



Noblesville giving thousands in bonuses to city employees

Nearly 400 Noblesville city employees will receive bonuses as a result of a \$6.2 million American Rescue Plan disbursement provided to the city by the federal government. Police and firefighters will

receive \$2,000 each. Other city employees will receive \$1,000. City officials said police and firefighters are receiving a larger bonus, as compared to other employees, due to their risk of exposure to COVID-19

while performing their jobs. In addition to bonuses, Noblesville will use \$4.5 million to offset costs for storm water and drainage projects associated to the Pleasant Street bypass. The city will use an additional \$800,000 to install

sewers in Wayne Township. Noblesville is the second local government agency to announce employee bonuses from the federal money. Hamilton County government recently gave each of its employees \$3,000.

Dillinger's State of the County highlights infrastructure

Commissioner Steve Dillinger laid out Hamilton County's top priorities in 2021 at the annual State of the County address last Tuesday.

Dillinger discussed several infrastructure projects, including the State Road 37 project.

"The pandemic struck shortly after the State of the County last year," Dillinger said. "It didn't seem possible then that any of these projects could have come to fruition during the lockdown, but we have a host of amazing accomplishments to celebrate as we come out of this difficult time."

Much of Dillinger's presentation included information on the State Road 37 project. "The State Road 37 Project has required a lot of governmental teamwork between Hamilton County, Fishers, Noblesville, and the Indiana Department of Transportation," he said. "I have to give a lot of credit to the contractors on this. They didn't slow down

live longer, fuller lives." The 20-acre campus is located along U.S. 31 in Westfield. Abbott announced plans in October 2019 to invest at least \$37.6 million to establish a new medical device production site for its Structural Heart busi-

Ongoing renovations at Noblesville, Fishers libraries focus on improved access, better indoor, outdoor spaces

If you have visited or driven by the Fishers and Noblesville libraries lately, you probably have noticed renovation work.

Construction at both libraries will focus on preparing for the future by improving access and expanding possibilities in the use of indoor and outdoor spaces. When completed, Fishers and Noblesville residents will notice more pedestrian-friendly access and gathering spaces, additional parking, improved traffic flow, plus more experiential learning opportunities.

The Noblesville library renovation will focus on improved traffic flow and expanded parking, increasing access to green spaces, creating outdoor amenities for all ages, plus an updated front façade. The Indiana Room is being expanded with more experiential learning opportunities and, improving second-floor access.

The Fishers library renovation will focus on more pedestrian-friendly access and gathering spaces, improved traffic flow and expanded parking, integration of the south entrance with the Nickel Plate trail, redesigning the north entrance to become the new main entrance, and expanding the north side parking. Currently the North and East parking lots are under construction. Library and Ignite Studio visitors can park in the li-

brary's South lot or can find additional parking throughout the Nickel Plate District. Both libraries will remain open during regular hours throughout the construction unless posted differently at hepl.lib.in.us or on lobby doors.

Noblesville's Hyde Park agreement will bring master plan vision to Hamilton Town Center area

The City of Noblesville and MAB Capital Investments entered into a partnership at last Tuesday's Noblesville Common Council meeting to establish Hyde Park. The 274-acre master plan development will encourage investment and foster economic development within walking and biking distance of Hamilton Town Center. "This project provides an infusion of residential options near Exit 210 and several Noblesville

attractions," Mayor Chris Jensen said. "The plan also increases the real estate assessed value from \$527,000 to an estimated \$142 million once completed." Hyde Park will include a variety of businesses, retail, restaurants, residential and recreational

ity, and townhomes; in addition to mixed-use, office space and neighborhood-serving retail. "Hyde Park provides the city

uses within and adjacent to Hamilton Town Center. Examples included in the master plan include a senior living community, multi-family, and townhomes; in addition to mixed-use, office space and neighborhood-serving retail. "Hyde Park provides the city with a long-range plan in one of the most sought-after areas of our city. This project gives us a vision plan to help guide development trends," said Sarah Reed, community and economic development director. "These are suggested uses and each piece of the project will come through the Noblesville Common Council as a new development." Construction will begin before Dec. 31, 2022 and build out of the full project is anticipated to be completed within 10 years.

Hamilton County among nation's healthiest counties

Hamilton County has been recognized as the 16th healthiest county in America by *U.S. News & World Report* in collaboration with the Aetna Foundation.

