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Continuance granted on Beaver's proposed gravel pit

The REPORTER

The City of Noblesville announced last Thursday that Chris Beaver has requested a continuance of his Noblesville Plan Commission application that would potentially move forward a controversial proposed gravel pit near Potter's Bridge.

According to city officials, the project was to be heard by the Noblesville Plan Commission on Monday, Oct. 19. It has now been scheduled for the Nov. 16 meeting.

Once gravel operations are complete, Beaver has pledged to give the property to the county parks department to allow for the expansion of Potters Bridge Park to the north.

Last month, the Hamilton County Parks Department announced that if the project was approved, expansion would happen in two phases.

Phase 1 entails a 10-acre land donation by Beaver Materials.

Phase 2 would be an additional 40-acre land donation by Beaver Materials. Phase 2 would include the creation of a 30-acre lake by Beaver Materials for the use of recreational activities provided by the Hamilton County Parks Department.

The project has been adamantly opposed by a group of Noblesville citizens known as "Don't Leave It To Beaver."

Due to the continuance, no public comment period regarding the application will be held at the Oct. 19 Plan Commission meeting. All written comments and petitions received to this point will be included with the information at the Nov. 16 Plan Commission meeting.

Judge: Absentee ballots must be received by noon on Election Day

Hamilton County party chiefs respond to court's decision

Indiana Attorney General Curtis Hill last Tuesday applauded a federal appellate court's summary decision reversing a district court injunction that would have required Indiana election officials to count mailed absentee ballots received after the statutory deadline.

Indiana law says officials may count only those absentee ballots received by noon on Election Day. In response to a lawsuit from Common Cause Indiana; however, a judge for the U.S. District Court for the Southern District of Indiana said that law is unconstitutional for the upcoming election because the COVID-19 pandemic has created a risk that ballots mailed close to Election Day will not be received on time. The judge issued an injunction requiring the state to count absentee ballots received by 10 days after Election Day.

In response to the State's motion to stay the injunction, the U.S. Court of Appeals for the 7th Circuit summarily reversed that ruling on Tuesday. The appel-

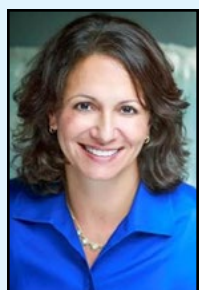
"I am deeply concerned that so many efforts are being expended to limit voting in this state. You have to ask why is the current Secretary of State and Governor so afraid of the public and their ability to vote? Why does Indiana have short voting hours, only excused absentee ballots, and now demanding mail-in ballots must be in the hands of the election office by noon? It seems that they are in fear of a large voter turnout that will result in a possible change on who gets elected, so let's do everything we can to limit voting."

"I respect the decision of the court. Voters have had sufficient time to request a ballot, and continue to be able to do so by Oct. 22. Over 24,000 absentee ballots that were sent out by Hamilton County election officials in the first mailing on Sept. 14 and continued high volumes of absentee requests shows that voters are aware of their right to request an absentee ballot, and we recommend that voters fill out and return the ballots as soon as possible."

late court wrote that while the COVID-19 pandemic has "caused great loss," it is "not a good reason for the federal judiciary to assume tasks that belong to politically responsible officials."

"People who worry that mail will be

delayed during the pandemic can protect themselves by using early in-person voting or posting their ballots early," the court wrote in its ruling.

Request for new Hamilton County court moves forward

A push to bring a new court to Hamilton County took a step forward last Friday, according to State Reps. Donna Schaibley (R-Carmel) and Jerry Torr (R-Carmel).

The Interim Study Committee on the Courts and Judiciary, chaired by Torr, recommended to the Indiana General Assembly to allow Hamilton County to create a new court. Schaibley said the court is needed because of the population growth in the past 10 years. Currently, Hamilton County is the fourth most-populous county in the state and projected to be Indiana's second-largest county by 2050.

"Rapid growth has proven to be

HSE school board presented with \$259.25M budget

Hamilton Southeastern (HSE) school board members were recently presented with a 2021 spending plan totaling \$259.25 million, a 3.37 percent increase over the 2020 budget.

