Noblesville Schools dedicates new unique community center

Noblesville Schools dedicated a first-of-its kind community center last Wednesday, opening new flexible usage options not just for Noblesville Schools, but for all residents.

The Noblesville Schools Community Center (NSCC) is located off of Field Drive between Noblesville High School and Noblesville East Middle

School. It will provide dedicated space for the district's enhanced alternative education program "Millers Success Academy," as well as adult education classes, public meeting space, and indoor team practice space.

The NSCC will also be used by the district's special education partners at the Hamilton Boone Madison County Co-op for its "Limitless" program,

which provides ongoing education for young adults with special needs.

The building has a kitchen and large multi-purpose space that make it ideal for community dinners and receptions and is located right next to Noblesville High School's new stadium, which is expected to be completed in 2022.

"With the community sched-

uling more than 14,000 hours of programming every year in our facilities, and with one of the largest high schools in the state, this additional space in Noblesville was desperately needed and we expect it to be a very popular area for events," said Noblesville Schools Superintendent Dr. Beth Niedermeyer.

LeMaster named new Health Dept. administrator

The Hamilton County Health Board has selected Jason LeMaster as the Health Department's new administrator. LeMaster replaces Barry McNulty, who passed away in December.

LeMaster has been in public health for 27 years. He has served as the Director of Environmental Health for the past 24 years. In that capacity, he has overseen restaurant inspections, water quality, on-site sewage disposal, and mosquito control. His department is also responsible for testing public swimming pools and private wells. LeMaster has served as the department's interim administrator for the past several months.

County Health Dept. switching to Pfizer vaccine

Change will triple vaccination rate

The Hamilton County Health Department will start administering first doses of the Pfizer vaccine on Tuesday, March 2. Up until now, the site at the 4-H Fairgrounds in Noblesville has been administering the Moderna vaccine.

The Indiana State Department of Health (ISDH) asked the Hamilton County Health Department to make the switch so it could free up the Moderna vaccine for mobile units in rural areas. The Pfizer vaccine must be stored at -94 degrees Fahrenheit, making it more difficult to transport. ISDH will provide the Hamilton County Health Department with ultra-low temperature storage for the Pfizer vaccine.

The state is also receiving more doses of Pfizer, which will allow the Hamilton County Health Department to administer more doses. The clinic at the

County death investigations up 23% this year

Coroner John Chalfin frustrated with state's new reporting system

The Hamilton County Coroner's Office logged a record-breaking number of cases in 2020.

According to Hamilton County Coroner John Chalfin, his office recorded a total of 511 cases in 2020, up 23 percent from the previous year.

Chalfin predicts the number will grow in 2021. "Based on current statistics, the office could see 560 to 600 cases," he said.

Chalfin contributed the increase to the growing population in the county. "COVID-19 did not impact our numbers significantly," he said. "A majority of those deaths were people under a doctor's care,

which most often, does not warrant a coroner investigation."

A new statewide death reporting system, DRIVE, was implemented in January. It's used by coroners, physicians, health departments, and funeral homes, and it has Chalfin frustrated.

"Under the old system it took 15 to 20 minutes to certify a death with the Indiana State Department of Health (ISDH)," he said. "Now, under the new system, it takes nearly an hour if everything goes smooth."

In Indiana, death certificates are administered by the local health departments and require the signature of a physician or coroner. Death certificates are needed for families to settle final affairs of the deceased.

"The new system has delayed the issu-

ance of death certificates, making it difficult for families to move forward with final arrangements," Chalfin said.

Four officers save life of county jail inmate

Earlier this year, four Hamilton County Sheriff's Office Corrections Officers used bravery, training, and skill to save the life of an inmate in the Hamilton County Jail. Officers Pyle, Whaley, and Dunn and Sergeant Rairdon responded to an inmate who was having a medical emergency within the jail. The inmate was located and was not

breathing and unconscious. Using a department-issued AED, CPR, and teamwork, these officers were able to revive the inmate and save that individual's life.

