New County Career Center names founding director

Carrie Lively will lead the Hamilton County Center for Career Achievement (HCCCA) as its founding director, creating a new shared cross-community program to support Certified Technical Education (CTE) programs for the county's six school districts.

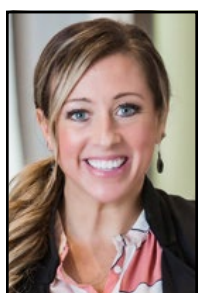
"Carrie was chosen because she is uniquely qualified to lead the HCCCA based on her vast experience," said Hamilton Heights School District Superintendent and center coordinator Dr. Derek Arrowood in making the announcement in partnership with the Hamilton County Economic Development

Corporation (HCEDC). Lively will work as an employee of HCEDC through its operating agreement with Hamilton County Tourism, Inc.

The Hamilton County Council in June agreed to support the initiative with a \$425,000 grant for two and a half years, when the HCCCA will become autonomous.

Lively will focus on four key goals of the initiative:

1. **Expand CTE Offerings**

ment in high wage and skilled jobs.

2. **Develop a Marketing and Enrollment Plan** – Grow enrollment in CTE classes and programs by ensuring all students are aware of these expanded opportunities and how it can provide them with a pathway forward.

– Implement best practices to give Hamilton County students the skills they need to obtain employment in high wage and skilled jobs.

3. **Pilot the HCCCA beginning with the 2022-2023 School Year** – Have in place the nucleus of the program by Spring 2022 for enrollment the following year.

4. **Support Hamilton County Employers** – By creating a pipeline of highly skilled individuals to fill their workforce needs.

Lively comes to the position with more than 15 years of experience in secondary education, 11 years of school administration and leadership, national CTE policy leadership, extensive knowledge of Indiana's CTE programming

Biotech firm selects new HQ space in Fishers

Quantigen is latest in series of life science firms growing in city

Quantigen Biosciences, a specialty contract research organization focused on medical diagnostics and device development through pharmaceutical and biotech industry partnerships, has announced its plans to relocate and expand its headquarters from its existing location to a 40,000 square-foot state-of-the-art facility located at the Round Room building in Fishers, 10300 Kincaid Drive.

Accompanying this announcement, the firm plans to add 30 new, high-wage jobs in the areas of quality and regulatory compliance and research by the end of 2023 and will invest \$2.5 million into new lab and office space.

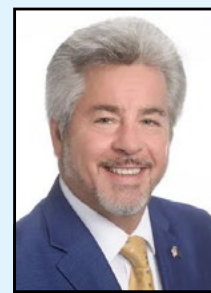
"The Fishers community has been home to Quantigen since our founding, so we are thrilled to have been able to find a facility that can support our expansion and allow us to continue operations in the city where we have been welcomed and supported," Quantigen CEO Jami Elliott said. "Mayor Fadness and his team have been incredibly supportive throughout our relocation search process. We

are bullish for Quantigen's future, as we are for the biotech prospects for our city and the region as a whole."

Quantigen plans to double its workforce, a result of efforts in three strategic areas:

- Increased demand from pharma and biotech companies to develop new diagnostic tests and platform technologies.
- Support for grant sponsored research through the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation in the areas of high throughput test development for soil transmitted helminths, COVID-19 and tuberculosis.
- A recent U.S. Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services MolDx coverage decision award for a novel genetic test that is used to aid health care providers in medication selection and to improve medication safety.

"Jami and his team at Quantigen are working on next-generation technology for the life science industry right here in Fishers," Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness said. "Quantigen's commitment to staying and investing in this community is exciting as we continue to see catalytic growth in this cluster that's ripe for Fishers."

The Indiana Economic Development Corporation offered Quantigen LLC up to \$350,000 in conditional tax credits based on the company's plans to create up to 23 new jobs by the end of 2023. These tax credits are performance-based, meaning the company is eligible to claim incentives once Hoosiers are hired.

"We're thrilled to support Quantigen's growing presence in Indiana as they

continue strengthening our state's life sciences sector, which contributes roughly \$80 billion to Indiana's economy," Interim Indiana Secretary of Commerce Jim Staton said. "I'm confident Quantigen's success will continue for years to come and grateful for the high-quality career opportunities they're providing for Hoosiers."

This comes on the heels of recent life science firms announcing their growth and investment in the city, including Stevanato, a foreign-direct investment equating to \$145 million and 230 jobs; INCOG BioPharma, investing \$60 million and 150 jobs; and Genezen, investing \$7.8 million and 36 employees.

The City of Fishers provided Quantigen with a \$50,000 grant toward its buildout and moving expenses. The Redevelopment Commission approved the Economic Development Agreement at the Feb. 2 meeting with the abatement approval being presented to City Council at the July meeting.