"Our ranking reflects the long-term investments made by the county and our cities and towns in parks, recreation, and open spaces as well as readily available quality health care," County Commissioner Christine Altman said. "Hamilton County both attracts and retains active and engaged residents of all ages."

Accompanied by news, analysis and in-depth reporting, Healthiest Communities features rankings drawn from an examination of nearly 3,000 counties on 84 health and health-related metrics in 10 categories. Population health and equity are the most highly weighted factors in the methodology, followed closely by education and economy. Data were gathered and analyzed by the University of Missouri Center for Applied Research and Engagement Systems (CARES).

This year's rankings also include data relevant to the pandemic, such as county-level information on coronavirus cases,

normal.”

The vaccine clinic will be located in Colts City and open during all practice sessions open to fans. Staff from the Hamilton County Health Department and Indiana University Health will provide the Pfizer vaccine, which is available to those age 12 and older. Anyone under 18 years of age must be accompanied by a parent or guardian.

“This is a great chance to bring the kids out to watch the Colts and get them vaccinated ahead of the start of school,” said Christian Walker, emergency preparedness coordinator for the Hamilton County Health Department. “In most cases, kids who have been fully

vaccinated will not be required to wear masks at school and cannot be quarantined for exposure in the classroom.”

The vaccine is free, but you must show proof of insurance. No appointments are necessary. Staff will be on hand to help schedule second vaccine doses for those who are receiving their first at camp.

Those who receive their vaccine at Colts Training Camp prior to Aug. 15 will receive two preseason game tickets to the Colts-Panthers game on Sunday, Aug. 15. They will also be entered to win a Colts Prize Pack which includes game tickets, an autographed item, and a jersey.

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Westfield CrossRoads Church helps 26 families across county

What can 250 people do to impact Hamilton County communities in one week in a significant way? Home repairs for 26 families!

A total of 250 people from around the country, mostly high schoolers, gathered in Westfield last week and completed repairs on 26 homes in northern Hamilton County. In conjunction with Group Mission Trips of Ft. Collins, Colo., Cross-Roads Church at Westfield ([ForOurNeighbor.Life](#)) invited church high schoolers and their adult leaders from eight states from as far away as Nebraska, New Hampshire, and New Jersey to participate. In groups of five to seven people, each day they spent their days with a homeowner doing significant home repairs, including mobile home skirting, building wheelchair ramps, constructing decks, and doing exterior painting.

All of the repairs were free for the residents. The construction repair material costs are being paid for by CrossRoads Church, by the participants, and through a local Central Indiana Community Foundation grant. Senior adults, veterans, and families who are struggling with home needs were the primary recipients.

Ruth Griepentrog, whose 18-month-old daughter has physical challenges, said, "Our family had an amazing week. A team from Ashland, Ohio, spent five days working in our yard and giving us a new deck with ramp! The

old deck was in really rough shape with lots of splinters and not safe for our daughter. They tore off the old deck surface and rails, re-surfaced it, and added new rails, stairs and ramp. This team worked CRAZY hard to accomplish this incredible project for us and we are so very thankful to have a safe place for our daughter to play outside with her family."

Eric Lohe, pastor of CrossRoads Church at Westfield, said, "This effort is one of four church initiatives called, 'For Our Neighbor.' We are trying to meet, know, enjoy, and serve the needs of our local neighbors." CrossRoads wants to both be good neighbors and also involve others in helping community neighbors.

Lohe emphasized, "Westfield Washington Schools was an incredibly great community partner in

this effort by housing the 250 people at Westfield Middle School for the week. The Rotary Club of Westfield and the Women of Westfield provided an awesome meal for the participants and Westfield Welcome provided water bottles and sunglasses for everyone. Culver's of Westfield donated ice cream for the whole camp celebration on Friday evening. We live in a great community that cares about all of its neighbors!"

"Group Mission Trips ([groupmissiontrips.com](#)) serves in 25-plus communities in the United States each summer and does week-long youth mission home repair camps," Lohe said. "I have been attending these camps since 2005 working as staff and a volunteer. Our church has sent a number of students and adults to these work camps. This year we got to bring

this to our community and hope to be offering this to our neighbors again in June 2023."

As part of its For Our Neighbor initiatives, Cross-Roads Church at Westfield also provides free pet food to Hamilton County residents the first Saturday of each month from 9 to 11 a.m., offers free Zumba every Tuesday evening on their campus, and is sponsoring their annual fall festival and Premier Chili Cook-off, Wild, Wild Westfield from 4 to 7 p.m. on Saturday, Oct. 2. The event is free to the public and will include games, inflatables, food, and a mechanical bull.