"I'm extremely proud of the professional men and women who make up our corrections staff," Sheriff Dennis Quakenbush said. "These heroes are dedicated to the safety and securi-

ty of the jail and were able to quickly put their training to use to save a life."

Hamilton County Jail Commander Josh Carey and Sheriff Dennis Quakenbush awarded these officers with lifesaving awards.

First aid, CPR, and AED are mandatory trainings provided to every corrections officer within the jail division.

New court likely soon . . .

Massive county projects under consideration

Hamilton County is likely to have a new court soon, assuming the state legislature approves. It will be Superior Court 7, the judge of which will be appointed by Governor Eric Holcomb.

The increasing case load is the reason given for the county's request for the additional court. Hamilton County currently has a Circuit Court and six superior courts. There is space in the Judicial Center for one more court.

County Commissioners and County Council members discussed the pending court's needs in a joint session last Tuesday.

The court was one item on a list of upcoming projects reviewed by the officials.

At the top of the list was the State Road 37 reconstruction designed to create a freeway without grade level intersections from Noblesville to Interstate 69. Costs for the major project are increasing. Late last

year, the county was told another \$40 million will be needed and further increases are likely.

The earlier announced county parking garage was also considered. Originally estimated to cost about \$9.5 million, county officials now believe it may be wise to increase the structure to five levels to allow for anticipated future needs.

The garage, planned on the northside of Noblesville's Clinton Street between 8th and 9th streets, will take the place of a current ground-level lot on Conner Street on the eastside of the White River. A private development is planned on that three-acre site.

Other projects getting attention at the meeting include converting the current Humane Society building on Pleasant Street to offices for the Soil and Water Conservation District and county Weights and Measures.

The Humane Society is in the process of building a new facility on Hague Road in Fishers.

The long-discussed White River bridge at Pleasant Street, a vital link in the planned bypass of downtown Noblesville, was considered at the joint session. The county is responsible for major bridges anywhere in the county, while the city will build the bypass to the bridge.

A center for victims of domestic violence has also been requested. There is presently no shelter for such victims within the county.

Officials are also considering acquisition of a 106-acre parcel for park development in Washington Township and will be undertaking intersection improvements at 146th and Allisonville, likely involving a roundabout at the heavily-traveled crossing.

All proposed projects were referred to the council's finance committee for consideration. While the county has considerable resources on hand, the listed projects cannot likely all be financed at one time without other sources of revenue or staged as annual revenues are collected.

Noblesville firefighters to begin giving COVID vaccine to homebound residents

As of Monday, March 1, the Noblesville Fire Department (NFD) has begun administering vaccines to at-risk, hard to reach, or otherwise immobile or homebound individuals as part of the Homebound Hoosier EMS Vaccine Administration Program. The program is a cooperative public health effort within Indiana.

The Hamilton County Health Department (HCHD) has partnered with local Emergency Medical Services providers to administer the COVID-19 vaccination to Homebound Hoosiers. NFD will use its Community Resources Paramedics to administer the COVID-19 vaccination to homebound Noblesville residents who have made arrangements with the

HCHD to receive the vaccine. Currently, Noblesville has 16 residents on the list for vaccination.

"We are fortunate in Noblesville to have resources available, like a Mobile Integrated Healthcare Program to reach people in need within our community," NFD Division Chief of EMS James Macky said.

The Homebound Hoosier Program is an Indiana Family & Social Services Administration (FSSA) initiative. Hamilton County resides in FSSA Area 8. Noblesville residents who are homebound are encouraged to reach out to the HCHD to schedule an in-home vaccination by calling (317) 776-8500 or 211 for help.

