Cook's bill decoupling teacher evaluations from test scores moves out of Ed. committee

A bill authored by State Rep. Tony Cook (R-Cicero) to permanently decouple teacher performance evaluations from student test scores passed out of the House Education Committee.

Cook said students' standardized exam results make up a significant portion of educators' annual performance evaluations. Cook, vice-chair of the House Education Committee and former school district superintendent and principal, said House Bill 1002 would allow school districts to determine how student exams are used when evaluating teachers.

"Local school administrators have a better grasp of educators' strengths in the classroom," Cook said. "Giving individual school

districts the flexibility to decide how to use test scores in evaluations will provide a more complete and accurate picture of teachers' overall performance."

He said performance evaluations play a role in where an educator falls on the highly effective to ineffective scale. These assessments are a factor in deciding whether a teacher is eligible for a pay raise, which is why Cook said Indiana needs to take a hard look at moving away from using standardized test scores in evaluations.

"Teachers have a lot on the line when their performance is evaluated in the classroom," Cook said. "Our educators play a vital role in ensuring our young Hoosiers are set on a solid path to success."

House to consider Schaibley's bill to allow Hamilton County an additional magistrate

The House Courts and Criminal Code Committee has approved State Rep. Donna Schaibley's (R-Carmel) legislation opening up the opportunity for Hamilton County judges to appoint an additional magistrate.

"It is amazing to see how much our county has grown over the past several years, but with an increasing population also comes a heavier workload for our judicial officers," Schaibley said. "The committee's vote is an encouraging step in the process

to ensure Hamilton County has the resources it needs."

According to Schaibley, the new magistrate would work with local circuit and superior courts to handle minor offenses or hold preliminary hearings for more serious crimes. She said the most recent data from The Weighted Caseload Measure shows the county has one judicial officer for every 29,432 people. County judges, commissioners, county councilors and the county prosecuting attorney support the legislation.

Sue Maki named ‘Recycling Rock Star’

The Indiana Recycling Coalition has named Sue Maki, the Manager of Environmental Initiatives and Education for Carmel Utilities, one of Indiana’s top “Recycling Rock Stars” of 2020. Maki was one of 30 chosen as part of the Coalition’s 30th anniversary. The Indiana Recycling Coalition is a statewide not-for-profit group that focuses on uniting Hoosiers in waste reduction, reuse, recycling and composting in order to preserve our communities for future generations.

The Recycling Rock Stars were chosen because

of their efforts to make a significant impact on the circular economy in Indiana. Maki manages the City of Carmel’s trash and curbside recycling program. Under her leadership the residential program has been extended to small businesses in the city to increase the overall level of recycling. In addition, curbside recycling is now available to all homes in Carmel, an accomplishment that earned Maki and the City of Carmel Utilities the 2014 Governor’s Award in Environmental Excellence in Recycling.

Maki serves as President of the Hamilton County Sol-

id Waste Board, which oversees the county’s Household Hazardous Waste Disposal Site and the community recycling compactors. She also serves on the Board as Environmental Chair for the Carmel International Arts Festival. Maki is responsible for bringing full scale recycling to the event for the first time in 2019. She also developed the Carmel Utilities Citizens Academy which includes a session focused exclusively on recycling and includes a

tour of the Republic Services Material Recovery Facility.

Maki also spearheaded the collaboration of the Central Indiana Crime Stoppers with the Technology Recyclers to merge two previously separate events in Carmel to one joint semi-annual event. This shredding and electronic recycling event has now expanded to all five Central Indiana Crime Stoppers Shred-It Day locations each April and October.

Fishers, Indy city officials tout regional law enforcement approach in triple arrest

A showing of officials, including Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness, the Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department (IMPD) Assistant Chief Chris Bailey and Fishers Chief of Police Ed Gebhart, gathered to appear before the media last Monday, revealing how two arrests in Fishers, related to the shooting death of Fishers police dog Harlej, led to arrests in an Indianapolis crime spree.

Police say the three ar-

rests were related to two deaths and impacted the lives of 18 people in the Indianapolis area. A firearm recovered after the arrests related to the shooting of K9 Harlej was used to link that weapon with other crimes.

Those three individuals were charged with the following:

- Richard Garrett: 23 counts, including two counts of murder, conspiracy to commit murder, six counts of criminal recklessness, pointing a firearm, seven counts of battery, aggravated battery, armed

robbery, and four counts of carrying a handgun without a license.

- Delance Hatcher: 15 counts, including murder, conspiracy to commit murder, five counts of criminal recklessness, pointing a firearm, three counts of battery, armed robbery and three counts of carrying a handgun without a license.
- Rashaana Farrow: 15 counts, including murder, conspiracy to commit murder, four counts of criminal recklessness, five counts of battery and four counts of carrying a handgun without

a license.

According to Gebhart, just since March of 2019, 84 firearms somehow related to criminal activity have been taken off the streets of Fishers by his officers, and 56 of those weapons have been checked out and found to have been used in another crime. Gebhart told *LarryInFishers* a majority of those firearms were seized in activity near 96th Street, although the enhanced commercial activity along 116th Street has shown an increase in weapons seizures there lately.

Noblesville Schools seeks solar solution to cut costs

Noblesville Schools invites the public to attend a public meeting regarding the district’s new solar energy project.

The meetings will occur at 7 p.m. on Tuesday, Jan. 21 at White River Elementary, 7 p.m. on Wednesday, Jan. 22 at Promise Road Elementary and at 7 p.m. on Tuesday, Jan. 28 at West Middle School.

In September, Noblesville Schools announced it was seeking a solar solution to significantly cut energy costs and support the environment, which also is expected to generate hundreds of thousands of dollars in savings a year.

With two million square feet under roof, 550 acres and more than 10,000 students to serve, energy is one of the district’s largest

costs after teachers and support staff. Almost \$1.5 million dollars a year are spent on energy expenses for lighting, heating and air, technology tools and more.

Associate Superintendent Dr. David Mundy, who oversees facility operations, is leading the solar effort for Noblesville Schools. Mundy was the first in the state to intro-

duce a solar program for an entire school district while serving previously as superintendent for Sheridan Community Schools.

The district has identified sections of land it already owns – near White River Elementary, Promise Road Elementary and the Hague Road Transportation Center – where solar panels are expected to be placed.

Strongbox Commercial is planning to add parking and create a Vasa Fitness Center. There are also plans to construct a strip mall, but no tenants have been lined up at this time.

Only one resident commented at the public hearing

asking what sorts of businesses will occupy the retail space. City Planning Director Tony Bagato responded that the usual types of tenants are likely, such as small restaurant locations.

The rezoning is needed because the Fishers City Council enacted a commercial overlay to ensure any development at former Marsh locations will be evaluated by city officials.

The city is waiving the normal fees in this project because Strongbox is co-operating with the city on technology to record vehicle license plates to assist law enforcement.

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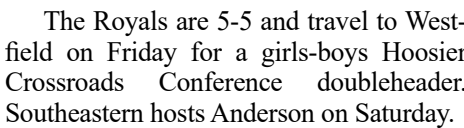