Chief Financial Officer Cecilie Nunn told the board the student population number is down about 400 this school year, mostly at the kindergarten level. Nunn attributes the decline to COVID.

Since state funding is largely tied to the number of students enrolled, there will be a deficit in the education fund provided by the state. Nunn says a budget study

Noblesville Council hears request for zoning change

290 luxury apartments planned for former Marsh Supermarket

Last Tuesday, the Noblesville Common Council heard a request for a zoning change of 7.5 acres located at 17901 River Road, the site of the former Marsh supermarket. The change in zoning would be the next step in a planned apartment building on Noblesville’s west side.

According to Noblesville Development

Services Manager Joyceann Yelton, Cityscape Development plans to build 290 luxury apartments on the site.

Yelton said the development will include four-story apartment buildings with mostly one- and two-bedroom apartments, but may also include some studio apartments. Amenities will include an inground pool, co-working space, conference space,

gather spaces, bike room, massage room and outdoor living space with grills.

The council took no action on the request at the Tuesday meeting. Representatives for Cityscape say once the zoning change is approved, demolition of the old Marsh building will begin in early 2021 and construction on the apartments should be completed within 24 months.

beneficial for our area in multiple ways, but it’s also put a strain on our courts as they manage increased workloads and cases,” Schaibley said. “In order to continue serving our community, our judicial system must be equipped to keep matters moving in a timely fashion.”

Torr said Hamilton County has one judicial officer for every 33,801 people in Hamilton County. That’s compared to one judicial officer for 9,897 Hoosiers in Marion County.

“The committee’s recommendation is a step forward for Ham-

ilton County,” Torr said. “As more people choose to move their family here or locate their business in our area, we must ensure we are keeping up with growing demands on our legal system.”

Based off the interim committee’s recommendation, Schaibley expects to author legislation during the 2021 legislative session, which begins in January. If approved by the General Assembly, the judge for this court would stand for election in 2022 and take the bench on Jan. 1, 2023.

Hill praised the ruling, and has argued for weeks now that changes to Indiana's election system this close to Election Day would do more harm than good.

“Our system provides adequate opportunity for all Hoosiers to cast a ballot by Election Day, and the absentee ballot-receipt deadline as written by the Indiana General Assembly helps most races to be called on Election Day, and not days or weeks after,” Hill said. “The U.S. Supreme Court has said repeatedly that courts should not issue election-related injunctions at the eleventh hour, and we

are pleased that the court of appeals has implemented that directive.”

In addition to Election Day voting, Hoosiers may cast a ballot at various early-voting locations for 28 days prior to Election Day. Indiana also permits mail-in absentee voting in 12 different circumstances, including when voters are disabled or elderly, or when voters expect to be away from their home counties on Election Day.

task force would be formed, essentially the same group used in previous years to close budget deficits. Nunn did not indicate how large she expects the shortfall in the education fund to be.

The school district will receive more than \$22 million in 2021 from a referendum, passed in 2016 and enacted in 2017, that will expire at the end of calendar year 2023. Nunn says the board will need to begin the process of deciding whether to ask the voters to renew the current referendum rate or ask for another amount. The referendum money goes to pay staff salaries and benefits.

The 2021 school proper-

ty tax rate is projected to decline one-half of 1 percent compared to 2020, at 1.245 percent. The drop is due to an increase in property valuations, according to Nunn.

The board was reminded that the state legislature was to be enacting a two-year state budget in the 2021 session and the money for education will not likely be known until April next year.

No one chose to speak at the budget public hearing, as no one spoke at the public hearings for two bonds funding renovation and maintenance projects for school buildings.

The board is slated to enact the 2021 budget at the Oct. 28 meeting.

Westfield finishes unbeaten HCC season

The Westfield football team was already the Hoosier Crossroads Conference champion, but the Shamrocks wanted a little more than that.

Last Friday, Westfield became an undefeated HCC champion. The Shamrocks sailed past Franklin Central 35-0 at Riverview Health Stadium to complete their perfect conference season at 7-0.

Westfield won the HCC back in 2013, but had to share the title with Fishers. This year, the ‘Rocks stand alone. Coach Jake Gilbert said he was “just thrilled for our senior and our whole team” in winning the conference.

