Governor extends stay-at-home order

Holcomb declares major disaster for all 92 counties

Indiana Governor Eric Holcomb says he will order Hoosiers to hunker down for an additional two weeks. The announcement was made Friday afternoon during Gov. Holcomb's daily press conference.

Holcomb had previously ordered Hoosiers statewide to stay at home for a two-week period which was scheduled to end on April 7.

He also extended the public health emergency through May 3.

"President Trump has just approved my request to declare a major disaster declaration for all of our 92

counties here in the state of

As of Friday morning, more than 100 Hoosiers

have died from complications of COVID-19. The state reported its highest death count in 24 hours Friday.

Hamilton County has 220 reported positive cases of COVID-19 and four deaths.

"Today we unfortunately reached a milestone and surpassed 100 deaths from COVID-19 in our state," said Indiana health commissioner Dr. Kris Box. "As we reported this number this morning, 24 Hoosiers have died from COVID-19. That is the highest number of deaths reported to date in a 24-hour period."

Carmel nursing home residents now getting tested for COVID-19

Carmel Mayor Jim Brainard announced Friday that the City of Carmel will begin coordinating COVID-19 testing at local assisted living facilities and nursing homes through Aria Diagnostics, a local lab, which has the ability to test large numbers of people quickly.

The tests are the same tests authorized by the CDC and can be repeated on a periodic basis. Two days ago, the City of Carmel began testing, in conjunction with Aria, all first responders and now all city employees.

"After consulting with medical practitioners and area hospital administrators about how to best use expanded testing capacity, it was recommended that we test nursing homes and assisted living facility staff. If a resident has already been identified as having the virus, then all the residents in that facility should be tested," Brainard said. "We are

fortunate to have a local entrepreneur who has quickly converted his business to perform large numbers of these much-needed tests.

Brainard continued, "Our residents in nursing homes and assisted living homes are the most vulnerable citizens to COVID-19 and that is why we want to move

quickly to help coordinate testing of their staff and residents. If this is done quickly it will save lives. Our goal is to stop the spread of the virus so that we can avoid overwhelming our health care workers and hospitals and give the scientific community time to develop treatments and eventually a vaccine."

The City is not paying for these tests for the private facilities, but there should be reimbursement under various federal laws for testing that is done.

New program from Westfield Fire will allow for treatment of some COVID-19 patients in their homes

The Westfield Fire Department on Thursday launched its new Field Resource Paramedicine program. Field Resource Paramedics (FRPs) will respond 24/7 to high-level cardiac, trauma and mass casualty incidents, as well as low acuity fire and medical incidents. The specially trained FRPs will use SUVs equipped with advanced life support equipment.

"This program is critical now more than ever," said Mayor Andy Cook. "Our team has been working for months to design this program, hire and train our FRPs. I am proud and the community should be proud of the innovation and commitment of care of the Westfield Fire Department."

"With the COVID-19 pandemic, putting these specially-trained paramedics in the field couldn't come at a better time," said Westfield Fire Chief Marcus Reed. "The expanded role of these experienced clinicians will be the connection between the patients and physicians. Our goal is and has always been to send the right resource with the right staffing to the right incident."

Westfield Fire EMS Division Chief Patrick Hutchison explained that this new program will allow patients with mild COVID-19 symptoms to be treated at home, thus easing some pressure on local hospitals.

The FRP program is an extension of the mobile integrated health program that began last year. The program is meant to prevent and manage chronic illnesses.

"In most cases, 911 dispatchers after talking to callers, send an FRP for select incidents," said program leader Westfield Fire EMS Division Chief Patrick Hutchison. "In the case of patients with mild symptoms suggestive of COVID-19, the crew will

dispense medications to relieve symptoms and leave instructions for self-care. The team will follow-up by phone or house calls during the quarantine period. This allows the patient to be monitored at home. This helps support the state's stay-at-home order and relieves some pressure on local hospitals."

Westfield FRPs are also specially trained to respond to behavioral health emergencies. This new service will provide alternative

transportation options and link patients with appropriate care. The addition of the mental health service is organized clinically and administratively within the Westfield Fire Department and will support goals of the Wellbeing Coalition of Westfield. FRPs will also serve as the internal EMS resource, providing technical expertise in operational situations and on-station educational programming developed by the Westfield EMS Division.

Noblesville's remaining railroad beds to be removed from 8th Street

The City of Noblesville will begin removing the remaining railroad tracks from 8th Street on Monday, April 6. Removal of concrete bases and rails will take place on South 8th Street from the south side of Conner Street to the north side of Logan Street. A new strip of asphalt will replace the tracks.

Work will be performed during the day and is expected to take approximately five days, weather permitting. 8th Street between Conner and Logan streets will be closed during the project. Conner and Logan streets will remain open to traffic, but with restrictions between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m.

