



Looking back 59 years

Time capsule from 1962 found in cornerstone of Noblesville church

Last Tuesday afternoon, a time capsule from 1962 was opened in the cornerstone of the First Church of God located off Field Drive across from Noblesville East Middle School. Community members, including members of the 1962 congregation, gathered to open the time capsule and revisit the history of the church and of Noblesville.

The church was disbanded 12 years ago, and the property was purchased five years ago, initially for storage, and the land will now be used to construct the new Noblesville High School tennis facility.

Noblesville Schools Director of Communications Marnie Cooke told The Reporter she had heard rumors of a time capsule being present in the cornerstone. When it was found and opened on Tuesday, rumor became fact.

Betty Clark, 84, who was a congregant at the church when the time capsule was sealed and was present when it was opened, spoke to The Reporter about seeing some history from her youth.

"I was there but I didn't remember what was inside,"

Clark told The Reporter. "I was very young then."

The First Church of God time capsule contained 1963 editions of the *Noblesville Ledger* newspaper, a Bible, a pho-

to of the congregation's earlier location on Cherry Street, 1962 church programs, and a typed history of the congregation.

"It brought back a lot of memories of when I started

going to church," Clark said. "I went to church, first of all, down on Cherry and 12th streets when they were down

Heights, Sheridan youth assistance programs receive generous donation

A group of businesses and individuals from Northern Hamilton County recently formed a charitable advocate group known as SHHAG, and the group has announced its first donation of \$65,000 to the Sheridan and Hamilton Heights Youth Assistance Programs.

The funds will be divided equally between the schools that will support the invaluable work of these programs in each district.

Hamilton Heights and Sheridan Youth Assistance Programs provide services year-round. The program is now in its seventh year at Heights and sixth year at Sheridan. It is a tremendous lifeline to services for area families in need.

Youth Assistance Early Intervention Advocates Mary Ann Haymaker (Heights) and Lisa Samuels (Sheridan) are the "go to" individuals for connecting families to resources for food, clothing, financial assistance, mental health counseling, medication management, parenting support and a little bit of everything in between. They are supported by a vast network of compassionate partners, and often work in tandem with other in-school advocates serving schools in Hamilton County.

Hamilton County Youth Assistance Program serves children ages 3 to 17 1/2. The Early Intervention advocates coordinate services for the youth and families they serve. The program operates in all six public schools in Hamilton County and takes a holistic approach to coordinate the community's vast array of talents, services, and resources to help youth and empower parents and caregivers.

The Early Intervention Advocates in each community work under the appointment of County Circuit Court Judge Paul Felix and County Superior Court 1 Judge Michael Casati.

County budget hearings wrap up

In spite of state cuts, county to see no income tax increase

Last Wednesday, the last day of budget hearings drew to a close with neither an increase in Local Income Tax (LIT) rates nor a reduction of the Rainy Day Fund to compensate for the shortfall of tax allocation from the state.

The Reporter spoke with Hamilton County Council Member At-Large Sue Maki, District 4 Member Ken Alexander, and District 2 County Council Member and Council President Amy Massillamany about the final day of hearings.

The day began with financial consultant Mike Reuter explaining that his investigation into the reduction in the state's

allocation of LIT funds to Hamilton County is still ongoing, but that he had discovered some interesting facts.

Reuter told the council that among Marion County and the donut counties, Hamilton County has, in recent years, seen consistently the largest percentage

of increase in LIT collections. This year, the county is seeing the largest decrease in collections of all those counties.

"I can't go into and no one seem to understand why we have this deep of a cut when Marion County barely has any," Alexander said. "The people

who live in Hamilton County, for the most part, are a lot more affluent and they pay their taxes. The people who didn't pay much in taxes and took a really big hit were people in the hospitality industry. Quite frankly, the majority of them don't live in Hamilton County, they live in Marion County."

Reuter also spoke to the council about other times when the state was incorrect in its distribution and allocation and how Hamilton County had to argue to have that corrected.