“I was just so happy with how sharp our guys were at the start of the game,” said Gilbert. “I was really proud that our guys were ready to play. We got off to a good start and that carried us through. Great maturity by our seniors.”

Westfield added two more touchdowns in the second quarter, both on one-yard runs. Jack Pfeiffer scored at the 10:29 mark of the period, then Micah Hauser punched into the end zone with 3:46 left. Sean Sullivan made all five extra-point kicks.

The Shamrocks totaled 364 yards of offense, including 211 yards through the air. Webster went 7-for-9 for 126 yards. Piening had four receptions. Hauser led the ground game with 63 yards rushing.

David Frey had seven tackles on defense, with Magwire Graybill making six stops. Seth Poriah had two tackles for a loss.

“To get a shutout in our conference is an amazing feat in and of itself,” said Gilbert. “I thought our D-line played hard.”

Westfield finished the regular season 8-1 and is off until Oct. 30, when it plays at Noblesville in the semi-finals of Sectional 4.

Carmel’s only passing touchdown of the night came at the 9:13 mark of the second quarter, when Osborne threw an 18-yard pass to Colton Parker, who made a perfect catch in the end zone. Then, midway through the second period, Osborne scored his fourth touchdown of the game on a four-yard run.

The ‘Hounds cruised through the second half, the entirety of which was played with a running clock. Carmel got one more score, this one in the fourth quarter when Hall dashed in from 11 yards.

The Greyhounds defense didn’t allow LC past midfield during the entire first half, and wound up holding the Bears to minus 8 yards rushing in the game.

“I thought that we were very focused,” said Hebert. “We had a couple guys back. Luke Conley

"This is the first time we've ever repeated as sectional champions," said Southeastern coach Jason Young. "That's a big deal."

Young praised his senior class and the leadership it showed. That characteristic came through after the Royals dropped a marathon second set, in which both teams held multiple set points. Young said things could easily go "the wrong way" for his team, but said his players "responded the right way and just threw down the throttle, and that was big."

Southeastern controlled the first set, at one point leading 13-5 midway through the set. The Tigers made a run to get within 16-11, but the Royals used their own run of five straight points to jump ahead 21-11. Delaney Garner served two aces and Lauren Harden hit a kill during that time.

The second set was much tighter. After a close early part of the set, Fishers seemed to have control by the middle stages, at one point leading 17-11. Ava Vickers helped out with a kill, solo block and block assists, while Jada Allen and Camryn Haworth both hit kills as well.

Southeastern came back to tie the set at 21-21; that run included aces by Taylor Lauri and Garner. Allen hit a kill to set up two set points for the Tigers at 24-22, but Harden erased those with a kill and an ace.

Fishers would hold seven set points over the next few minutes, while the Royals had two set points. Both teams stepped up with quality hitting during the extended part of the set. For example, with her team down 26-25, the Tigers' Emily Waldrop nailed back-to-back kills to get Fishers up 27-26. The back and forth continued from there until, on the Tigers' seventh set point, Allen smashed a kill to give Fishers the second set.

The Royals had to respond, and did so in a big way. Southeastern roared out to an 18-3

lead in the third set. Lovie Wallace helped out with two kills during the early part of the run. The Royals also got their service going, which Young believes was key.

"We were not serving with enough service pressure, and losing that second set, I think the sense of urgency went up tremendously," said Young. "When we lost that second set, I think we dialed it in and decided that we were going to be a little bit different, and the serving game improved dramatically."

The big lead carried Southeastern through, as it was able to weather some Fishers resistance at the end of the set. Carly Mills, the Royals' Indiana University-bound libero, said that after the second set, the team put it in the past.

"We want to win this, we got to look forward," said Mills. "We can't think about, 'Oh, we just lost a really close game.' We gave it our all. We fought for that set and we lost. So, now we have the next one and we got to just finish it right then and right there."

The Tigers continued to play it close in the fourth set, staying within 7-6 after Waldrop hit a kill. But the Royals took over after that, winning eight of the next nine points to build a 15-7 lead. Garner was responsible for the first three points of the run, hitting a kill and then making two blocks. The Tigers stayed within 17-10 late in the set, but Southeastern finished the match in style, winning eight of the next 10 points.

