incidental to operation of the works, provide adequate money for improving and replacing the works, provide adequate money to be used as working capital, and provide the sinking fund; and
WHEREAS, it has been determined by the Town Council that the existing rates are inadequate to fund the sewage works utility, and therefore should be amended and modified as provided for in this Ordinance;
WHEREAS, this Ordinance will not modify the date(s) on which sewage works fees and charges are payable and due; and
WHEREAS, the sewage works fees reflected in this ordinance are just and equitable, and comply with the provisions of Ind. Code § 36-9-23-25 and other applicable statutes,
NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the Town Council of the Town of Atlanta, as follows:
Section 1. The foregoing Recitals are fully incorporated herein by this reference.
Section 2. For the use of and service rendered by the Town of Atlanta sewage works, charge per Equivalent Dwelling Unit ("EDU") on all new and expanded sewer services shall be two thousand, four-hundred and sixty dollars (\$2,460.00). See Exhibit A for an applicable EDU table.
Section 3. All other provisions codified in the Town of Atlanta, Indiana Code of Ordinances concerning the sewage works fees, not amended by this Ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.
Section 4. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage by the Atlanta Town Council

My Rainbow Baby

Recently I asked Emily if she knew she was a Rainbow Baby. Emily had no idea what I was talking about.

I explained to her that a year before she was born I had a miscarriage. A baby born after that is a Rainbow Baby.

It was in July of 1980 when I went to see my doctor, Walt Beaver, to hear the heartbeat of the baby I was carrying. I watched his brow become furrowed as he moved the stethoscope over my stomach. He calmly suggested we do an ultrasound.

I went home in tears and waited a few days before it could be done. Nothing back then was instant. I did a lot of praying.

The results were not what I had prayed for. I was devastated. I went into the hospital for a D&C August 7.

I spent the next few weeks explaining to friends that I was no longer pregnant and reassuring them that I was okay. But I wasn't.

I questioned God. I had obeyed all the pregnancy rules. I was in good health. So why?

To make matters worse I had two close friends who had gotten pregnant with their third child and neither pregnancy was planned.

I helped to give them a baby shower. I remember going into the bathroom, wiping tears, splashing cold water on my face and returning to the laughter and baby chitchat with all the



guests. All the while my heart was crying.

I know miscarriages are very common but when it happens to you it devastates your heart.

With in months I did get pregnant again. I was so scared the entire nine months. Dr. Beaver kept reassuring me that this pregnancy was going well and I would deliver a healthy baby in August of 1981.

Back then no one knew what sex their baby would be, but I knew, I just knew it would be a girl.

So on August 7, 1981 Emily Catron was born. She weighed a little over 8 pounds and was so pretty and healthy. It was exactly one year to the day that I had my D&C.

I still don't understand why I lost that baby. I don't understand why things happen the way they do. I honestly don't believe everything happens for a reason. Things just happen sometimes.

I do know that when I held Emily in my arms that day, some 38 years ago, I could never imagine not having her. She was not only a Rainbow Baby but helped to heal my broken heart.

Now, all these years later, she has a way of calming my fears and reassuring me that things will be okay.

God must have known I'd need that. Whenever I look up at a rainbow I am reminded that God keeps His promises, even when we don't understand His ways.

size of this jail, which was at 296 beds before the expansion. Having a population of almost 300k – that's efficiency at its best!"

Heirbrandt and Bowen both credit collaboration between various agencies as key to keeping crime low in the community.

"I think a lot of it is the collaboration between the commissioners, the Sheriff's Office, the prosecutor and the judges all working together to make this happen," Heirbrandt said.

"The probation department and community corrections obviously play a big part in that," Bowen said. "Hamilton County is blessed to be able to have a good working relationship with all of those entities to try to do the right thing and make sure we are serving folks' needs and taking care of the underlying issues that need to be dealt with when it comes to making sure we are getting them on the right track and getting them the help that they need to try to prevent them from having to go to jail."

When asked about the challenges law enforcement faces in keeping the crime rate, and thus the inmate population so low, Bowen pointed to the secondary effects of the drug problem.

One major difference

between 4G and 5G wireless technology is the need for more towers with 5G. A 5G tower has a range of only 500 to 1,000 feet, meaning more towers are required. 4G towers cover a much wider geographical area.