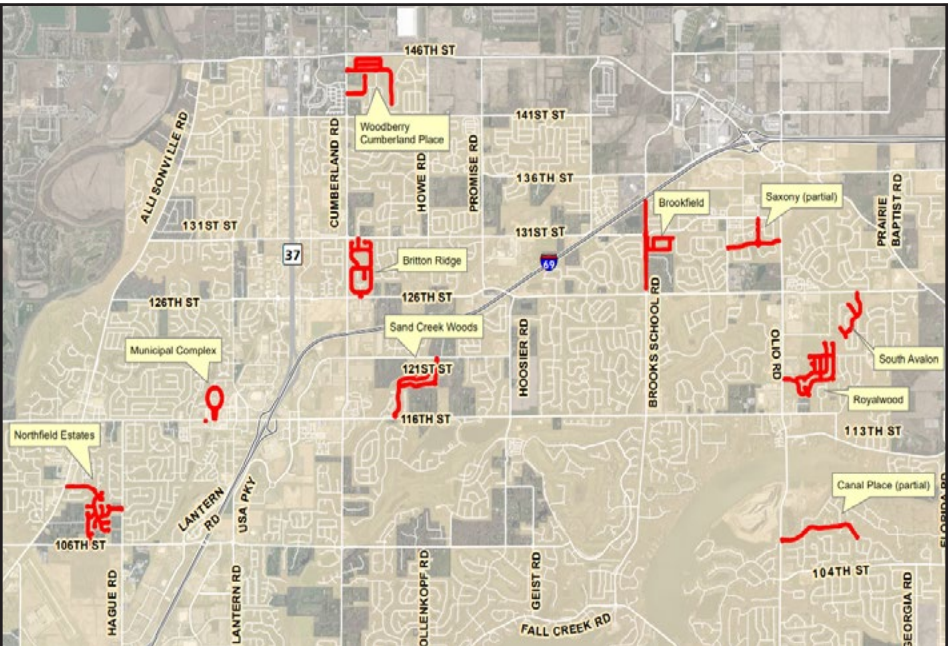

Fishers approves \$2.36M paving bid

Streets around Fishers City Hall and a number of city neighborhoods will be resurfaced and paved after the city awarded a \$2.36 million bid to E&B Paving.

Neighborhoods that will see the work include sections of the following:

- Northfield Estates

- Fishers Center Drive
- Municipal Drive
- Britton Ridge
- Woodberry
- Cumberland Place
- Sand Creek Woods
- Saxony
- Brooks School Road
- Brookfield and Waterway Boulevard

E&B submitted the winning bid, amongst a total of seven firms vying for this

contract.

In one other item passed by the Board of Works and Public Safety, the city renewed its contract with the firm IPEP for worker's compensation. The contract covers a one-year period beginning March 1. The annual premium will be \$344,851, compared to the previous year's premium cost of \$352,887.

Chalfin said his frustration with the new system is attributed to inadequate training by ISDH, timing of implementation, and the lack of physicians registered in the DRIVE database.

"They rolled this out right in the middle of a pandemic," he said. "What use to be a simple process is now an arduous task for everyone involved. On top of that, the new system did not ini-

tially recognize the newly formed Fishers Health Department."

Barb Hathaway, Vital Records Registrar for the Fishers Health Department, confirmed her office did not come online with ISDH's new system until mid-February, which created a backlog in the issuance of death certificates for deaths occurring in Fishers.

Chalfin said the new system has tasked his

staff. "An average number of hours worked per coroner case is 14. With a case load expected to be nearly 600 this year, it is easy to see the additional workload the new system will create," he said. "We are the fourth largest county in Indiana by population. Unlike some of the larger counties, we do not have a staff person assigned to processes death certificates. Much of our time is spent investigat-

ing cases and conducting autopsies. We will need to make some changes if the bugs aren't worked out of the DRIVE system."

Chalfin also pointed out some death certificates are being delayed due to toxicology reporting. "In death investigations requiring toxicology examinations, results from testing laboratories are taking four to six weeks due to a nationwide increase in overdose deaths," he said.

