



Westfield Fire Department unveils baby box at Station 83

The Westfield Fire Department and Safe Haven Baby Boxes announced last Friday the launch of a new baby box location at Fire Station No. 83, 17944 Grassy Branch Road. This location is the 51st Safe Haven Baby Box in the country and is now available to the public.

“I am pleased to see Westfield have a Safe Haven Baby Box,” said Westfield Mayor Andy Cook. “While I hope it is never used, it is important that we have this available for a parent in crisis. Every baby deserves a chance and this program is one way to make that possible.”

“We are always looking for innovative ways to serve our community,” said Westfield Fire Chief Marcus Reed. “Adding a Safe Haven Baby Box to one of our stations is just another way we can proactively protect our most vulnerable.”

Safe Haven Baby Boxes cost roughly \$15,000 to install and are equipped with alarm systems to immediately notify staff at the fire station. The boxes also have heating and cooling features and are made to lock as soon as the baby is placed in-

side. Several local businesses and community members donated funds to support this Westfield Safe Haven Baby Box location.

Indiana is one of five states with updated Safe Haven Laws to include additional infant surrender options, such as the Safe Haven Baby Box. To view all the Safe Haven Baby Box locations, visit shbb.org/locations.

About Safe Haven Baby Boxes

The mission of Safe Haven Baby Boxes is to end infant abandonment by raising awareness of the Safe Haven Law by providing resources for safe and legal infant surrender. The organization staffs a 24-hour anonymous hotline (1-866-99-BABY-1) for mothers in crisis. In Indiana, nine babies have been surrendered inside Safe Haven Baby Boxes since the first box was installed in 2016.

Mayors issue warnings on Thanksgiving gatherings

The mayors of Hamilton County’s two largest cities have recently issued statements regarding in-home gatherings for the upcoming Thanksgiving holiday.

Carmel Mayor Jim Brainard, in a recent press release, said, “It is very tempting with Thanksgiving just around the corner to think that celebrating together with family or a small group of friends is harmless. Our data shows [sic] that the opposite is true. It is the in-home gatherings that are causing the increase in COVID cases and deaths.”

Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness stated in a recent social media video, “We’ve been less cautious. We’ve been visiting family members, inviting friends to our homes and getting together for weddings and birthday parties. Because of these actions we are facing an even greater risk of COVID-19 than we were six months ago. We need to start having hard conversations about our holiday plans this year.”

Several health officials have agreed that small in-home gatherings have been linked to the surge in COVID-19 cases.

Last month, the Chief Physician Executive at Community Health Network, Dr. Ram Yeleti, issued a statement encouraging Hoosiers to refrain from gathering with extended family for the Thanksgiving holiday.

Fishers Health Department calls for renewed social gathering restrictions

Hamilton Southeastern Schools will be able to continue their athletic and other extra-curricular programs after action last Wednesday by the Fishers Health Department.

The games and activities can go on, but the people at the events will be limited to one parent, support staff and players. Teams must submit a COVID-19 mitigation plan to the Fishers Health Department for approval.

The Fishers Health Department had originally recommended that all school extra-curricular activities be canceled, but decided instead to go with the state’s guidance for counties in the red risk category, even though Hamilton County is a notch below that with an orange designation.

The department voted to keep the original recommendation intact for social gatherings, with a limit of 10 people inside and 25 people outside. Health De-

partment approval is required for gatherings of more than 25 people.

Restaurants in Fishers will be limited to eight customers per table with six feet of separation between groups. There will be no bar seating and no more than two people waiting in the lobby at one time.

Throughout Fishers, businesses generally must post signs telling customers that masks are required. The Fishers Health Department says it will rely on the public to report violations. The city-wide mask mandate has been extended by 30 days.

Fishers City Attorney Chris Griesl will work with the Health Department to write the public health order, which should be effective Wednesday, Nov. 18. The department will review the public health order in late November or early December.

Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness said the capacity for the free COVID-19 testing program will be expanded by 100 per day.

Commissioners react to new statewide restrictions

Governor Eric Holcomb announced new pandemic restrictions at a news conference last Wednesday. Hamilton County Commissioners Christine Altman, Steve Dillinger and Mark Heirbrandt praised the Governor’s mandate, but warned that additional restrictions may be necessary if Hamilton County cannot reverse the current trajectory of its COVID-19 cases.

“Things have gotten serious. We’re concerned,” Heirbrandt said. “People have really let their guards down in recent months. We need everyone to take more personal responsibility for their actions and follow the course set by our county and state health departments.”

The commissioners met last Monday with the mayors of Carmel, Fishers, Noblesville and Westfield to get a better handle on what is happening in their communities and what they can do together to help combat the spread of the virus.