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Theodore Louis Alexander Rowland June 23, 1940 – June 28, 2021

Theodore Louis Alexander Rowland has left the place he loved for a place he loves more.



Born into a German immigrant family in Indianapolis on June 23, 1940, his destiny was to make a difference in the place he was to call home, and he did just that throughout his life. His mother was Blanche Pauline Schmidgall Alexander, and his father was Theodore Louis Alexander. Around the age of 12, Ted moved to Noblesville with his mother and new father, James L. Rowland. The remainder of his life was in Noblesville, where he started his family, his business and found his happiness. Noblesville Senior High School (Class of '58) became the place that taught his lifelong work. In high school, he met a young girl that later would become his wife for 59 years, and both shared in the hard work and the best of times.

After graduation, Ted joined the Navy and served aboard the USS Alamo and the USS Ester AGC 12 as a Lithographer (Printer) while advancing his talent and skills. Lithography was an area that Ted excelled in. As shop manager in high school, specialty training in the Navy, he began a 50-plus year career in the printing industry. After finishing his tour of duty in the Navy, he married Mary Sue Staton Rowland, starting his own printing company in 1972 in downtown Noblesville in the historic Union Traction Terminal Station just one block off the Courthouse Square, known as Image Builders Rowland Printing. Ted worked in Chicago, Anderson and Indianapolis WFBM Time Life Radio and Television Station as the implant printing department manager. He met many people who became friends and customers for his new young business.

Ted was known for his generosity and support of community. Retiring in 2017, he continued to enjoy discussing printing with his sons Dane Vincent Rowland and Dean Vance Rowland, both continuing the tradition their father started. Ted's grandchildren were his greatest joy: Vincent Theodore Rowland and Vivian Michelle Rowland, children of Dane Rowland. They loved Grandpa too.

Ted was creative, generous, and a risk taker who had thousands of ideas, most of which became a reality, when others were not so sure. That included the idea of starting his business on a shoestring. The one thing others did not understand was that Ted had "luck" on his side. Ted truly lived life to the fullest. If you knew Ted, you would agree he was unique. He did "it" his way, always. He was hard to keep up with but left behind a million memories for all of us to enjoy and share for years to come. When asking Ted about his most favorite accomplishments, he would narrow a long list to three.

First and foremost, was the time he spent in high school working nights at Hudler Press in Noblesville, printing the weekly paper and getting it out on the street the following early morning before returning to class after an "all nightery." He was not the only printing student who worked at the paper and some lifelong friends were developed during those years. After serving in the Navy, Ted returned to Hudler Press to open a new offset printing department for the long-time business. Some 30 years later, Ted returned to Hudler Press again, upon its closing, to purchase the paper he printed as a student. Continuing production of the weekly "Noblesville Times" tradition without missing an issue was perhaps the most fun Ted had. He focused on the community and those people who made it great. He asked people with special talent to write articles for the paper and placed hundreds of pictures into each edition taken by him personally. After serving as the editor of the paper he once printed as a teen, he sold "The Times" to a newspaper publisher and it continues today as a daily paper. Ted saved the historic paper for others to enjoy for years to come.

The second accomplishment most important to Ted was the production of many historic bound books of Hamilton County towns and cities. He also published his own history book along with a team of well-known artists, writers, designers, and his own production company. The history book is called "Remembrances" and the year was 1976. Ted's Hamilton County History book sits today in the National Library of Congress, the State Library and local library.

Ted's mother had three brothers that were favorites. All three served in World War II in different branches of service at the same time. All three brothers serving during the war, catching the interest of many. Uncle Oscar became a talented chef like his father after the war, Uncle Julius also became a chef, and Uncle Henry, who was in the cavalry during the war, become a printer. Henry lived to 94 years and his wife Marie lived to almost 99 years. During the war, Henry received the Purple Heart along with Theatre Ribbons, including four Bronze Stars and an Accommodation for the Liberation of France.

Next year will be the 50th year celebration of Ted's life-long work and accomplishments as a design and print company in his town. The celebration will be a perfect time to honor 50 years of community dedication and creative talent of its founder, Theodore L. Rowland.

