# Fishers brothers arrested, allegedly plotted to sell automatic rifles to ISIS

A federal grand jury has indicted two Fishers brothers on charges of making and trying to provide firearms and other resources to the Islamic State of Iraq and Al-Sham (ISIS).  
Moyad Dannon, 21, and Mahde Dannon, 20, were indicted last week according to a news release issued by the office of U.S. Attorney Josh Minkler with the Indianapolis district federal court.  
The brothers have been detained by the U.S. Marshals Service without bond since May 15 while they await trial.  
A statement from Grant Mendenhall, special agent in charge of

the FBI's Indianapolis Division, said, "This case is the first of its kind for the Federal Bureau of Investigation where you have individuals allegedly making guns to sell and/or send overseas to ISIS. This indictment paints a vivid picture of the rapid rise of homegrown violent extremism and the lengths people are willing to go to in their support of terrorist activity."  
The indictment came after a months-long investigation by the FBI and Fishers police. It was not immediately known where the brothers made the firearms. Their Ashwood subdivision home is in the 10600 block of Summerwood Lane in Fishers. That's near the

intersection of East 131st Street and Promise Road.  
In June 2018, Mahde Dannon hatched a scheme to deliver firearms, some that were stolen, to a convicted felon who was cooperating with the FBI. The indictment said Mahde at the time was awaiting trial on felony theft charges in Lake County.  
Between July 2018 and December, the brothers sold a number of illegally obtained firearms to the felon. During the same time, the brothers also started to manufacture untraceable semiautomatic, .223-caliber rifles by buying and assembling unserialized firearms parts. The indictment called

the firearms "ghost guns" because the lack of identification numbers makes the guns untraceable.  
In late 2018, the brothers approached the convicted felon with a plan to make fully-automatic

.223-caliber rifles using the “ghost guns” process.

In February, the brothers built one fully-automatic rifle and gave it to the felon. A short time later, Moyad accompanied the felon to the southwest U.S. border to try to sell that rifle as well as other fully-automatic ones to a potential buyer who also was cooperating with the FBI. Moyad learned that the buyer intended to ship the rifles to a location in the Middle East, where they would be used by ISIS, the indictment said. Eventually, the brothers agreed to make and sell at least 55 fully-automatic “ghost gun” rifles to the buyer with the knowledge the firearms would be sent to ISIS and its members in the Middle East.

As part of that agreement, the brothers on May 15 sold five fully-automatic .223-caliber rifles in the “ghost gun” process to undercover FBI agents posing as employees of the buyer.

The charges against the brothers could result in a maximum of 30 years in prison.

Chuck and Dorothy had a cottage on Lake of the Woods in Bremen, just 20 minutes from South Bend. My family and I would go there often every summer along with Mike and Vicky and their children, Brian and Melissa, who are so close in age to me that they're more like my siblings. I would get in the water every morning and barely get out until almost sunset. My skin was "pruny" and often sunburnt.

The cottage turned into Chuck and Dorothy's year-round residence in the mid 80s, around the same time I learned to water-ski. To this day, the sounds of speedboats on a lake take me back to my childhood and are soothing to my soul.

Whenever we left the lake after a day of fun, delicious food (corn on the grill at Lake of the Woods tastes

better than anywhere else!) and sun, Chuck and Dorothy always stood in their driveway to wave goodbye. It was a comforting sight.

Fast forward to me having my own kids and the

visits to Lake of the Woods dwindling thanks to moving to Central Indiana. Mom didn't visit as often either but still enjoyed coming down once or twice a year when we made it there for different celebrations. I still remember her chatting for hours with Dorothy, whom she adored.

I decided to write a letter to Chuck and Dorothy in 2010 to let them know how much they meant to me. And when they passed away a few years ago, I was so glad I took the time to write and send it.

My sons and I just spent a couple of days at Lake of the Woods for the holiday weekend. While the cottage was overflowing with people Saturday, last Friday we just enjoyed some time with Mike, who lives there now. We only see him once a year now, as he and Vicky divorced years ago.

We were lucky to have enjoyed an afternoon and evening of fun, but the skies finally spewed raindrops, so we retreated to our car at sunset. Mike sat on the back porch while we fiddled with the navigation in the car to figure out how to get to our hotel. Since I wasn't used to my husband's Ford Fusion hybrid, it took us a longer than expected. To my surprise, Mike still sat there.

Then it hit me why he was staying. He couldn't do the traditional driveway goodbye without getting soaked, but he was pretty darn close. My throat constricted and decades of memories flooded my heart. I thanked God once again for the family that helped raise me and hoped that we will still have many more years together.