According to Massillamany, if Reuter finds that the state is in error after his investigation is

Carmel Clay Schools start times change due to bus driver shortage

Last Tuesday's Hamilton County Council budget meeting, one of the topics discussed was various departments' struggles to hire and maintain staff in the current economy. At the local level, Carmel Clay Schools (CCS) is facing the same issue with a shortage of bus drivers.

Also on Tuesday, CCS announced a change to school start times because of a bus driver shortage.

In an email to parents, Carmel Clay Schools Superintendent Michael Beresford says the district is down by 30 to 40 drivers.

That means current drivers will have to handle three to four routes each day, instead of the normal two.

Also, bus transportation will not be offered to kids who live within a one-mile radius around each school building.

According to an email sent to parents, students on special needs or early childhood buses will not be impacted.

Elementary schools will be using what the dis-

Carmel makes rapid response to boost safety in 'no-bus' zones

Due to a shortage of bus drivers for Carmel Clay Schools, the school district has announced the creation of "No-Bus Zones" within roughly a one-mile radius of schools, with accommodations for those needing to cross busy streets or dangerous intersections.

"The safety of our students and families is a top priority and when I learned of the School Dis-

trict's decision to change the bus routes, along with the rest of the community, I immediately reached

out to our Engineering, Streets and Police departments to work as quickly as possible on a plan to enhance the safety of those who must now bike or walk to school,"

said Mayor Jim Brainard. "We have worked hard to build our network of paths and sidewalks to provide

This collaborative project is a continuous work in progress with updates

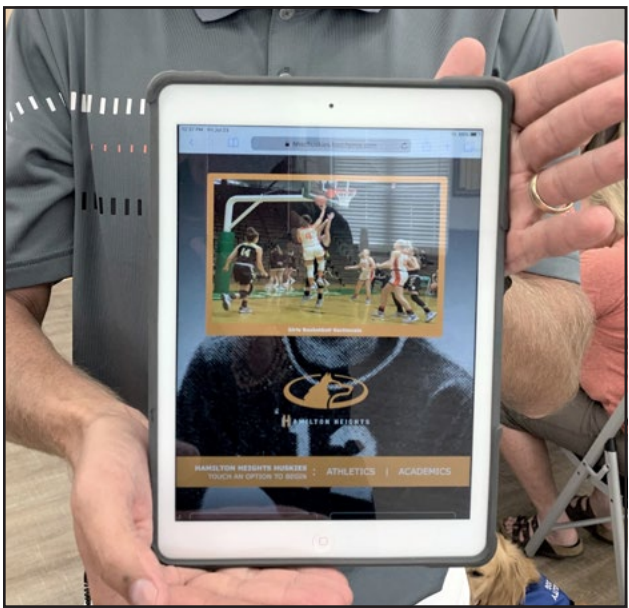

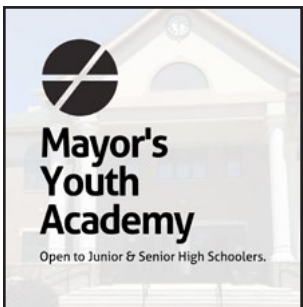

there. We sold that building and when they started building the new building on Field Drive, we had to do services in the old Noblesville Armory up there by the river on Logan Street."

Clark said the time capsule also brought back a lot of memories of people who had donated to have the building constructed. When talking about both the Field Drive and the Cherry Street locations for the church and the kind of people who attended, Clark spoke about one family who the government thought was donating a bit too much.

"There were people

there who were mostly living paycheck to paycheck and had a lot of kids," Clark said. "I remember one family, the Bryants. She was a housekeeper at the hospital and he was a janitor at the armory. The IRS wanted to audit them because they claimed so much on their taxes as being given to the church, but to them it was just their tithe. It just shows you what kind of people there was that put a lot of time, money and heart into building the newer one up here on Field Drive."

Clark attended the opening of the time capsule with and her two sons and one of her two daughters.

She has another daughter who lives in Colorado and thus was unable to attend last Tuesday.