An opening remark in the "Remembrances" book published by Ted Rowland is a tribute to many who care about country and its history. History does repeat itself and is a good place to read and learn how to preserve the United States of America.

From the "Remembrances" history book of Hamilton County: "Fellow Citizens. We cannot escape history. We will be remembered in spite of ourselves. No personal significance or insignificance can spare one or another of us." – Presented by Abraham Lincoln speaking before Congress.

Everyone was welcome to join the family at a visitation on Friday, July 2, 2021 at Randall and Roberts Funeral Home, 1150 Logan St., in Old Town Noblesville.

Services and Celebration of Life were held on Saturday, July 3, 2021 at the funeral home.

Burial was at Oak Lawn Gardens following the service with a Military Honor Guard ceremony by the American Legion for the family to honor Ted's service.

prised of 70 members specializing in search, rescue, medicine, hazardous materials, logistics and planning, including technical specialists such as physicians, structural engineers and canine search teams.

We must continue supporting our law enforcement officers

As lawmakers, we rely heavily on input from constituents and local leaders to learn how we can better serve our communities. Oftentimes, what starts out as a conversation can turn into legislation, which is introduced to the General Assembly and hopefully carried across the finish line to become law.

After listening to several Hoosiers in our district express an urgent need for more support for public safety officers, I knew this needed to be a top priority of mine during the 2021 legislative session. Law enforcement officers put on their uniforms and head to work every day not knowing what their next shift will have in store for them. New laws I supported this session invest in Indiana’s law enforcement training and programs, while supporting local police departments.

One of the most notable new laws passed this session is House Enrolled Act 1006, which provides local police departments with more tools to ensure they hire the best officers for the job. Under the new law, agencies are required to request and receive a candi-

date’s full employment records from their previous department.

I co-authored this new law because it will help support our local officers as they protect communities across our state. The Indiana State Police, Indiana State Police Alliance, Indiana Fraternal Order of Police, Indiana Sheriffs’ Association, Indiana Association of Chiefs of Police, Indiana Law Enforcement Academy, Public Defender Commission and other advocates all backed this new law throughout the process. This is a testament of what we can accomplish when all stakeholders provide input to help develop sound policies that can benefit all Hoosiers.

Indiana’s next two-year budget also makes strategic investments to further support our law enforcement officers by dedicating \$70 million to enhance Indiana’s training facilities and programs. Another investment includes a \$3.5 million per year grant program to help fund trainings. Another \$10 million grant program is established to help local departments purchase body-worn cameras for all officers.

Our budget also seeks to raise salaries for state police, conservation and excise officers. These investments are critical in ensuring our officers are prepared to handle any situation they may encounter while also boosting transparency and accountability.

Individuals in Hancock, Hamilton and Marion counties have said time and time again they want to see more support for our public safety officers because of their selfless service. Whether it is doing a welfare check or responding to a domestic violence call, these public safety officers often deal with extremely dangerous situations in order to protect and serve.

At a time when other communities are seeking to “defund the police,” in Indiana we are doubling down on funding the police. I’m committed to supporting law enforcement and will look for ways to continue supporting them in the future.

Lawrence W. Inlow Park closed on Monday, July 5 to undergo planned improvements as part of Carmel Clay Parks & Recreation’s (CCPR) Reimagining Parks initiative. Through this initiative, CCPR is working to update and enhance existing parks to improve accessibility and safety and offer year-round fun.

This project is the second and final phase of improvements at Inlow Park, following the new playgrounds installed in 2019. This phase of improvements will include a new splash pad, two pickleball courts, new re-

stream building, expanded parking and more. The park is anticipated to reopen after construction is completed in December 2021.

The park’s playgrounds

will be closed during construction. The community is asked to respect closure signage and barricades.

Inlow Park is only one of six parks in the Carmel

community to receive funding from the Clay Township Impact Program. Improvements will provide benefits for all township residents to enjoy and make the community a better place to live, work and play.

traffic much on 37, and it is a big project. They are doing a terrific job.”

According to Dillinger, the cost of the recently completed 126th Street intersection was approximately \$22 million, and the cost of the 146th Street intersection will be about \$30 million once completed.

Future work on the 37 Project will include a \$30 million revamp of 131st and 135th streets, and reconstructing the 141st Street intersection at a cost of \$24 million.

Dillinger then described a \$29 million 146th Street and Allisonville Road improvement project that is expected to be completed in 2024, as well as the current improvements being made to 146th Street from Allisonville Road to the Boone/Hamilton County line.