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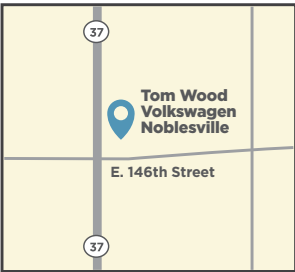

John Kraft: 60 years ago this week, I played 100 holes of golf in one day

In June of every year, I reminisce how lucky I was as a child to grow up in Noblesville during the 1950s and early 1960s, when life was simple and kids had a chance to be kids and enjoy summers in a safe, nurturing atmosphere in a friendly Midwestern farm town.

It was during this time when I was small boy, a good friend of mine introduced me to golf at Forest Park. I was 13 years old. Soon, I was hooked! During the summer I had to balance my farm chores, mowing lawns, and playing golf. I loved the game.

Now, when I look back to those wonderful times on that old nine-hole course, I smile and remember a very special day during the third week of June one year ... the day I played 100 holes at Forest Park!

I chose June 20, 1961, a Tuesday, the day before the Summer Solstice: the longest daylight of the year.

Monday night, I selected just a few clubs to carry in what was known as a "Sunday bag" – a light canvas bag, a couple of golf gloves, tees and about four or five golf balls, nothing else. I chose a putter, 3, 5, 7, and 9 iron, a wedge, and a 2-wood. Back then I hit a 2-wood off the tee as well as in the fairway. It was my "secret weapon."

I didn't sleep much that night and 4 a.m. quickly came. My mother took me to the golf course as my father, an obstetrician, had left in the middle of the night to deliver a baby at Riverview Hospital.

We arrived at Forest Park just before sunrise. My tee shot on number one split the two bunkers and the magic was about to begin! I was so happy walking down the first fairway. I was on top of the world. All I had to do was to get to my ball and hit the next shot. Life was good!

There were no golfers out early that Tuesday morning, so by 9:30 I had played 36 holes and was feeling confident about my pace. But then, the course began to fill up more than I anticipated with out-of-town golfers. This was strange, as it was a regular weekday and the only other weekday with heavier than normal play was Wednesday

when the local merchants closed downtown shops and came out to play golf together in large groups. However, some organization from Indianapolis was having a "retreat" in Forest Park and a bunch of "duffers" were invading the course! Despite this,

I did manage to finish 45 holes by 11:45 and tried to get in line to tee off once more on the first tee. But there was a long list of groups ahead of me.

And then, just as my heart began to sink, our local golf pro, Red Robison, steps to the first tee and tells the group that is about to tee off that "this little fella is on his way to play 100 holes of golf today, so I want you gentlemen to let him go ahead and tee off in front of you ... he won't hold you up, I promise you!" And so, I teed off ahead of them!

Well, the word spread quickly that this little blonde head kid who was walking and carrying a white canvas bag was playing 100 holes today, so when he gets behind you, let him play through! It was almost like a Disney movie ... men I had never met were shouting encouraging comments to me from other fairways and groups of golfers consistently let me play through them. By 4:30 I was on schedule having played 72 holes.

The late afternoon sun was very warm, yet I did manage to finish my 81st hole by 5:45 and make the turn to tee off on the 82nd by 5:50 p.m. When I finished the 90th hole and sprinted to the first tee to begin the 91st hole, there were several folks there offering their support. It was a thrill for me. I hit the best drive of the day and did not look back. Picked up my bag and jogged down the first fairway. It was 7:20 p.m.

I quickly finished the nine holes as dusk set in. I had now played 99 holes. Since the last hole at Forest Park is an up the hill Par 3, I ran back down to hit a 9 iron back up to the green. However, the greens keeper had turned on the sprinklers on number 8 green and the ninth tee was in line with the water spray. So, I had to time my tee shot in between water bursts! When I hit my shot up the hill to the ninth green,

I was soaking wet, but I couldn't have cared less! My ball landed slightly to the right of the pin. Once on the green, I two-putted for par on the 100th hole!

It was 8:55 as I walked off the green of the 100th hole. I was greeted by my mom and dad, my Uncle Larry Richardson, Red Robison, his wife Ruth, and son Rick and Billy Elder. Earlier in the day, Andy Richardson, Joe Butler and Donny Powell had been there and offered very friendly encouragement.

I really felt good about what I had just done. I must admit, it really

was a lot of fun!

In the next few years, I went on to play golf in high school, at Georgetown College and Butler University, where I set a low scoring school record in 1967. However, when I look back on my life when golf meant "everything" to me, there is one accomplishment that is uppermost in the vault of my many golf memories: That one day, 60 years ago this week, when at

age 15, I played 100 holes in one day while walking and carrying my clubs!