In a video published on YouTube, Heir-

brandt spoke about the rapid spread of COVID-19 in Hamilton County. He addressed increased hospitalization, the possibility of a county shutdown and contact tracing that indicates primary causes for the spread of COVID-19 in the county. Visit tinyurl.com/y2sck06s to view the video.

“It is not our intention to shut things down again,” Heirbrandt said. “In fact, I hope we don’t get to that point; but with the way the numbers are rising, we may have to make some tough choices. We all need to double down on our efforts to reverse the trends we’re seeing.”

According to Heirbrandt, contact tracing being done shows that people have become more relaxed and not taking restrictions seriously. “They are not wearing masks and it [the virus spread] is coming from a lot of social gatherings. It is not from our schools.”

Heirbrandt was joined in the video by

Hamilton County Health Department Emergency Preparedness Coordinator Christian Walker. Walker confirmed that local data indicates much of the spread locally is coming from private gatherings.

Walker talked about the upcoming Thanksgiving holiday, saying, “We highly recommend that we hold virtual gatherings this year with family members. We are going to have to make some hard choices to get through this that much faster.”

“We are trying to convey to the public how important this is. It is very serious. These numbers are rising and we are very concerned. We are trying to do the best we can to help the citizens of Hamilton County,” Heirbrandt concluded.

Governor Holcomb’s new restrictions will go into effect on Sunday, Nov. 15. They are based on the state’s color-coded map showing viral spread. Hamilton

County currently falls under orange, which means it is experiencing moderate to high spread. Under the new orders, counties in orange must:

- Limit social gatherings to no more than 50 people.
- Limit attendance at winter indoor K-12 extracurricular and cocurricular events to 25 percent capacity.
- Reduce capacity in common areas and break rooms.
- Limit attendance to community recreational sports leagues and tournaments to participants, required personnel, and parents/guardians.
- Require a safety plan be submitted to the local health department for special, seasonal, or commercial events for more than 50 people.

Governor Holcomb says the state will make \$20 million available to local governments to support virus mitigation efforts. Hamilton County is making plans to secure some of that funding.

A recent surge in COVID-19 cases in Hamilton County, partnered with the upcoming holiday season, has given many cause for concern. The County Health Department is providing new guidance on holiday-specific actions families can take to help mitigate the virus’ spread.
C – CELEBRATE VIRTUALLY. Try using Skype, Zoom, or some other video chat platform for a family toast or virtual dessert.
L – LIMIT TRAVEL. Stay close to home. Travel increases the chance of getting and spreading the virus that causes COVID-19. Staying home is the best way to protect yourself and others.
A – AVOID IN-HOME GATHERINGS. Contact tracers have determined private parties and in-home gatherings are the leading cause of transmission. Visit with people outside your immediate family in public spaces.
S – SPEAK TO CONTACT TRACERS. Only a third of Hamilton County residents who test positive for COVID-19 are answering the call from contact tracers. Please answer the phone so they can monitor hotspots and notify those who may be at risk for contracting the virus.
S – STAY HOME. Stay home if you are sick or waiting for the results of a COVID-19 test.

City officials cut ribbon on new Westfield Boulevard extension

Last Tuesday, Westfield Mayor Andy Cook joined city and state leaders to open the new Westfield Boulevard.
The new road runs 0.65 miles between 169th Street and Park Street and is projected to come in slightly under the original estimated cost of \$4.8 million. What was previously known as Poplar Street from State Road 32 to Park Street has been renamed Westfield Boulevard.
This project has added a new trail connection along 169th Street and north along Westfield Boulevard to give pedestrians direct access to Grand Junction Plaza and Park Street, as well as extensions to the Midland Trail from Mill Street to Westfield Boulevard and the Monon-Midland Loop along David Brown Drive from Union Street to U.S. 31.

The new road runs 0.65 miles between 169th Street and Park Street and is projected to come in slightly under the original estimated cost of \$4.8 million.
The construction was a federal exchange project with the city paying 10 percent of construction costs and the state covering the remaining 90 percent. Future plans call for the road to extend further south and connect with Westfield Boulevard at 161st Street.

HSE students in grades 7-12 going all-virtual until Christmas break

Junior high and high school students in Hamilton Southeastern (HSE) Schools will be on an all-virtual class schedule at least through Dec. 18, when Christmas Break begins the next day. Grades K-4 (including preschool) will remain in-person, while grades 5 and 6 will stay on a hybrid schedule with 50 percent of the time in the classroom.

The vote by the school board was unanimous. It is a reaction to an increase in COVID-19 positive cases in the Fishers area and Hamilton County.
Superintendent Allen Bourff said only 4.1 percent of the positive cases within the school district came from school activities. According to Bourff, there have been 245 positive cases in the school system and 2,263 instances of close contacts requiring quarantine.