Noblesville Schools updates parents, staff following school closing

On Thursday, Governor Eric Holcomb extended school closures through the end of the 2019-20 school year. Following Holcomb's announcement, Noblesville Schools issued the following statement:

The Indiana Superintendent of Public Instruction announced today [Thursday] that all schools in the state will now be closed through the end of the 2019-2020 school year. This includes the cancellation of all school activities, events and field trips (Flat Rock, Washington D.C., etc.) Schools will follow up with more details regarding trip cancellations. Any events scheduled by outside organizations in our buildings or on grounds are also canceled.

While we knew this was a real possibility, and important for the health and safety of our community, it's still sad and difficult for many of us to hear. Students

may find this news upsetting so we encourage parents to provide emotional support, including utilizing our [counseling resources](#), if needed.

As a reminder, we will use eLearning days Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays in April following spring break. Mondays and Fridays will be teacher work days with no student lessons. We will provide information on the school schedule for May once it's finalized.

eLearning is not designed to be used for these long periods of time and we realize that student academic growth this spring may be different than it would be in a typical year. This is true for students throughout the country. Please be assured that we will adjust curriculum plans in the 2020-21 school year in order to identify and address any academic needs that may exist.

AG Hill: Hoosiers retain right to purchase guns and ammunition during public health emergency

Counties, municipalities and other political subdivisions have no authority under current law to restrict or prohibit the sale of firearms and/or ammunition during an emergency declaration, Attorney General Curtis Hill said Thursday.

Attorney General Hill issued an [advisory opinion](#) on this subject following inquiries from state Sens. Jim Buck, Aaron Freeman and Jim Tomes. Their interest in the matter arose following reports that an Indiana county asked gun stores to close their doors during the state's public health emergency resulting from the COVID-19 outbreak.

"Year after year, Indiana's lawmakers have recognized the paramount importance of Hoosiers' right to bear arms," Hill said. "We're talking about a liberty so cherished as to be enshrined in the Second Amendment of the U.S. Constitution."

Counties and municipalities have significant authority under Indiana's "home rule" statutes, Hill acknowledged, but they only retain power

sell or otherwise transfer firearms or ammunition," Hill said. Further, he noted that Governor Eric Holcomb has explicitly classified "firearm and ammunition suppliers" as essential businesses in one of his recent executive orders, in keeping with existing Indiana law.

"that is not constitutionally or statutorily denied."

"Disaster emergencies declared by the governor or local units of government do not abridge Hoosiers' freedoms to buy,

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CARES Act offers help for investors, small businesses

As we go through the coronavirus crisis, we are all, first and foremost, concerned about the health of our loved ones and communities. But the economic implications of the virus have also weighed heavily on our minds. However, if you're an investor or a business owner, you just got some help from Washington – and it could make a big difference, at least in the short term, for your financial future.

Specifically, the passage of the \$2 trillion Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act offers, among other provisions, the following:

Expanded unemployment benefits

The CARES Act provides \$250 billion for extended unemployment insurance, expands eligibility and provides workers with an additional \$600 per week for four months, in addition to what state programs pay. The package will also cover the self-employed, independent contractors and “gig economy”

workers. Obviously, if your employment has been affected, these benefits can be a lifeline. Furthermore, the benefits could help you avoid liquidating some long-term investments you've earmarked for retirement just to meet your daily cash flow needs.

Direct payments

Individuals will receive a one-time payment of up to \$1,200; this amount is reduced for incomes over \$75,000 and eliminated altogether at \$99,000. Joint filers will receive up to \$2,400, which will be reduced for incomes over \$150,000 and eliminated at \$198,000 for joint filers with no children. Plus, taxpayers with children will receive an extra \$500 for each dependent child under the age of 17. If you don't need this money for an immediate need, you might consider putting it into a low-risk, liquid account as part of an emergency fund.

No penalty on early withdrawals

Typically, you'd have to pay a 10 percent penalty on early withdrawals from IRAs, 401(k)s and similar

retirement accounts. Under the CARES Act, this penalty will be waived for individuals who qualify for COVID-19 relief and/or in plans that allow COVID-19 distributions. Withdrawals will still be taxable, but the taxes can be spread out over three years. Still, you might want to avoid taking early withdrawals, as you'll want to keep your retirement accounts intact as long as possible.

Suspension of required withdrawals

Once you turn 72, you'll be required to take withdrawals from your traditional IRA and 401(k). The CARES Act waives these required minimum distributions for 2020. If you're in this age group, but you don't need the money, you can let your retirement accounts continue growing on a tax-deferred basis.

Increase of retirement plan loan limit

Retirement plan investors who qualify for COVID-19 relief can now borrow up to \$100,000 from their accounts, up from \$50,000, provided their plan allows loans. We recommend that you explore other options, such as the direct payments, to

bridge the gap on current expenses and if you choose to take a plan loan work with your financial adviser to develop strategies to pay back these funds over time to reduce any long-term impact to your retirement goals.

