

Fishers Council Connect centers on transportation, economic development

The Fishers City Council Connect meeting last Wednesday saw its largest crowd since the sessions began earlier this year, with more than 20 people gathering at the Reserve in the Hamilton Trace complex, a senior citizens residential facility.

Council President Rich Block and Vice President Eric Moeller answered questions from the audience for about 90 minutes. Transportation and eco-

nomic development issues took center stage, but one central issue was the lack of an up-to-date printed map of the City of Fishers. The councilmen promised to look into that.

There were a number of senior citizens on hand and they asked about Fishers stature as a senior-friendly city. AARP announced in early 2018 the naming of Fishers as Indiana's first age-friendly city.

One citizen asserted that Fishers motorists' behavior is not good, with speeding a regular thing along main arteries such as 116th Street.

The councilman pointed to the recent actions standardizing neighborhood speed limits at 25 mph. They promised to raise awareness of the speeding on main streets with the police department.

On the transportation issue, the councilmen said the bus running during rush hours between Fishers and downtown Indianapolis several years ago had plenty of ridership when gasoline prices edged up to \$4 a gallon, but when prices went down to near \$2.50 a gallon ridership declined to the point where the bus operation was canceled. The city will continue to study mini-transit operations to navigate within the city if that becomes feasible.

Questions were raised about a developer buying homes just west of the Chatham Tap restaurant along 116th Street, with development possible but none announced at this time. Block responded that those homeowners received a very good price when selling those homes, and added all that property is not now within the Fishers city limits.

Another Council Connect session will be scheduled during July or August.

she knew she was a Rainbow Baby.

Emily had no idea what I was talking about.

I explained to her that a year before she was born I had a miscar-

riage. A baby born after that is a Rainbow Baby.

It was in July of 1980 when I went to see my doctor, Walt Beaver, to hear the heartbeat of the baby I was carrying. I watched his brow become furrowed as he moved the stethoscope over my stomach. He calmly suggested we do an ultrasound.

I went home in tears and it could be done. Nothing back then was instant. I did a lot of praying.

The results were not what I had prayed for. I was devastated. I went into the hospital for a D&C August 7.

I spent the next few weeks explaining to friends that I was no longer pregnant and reassuring them that I was okay. But I wasn't.

I questioned God. I had obeyed all the pregnancy rules. I was in good health. So why?

To make matters worse I had two close friends who had gotten pregnant with their third child and neither pregnancy was planned.

I helped to give them a baby shower. I remember wiping tears, splashing cold guests. All the while my heart was crying.

I know miscarriages very common but when it happens to you it devastates your heart.

Within months I

get pregnant again. I was so scared the entire nine months. Dr. Beaver kept reassuring me that this pregnancy was going well and I would deliver a healthy baby in August of 1981.

Back then no one knew what sex their baby would be, but I knew, I just knew it would be a girl.

So on August 7, 1981 waited a few days before Emily Catron was born. She weighed a little over 8 pounds and was so pretty and healthy. It was exactly one year to the day that I had mv D&C.

I still don't understand why I lost that baby. I don't understand why things happen the way they do. I honestly don't believe everything happens for a reason. Things just happen sometimes.

I do know that when I held Emily in my arms that day, some 38 years ago, I could never imagine not having her. She was not only a Rainbow Baby but helped to heal my broken heart.

Now, all these years later, she has a way of calming my fears and reassuring me that things will be okay.



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IHSAA announces changes to 6A, 5A football sectionals

Due to the recent change in the Tournament Success Factor point system, an updated version of the 2019 and 2020 football state tournament assignments in Classes 6A and 5A was approved Friday by the IHSAA Executive Committee.

The modification to the Tournament Success Factor at its April 29 meeting lowered the number of points needed (from three points to two points) by a school already playing in a higher classification to continue playing in that same class for another two years. Schools that win a regional championship in a single season or a sectional championship in back-to-back seasons would remain in that same higher class. The rule previously had required three points (two sectional titles and a regional title) to continue in that class.

With that rule change, both Fort Wayne Snider and Cathedral each accumulated two points over the last two seasons, enough to remain in Class 6A and 5A, respectively. The sectional assignment announcement released on April 29 had Snider in Class 5A, Sectional 11 and Cathedral in Class 4A, Sectional 22, the same day the new tournament success factor rule was changed. Snider has now been assigned to 6A, Sectional 3, while Cathedral will be in 5A,

Sectional 13.

That rule change coupled with Elkhart Central and Elkhart Memorial consolidating to form a new and larger Elkhart High School which will compete in 6A in 2020, affects several teams from one year to the next. One of those is Zionsville, which will compete in 6A, Sectional 5 in 2019 but 5A, Sectional 12 in 2020. Previously, Valparaiso had been that school which would split time between classes but will now spend both years in 5A, Sectional 9. Another is Carmel which will compete in Sectional 4 in 2019 but Sectional 5 in 2020. Noblesville will be moved from Sectional 3 in 2019 to Sectional 4 in 2020.

I was born and raised right here in Noblesville, I grew up in a home without domestic violence or assault - it wasn't something I saw, or even heard about. But when I was introduced to Prevail of Central Indiana, I was shocked by the number of individuals who are affected by domestic violence. In 2018 alone, Prevail helped more than 4,000 clients in Hamilton County. (Nearly 80 percent of clients are women and children.) Prevail is strictly confidential, and since their core values include integrity and respect, they provide their services at no charge. Domestic violence and abuse are hard topics to discuss, so you don't often hear about them. But at Tom Wood Volkswagen in Noblesville, we're breaking the taboo and raising awareness for Prevail, an organization that helps families in Hamilton County. - Mike Bragg, GM of Tom Wood Volkswagen in Noblesville

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
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