Other road projects discussed included the Pleasant Street bypass in Noblesville, for which the county will fund two bridges across Cicero Creek and White River, the installation of roundabouts at River Road and State Road 32, a roundabout at State Road 32 and State Road 38 directly in front of Riverview Hospi-

tal, a roundabout at State Road 38 and Logan Street, a roundabout at State Road 32 and Mill Creek Road, and finally a roundabout at State Road 38 and Oakmont Drive.

Other infrastructure projects discussed were the Logan Street bridge, Carrigan Road bridge, and a 475-space county-owned parking garage currently being built one block north of the Government and Judicial Center at 8th and Clinton streets in Noblesville.

Moving away from infrastructure, Dillinger announced the county’s participation in a new women’s domestic violence shelter and a career achievement center for skilled trades.

According to Dillinger, the county has approved \$14,000 for the design of Prevail’s new domestic violence shelter.

Prevail provides crisis intervention and restorative support services for adult, adolescent and child survivors of crime and abuse.

“Prevail served 3,783 clients in 2020 and unfortunately eight Hamilton County residents died as a result of domestic violence

during the same year,” Dillinger said.

Dillinger announced that a \$425,000 grant by the county will fund the first 2 ½ years of the Career Achievement Center for high school students studying skilled trades. The Center will be a partnership with local high schools, Ivy

Tech and local businesses.

Dillinger concluded his State of the County address by announcing Hamilton County has been awarded a AAA bond rating, and the recently installed county solar project saved taxpayers \$1,094,000 in energy bills for county buildings during 2020.

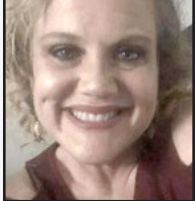

Fishers boys volleyballers' experience sets them up for championship title

There are many advantages to a sports team having an experienced roster. One of them is the ability to adjust to changes. With 10 seniors, the Fishers boys volleyball team had the necessary experience and leadership to make adjustments on the fly. As a result, the Tigers flew to another state championship.

Fishers defended its state title with a four-set win over Roncalli, which took place May 22 at Southport High School. The Tigers took care of the Royals 25-23, 25-13, 18-25, 25-20.

"It was definitely, absolutely a lot of fun," said Tigers coach Carlos Capo. Fishers won the state title in 2019; last year's season was canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

"We also played them in the championship match in 2019," said Capo. "It was our only loss of the season, so we were able to avenge that one loss."

The Tigers played Roncalli in the regular-season on April 27, with the Royals edging out Fishers in five sets, 17-15 in the fifth. (The fifth set is played to 15 points, while other sets are played to 25 points, and a team must win by two points.) The Tigers were 41-1 for the season. That included a 37-1 record against Indiana teams. Fishers played and won four matches against teams from neighboring states, getting victories over Cincinnati Elder, Oelentangy Orange from the Cleveland area, and two Louisville schools, St. Xavier and Trinity Lutheran. In addition, Fishers won the Indiana Crossroads Conference championship and the Indy Metro tournament championships, in both cases defending their titles from 2019.

The tournament began with the regional round on May 15. The Tigers swept through their regional, beating Lawrence North in the semi-finals and Brebeuf

Jesuit in the championship, both in straight sets.

The regional victory sent Fishers into the state quarter-finals, which took place on May 21. The Tigers beat Hamilton Southeastern in straight sets, then defeated Cathedral in a four-set semi-final before their championship victory over Roncalli.

The experience factor came into play once the state tournament began, in a couple of ways. Capo said that four of his 10 seniors were part of Fishers' varsity team in 2019, while the others were playing junior varsity.

"There were a handful of them that were part of the championship team two years ago," said Capo.

Capo said that experience allowed him to move players around.

"Towards the end of the season, I moved my center to outside hitting, because I needed a little more firepower," said Capo. "I moved my libero to setting. That was working really well."

Two days before the quarter-finals, one of the Tigers players was injured, meaning there would have to be another adjustment. Capo had to re-do the lineup with only one practice left before the state tournament. But Fishers worked through it just fine.

"Because of their experience and leadership, they were able to adjust to

last-minute changes and execute as if we were playing that rotation all year long," said Capo.

Senior Aaron Hernandez won the Mel Young MVP award for the tournament, hitting 15.6 kills per match with a hitting percentage of .448. Hernandez, who has committed to play at Ball State University, used to be the Tigers' setter, although he did do some hitting during the season.

