

Cook's bill to decouple teacher evaluations from test scores moves forward

A bill authored by State Rep. Tony Cook (R-Cicero) to permanently decouple teacher performance evaluations from student test scores passed out of the House Education Committee on Tuesday.

Cook said students' standardized exam results make up a significant portion of educators' annual performance evaluations. Cook, vice-chair of the House Education Committee and former school district superintendent and principal, said House Bill 1002 would allow school districts to determine how student exams are used when evaluating teachers.

"Local school administrators have a better grasp of educators' strengths in the classroom," Cook said. "Giving individual school districts the flexibility to decide how to use test scores in evaluations will provide a more complete and accurate picture of teachers' overall performance."

He said performance evaluations play a role in where an educator falls on the highly effective to ineffective scale. These assessments are a factor in deciding whether a teacher is eligible for a pay raise, which is why Cook said Indiana needs to take a hard look at moving away from using standardized test scores in evaluations.

"Teachers have a lot on the line when their performance is evaluated in the classroom," Cook said. "Our educators play a vital role in ensuring our young Hoosiers are set on a solid path to success."

Carmel's Sue Maki named an Indiana 'Recycling Rock Star'

The Indiana Recycling Coalition has named Sue Maki, the Manager of Environmental Initiatives and Education for Carmel Utilities, one of Indiana's top "Recycling Rock Stars" of 2020. Noblesville opens Logan Street Bridge, river overlook

The City of Noblesville and Hamilton County officials came together on Monday to celebrate the completion of the Logan Street Bridge renovation.

The joint project, which began construction in July 2018, widened the bridge over the White River to accommodate sidewalks on the north and south sides and constructed a new bridge deck. A 150-foot river overlook was added along the south side of the bridge.

"The overlook will provide a nice gathering spot for special events," said Steve Dillinger, president of the Hamilton County Commissioners. "And the new sidewalks will give pedestrians much safer access across the river, especially those walking between downtown, Riverwalk and Federal Hill Commons."

The Logan Street Bridge project, which includes new lighting to the railings, provides a more scenic and secure east-west connection from the Hamilton County Courthouse and Riverwalk Trail to Federal Hill Commons.

"The bridge rehabilitation provides pedestrians and bicyclists the opportunity to travel to and from our downtown without using streets while emphasizing the beauty of the White River and downtown Noblesville," said Nobles-

ville Mayor Chris Jensen. "Improving connectivity and extending downtown so the White River is an asset and not a barrier is key for Noblesville's next chapter."

The Logan Street Bridge project to-

taled \$4.3 million with the City of Noblesville contributing \$1.5 million toward the total cost.

Fishers touts regional law enforcement approach in triple arrest

A showing of officials, including Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness, the Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department (IMPD) Assistant Chief Chris Bailey and Fishers Chief of Police Ed Gebhart, gathered to appear before the media Monday afternoon, revealing how two arrests in Fishers, related to the shooting death of Fishers police dog Harlej, led to arrests in an Indianapolis crime spree.

Police say the three arrests were related to two deaths and impacted the lives of 18 people in the Indianapolis area. A firearm recovered after the arrests related to the shooting of K9 Harlej was used to link that weapon with other crimes.

Those three individuals were charged with the following:

- Richard Garrett: 23 counts, including two counts of murder, conspiracy to commit murder, six counts of criminal recklessness, pointing a firearm, seven counts of battery, aggravated battery, armed robbery, and four counts of carrying a handgun without a license.

- Delance Hatcher: 15 counts, including murder, conspiracy to commit murder, five counts of criminal recklessness, pointing a firearm, three counts of battery, armed robbery and three counts of carrying a handgun without a license.
- Rashaana Farrow: 15 counts, including murder, conspiracy to commit murder, four counts of criminal recklessness, five counts of battery and four counts of carrying a handgun without a license.

According to Gebhart, just since March of 2019, 84 firearms somehow related to criminal activity have been taken off the streets of Fishers by his officers, and 56 of those weapons have been checked out and found to have been used in another crime. Gebhart told *LarryInFishers* a majority of those firearms were seized in activity near 96th Street, although the enhanced commercial activity along 116th Street has shown an increase in weapons seizures there lately.

The main theme of the Monday news conference was collaboration among the many communities that make up the Indianapolis Metropolitan Area.

"Crime does not respect political boundaries," Fadness said. "It doesn't care whether you are a Republican or Democrat. All it cares about is causing chaos among the streets of our city as well as the streets of Indianapolis."

a rock star when it comes to promoting recycling in Carmel,” said Mayor Jim Brainard. “She collaborates with Carmel Clay Schools and their Green Teams, which is important for kids, and she has worked hard to expand our Holiday Light Recycling Program which gets people to think before they simply throw things away.”


Maki serves as President of the Hamilton County Solid Waste Board, which oversees the county’s Household Hazardous Waste Disposal Site and the community recycling compactors. She also serves on the Board as Environmental Chair for the Carmel International Arts Festival. Maki is responsible for bringing full scale recycling to the event for the first time in 2019. She also developed the Carmel Utilities Citizens Academy which includes a session focused exclusively on recycling and includes a tour of the Republic Services Material Recovery Facility.