Small-business loans

The CARES Act provides \$349 billion to help small businesses – those with fewer than 500 employees – retain workers and avoid closing up shop. A significant part of this small business relief is the Paycheck Protection Program. This initiative provides federally guaranteed loans to small businesses who maintain payroll during this emergency. Significantly, these loans may be forgiven if borrowers use the loans for payroll and other essential business expenses (such as mortgage interest, rent and utilities) and maintain their payroll during the crisis.

We'll be in a challenging economic environment for some time, but the CARES Act should give us a positive jolt – and brighten our outlook.

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

Sherwin-Williams donates thousands of masks, gloves

Indiana Attorney General Curtis Hill announced Friday that Sherwin-Williams is donating thousands of masks and gloves to Indiana as the state continues to battle the COVID-19 pandemic.

Four-year varsity player for Guerin Catholic . . .

Nicole Cunningham finishes solid career, commits to Benedictine University

As Nicole Cunningham went through high school as a Guerin Catholic basketball player, she got to see the different roles she could play for the Golden Eagles.

By her senior year, Cunningham was a leader for the Guerin team. She graduated with a fine career and earned a chance to play at the next level, as she committed to play at Benedictine University next fall.

“There were a lot of schools that I had to choose from, which I was really grateful for,” said Cunningham. But Benedictine, located about 30 minutes west of Chicago in Lisle, Ill., stood out from the beginning.

“I looked at a bunch of other options, but their coaching staff was really the one thing that stuck with me,” said Cunningham.

Benedictine is a Division III school that plays in the Northern Athletics Collegiate Conference (NACC). The league consists of schools around the Chicagoland area, plus several Wisconsin schools. The Benedictine Eagles made it to the NCAA tournament this past season.

“Watching what they did this season and how the team worked with the coaching staff was really something special,” said Cunningham. “I really would love to have that for the next four years.”

In other words, Cunningham is hoping to have the same experience in college that she did playing with Guerin Catholic. She was a varsity player all four years, steadily improving each season. Cunningham was the leading scorer both her junior (13.6 points per game) and senior (12.6 points per game) years, finishing with 861 career points.

“I made a lot of lifelong friends,” said Cunningham.

“Nicole was a great leader for our team both on and off the court,” said GC coach Marc Quaranta. “She did a great job mentoring our younger players and the future of our program is in a great position because of Nicole’s efforts.”

That is exactly the kind of impact Cunningham wanted to have for the

Golden Eagles team.

“I got to be a good leader and I know I impacted my teammates lives in a very positive way,” said Cunningham. She wanted to be the leader that incorporated everyone on the team, whether it was a freshman player or one of the five starters.

“We all have a role and that role is important,” she said.

Cunningham also played tennis for Guerin Catholic during her sophomore and junior years. She also is part of the Indy Magic AAU team, having played “for five or six years.”

In addition to her scoring, Cunningham was a consistent rebounder, averaging 3.8 in her junior season and 3.9 in her senior season. She made at least 40 3-pointers during each of those years.

“Nicole can be a difference-maker at the next level,” said Cunningham. “She can flat out score the ball. When she gets hot, teams are going to have to account for her shooting. She can put in three or four 3-pointers in a two-minute span and completely change the game.”

Cunningham said that among the lessons she has learned from basketball, leadership and teamwork “are definitely

the top two,” in addition to how to work with people, being coachable and time management.

“Being coachable is a life skill that is very unique and helps me adapt to all different kinds of situations,” said Cunningham.

Time management became important for her last year when she was also on the tennis team and playing AAU.

“I learned a lot of time management and what my priorities were and how to get everything into one day,” said Cunningham.

What a blessing! Yesterday was a difficult day, while I know the decision to cancel school and spring sports was the right decision, it does not make it any easier. Over the last two days we have conducted coaching interviews using Zoom. One of the questions that I asked was – why do you coach? Simple question but one that I think I should have to answer in this difficult time. Why am I an athletic director? I believe with all my heart in the value of education-based athletics and the life lessons that can be taught through participation in high school sports. I love that IHSAA Commissioner Bobby Cox always refers to high school sports as education-based athletics. I love to watch our athletes participate and compete, I love to watch athletes grow through wins and losses. I love to watch athletes reach their goals. I love to watch our school and

community rally behind the Royals. But most of all, I love to watch our coaches impact lives.

I believe that a coach is one of the most powerful terms in the English language. Besides Mom, Dad, Grandma and Grandpa, I strongly believe that a Coach and a Teacher can have the most influence on a young person’s life. At Hamilton Southeastern we are blessed to have great coaches who make a positive impact on our athletes. They understand that relationships are more important than wins and losses. They use high school athletics as a tool to help young people reach their potential.

A wise OLD coach (Rob Cutter) used to tell his teams and his staff...Two things you can control every day, your attitude and your effort. I am writing this today because I call tell you that my attitude yesterday afternoon was not very good. Today, I woke up and thought like I have