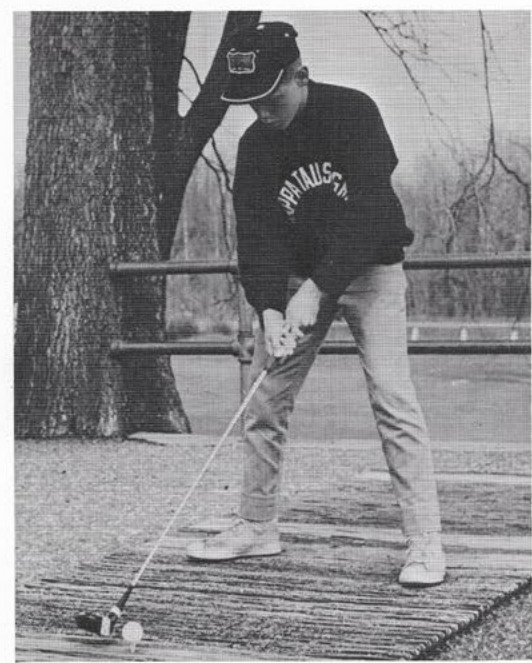

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Noblesville Lions bringing dodgeball back

After missing the Dodgeball Tourney last year, the Noblesville Lions is bringing dodgeball back in September. Now is the time to start planning and gathering your teams.

Tournament Information

This year’s tournament is scheduled to start at 11 a.m. on Sept. 11 at the Ivy Tech Gym, 300 N. 17th St., Noblesville. Play will actually start around noon, with waiver signing, bracket assignments, and rules meeting scheduled during the first hour.

Dodgeball is still popular because of the movie, everybody played dodgeball in school, dodgeball is also popular because it is rowdy, has freedom of play and is a great physical release.

A cornhole competition will be added this year. A popular game, cornhole is played during tailgating events, family gatherings and backyards across America. Cornhole is also popular because older and younger participate can play and enjoy.

The tournament will have two leagues in cornhole and two leagues in dodgeball. Each of the leagues will have a maximum of 10 teams, which means there could be 40 teams total. Dodgeball requires six players for active play and two for subs or retrievers. Cornhole team will have two players per team. If all four leagues are filled, there

will be a total of 200 participants.

A possible first this year could be exhibition games with elementary school children in fifth and sixth grades, or maybe the four Boy Scouts Troops in Noblesville, which could add an additional 32 participants to the tournament.

The entry fees (donation) this year are \$25 per team in the cornhole competition and \$35 per team in the dodgeball competition. The fees will cover the cost of embroidered baseball caps for champions and medals for runners-up. All entry fees are fully refundable 10 days before the tournament.

Themes for this year’s tournament are scholarships and support for the visually impaired, which includes leader dogs, kids’ sight (screening for children ages 2 to 6, with 1,575 children screened in 2019), purchasing eye glasses for children in need, recycling eye glasses, and donations to the blind school.

The last tournament in 2019 netted \$7,000. In 2019, the Club provided a total of \$5,250 in scholarships, which were given to students at Noblesville High School, Hamilton Heights High School and Ivy Tech. The Club’s support for vision impaired from the 2019 tournament totaled \$1,750. This year’s goal is \$11,000 for the tournament fund raiser.

The tournaments will be a double elimination format with the best two out of three

games to advance a bracket in dodgeball. The two leagues in dodgeball will be different; one league will be recreational for the not-so-serious players and one league will be competitive for the more serious players. The two dodgeball leagues will not play each other and there will be tournament champions for both leagues. Both league champions will receive embroidered baseball caps and runners-up will receive medals.

The cornhole double elimination tournament will use one game per bracket to advance. The two cornhole runners-up to the league champion teams will receive medals. The two league champions will play each other for the tournament championship. The tournament champions will receive embroidered baseball caps and the runners-up will receive medals.

Sponsorship support levels are \$200, \$400 and \$600. One super sponsor level will be available at \$1,500. At each level, the sponsor will have the opportunity to enter a team in the competition. Sponsors at the \$200 level may enter one team. Sponsors at the \$400 level may enter two teams. Sponsors at the \$600 level may enter three teams. The super sponsor can enter five teams.

Teams can have fun with names and shirt design. If you are a business, you can do some advertising with your team’s

name. If you are an individual, you may also have fun outfitting your team. Maybe make some challenges between competing teams.

What else do you receive as a sponsor?

- Upscale signage at the tournament and next port chop dinner.
- Additional signage for your business or home.
- Recognition in newspaper articles and final article on the tournament, including net money raised and names of sponsors, unless you would prefer to be anonymous.