Fadness expects Verizon to have the most interest in installing 5G wireless networks in Fishers residential areas. AT&T has already built a fiber optic network in most Fishers neighborhoods, but Verizon has not. A residential 5G network would allow Verizon to offer residential high-speed Internet and television service through a 5G network.

The mayor said he has received comments from Fishers residents about the possible health risks at-

tached to 5G wireless technology, but referred to a May 12 New York Times story that points out a Russian disinformation campaign on 5G health risks. The mayor also talked about that subject in a recent podcast interview with *LarryInFishers*.

The wireless firms expect this new 5G network to be the technology of the future that should last for decades, so it is not expected to be usurped by new technological advances in the foreseeable future, Fadness told fellow board members.

The board reached no decision at the Monday discussion. The mayor plans to invite technical experts to talk with board members at a future board work session, possibly in August.

like most counties across the state it is theft and burglary," Bowen said. "Often what we are seeing is the systemic issue with the opioid and drug epidemic. People are stealing from each other in order to support the habits."

Heirbrandt said another part of the low crime rate is found in Hamilton County's focus on rehabilitation.

"We do a really good job of identifying some of the inmates who get in here who, even if they go through community corrections, need help with job placement," Heirbrandt said. "Some lose their jobs because of this [incarceration]. We work with them and try to get them back into society."

The jail expansion includes five cell pods with 38 prefabricated steel cells consisting of two and four-man cells. The expansion also includes an interior recreation area, classroom and medical support area. Existing space within the old jail will be designed to accommodate dining space for community corrections participants. Construction began in April 2018. Inmates will be moved to the new facility on July 8.

The jail expansion is powered by the solar project.

New junior varsity field debuts at Hazel Dell

Hazel Dell Elementary School has itself another baseball field.

A new junior varsity field has been constructed right next to Don Dunker Field. The JV field, a turf facility, saw its first action a couple weeks ago when games from a tournament hosted by Bullpen Tournaments were played. The new field is a partnership between Noblesville Schools and Bullpen.

Dr. David Mundy, Associate Superintendent of Noblesville Schools, is pleased with the new field, construction of which had to wait out a couple months of rainy weather. The field was to have opened in April, but finally got to see its first action in early June.

"So we were a couple months delayed, but obviously we can't control Mother Nature," said Mundy.

The Bullpen tournament played on the new field was in collaboration with Grand Park, another partner in the new field. Yet more rain fell during the week, but Mundy said that allowed everyone to see how affected the field would be. And it turned out to be fine: A storm passed through, but players were

able to get back on the field 20 to 25 minutes after the rain ended, and the field was playable.

"It drained perfectly," said Mundy.

The new JV field is located on the old Noblesville High School varsity soccer field, so a drainage system was already in place.

"Due to the fact there were old drainage tiles, we were able to utilize those," said Mundy. Crider and Crider, a construction company, also assisted with the project, helping to develop a system that allows for very quick drainage of the turf field. Mundy noted there was a small water retention area next to the field, and the water ran right into the area.

Once next year's high school spring sports season rolls around, the Millers will have priority over the field. That includes junior varsity games. Mundy noted that Noblesville was the only baseball program in the Hoosier Crossroads Conference that didn't have two baseball fields, so having the new field will help out with scheduling JV and freshman games. Mundy also said that The Dunk will remain the varsity field - "We have no intention of

not utilizing the Dunk as the varsity field," he said.

Marnie Cooke, Director of Marketing and Communications at Noblesville

Schools, said the construction of the new JV diamond has been important to the development of the Millers' baseball student-athletes.

"In the past we had over 50 athletes across three Miller baseball teams share one diamond and that has been a challenge for years, sometimes even causing practices and games to be canceled due to lack of space," said Cooke. "This new facility allows space we need, including maximizing coaching staff and collaboration between the individual teams."

"It's also important to note that no referendum

dollars were used for the project and we were able to secure a significant discount," said Cooke.

Mundy, who was the JV baseball coach for Noblesville when The Dunk opened in 1996, said that the Millers program is "very fortunate and blessed due to this partnership with Bullpen," and also appreciated the efforts of Noblesville Schools Superintendent, Dr. Beth Nidermeyer and the Noblesville School Board of getting the new field opened.