Enrollment down, HSE Schools faces \$5M deficit

Hamilton Southeastern (HSE) Schools took a hit in this school year’s enrollment, losing about 400 students compared to the previous year. District Chief Financial Officer Cecilie Nunn told the school board last Wednesday that school systems throughout the state are seeing the same reductions in student population, likely related to the novel coronavirus.

The state funds local school corporations based on the number of students enrolled, so with fewer students, HSE Schools will be facing a \$5 million budget deficit. In an effort to deal with this, administrators are forming a task force to make recommendations for the board.
The task force will look for actions to reduce the funding deficit for the 2021-2022 school year. The guiding principles for the group are to look at all programs and how they are delivered, look at innovative ways to deliver the programs and conduct any required staff reduction in force through attrition.
The group is scheduled to have its report to the school superintendent by late February, and the board will see the recommendations in early March 2021, with action projected by the end of March.

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Another 6A football first for Westfield . . .

Shamrocks cruise to regional title

WESTFIELD - For the first time in what seemed like a long time, the Westfield football team had to deal with a little bit of adversity last Friday night.

The Shamrocks were hosting Homestead in the Class 6A Regional 2 championship at Riverview Health Stadium. Early in the second quarter, the Spartans did something that no team had been able to do to Westfield in the past month: Take the lead.

Homestead was up 9-7, but that would be it. The Shamrocks shut out the Spartans for the remainder of the game, and cruised to a 42-9 victory. This is Westfield's first-ever regional title in Class 6A, and its fifth overall. The 'Rocks last won a

regional in 2016.

"That's a very good team that we just beat," said Westfield coach Jake Gilbert. "Very well-coached. I'm impressed as heck with our team to be ready, our staff to have them ready like this."

In addition to being prepared, the Shamrocks also had players step up, and do so in new roles. One example of that was Carson Voorhis. Normally a receiver, Voorhis moved into the running back position after Micah Hauser was held out from this game due to injury.

Voorhis performed well in his new role, leading Westfield in rushing with 100 yards in 10 carries. He made several big runs in the first quarter that would set up touchdown plays. On the Shamrocks' first drive, Voorhis ran for 15 yards, then made a 20-yard dash that got Westfield to the five-yard line. Maximus Webster then grinded the ball into the end zone, scoring on third-and-1.

"Carson Voorhis, first time ever playing running back, not too bad," said Gilbert. "So he stepped in there and did a great job. I was just proud of everybody for the contributions they made."

Webster's touchdown and Sean Sullivan's extra-point kick put the Shamrocks up 7-0 less than three minutes into the game. Homestead got on the board midway through the first on a field goal, making the score 7-3. That margin would stand through the end of the period.

The Spartans took their 9-7 lead just 25 seconds into the second quarter on a huge 62-yard pass play touchdown from Nate Anderson to Jared Kistler. Westfield responded right away, however: Webster tossed a 17-yard touchdown pass to Nic Depasquale with 10:06 left in the second quarter, and the 'Rocks would never trail again.

Webster would be involved in each of the six touchdowns Westfield scored in the regional. Minutes after his throw to Depasquale, Webster sent a 22-yard pass to Reid Schepers, who took it into the end zone. Then with less than two minutes left in the half, Webster punched the ball in from the three-yard line. After briefly trailing, the Shamrocks led 28-9 at the break.

Webster and Schepers would team up for two more touchdowns in the third quarter, scoring on 13-yard and 16-yard pass plays. Webster finished the game 16-of-23 through the air, totaling 239 yards and also had 77 yards rushing.

"He was pretty awesome," said Gilbert.

DePasquale led the receptions with five, while Schepers and Jackson Wasserstrom both had four catches. Gilbert also had special praise for Jack Pfeiffer, who came in and made plays for Westfield despite being hurt; the coach said that Pfeiffer was "pretty heroic" to help the team out.

"That's what seniors do, and I was really impressed just

with his toughness, because he was hurt more than he let on," said Gilbert.

Sullivan made all six extra-point kicks after each score. Kyle Pape and McGuire Graybill both had five tackles on defense, with David Frey, Seth Martin and Zander Nguyen each making four stops. Benji Welch caught two interceptions.

Westfield is now 11-1 for the season and will travel to Merrillville Friday to play in the 6A north semi-state game. The Pirates won a back-and-forth game with Elkhart 27-24 for the Regional 1 championship.

Ben Davis holds off Carmel for regional trophy

Carmel nearly came all the way back from a big deficit last Friday in the Class 6A Regional 3 championship at Ben Davis, but the Greyhounds were held off by the Giants, who won the regional title 27-21 to end Carmel's season.