Maki also spearheaded the collaboration of the Central Indiana Crime Stoppers with the Technology Recyclers to merge two previously separate events in Carmel to one joint semi-annual event. This shredding and electronic recycling event has now expanded to all five Central Indiana Crime Stoppers Shred-It Day locations each April and October.

“I am proud to have received this recognition but it could not have been possible without the support of dedicated people in our Carmel community,” said Maki. “Even though recycling is an important part of environmental stewardship, it is more important to reduce the amount of waste we generate in the first place.”

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Community Health accused of filing false Medicare claims

The U.S. Department of Justice has filed a complaint against Community Health Network.
The department says the health network submitted false Medicare claims, which violates the Stark Law.
The Stark Law, according to the department, “prohibits a hospital from billing Medicare for services

referred by a physician with whom the hospital has an improper financial relationship that does not meet any statutory or regulatory exception.”
The complaint says the health network had a number of employment relations with physicians who did not meet the Stark Law exception. Instead, these doctors were supposedly paid “well above fair market value”

and the doctors were paid a bonus after they referred a minimum number of patients to the hospital.
The complaint also says that Community Health Network then submitted claims to Medicare from these referrals knowing that those claims were ineligible for payment.
“Our goal at the U.S. Attorney’s Office is to serve the citizens and help

ensure safety in their communities,” said U.S. Attorney Josh Minkler for the Southern District of Indiana. “Hospitals are responsible for not only the health and well-being of their patients, but are also required to establish a compliance program in order to protect against improper payments, fraud and abuse as a condition of enrollment in the Medicare program.”

AG Curtis Hill: State Egg Board lacks authority to regulate online ‘farmers markets’ as retailers

The Indiana State Egg Board has no authority to regulate as retailers third-party websites that facilitate transactions between buyers and sellers of eggs, Attorney General Curtis Hill said in an **advisory opinion** issued Tuesday.
Hill issued the opinion following an inquiry from the Indiana State Egg Board regarding an online business called Market Wagon that enables customers to connect with local agricul-

tural producers.
Although Market Wagon maintains physical warehouses, all transactions for eggs between vendors and customers occur online, and Market Wagon itself never assumes ownership of the eggs. After a vendor fulfills the customer’s order, the vendor brings the order, sealed and labeled, to Market Wagon’s warehouse.

The vendor then places the order in a customer’s designated tote for customer pick-up or delivery.
State law requires a permit to sell eggs at a farmers market, Hill noted, but the law’s concept of a farmers market does not include the online platform currently offered by Market Wagon.
“The board’s statutory

and regulatory provisions were not designed to address e-commerce,” Hill said. “For the board to regulate in this area, there would likely need to be legislative changes to extend the board’s authority.”
Courts have held that websites that offer online marketplaces, such as Amazon and eBay, are not sellers of the products. The fact that a business such as Market Wagon collects money from the customer at the time of purchase does not make it a seller, Hill said, because its share of the money is collected as a fee for providing access to its online marketplace rather than for the eggs themselves.
The Indiana State Egg Board does retain regulatory oversight over the egg vendors who use Market Wagon’s services, Hill said.

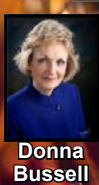

Golden Eagles get hard-fought win

NOBLESVILLE - There was one intangible that helped the Guerin Catholic girls basketball team to a win on Tuesday: Trust.

“Trusting themselves and then trusting each other,” said Golden Eagles coach Marc Quaranta. That simple act led Guerin Catholic past Shelbyville 45-42 at the Eagles Nest.



Cunningham The Golden Eagles led 9-8 after the first quarter, with four different players scoring. Kathryn Loso had three points, with Katie Koger, Aliyah Dorsey and Nicole Cunningham all scoring two.

Guerin extended its lead to 15-10 midway through the second period, after Koger hit a 3-pointer and Dorsey converted a traditional three-point play with 4:28 to go. But the Golden Bears took over after that, scoring 10 straight points to lead 20-15 at halftime.

“One of our biggest faults over these last few games is, we can’t stay on the floor,” said Quaranta. “We finished the entire first half the last four minutes with four of our starters in foul trouble on the bench. We had one starter in. And we had faith to play those girls, but in those long stretches, we had two freshmen on the floor. Their first real varsity action.”

The Golden Eagles got it together in the third quarter. They opened the period with a 9-0 run, which consisted of five points from Cunningham (including a 3) and four points from Loso. That put GC up 24-20.

The remainder of the quarter was back-and-forth. Amy Brenner hit a 3 late in the period to put Shelbyville back up 32-31, but Guerin Catholic finished the game with consecutive baskets, one from Olivia Labus and a layin at the buzzer from Cunningham.

The Golden Bears made one last push in the fourth quarter, with Kylee Edwards’ layin giving Shelbyville a 39-38