"On the dead end on 16th Street there used to be a two-story house," Clark said. "That was where the pastor lived. After he moved to a different home, that building was turned into a place for Sunday school classes and we had Bible school over there. The church grew quite a bit and overflowed really, which is why we had to use the house for those classes. All my kids were dedicated to God at that church. They were married in that church. That place was just us."

Help when you need it most

Hamilton County Trustee Association working to prevent evictions

The CDC eviction moratorium order has been extended through Oct. 3, but not for everyone. It applies only to individual counties experiencing substantial or high COVID-19 positivity rates.

That means the eviction moratorium can and start and stop repeatedly through Oct. 3.

Hamilton County rates are on the rise, and the county has recently been in the substantial category, though that is based on the state coronavirus map, which updates weekly. If you need help, the time to seek assistance is now, before eviction proceedings begin, and the Hamilton County Rental Assistance Program can help those struggling to pay rent, utilities, or both.

Hamilton County Trustee Association (HCTA) President Danielle Carey Tolan told The Reporter, “People who are not getting help may not even know what is out there for them. It is not just affecting renters; it is affecting landlords, which is a huge economic driver for our community.”

According to their website, HCTA is made up of all nine townships in Hamilton County. Their mission is to help families and strengthen the community.

The organization will soon be working with probate courts, judges and magistrates about evictions and how they can help through the Hamilton County Emergency Rental Assistance Program (HCERAP).

“If we aren’t all working together, they [the courts] are going to get overrun and people are going to get evicted,” Tolan said. “We have been lucky enough that here in Hamilton County we don’t have the tent cities or people living under bridges. Most of our homeless are living in their cars or are couch surfing, so we don’t see it like we would in downtown Indy or Chicago or Seattle. But if we don’t work together to help fix the problem and help these renters that really do need help, it’s going to become a big nightmare for everybody in Hamilton County and the state.”

HCERAP has already helped a lot of

people.

“We have amazing success stories of people getting out of situations they could never imagine getting out of,” Tolan said. “Some were truly affected by COVID. One was hospitalized, lost her voice box and now has some mental problems because of all the medications, and we helped her. She’s able to stay on her feet, but she got so far behind because of not being able to work for eight months. There are amazing stories out there.”

This program is not just for people who are either diagnosed currently or have been in the past.

“As long as you can show that COVID affected you financially in one way or another ... You lost your job. You were furloughed. You had to take care of your kids because of schools closing or their kids got contact-traced with COVID in the classroom or they got trace contacted at work. If you can show anyone in your household was financially affected by COVID and are under 80 percent of the Hamilton County area medium income, you can apply.”

HCERAP opened the program March 15. The Hamilton County Commissioners applied for the program through the U.S. Treasury and it is administered by HCTA.

“It makes sense for the HCTA to do it because this is what we do day in and day out,” Tolan said. “This is our bailiwick. We saw the need immediately. We have had over 1,300 applicants to date since March 15. We have awarded over \$3.1 million of the \$10 million available.”

In 2018, there were 26,000 renters in Hamilton County. While that number has certainly increased, 2018 is the last set of official numbers HCTA had to work with in structuring this program.

“Based on the 2018 numbers we knew we would be able to help approximately 3,000 renters,” Tolan said. “Out of that, 14 percent of those renters are house-burdened. They can barely pay their rent and utilities – their basic needs. Fourteen percent of the renters in Hamilton County are living paycheck to paycheck.”

HCTA has over a dozen partners throughout the county including nonprofits,

If can show anyone in your household was financially affected by COVID and are under 80 percent of the Hamilton County area medium income, you can apply for assistance through the HCERAP at hctaindiana.com/era. complete, the council will take action to have that corrected.

“At this point we are still in the preliminary stage of understanding how we ended up in this state,” Massillamany said. “It is obviously not just us. There were others. But there were also other counties that saw an increase.”

The rest of the meeting

focused on both calling back department heads to discuss changes the council would make to the requests from Tuesday, and also on dealing with the requests from local nonprofits.