"He was on fire," said Capo. "He was hitting the ball from the left side, the right side, the back row." Capo said Hernandez was "nearly unstoppable" and his play "made a big difference and a big impact in the tournament."

Senior Franky Capo moved into the setter position, playing a position that Carlos Capo said he hadn't played since the eighth grade. Franky Capo averaged 29.2 assists per match in the tournament, making the All-Tournament Team, and totaled 633 assists, placing third in Indiana.

"He did a great job running the offense," said Capo. "He's got a high volleyball IQ, he was able to spread the ball around. He dumped the ball when needed."

Franky Capo also played at the libero position, and was eighth in the state with 264 digs. With the lineup changes, senior Max Hoffman moved into

libero. He also played well, with 7.2 digs per match during the tournament.

"He played lights out, especially in the championship match," said Capo. "He had so many amazing digs, kept the ball in play, really hustled extremely hard. He definitely stepped up."

Senior Henry Dufour was the player who got injured right before the quarter-finals. He was right behind Hernandez in the offense, as he averaged 5.5 kills per match for the season.

Senior Eli Buckler was the "x-factor," said Capo. Buckler normally played at the middle hitter position, but after Dufour's injury, Buckler "did a little bit of everything," said Capo, including hitting quite a few aces. Capo also credited him with playing "great defense for a big guy" and for hitting a good amount of kills on offense. Buckler was also named to the All-Tournament Team.

Seniors Keegan Hurst and Nate Heffron, junior Cole Moritz and sophomore Zach Lewis also were solid contributors for the Tigers, with Moritz and Lewis both making 1.6 blocks per match. Other players on the roster were seniors Bryce Hagerty, Evan Milburn and Jack Bagley, juniors Bryant Cochran, Austin Pifer and Kevin Burks, and sophomore William Schnefke.

HSE grad Noah Malone going for gold at Paralympics in Tokyo

Up close, nothing bothers Noah Malone.

The former IHSAA 200-meter state champion at Hamilton Southeastern (HSE) High School currently runs at Indiana State, a huge get for the Sycamores, who lured one of the Indianapolis area's prime sprinters to Terre Haute despite interest from multiple Big Ten programs. Each time Malone takes his mark, a minor miracle resurfaces.

"I can see well enough the lines and everything on track; I can see well enough to be mobile," Malone said. "The closer they get, the more I can see, but like other than that, everything is kind of blurry, so."

Six years ago, Malone's doctors discovered the then-junior high student had Leber Hereditary Optic Neuropathy, an inherited form of

vision loss that often results in rapid and permanent loss of vision in both eyes.

"A couple of days after noticing it, my doctor said

over the next year it is going to get a lot worse," Malone said. "That is really scary for a 13-year-old kid ... I was very into track and field

then, and once my vision got worse, I wasn't really sure if I was going to be able to compete at a high level. I had goals to become a high school state champion and to go to college for track and field, and I wasn't sure if I was going to be able to accomplish any of that."

Malone kept running and winning.

Earlier this month in Minneapolis, Malone made the U.S. Paralympic track and field roster heading for Tokyo in August in stellar fashion.

His official ticket to Tokyo was punched in the 100-meter dash, with a time of 10.74.

The current top Paralympic T-12 time in the world in the 100-meters? Malone's previous time of 10.66 clocked before the U.S. Qualifications.

Later in Minneapolis,

Upcoming year sees limited sectional grouping changes

The COVID-19 pandemic is hopefully in its last stages, but an after-effect will be felt during the upcoming Indiana high school sports season.

In April, the IHSAA voted to freeze enrollment figures from the current classification cycle, which began in the 2019-20 season, for the 2021-22 school year. The organization noted in a press release that enrollments for the just-finished 2020-21 school year "showed significant fluctuation likely affected by the pandemic which raised questions about their true representation."

That means all schools will stay in their current classifications for each sport this coming year. The only exception are schools that are affected by the IHSAA's Tournament Success Factor, and will be moving up a class, down a class, or remaining

in a higher class.

Because of this, there isn't much change for Hamilton County schools when the sectional groupings were announced. There will be some new schools here and there, but no radical re-groupings.

Starting with the fall sports, boys soccer doesn't have too many changes. In Class 3A, the highest class, the sectionals are the same. Sectional 8 consists of Anderson, Fishers, Hamilton Southeastern, Muncie Central, Noblesville and Pendleton Heights, while the Sectional 10 group is Carmel, Shortridge, North Central, Pike, Westfield and Zionsville.