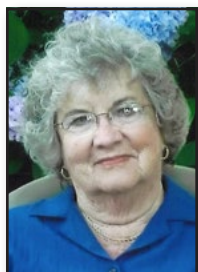

No services are planned at this time. Jerri's care has been entrusted to Randall & Roberts Funeral Homes in Noblesville.

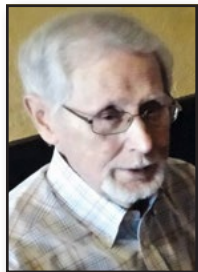

More than 56,000 Meals on Wheels delivered last year

Hamilton County Meals on Wheels released a report last Friday on its activities during 2020. Beth Gehlhausen, the organization's director, says a total of 56,810 meals were delivered during the past year; an average of 4,671 each month.

Delivery of two meals per day, five days a week are available to any county resident who is elderly, disabled or housebound. The meals are delivered by 428 volunteers who offer their services a few days each month.

Last year, 362 residents were served throughout the county, although about 40

percent are in Noblesville. Clients pay according to their financial ability.

Funding last year amounted to \$633,901, of which about \$232,000 came from grants, with the remainder coming from clients, donations, and other sources.

Meals on Wheels of Hamilton County, founded in 1975, is a non-profit organization designed to help those in need of daily meals to remain living independently, according to Gehlhausen.

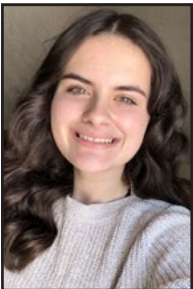

Boys swimming state finals

Carmel claims 7th straight team title

Streett, Carlile, Malicki are individual winners

INDIANAPOLIS – The Carmel boys swimming team has enjoyed a nice run at the state meet over the past several years.

That run continued last Saturday, as the Greyhounds won their seventh consecutive state championship at the IU Natatorium in downtown Indianapolis. Carmel scored 360 points, the third-highest point total ever achieved by a boys team at state. The ‘Hounds won by 161.5 points over runner-up Fishers, the fourth-highest margin of victory.

If those aren’t enough records, here are a few more. It was the 21st overall state championship in boys swimming for Carmel, extending a record. The Greyhounds’ seven straight titles is another extension record, as is the 10th state title for Carmel coach Chris Plumb.

“We had a lot of guys score and it obviously was a goal to have everybody score in every race,” said Plumb.

The Greyhounds had 24 swims at state, including 19 in the championship heat, all of which earned state medals. Carmel also won three individual events, starting with the medley relay, where the team of Carter Lancaster, Ryan Malicki, Christopher Holmes and William Kok finished in a time of 1 minute, 29.60 seconds.

“The 200 medley relay, we needed everybody to do their job and they did,” said Plumb.

Malicki would later claim an individual event, winning the breaststroke in 53.71 seconds. The junior

won a battle with Mount Vernon senior Aidan Tierney, staying a stroke ahead to get Carmel’s first win in the event since 2018.

“Shout out to Aidan, he had a really great race,” said Malicki. “I think I just really capitalized on racing off of him. He did amazing. That’s always nice to have someone next to you to push you.”

The breaststroke was the next-to-last event, and Carmel won the final event as well, the 400 free relay. The team of Griffin Hadley, Kayden Lancaster, Carter Lancaster and Augustus Rothrock won that race in 2:58.70.

“It’s a tough meet,” said Plumb. “There’s a lot of fast swimming. So, to get away with three wins, great effort by those guys. Every relay was hard-fought and close. There’s a lot of great swimming in this state and we feel pretty good about coming on top.”

Carmel placed second in the 200 free relay, with the squad of Malicki, Hadley, Rothrock and Kayden Lancaster finishing in 1:22.02. Rothrock picked up third-place medals in the individual medley and butterfly, while Hadley placed third in the 200 free and fourth in the 100 free. Both are bound for the University of Tennessee next fall.