This year there was a revised application process for nonprofits to ask for county funding, and that has shifted the focus to services that Alexander said

provide a tangible return on investment.

“There are several healthcare organizations that come to us every year,” Alexander told The Reporter. “Trinity Free Clinic, Hope Clinic and Heart and Soul. They are what I call gap medical facilities. They help provide free healthcare to either underinsured or uninsured people.”

And then there are some organizations that do not fit in either category.

“Indiana Center for Prevention of Youth Abuse and Suicide, formerly known as Chaucie’s Place, is a unique one because that is a contract for services,” Alexander said. “They do the interviews with children of abuse at a contracted value of \$200 up to a threshold. We set that threshold and that’s what they stop billing us at.”

In light of the expected LIT shortfall from the state, one of the nonprofit areas that was cut was the arts.

“We just funded what we felt we needed to fund based on the services those specific nonprofits being to our county,” Maki told The Reporter. “There were quite a few that were arts-based that we did not fund because that is not what the council believes is what we should be doing with our taxpayers’ dollars regarding nonprofits.”

Massillamany was very specific that the choice to fund the arts less than in previous years was based on providing more essential assistance, and not because the arts are less valuable to the community.

“It is not that we don’t want to support any type of nonprofit – let me be very clear on that,” Massilla-

Tolan said.

many said. “What we had determined is primarily in the arts space we felt those nonprofits would be better served utilizing someone like Hamilton County Tourism.”

Maki echoed the desire to help nonprofits, but also pointed to LIT constraints as being part of the decision.

“We have some great nonprofit organizations,” Maki said. “We wish we could have funded all, but because of the cutback in the amount from the state regarding our share of the LIT, we could not entertain that.”

Several people have told The Reporter that this year’s budget hearings were very nonconfrontational, smooth and productive.

“As a whole there was a lot of legwork done

ahead of time, which I think is always very valuable for all members of the council,” Massillamany said. “I think that made it very productive. Looking at the council as a whole I think we all bring very unique qualifications that have made this year. If you think about where we have been in the last 18 months with COVID, everybody has honed in on their specialty or their niche and it’s worked. I think we saw that with the budget hearings. I think we have gotten to a place where everybody provides value and I’m just glad to be a part of it.”

The final county budget will be adopted in a public hearing, with public comments available this fall.

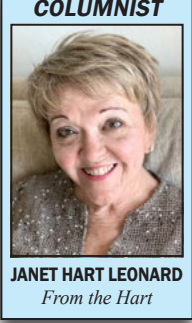

Laugh, my dear daughter, laugh! Picture your mom dancing in a TikTok video. OK, maybe not.

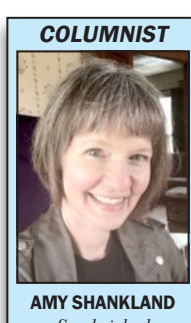
Never think that you are too old to do something. Well, you are too old to skydive. Don't even think about it.

Feeding Team food pantries depend on neighbors like you

Our neighbors in Hamilton County are amazing. Hundreds of people each month play a part in providing meals to food challenged neighbors. Simple acts of generosity multiplied hundreds of times help provide thousands of no questions asked meals that are available 24/7.

This column intends to inform, encourage, and tell stories of our neighbors who give to and shop from the pantries.

Yellow, honor system "Take What You Need, Give What You Can" food pantries are new to this area, which prompts lots of questions. How does this work? Where did the idea come from? Why do you do it? How can we get involved?

Food charities have been a personal cause since Lisa and I struggled with

food insecurity in the 80s. It became our primary business charity in the mid-90s.

Using data from the American Community Survey, we created a county map highlighting areas

with income levels slightly above what qualified for public assistance. The data also revealed 27,000 food insecure neighbors in Hamilton County before COVID hit. Recent estimates exceed 50,000 today.