In Class 2A, Guerin Catholic and Hamilton Heights stay in Sectional 22. The sectional had been a six-team group, but will now be seven teams as Covenant Christian moves in. The other teams are Brebeuf Jesuit, Cardinal Ritter, Lebanon and Western Boone.

Class 1A Sectional 39 remains the same, consisting of Anderson Prep Academy, Liberty Christian, Sheridan, Taylor and Tri-Central. Sectional 40 features one change: Tindley replaces Howe. The other schools are the same: Heritage Christian, International, Park Tudor, Seccina and University.

In girls soccer, all local 3A sectionals are the same. Class 3A Sectional 8 is identical to the boys (Anderson, Fishers, Hamilton Southeastern, Muncie Central, Noblesville and Pendleton Heights), while 3A Sectional 10 features Arsenal Tech, Carmel, Guerin Catholic, North Central, Pike, Westfield and Zionsville.

Hamilton Heights plays in 2A Sectional 24 with Delta, Jay County, New Castle and Yorktown. Sheridan and University play in 1A Sectional 37 with Eastern, Taylor, Tipton and Tri-Central.

- VOLLEYBALL - EAGLES MOVE UP

In volleyball, one school will move up due to the success factor, and that impacts two local sectionals.

Heritage Christian makes the jump to Class 3A and will go to Sectional 27. Guerin Catholic and Hamilton Heights are in that sectional, along with Bishop Chatard, Brebeuf Jesuit and Shortridge. It will remain a six-team sectional, though, as Indianapolis Manual is leaving the group.

Heritage had been playing in 2A Sectional 43, in which Sheridan and University play. That sectional will now be a four-team group, with the Blackhawks and Trailblazers also playing with Park Tudor and Western Boone.

There are no changes in 4A Sectional 8. That lineup will stay Carmel, Fishers, Hamilton South-

eastern, Noblesville, Westfield and Zionsville.

- FOOTBALL - STARS IN 3A

The success factor will also mark a change for a football sectional involving county teams.

Western Boone, state champions in 2A for three straight years, will be moving up to 3A. The Stars will move to Sectional 28, a group that includes Guerin Catholic and Hamilton Heights. Other schools are Brebeuf Jesuit, Crawfordville, North Montgomery, West Lafayette and Yorktown. Chatard had been in this sectional, but the success factor bumped the Trojans up to 4A.

The other local football sectionals are the same. Fishers, Hamilton Southeastern, Noblesville and Westfield stay in 6A Sectional 3; Avon, Brownsburg, Carmel and

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World-class goalkeeper tells her tale

Carmel woman earns place in Canadian Soccer Hall of Fame

Canadian soccer is celebrating a big anniversary this year: It was 35 years ago when it fielded its first-ever women's international team. That historic 1986 team featured a goalkeeper from Ontario named Carla Chin. She would be with the team for nine years, culminating in a trip to Canada's first-ever Women's World Cup in 1995.

Twenty-five years later, Carla Chin Baker and seven of her teammates have a permanent place in Canadian soccer history, as they have been inducted into the Canada Soccer Hall of Fame. The induction honors the eight players who were part of that original Women's National Team. Chin Baker, who lives in Carmel, got a chance to reconnect with her teammates when they were presented to the country in a Zoom meeting in April.

"It was fantastic, because some of them I hadn't seen since '95," said Chin Baker.

Chin Baker started playing soccer at age 12, playing in a coed league. When she got to high school, a friend asked her to try out for a club team.

"That's when I got exposure to travel soccer," said Chin Baker. She continued to play and by 1986, when she was at university, she represented Team Ontario in its provincial championship. When that was successful, Chin Baker was picked from

a pool of players amongst the different provincial teams to represent Canada's first national women's team.

Chin Baker played her first international game on Dec. 11, 1987 at the Women's World Invitational Tournament (the Chunghua Cup), at Kaohsiung, China. The Canadian team won its first game, beating Hong Kong 2-0, giving Chin Baker the first of her 10 clean sheets in international competition.

It was a personal experience for Chin Baker, as her grandparents are from mainland China. Kaohsiung wasn't too far from where they were born.

"They were in a village probably about 10 miles away, but we couldn't really venture too far from our congregation," said Chin Baker.