## State Parks Draw Hunt applications open Monday

Hunters can apply online for State Parks Deer Management Draw Hunts beginning July 15 by visiting [on.IN.gov/reservedhunt](http://on.IN.gov/reservedhunt). Applications are only available online and close Aug. 26.

The first State Park hunt was held in 1993 as an effort to mitigate damage to vegetation and unique habitat by an overpopulation of white-tailed deer in Brown County State Park. Multiple parks have hosted deer management hunts annually since 1995.

The decision to start deer management at individual parks has been based on scientific vegetation monitoring. Decisions to continue deer management at individual parks are made annually using harvest data and consideration of occurrences of rare, threatened and endangered flora that could be affected by excessive browsing by deer.

Applicants must possess any valid license to take a deer in Indiana at the time of the application, excluding an apprentice license, and must be Indiana residents who will be 18 years of age by the date of the first hunt. Once

an application has been submitted, information cannot be changed. Applications must be completed by the application deadline.

Primary applicants can apply by themselves or with up to two secondary applicants (buddies). Primary applicants must apply with their buddies' information on their application in order for them to participate, including their buddies' deer license number(s) and date(s) of birth.

Buddies must still meet all age, residency and licensing requirements of the State Parks Deer Management Hunts. Each applicant may appear on only one application per hunt period.

Firearm hunts allow applicants to use any legal firearm to take deer on public land in Indiana. Archery hunts allow applications to use any legal archery equipment to take deer in Indiana, including crossbows.

Hunters will be selected through a randomized computer drawing. A link to view drawing results will be posted at [on.IN.gov/reservedhunt](http://on.IN.gov/reservedhunt) by Aug. 30.

## Enchanted Forest Swim Meet begins today

The Noblesville Swim Club's annual Enchanted Forest Swim Meet begins today at the Forest Park Aquatic Center, and it looks to be the biggest meet ever in the event's history.

"We currently have 962 swimmers for the meet," said meet director Chris Berger.

Those swimmers will be divided up among 30 teams, as well as a few unattached swimmers. The majority of teams are from Indiana, with one notable exception: Pickering, a swim club from the Toronto area, will be making its way from Canada to the Hoosier state.

In addition to Noblesville, four other county swim clubs will have swimmers there, including Southeastern Swim Club, Fishers Area Swimming Tigers, Westfield Aquatics, and Power Aquatics, which represents the Hamilton Heights area.

"I think our swimmers, our athletes are pretty excited and I hope that the visiting teams are excited, too," said Berger. He and the other meet volunteers were busy Thursday evening setting up for the meet.

There will be two sessions today. Session 1 starts at noon and will feature the 400 individual medley and the 400 free-style events. These races will be contested by age groups 13-14 and in the "Open" group, which usually means ages 15 and up. Gates open at 10 a.m.

Session 2 begins at 5 p.m. The 10 and Under and 11-12 age groups will race in the 200 free and the 200 IM; then the session concludes with the Open 1500 free-style.

Admission is \$6 for a single-day pass, or \$15 for the whole weekend. Children ages 12 and under are admitted free. Concession stands will be open for breakfast, lunch and snacks. Limited seating is available, so spectators are welcome to bring their own chairs.

The schedule for both Saturday and Sunday is as follows: The morning sessions start at 7 a.m., the afternoon sessions begin at 12:45 p.m., and the finals are set for 5:30 p.m. Gates open at 5:45 a.m. both days.

During the weekend, the 13-14 and Open age groups will swim preliminaries in the morning and finals in the evening. The 10 and Under and 11-12 group will swim in the afternoon, with the 11-12 swimmers competing in prelims during that time. The 11-12 group will then swim finals in the evening. All 10 and under events will be timed finals.

Saturday events include the 200 free, 200 butterfly, 100 backstroke, 50 free and 200 breaststroke, with the younger ages (10 and under and 11-12) competing in

the 100 butterfly, 50 backstroke, 50 free and 100 breaststroke.

Sunday events include the 200 IM (for 13-14 and Open swimmers), 100 butterfly, 100 breaststroke, 100 free and 200 backstroke. The 10 and Under and 11-12 groups will swim the 50 butterfly, 50 breaststroke, 100 free and 100 backstroke.

Heat sheets will be available on the Meet Mobile app, the Noblesville Swim Club website, and the spectator viewing area. Results will be posted on Meet Mobile as well.

Dentino in the semi-finals. Dentino won a marathon third-round match over Tipton's Griffin Hare, prevailing in 23 holes. # Etchison among new Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame Board of Directors members

**NEW CASTLE** - The Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame has elected new officers and added new members to their Board of Directors effective July 1, 2019.