Armed with data, we started knocking on doors asking to place a pantry near challenged population areas. Once locations were secured, several organizations stepped in to help build, paint, and deliver the pantries. Each week volunteers

maintain the pantries, pick up food, sort and then stock non-perishable food items. Their service makes thousands of meals available in pantries county wide. It is a simple model powered by a vision to serve neighbors, a business, several donors, and lots of volunteers. Take what you need, simply meaning NO NEIGHBOR need go hungry because food is available. Give

what you can, simply meaning when you are able, please help a neighbor by contributing into any of the pantries.

The model was adapted from the small outdoor book libraries that became popular over the last decade. The Feeding Team honor system is fueled with funding from businesses and individuals. It is capped with donations from neighbors who want to

help struggling families.

We will never know the stories of most of our neighbors who struggle with food insecurity. We believe it's not our business unless a neighbor shares their story. In future columns, we will share stories from neighbors about how your generosity served them in times of need. Be assured that the face of hunger in Hamilton County is not what you may think.

In practical terms, this simple way to help neighbors is having real impact on lives, families, and our communities. Thank you. A few meals can change the course of a person's life. 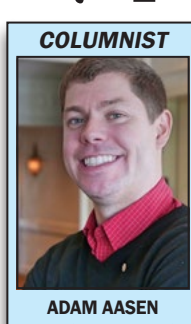

Bitcoin: Investing or speculating?

Many people have decided that bitcoin is the next big thing – and they are backing up their enthusiasm with dollars. Should you, too, consider putting money into bitcoin or other cryptocurrencies?

First of all, keep in mind an essential piece of financial advice: Don't invest in something you don't understand. And bitcoin is not easily understandable. There's no physical bitcoin, nor is it backed by a bank or government. It's a digital currency, used for transactions on a decentralized network of computers. The market's demand for bitcoin largely determines its price, though other factors are also involved.

And this price can vary widely. Since bitcoin was introduced in 2009, it has gone through periods of enormous gains and precipitous declines. Its short history has reminded market watchers of the bursting of the "dot-com" bubble in 2000 and the housing market bubble in 2007. These results have raised the following question about purchasing bitcoin: Is it investing or speculating?

There's a big difference between the two. Speculators engage in risky transactions with the hope of profiting from short-term price fluctuations in various financial vehicles. Investors, on the other hand, stick with these practices:

- **They follow a long-term strategy.** Real investors follow a long-term strategy based on their goals, risk tolerance and time horizon. Generally speaking, long-term investors don't do a lot of buying and selling, saving on fees and potential taxes. But this "buy and hold" approach doesn't mean investors put their portfolios on autopilot. Instead, they review their portfolios at least once a year to make sure their investment mix is still appropriate for their needs.
- **They focus on quality.** Long-term investors stay away from the flashier – and

riskier – financial instruments. Instead, these investors seek quality. When they're considering stocks, for example, they look for companies with solid fundamentals, including strong management teams, competitive products and services and business plans that bode well for the future. When they buy bonds, they seek those with high credit ratings issued by the independent rating agencies. Focusing on quality doesn't yield quick results, but it can instill confidence in one's investment choices.

• **They diversify their holdings.** If a downturn in the financial markets affects one type of asset particularly hard, and your portfolio contains a high concentration of that asset, your financial strategy could be jeopardized. Long-term investors reduce this risk by owning a variety of investments. While diversification can't guarantee profits or protect against all losses, it can help reduce the impact of market volatility on your portfolio.

And here's one more difference between investors and speculators: track record. Investors put their money into companies that provide tangible goods and services, and these companies have historically grown

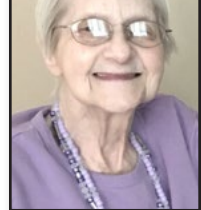

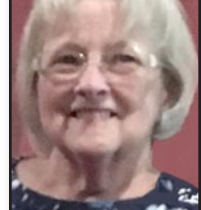

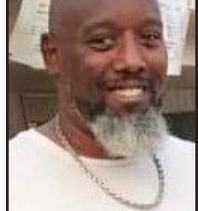