The Greyhounds got the first score of the game just a few seconds after the start. Baron Smith took a kickoff return 94 yards into the end zone, then Spencer Hanna's kick made the score 7-0 with 11:46 to go in the first quarter.

But Carmel would have to wait a while to score again. Meanwhile, Ben

Davis' Devon Wiley got his team on the board with an 18-yard touchdown run, and the extra-point kick tied the game.

The 7-7 tie at the end of the first quarter became a 21-7 halftime lead for the Giants. Dillon Moore caught a 26-yard touchdown pass during the middle portion of the period, then Devon Wiley took a 14-yard pass into the end zone with just over a minute to go.

Ben Davis extended its lead to 24-7 with a field goal two minutes into the third quarter. That's when the Greyhounds made their

The Tigers took on a very tough Columbus East team. Fishers rose to the occasion, using its balance, toughness and a record-tying performance by Katie Howard to beat the Olympians 72-67.

“Columbus East is a very good basketball team,” said Tigers coach Lauren Votaw. “And match up-wise, we do not match up well with them. Howard drained two more 3s in the third quarter, then hit another pair early in the fourth. That gave her a total of 10 for the game, which ties the school record originally set by Brooke Sugg. In an interesting turn of events, while Howard was tying her record, Sugg was tying the knot: She got married on Saturday.

“On Brooke Sugg’s wedding day, her record got tied,” said Votaw.

“We know that Katie Howard can shoot the basketball,” said Votaw. “And she’s been struggling a little bit this year. She came ready to play today. She knocked the shots down and her teammates did a great job of finding her, and I thought she played within herself and didn’t force anything.”

Howard’s 10th 3-point-er put Fishers up 59-55.

Columbus East made one last push, and a 3-point-er of their own gave the Olympians a 62-61 lead.

Then it was Hailey Smith’s turn. The sophomore took over the game, making three straight lay-ins to put the Tigers up 67-62. Fishers was able to hold on from there, finishing the game from the free throw line.

“We found that we had a good match up there, and Hailey was able to attack a little bit off the dribble and went in,” said Votaw of Smith’s fourth-quarter spark. “We hit some free throws down the stretch.”

Howard made two free throws near the end of the game, which added to her 10 3-pointers gave her a career-high 32 points. Burton added 20. Hailey Smith added nine points and collected seven rebounds, while Emmerson dished out six assists.

The Tigers are 4-1 for the season. Fishers, along with host Hamilton Southeastern, was supposed to also play Terre Haute South on Saturday, but the Braves withdrew from the tournament earlier in the week. The 'Blazers are certainly making the most of every opportunity. They found themselves in a precarious position early in the first quarter, when the Warriors led 10-3 due to timely baskets and their own solid defense.

But University began working its way back into the game midway through the period, and cut Danville's advantage to 13-10 by the end of the first. Kamryn Washington started things off with a 3-pointer, followed by layins from Payton Seay and Sierra Hinds.

The second quarter began with the Warriors' Haley Ancelet making a 3-pointer, pushing her team ahead 16-10. The Trailblazers took over after that, going on an 11-0 run to take a 21-16 lead. Kelsey DuBois scored five points in that run, which gave University a lead it would not relinquish.

In fact, the 'Blazers increased that lead to 31-21 by halftime. Hinds finished the quarter strong with a 3-pointer, while Abby Han-non came off the bench and

scored three points.

"We've been talking about that all year," said Blanding. "We're not very deep. We could end up getting in foul trouble. So, we always tell everybody to be ready."

Seay got University off to a good start in the second half, making two baskets to push the Trailblazers ahead 35-21. Hinds and Jordan Patterson both hit 3-pointers later on in the third quarter. Another Hinds jump shot gave University a 43-31 lead, but a 3 and a

layin by Danville kept them within 43-36 at the end of the third.

The Warriors would get no closer. The 'Blazers held Danville to only three points in the fourth, all of them free throws. A 6-0 run in the latter half of the period – two Seay baskets and a pair of DuBois foul shots – sealed the victory.

"We've been working on our defenses since we started," said Blanding. "Our defensive coach, John Fair, he's top notch. So the girls are always prepared. And we're prepared to switch defenses."

Hinds, who was honored before the game as the team's lone senior, led the way with 17 points. Seay was next in line with 13 points, and led all the other stats: Eight rebounds, five assists and five steals. Hinds also had seven rebounds and four steals.

DuBois and Patterson both collected five rebounds. All seven players that took to the floor for University scored at least two points. Arrion Sherrod made two free throws during the Trailblazers' second quarter run that would put University in the lead for good.

The Trailblazers' scheduled game at Clinton Central last Friday was postponed to this Friday. University will also play Saturday at Oldenburg Academy.