The Canadian team played three more games at the tournament, one at Kaohsiung and two more in Taipei. It was a remarkable experience for Chin Baker, who was 21 at the time.

"It was absolutely incredible," said Chin Baker. She said it was "eye-opening" because it helped her "appreciate you had living in North America, in Canada. It really made me very grateful for the opportunity to represent my country, but also to see other parts of the world."

Chin Baker would go on to play 29 international games with the Canadian team. The team played in a qualifier for the first-ever

Women's World Cup in April 1991 in Port-au-Prince, Haiti. The Canadian team made it to the finals, with Chin Baker recording four clean sheets along the way, but fell to the United States team in the final.

The team qualified for the second Women's World Cup in 1995, which was played in Sweden. The Canadian team finished its group play 0-1-2, including a loss to eventual champion Norway.

Still, it was a great experience, and Chin Baker said she was "unbelievably bless-

ed and very honored to have that opportunity and to earn my way into a starting position during that event. It was an incredible experience, one that I'll definitely never forget. Highlight of my national team career, of course."

As one of the first national team players, Chin Baker saw several changes during her stay on the team.

"In the early days, when it first started, it was all from the provincial teams, and then they started to branch out to the universities," said Chin Baker. The provincial

championships would be the equivalent to each state from the United States playing each other.

And nowadays? "It's so different," said Chin Baker. "Now they run those residency programs and they have a U17 national team, U20 national team. They have the younger national teams and a full women's team."

Chin Baker and her teammates were at university when they were part of the national team; Chin Baker graduated from McMaster University in 1990.

"We would just play with our university teams, then at spring play with our club teams," said Chin Baker. "At any point during the year, they would email us and say, are you available. We'd have a training camp, then travel to any event what we wanted."

By January 1991, Chin Baker was living in the U.S. and working at universities across the country. After working at several colleges, she was an assistant coach at Notre Dame from 1993 to 1998, helping the women's team to its first national championship in 1995 – "a pretty good year," she said.

In 1998, Chin Baker officially retired from the program. That same year, she got married, and her family eventually settled in Carmel in 2007. She is now an assistant girls soccer coach at Park Tudor, and also was an assistant girls lacrosse coach for the Greyhounds this past

year, helping them to a state championship.

Chin Baker's daughter Erin Baker followed in her mother's footsteps in the net. Erin Baker just graduated from Carmel High School and was a goalkeeper for the 'Hounds, anchoring the defense as part of Carmel's 2019 Class 3A state runner-up team.

"A lot of her training that she got was in game-like situations in practice, so she was able to simulate those situations," said Chin Baker. "I let her develop into who she is today as a goalkeeper."

Erin Baker recently got to play in the Girls' High School All-American Game, which took place May 29 in St. Louis. She also is on the watchlist for Canada's U20 World Cup team; both Carla and Erin hold dual citizenship.

Chin Baker and her fellow inductees received crystal statues for their Hall of Fame induction, which she said was "very, very nice." In addition, the inductees were introduced with a question-and-answer session, which focused on their experiences as well as advice for young girls aspiring to play on the Canadian National Team.

Chin Baker said she was blessed and grateful to get to reconnect with her teammates. They may not have known it at the time, but Chin Baker and her teammates were pioneers for Canadian women's soccer.

Malone's qualifying attempt 400-meter dash, the first 400 of his competitive career, was clocked at 49.38 seconds. That time is the fastest by a T-12 visually impaired athlete in American history.

"I was blown away because I didn't know what

the American record was beforehand," Malone said. "Right now, I am ranked in the top three in the world in three different events. I am hoping to capitalize on that in Tokyo ... My goals are to medal, gold medals for those events."

Just as HSE High School paved the way toward Malone's athletic stardom, countless hours inside the classrooms of the Indiana School for the Blind and Visually Impaired gave him a chance to live the life he wanted.

Ahead of his senior year of high school, Malone spent most of his academic time at the Indiana School for the Blind and Visually Impaired, relearning everyday activities following his diagnosis.

Regardless of what happens on the track in Tokyo

this August, a new role model is ready to be a bright light on the world's grandest athletic stage.

"I think it is, I think it is for visually impaired people to be inspired and show that there is a way you can portray your talents," Malone

said. "I just want to make all my friends, teachers, coaches and family proud in Tokyo. They all have helped me so much along this journey."

Even when a fantastic gift is taken away, some people find a way to guide us where we need to go.

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