The Greyhounds had three events where all three of their swimmers earned medals. In the IM, Ryan Malicki (sixth) and Carter Lancaster (eighth), joined Rothrock on the medals stand. Kellen Reese (sixth) and Christopher Holmes (seventh) also reached the podium in the butterfly.

Kayden Lancaster (fifth), Aaron Shackell (seventh) and Gregg Enoch (eighth) gave Carmel three more medals, and team points, with their performances in the 500 free.

Other medal winners for the ‘Hounds were led by Sean Sullivan, who finished third in the backstroke. Three more Carmel swimmers got sixth-place finishes: Kayden Lancaster in the 200 free, Carter Lancaster in the backstroke and Brandon Malicki in the breaststroke.

Consolation finishers for the Greyhounds were Shackell in the 200 free (10th), Sullivan in the 100 free (11th), Connor Lathrop in the backstroke (12th), and Holmes (15th) and Andrew Robertson (16th) in

the 50 free.
FISHERS PLACES SECOND

The Fishers Tigers continued their rapid ascent in the swimming world by finishing second at the state meet. The Tigers scored 198.5 points, the most ever in school history, and their runner-up finish is easily the best at the meet, surpassing last year’s fourth-place mark.

Fishers had nine medal winners, including a 1-2 finish in the 500 freestyle. Jackson Carlile won the race in 4:22.31, with Kyle Ponsler the runner-up with a time of 4:23.37.

Carlile became the first-ever boys swimmer to win a state event for the Tigers. While winning is a big deal, Carlile said

he was happy for Fishers’ runner-up trophy – “the first time the boys team has gotten something as a team,” he said. “So, I think that was the priority for everyone going in and that’s what I focused on throughout the meet.”

Carlile, who will swim for Indiana University in the fall, also tied for fourth in the 200 free, while Ponsler took fourth in the IM. Both swimmers were part of two of the Tigers’ three medal-winning relays, joining Connor Carlile and Reed Beaumont on the third-place 200 free relay, then teaming with Connor Carlile and Tyler Schwertfeger to take fourth in the 400 free relay. Beaumont and Connor Carlile joined Logan Ayres and Daniel Bennett on the eighth-place medley relay.

Fishers also picked up two medals in diving. William Bennett was the runner-up with a score of 557.00 points, while Sebastian Otero took sixth. Freshman Jack Roby finished 10th in diving, also earning points for the Tigers.

Connor Carlile also took 10th in the IM and Ayres was 13th in the backstroke.

“These guys were just super tough,” said Tigers coach Joe Keller. “I knew that we would have to drag them out of here, regardless of the end result, because they were going to put it all out there today. We just knew that the effort was going to be over the top.”

STRETT WINS FOR HSE

Hamilton Southeastern senior Keegan Streett led the way for the Royals, winning the 200 freestyle.

Streett won his race in a time of 1:36.72. He dropped a considerable amount of time from his last Friday preliminary swim; Streett swam the prelim race in 1:38.15, so he was nearly a second and a half faster on Saturday.

“It feels great,” said Streett, who will swim for the University of Georgia next fall. “I would have liked to have been faster with the time.” But as he pointed out, “it’s nice to get my hand on the wall first and that’s all that really matters.”

Streett earned four medals at the meet. He also took third in the 100 free, and was part of both of the Royals’ freestyle relays, joining Logan Hess, Thomas Reising and Zack Bostock on the fourth-place 200 free relay. Bostock, Streett, Charles Rogers and Reising teamed up for a sixth-place finish in the 400 free relay.

Southeastern placed sixth as a team with 125 points, marking the school’s 20th top-10 finish at the state meet. In addition to the freestyle relays, the Royals medaled in the medley relay, as Ryan Harrison, Justin Voelker, Reising and Bostock placed sixth. Voelker would later place 11th in the breaststroke and Reising finished 16th in the butterfly.

