In June 2018, Mahde Dannon hatched a scheme to deliver firearms, some that were stolen, to a convicted felon who was cooperating with the FBI. The indictment said Mahde at the time was awaiting trial on felony theft charges in Lake County.

Between July 2018 and December, the brothers sold a number of illegally obtained firearms to the felon. During the same time, the brothers also started to manufacture untraceable semiautomatic. .223-caliber rifles by buying and assembling unserialized firearms parts. The indictment called



## Shaffer not optimistic about future of Carmel

Happy Mid-Year, 2019!

As we pass the midpoint of the 19th year of the 21st century, folks in Carmel have little to celebrate.

Since Jan. 1, Carmel's debt has increased \$35.5 million - \$195,000 per day. Thirty million dollars of the increase came in the form of borrowing for the Hotel Carmichael and other non-essentials.

Meanwhile, flooded streets and basements caused by inadequate storm sewer infrastructure, cracked and crumbling sidewalks and pavement all over town, dangerous roundabouts of which 124 in place have not reduced accident rates one iota, and ample money borrowed without consent of the governed for such things as:

• A \$584,500 video wall on the Monon path, nearby a \$125,000 bocce ball court and two \$12,000 ping-

• A severely constricted Range Line Road from Carmel Drive to City Center Drive,

 And, disclosure of the dire need for \$73 million-plus for water and sewer capacity upgrades to serve adequately the high-density congestion being built between Range Line and the Monon.

After the slimiest mayoral campaign in recent history, the mayor and puppet council members seem destined for re-election by the 15-20 percent of eligible voters who actually show up and vote.

## State Parks Draw Hunt applications open Monday

#### The REPORTER

Hunters can apply online for State Parks Deer Management Draw Hunts beginning July 15 by visiting on.IN. gov/reservedhunt. Applications are only available online and close Aug. 26.

The first State Park hunt was held in 1993 as an effort to mitigate damage to vegetation and unique habitat by an overpopulation of white-tailed deer in Brown County State Park. Multiple parks have hosted deer management hunts annually since 1995.

The decision to start deer management at individual parks has been based on scientific vegetation monitoring. Decisions to continue deer management at individual parks are made annually using harvest data and consideration of occurrences of rare, threatened and endangered flora that could be affected by excessive browsing by deer.

Applicants must possess any valid license to take a deer in Indiana at the time of the application, excluding an apprentice license, and must be Indiana residents who will be 18 years of age by the date of the first hunt. Once

an application has been submitted, information cannot be changed. Applications must be completed by the application deadline.

Primary applicants can apply by themselves or with up to two secondary applicants (buddies). Primary applicants must apply with their buddies' information on their application in order for them to participate, including their buddies' deer license number(s) and date(s) of birth.

Buddies must still meet all age, residency and licensing requirements of the State Parks Deer Management Hunts. Each applicant may appear on only one application per hunt period.

Firearm hunts allow applicants to use any legal firearm to take deer on public land in Indiana. Archery hunts allow applications to use any legal archery equipment to take deer in Indiana, including crossbows.

Hunters will be selected through a randomized computer drawing. A link to view drawing results will be posted at on.IN.gov/reservedhunt by Aug. 30.



# **Enchanted Forest Swim Meet begins today**

The Noblesville Swim Club's annual Enchanted Forest Swim Meet begins today at the Forest Park Aquatic Center, and it looks to be the biggest meet ever in the event's history.

"We currently have 962 swimmers for the meet," said meet director Chris Berg-

Those swimmers will be divided up among 30 teams, as well as a few unattached swimmers. The majority of teams are from Indiana, with one notable exception: Pickering, a swim club from the Toronto area, will be making its way from Canada to the Hoosier state.

In addition to Noblesville, four other county swim clubs will have swimmers there, including Southeastern Swim Club, Fishers Area Swimming Tigers, Westfield Aquatics, and Power Aquatics, which represents the Hamilton Heights area.

"I think our swimmers, our athletes are pretty excited and I hope that the visiting teams are excited, too," said Berger. He and the other meet volunteers were busy Thursday evening setting up for the meet.

There will be two sessions today. Session 1 starts at noon and will feature the 400 individual medley and the 400 freestyle events. These races will be contested by age groups 13-14 and in the "Open" group, which usually means ages 15 and up. Gates open at 10 a.m.

Session 2 begins at 5 p.m. The 10 and Under and 11-12 age groups will race in the 200 free and the 200 IM; then the session concludes with the Open 1500 free-

Admission is \$6 for a single-day pass, or \$15 for the whole weekend. Children ages 12 and under are admitted free. Concession stands will be open for breakfast, lunch and snacks. Limited seating is available, so spectators are welcome to bring their own chairs.

The schedule for both Saturday and Sunday is as follows: The morning sessions start at 7 a.m., the afternoon sessions begin at 12:45 p.m., and the finals are set for 5:30 p.m. Gates open at 5:45 a.m. both days.

During the weekend, the 13-14 and Open age groups will swim preliminaries in the morning and finals in the evening. The 10 and Under and 11-12 group will swim in the afternoon, with the 11-12 swimmers competing in prelims during that time. The 11-12 group will then swim finals in the evening. All 10 and under events will be timed finals.

Saturday events include the 200 free, 200 butterfly, 100 backstroke, 50 free and 200 breaststroke, with the younger ages (10 and under and 11-12) competing in
