Former county magistrate sees no jail time for felonies

Former Hamilton County Magistrate Will Greenaway was sentenced Wednesday after drafting a plea agreement approved by a Special Prosecutor and Special Judge assigned to the case.

In 2018, Greenaway was arrested for Possession of Methamphetamine, Resisting Law Enforcement and Obstruction of Justice, all Level 6 felonies, following a fourmonth long multi-agency drug investigation.

According to police reports the arrest occurred in the Noblesville Goodwill store parking lot after an arranged drug transaction between Greenaway and a police informant.

Police said during the arrest Greenaway swallowed the bag of drugs and bit a police

County Superior Court 5 Judge David Najjar recused himself from the case and assigned Tipton County Judge Thomas Lett as Special Judge and Howard County Prosecutor Mark Mc-Cann as Special Prosecutor.

The sentences under Counts 1 and 2 are ordered to run concurrently.

But once I started intermittent fasting, I said I'd never be able to exercise without

HSE keeps 50/50 attendance for grades 5-12

The Hamilton Southeastern (HSE) school board did not receive a recommendation from school administrators to move toward a 100 percent in-person classroom experience for students in grades 5-12 at the Wednesday night board meeting, so in classroom and 50 percent virtual.

"I can't say I won't be bringing it to you soon, but it won't be tonight," Super-Wednesday concerning a possible plan to bring grades 5-12 back to in-person classes

full-time. Bourff said the Fishers Health Department has recently lowered the COVID-19 community risk rating to Level 2, but it does call for the hybrid system now underway in grades 5-12. Bourff also cited the challenges of cohorting in those grade levels.

Dr. Bourff told the board those grade levels will remain at 50 percent there may be an extension of the virtual learning option into next semester if no COVID vaccine is available.

The governor has announced that Indiintendent Allen Bourff told board members ana will enter Stage 5 in a few days, which allows gatherings of more than 250 people. That may impact athletic participation and



the number of fans allowed at events.

Administrators told the board that out of 289 substitute teachers, 56 (or 19 percent) have been willing to substitute teach so far this school year. The number of permanent substitutes is now down to 31.

Janet Chandler, long-time president of the Hamilton Southeastern Education Association, cited a survey just conducted with elementary teachers that shows 99 percent are feeling stressed with everything they







In 2002, 18 years ago, Senator Tom Daschle raised a similar resolution with unanimous support from the Senate. It passed on the floor uneventfully, without amendment.

Today, this body can re-affirm our support for the Pledge of Allegiance.

I rise today, too, to honor a Hoosier who understood the innate value of the Pledge of Allegiance to civic education.

In 1969, Red Skelton, the American comedian and entertainer who was well-known for his program on CBS, The Red Skelton Hour, wrote a speech on the importance of the Pledge of Allegiance.

Reflecting on his time in Vincennes, Indiana, he spoke about the value instilled by one of his high school teachers in the words of the Pledge of Allegiance.

After the performance of the speech, CBS received

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200,000 requests for copies. The speech would go single by Columbia Records and performed at the White House for President Richard Nixon.



Indiana Sports Corp proposes NCAA basketball bubble at Convention Center

With more than \$100 million on the line, sports leaders have laid out plans for life in a basketball bubble in downtown Indianapolis during the coronavirus pan-

"We're the host of the 2021 (NCAA) Men's Final Four," said Indiana Sports Corp President Ryan Vaughn. "It's really important to us, it's really important to this community that college basketball get started off on the right foot."

The Indiana Sports Corp has been talking for months with conferences including the Big Ten about their needs.

In many ways, the proposal is modeled like the NBA bubble in Orlando. In this case, it's about the 4,700 hotel rooms

connected to the Indiana Convention protected from the outside world. Center, which could hold more than 20 basketball courts inside.

"It's the perfect place for a bubble-type operation or a controlled environment," Vaughn said.

With the announcement the NCAA season will begin Nov. 25, decisions for teams at all levels across the country need to be made like will they play at all, will they play teams outside the conference, where will they play and if it will be in

"As with everything in this pandemic, all options are on the table," Vaughn said. The bubble is one of them.

It's an attempt to add an extra layer of safety with testing before and again as teams arrive, with 24/7 security to keep it

"You never need to leave," Vaughn said. "We've got all your food. We'll take care of the medical. You've got a place to practice. You've got a place to play, all within a very secured environ-

Vaughn said the model is scalable, meaning it can getting bigger or smaller as the need arises. Four windows for games are already listed, including a 38day window the day the season begins.

"We feel very good we can host large-scale tournaments or just 4-8 team, round play," Vaughn said.

For a city which has lost so many big events because of coronavirus already, it's too early to talk about the Final Four. Vaughn said discussions are going on as if it will happen like every other year.

"We hope that's the case but certainly testing out these protocols along the way would only be helpful should we arrive at some circumstance like that in the future."

The cost per team is estimated at \$90,000, which is basically all-inclusive price. But the figure could shrink for colleges and universities who want to provide their own meals or testing.

Vaughn said the goal for the Indiana Sports Corp is just to break even on this venture.

He believes it will still take a few more weeks before any announcement of teams or conferences moving forward with this bubble.