OTHER SCHOOLS

Noblesville tied for 35th as a team with nine points. The Millers’ young swimmers were a factor, with sophomore Aidan Biddle placing 14th in the breaststroke and freshman Luke Whitlock taking 15th in the 500 free. Both swimmers joined Jeremiah Ledwith and Cavan Cameron for a 15th-place finish in the medley relay.

Hamilton Heights freshman Nathan Cox placed 13th in the diving event, scoring four team points for the Huskies. Cox totaled 433.10 points in the diving.

Westfield junior Noah Brauer took 16th in the IM, earning one point for the Shamrocks.

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Gus Etchison reaches 2,000 points . . .

Huskies get exciting win over Raiders

ARCADIA - It was starting to seem like old times in the Hamilton Heights gym last Wednesday night.

A large crowd was there to root on the Huskies as they played their regular-season finale against Harrison. Those fans not only got to cheer about an exciting win for Heights, 65-62 over the Raiders, but they also got to see some history as well.

Huskies senior Gus Etchison scored his 2,000th point during the opening minutes of the third quarter. Etchison got to that magic number on a putback. With that basket, he joined an ultra-exclusive club. The Western Michigan commit is only the third Hamilton County basketball player to reach 2,000 points, following the lead of Carmel's fabulous Shepherd boys, Dave and Billy.

"That's a great accomplishment for Gus," said Heights coach Chad Ballenger. "As I keep telling him, team success leads to individual success. He's buying into that. We need to have team success to help him get to his individual success."

"All those individual goals and stuff and success, it's awesome and everything," said Etchison. "But at the end of the day, all I really want is just that sectional championship, because I haven't experienced that yet."

Etchison said he wants to win the sectional "for the school and just for the whole community, because we deserve that after a lot of the stuff that all of us on the basketball team" has gone through.

"All the individual success is awesome and stuff, but at the end of the day, I'm just here to get that sectional championship," said Etchison.

The Huskies will go into the sectional on a four-game win streak, but they had to work to get that fourth consecutive victory. Harrison skipped out to a 6-0 lead, and would not trail for most of the first half. Heights worked its way back to a 10-10 tie, with Isaac Wilson's 3-pointer knotting the score up. But the Raiders went on an 11-2 run, which finished with sophomore Ben Henderson making a four-point play with 1:11 left. Henderson's 3-pointer and foul shot put the Raiders up 21-12.

Wilson drained another 3 before the quarter ended, getting the Huskies within 21-15. Luke Carroll opened the second period by making two foul shots, and Isaac Tuma added another free throw to make it a 6-0 run.

A layin by Max Jacobsen gave Harrison a 25-21 lead. Then Heights took over, making its own 11-2 run that would stretch into halftime. Tillman Etchison started it with a triple, then Carroll's layin put the Huskies in front for the first time, 26-25. Gus Etchison added a layin, Noah Linville hit two free throws, and another layin from Gus Etchison finished the half and gave the Huskies a 32-27 lead.

"I think we really started spreading them out more," said Gus Etchison. "We got in our five-out formation. Instead of having guys on the post, we

just spread them out."

"We really locked in defensively," said Ballenger. "It was a big key to the game. Their pace and who they play, a really good schedule, and we always know when we play them that we have to get adjusted because they cut so hard and play so hard. So, we did. It took us that first quarter, a little bit, to see that and realize it. And in the second quarter, I thought we did a great job."

The Huskies were moving the ball exceptionally well. Gus Etchison said that after Heights suffered a close loss to Western earlier in the month, the players got together and had a conversation about trusting each other more.

"We just said we needed to start trusting each other and making that extra pass," said Etchison. "Instead of having a good shot, make it a great shot."

The third quarter opened with a 3-pointer by Harrison's Bryant Smith, and that was followed by Etchison's history-making putback. Later, Smith drained another 3 to put the Raiders up 37-36, the first of eight lead changes during the period.