Wallace hit two kills as part of the run, while Harden smacked another ace. Emily Weber assisted on back-to-back blocks, teaming with Wallace for one and Garner for another. Garner got the last hit of the game, as she made the winning kill on match point.

Garner totaled 17 kills for the Royals, with Wallace hitting 11. Avery Hobson and Harden both spiked 10 kills each. Weber handed out 19 assists while Olivia Phillips dished out 16. Garner and Harden both served three aces.

Wallace finished the game with five block assists. Carly Mills collected 26 digs, with Harden and Emi Robinson each getting 10.

Waldrop and Allen both hit 14 kills for the Tigers against HSE. Haworth dished out 39 assists. On defense, Samantha Perdue made 13 digs, while Ava Vickers totaled three blocks. After the match, Fishers coach Steven Peek praised his seniors, who were true lead-

ers for the team.

"We have eight fantastic seniors who have forever raised the bar in this program," said Tigers. Waldrop, Allen, Haworth and Mikayla Christiansen were among the seniors that played for Fishers this season and helped it to a 19-8 record. Other seniors were Shelby Settles, Olivia Lux, Jill Snyder and Grace Dunnuck.

In semi-final matches, Fishers beat Zionsville 25-23, 25-21, 25-21. Waldrop smacked 22 kills in that match, followed by Allen with 16. Haworth handed out 45 assists and had 12 digs; Perdue collected 15 digs. Vickers made six blocks, and Haworth and Christian-

sen had three each.

Meanwhile, HSE beat Westfield 25-22, 25-16, 25-21. Harden hit 10 kills in that match. Mills served five aces and collected 11 digs. Robinson had 14 digs and Taylor Lauri had 12 digs. Garner had five blocks. Weber handed out 16 assists and Phillips dished out 13.

Carmel boys tennis makes it a five-peat at state

INDIANAPOLIS - Another season, another state championship for the Carmel boys tennis team.

It may seem a little routine for the Greyhounds to win every year, but there was nothing routine about the occasion, or the way that Carmel won its fifth consecutive state title last Saturday. The 'Hounds held off their great rival North Central 3-2 at the Panthers' home base, the Barbara Wynne Tennis Center – a place where North Central has been making its own history for decades.

Now the Greyhounds have their own piece of history as well. Carmel's sensational run of five state titles matches the Panthers' five in a row that they won between 1982 and 1986. Moreover, the Greyhounds completed their fifth consecutive undefeated season by going 23-0 this year. Over the past five years, Carmel's record is an astonishing 106-0.

"This is a goal that we had at the beginning of the year," said Greyhounds coach Bryan Hanan. "We knew it was going to tie a state record. We don't want to let other guys that played before and been a part of this down. Talked to one today and he's like 'Keep it going.' We wanted this. We know it's only been done once in state history."

North Central made Carmel work to get that five-peat. The Greyhounds quickly went up 2-0 in the final by sweeping both doubles matches. The No. 1 team of junior Srisanth Malpeddi and senior Jones McNamar won 6-1, 6-0 and No. 2 team of seniors Ethan Eckhart and Corbin King were victorious 6-2, 6-1.

The singles matches were tense. The Panthers got their first point at No. 3 singles, when Maurquis Willingham beat Jack Jentz 6-2, 6-4 in a battle of sophomores. Meanwhile, the No. 2 match between Carmel junior Eli Mercer and NC freshman Alex Antono-

In doubles, Malpeddi and McNamara cruised to a 6-2, 6-1 victory and Eckhart and King were 6-0, 6-1 winners.

In last Friday's quarter-finals, Carmel swept past Homestead 5-0. Fletcher scored a 6-0, 6-0 shutout at No. 1 singles, with Mercer winning 6-2, 6-0 and Jentz getting a 6-0, 6-1 victory. Malpeddi and McNamar won 6-4, 6-2 at No. 1 doubles, while Eckhart and King sailed to a 6-2, 6-1 win.

Malpeddi and McNamar were undefeated for the tournament, which means they will advance to next weekend's individual state doubles tournament. The duo will receive the top seed in the tournament due to their being from the state championship team.
