Victoria Congresswoman Spartz (R-Ind.), Lt. Gov. Suzanne Crouch, and the Indiana Broadband Office held an informative roundtable discussion with local industry stakeholders Monday to discuss current broadband initiatives.

Understanding broadband's importance, ever-increasing topics centered on closing the digital divide, specifically in rural communities, and how doing so would allow underserved and unserved populations the same opportunities within areas of connectivity. Broadband in agriculture was discussed, and how the technologies used in feeding citizens can be exbroadband capabilities.

Superintendent Dr. Paul Kaiser said in an announcement the Delta variant is jeopardizing the district's ability to have in-person learning, athletics, performing arts, clubs and special events.



Kaiser's full message said the following: In an effort to keep our students in the buildings and learning at a high level, effective Wednesday, August 18, 2021, Westfield Washington Schools will require students, staff and guests to wear face masks inside of all our buildings. With the updated contact tracing guidelines, students who are 3+ feet from a person with COVID do not have to quarantine, so long as both parties are wearing a mask.

The City of Noblesville has partnered with Tandem Mobility to relaunch its bike share program that provides all Noblesville residents and visitors with a convenient, affordable and healthy way to get around town. A total of 10 cruiser bikes are now available between the city's two stations for members to use for on-demand, local trips.

"People are wanting to be outside and more active, so I'm excited to relaunch the city's bike-share program to better access our ever-increasing trail inventory," said Mayor Chris Jensen. "The locations of our two stations are per-





Teenage twins and an 18-year-old woman, all from Fishers, were killed in a hit-and-run crash in South Carolina early Monday morning.

South Carolina Highway Patrol says the crash happened around 2:06 a.m. on Interstate 26 about five miles north of Spartanburg.

Melissa Ann Parker, 43, Spartanburg, was driving a Hummer westbound

in an eastbound lane and hit a Kia sedan head-on. Three of the four people in the car died at the scene: 17-year-old Elleana Gaddis, 17-year-old Isabella Gaddis and 18-year-old Brianna Foster. Elleana and Isabella Gaddis were twins and students at Hamilton Southeastern High School. Foster graduated from the school this spring, according to a spokesperson.

Shaffer points out \$157.4M in deficit spending by Carmel Redevelopment Authority

As if the sexual harassment, hotel cost overrun, and \$1.3 billion debt scandals weren't enough, simple arithmetic unearthed a fourth.

In its annual financial reports to the state's Department of Local Government Finance, the Carmel Redevelopment Authority documented \$157.4 million in deficit spending over the last three years.

Disbursements exceeded receipts by \$84.8 million in 2018; \$46.4 million in 2019, and \$26.2 million last

That's eight and a half times greater than the shameful \$18.5 million (or 46 percent) cost overrun on the Hotel Carmichael construction.

On a happier note, \$157.4 million is a mere 12.1 percent of the \$1.3 billion debt.