Jacobsen's 3 late in the quarter gave Harrison its last lead of the game at 46-45. Etchison promptly erased that with a layin. Then, after a Raiders' timeout with 2.3 seconds left, Gus threw in a last-second 3-pointer, putting the Huskies up 50-46 going into the fourth.

Heights never trailed in that closing quarter. Lucas

Ballenger called Linville one of the team's best defenders.

"I'm pleased for him, and he wants to play at the next level," said Ballenger. "He's going to be able to. He's going to be able to play at that next level. He's really done a good job the last few weeks for us."

Heights took a trip to Norwell last Tuesday night and came home with a 75-63 victory. The Huskies got off to a good start, leading 23-12 after the first quarter. The teams played even for the remainder of the game, and Heights was able to hold a comfortable advantage. The Huskies led 38-29 at halftime and 58-49 after three periods.

Gus Etchison led the Heights scoring with 24 points and handed out seven assists. Wilson had 13 points, including three 3-pointers. Carroll reached double-double status with 12 points and 10 rebounds, while Letsinger threw in four 3s for 12 points.

The Huskies finished the regular season 15-4 and will play Yorktown Tuesday in the first game of Sectional 24 at New Castle.

'Hawks drop tough games to Frankton, Eastern

After last weekend, no one can say that the Sheridan boys basketball team is not battle-tested.

The Blackhawks played two tough game last Friday and Saturday at Larry Hobbs Gym. On Friday, Sheridan battled Frankton and took the Eagles down to the wire before falling 51-49 in a great game.

It was Sheridan's winter Homecoming game, and it was played in front of a nice-sized crowd. Frankton never trailed, but the Blackhawks never allowed the Eagles to lead by more than nine, and used timely shooting and toughness to stay with Frankton until the end.

Sheridan coach Tod Windlan told his team after the game that there was no reason for anyone to hang his head and get down.

"We got another tough game tomorrow night and then the tournament starts," said Windlan. "These are great opponents preparing us for our tournament."

The Eagles opened the game with a 3-pointer from Jack Davenport, but Sheridan's Ethan Moistner tied it up with a triple, his first of what would be many. But back-to-back 3s from Frankton gave it a 9-3 advantage.

Silas DeVaney scored on

a layin, then Moistner drained another 3 to get the 'Hawks within 9-8. Frankton would keep trying to pull away, but Sheridan always came back. Two baskets from Corbin Murray at the end of the first quarter kept the Blackhawks within 17-16.

Frankton threatened to pull away in the second quarter, as a 6-0 run put the Eagles ahead 28-19. Sheridan hung around, however, with everyone making contributions. That included Cole Webel, who came off the bench starting in the second quarter and made his presence known with a 3-pointer to finish the period. That kept Sheridan within 32-26 at halftime.

A free throw by Ayden Brobston stretched the Frankton lead back to 50-47. Eden made a layin, then Schwinn hit a free throw to keep the Eagles up by two. Sheridan had one last shot, but it didn't go.

The Blackhawks had good balance, as all seven players that took to the court scored at least four points. Moistner led the way with four 3-pointers for 12 points. The two teams were tied at the end of each of the first three quarters. The score was 8-8 after the first period; Eden had six points for Sheridan in that quarter. The 'Hawks and Eastern were knotted at 16-16 at halftime, with DeVaney scoring four.

In the third quarter, Sheridan led by as much as five points. Moistner got hot, nailing two 3-pointers on his way to nine points. But the Comets came back and tied it up at 28-28 going into the fourth. The game stayed tight until Eastern's late 3-pointer.

"I think the last three games we've played have

been very tough games that'll prepare us for our sectional very well," said Blackhawks coach Tod Windlan. "We had a chance to win all three games."

Eden led Sheridan with 13 points, followed by Moistner with 11. DeVaney and Moistner both collected four rebounds and Moistner also made four steals.