Noblesville High School graduate Tony Etchison, a member of the Hall's 2016 Silver Anniversary Team, is one of four new members that have been appointed to four-year terms as new members of the Board of Directors, effective July 1.

Etchison is a graduate of Noblesville High School and Mercer University. Totalling 1,357 points in high school, he led Noblesville to two sectional titles and two-time Hamilton County Player of the Year honors, before leading the Trans-American Conference in three-point shooting at Mercer. An agent for Farm Bureau Insurance, he resides in Arcadia.

The other three new members are:

Jimmie Howell, a 2018 HOF inductee, is a graduate of Lapel High School and Charleston Southern University. In his 38th season as an Indiana high school basketball coach, the current Lapel head coach is the 14th winningest high school boys varsity coach in Indiana history with 610 career victories, including 2005 1A and 2016 2A IHSAA championships. Currently the athletic director of Lapel Middle School, he resides in Lapel.

Jennifer Jacoby, a 2017 HOF inductee, is a graduate of Rossville High School and Purdue University. Indiana's 1991 Miss Basketball graduated as the 2nd all-time leading scorer in Indiana girls basketball history with 2,344 career points after averaging 33.7 points and 11.3 assists as senior and 29.3 points per game for her career. She was a starter for Purdue teams that won two Big Ten championships, including their 1994 NCAA Final

Four team. Employed in college and high school coaching and administrator roles, she resides in Rossville.

Laura Titus, a 2011 HOF inductee, is a graduate of Rochester High School and Purdue University. At Rochester, she helped teams to undefeated regular seasons and a pair of regional championships in the first two years of IHSAA girls basketball and was named a 1977 Indiana All-Star. A two-time team MVP at Purdue, she graduated as the program's career scoring leader. Employed in education, she teaches at Avon Intermediate School and lives in Plainfield.

Jerry Peirson, a 2010 HOF inductee, has been elected as President. A graduate of Royerton High School and Miami (OH) University, he served as head coach at Cowan High School before a coaching career at Miami (OH), including as head men's basketball coach from 1984-1990. Retired from a position with Ball State University's Cardinal Varsity Club, he resides in Yorktown.

Mark Baltz, a 2013 recipient of the Hall of Fame's Center Circle Officials Award, has been elected as Executive Vice President. Baltz was a veteran NFL official for 25 seasons, along with a lengthy basketball officiating career. He worked 38 IHSAA sectionals, 25 regionals, eight semi-states and three state finals during his involvement in Indiana high school basketball. He resides in Zionsville.

Ray Pavy, a 1990 HOF inductee, remains the organization's Treasurer. A graduate of New Castle Chrysler High School and Indiana University, he was head coach at Sulphur Springs and Shenandoah high schools before a lengthy career as a school administrator in New Castle. He resides in New Castle.

Donna Sullivan, a 2002 HOF inductee, has been appointed to a two-year term as Secretary. A graduate of Orleans High School and Indiana University, she coached Seymour High School girls teams to 344 wins, including 10 sectional championships, five regional titles and a 1987 state finals appearance. Retired from Seymour High School, she resides in Seymour.

Additionally, Steve Platt, Dave Schellhase and Rick Goins have joined the organization's Executive Committee.

Platt, a 1996 HOF inductee, is a graduate of Union Township High School (Huntington County) and the then-Huntington College. An All-American in his college days, he twice led the nation in scoring average and he remains the highest scoring college player in Indiana history (3,700 career points). In 14 seasons as the head coach at Huntington University, his teams won 329 games and finished as 2006 NAIA National Runners-Up. Retired from coaching, his family farms east of Huntington, where he resides.

Schellhase, a 1992 HOF inductee, is a graduate of Evansville North High School and Purdue University. Setting the city career scoring record (1,325 points) in Evansville, he graduated from Purdue with the program's single-game (57) and career (2,074) scoring records, was the nation's leading scorer and a consensus All-American in 1966 before becoming the first NBA draft pick in Chicago Bulls franchise history. He was the head men's basketball coach at Indiana State University from 1982 - 1985 and is the winningest head coach in the history of Moorhead State (MN) University, with 298 wins in 18 seasons. Employed at Logansport High School from 2004-2015, he is retired and resides in Logansport.

Goins, a 2015 HOF inductee, is a graduate of Rushville Consolidated High School and Miami (OH) University. Setting Rushville records for most points in a game (45) and in a season (662), he helped lead the Lions to the 1976 IHSAA

state runner-up finish. A team captain and two-time MVP at Miami, he graduated as the school's 6th all-time leading scorer (1,230 points) as a member of two Mid-American Conference title teams. Retired from a career with the Internal Revenue Service, he resides in Cincinnati, Ohio.
