



Sen. Robert Dole's recent passing reminded me of the perennial boxing contender who finally gets his title shot well past his prime; or the legendary actor who receives a "Lifetime Achievement Award" instead of the elusive Oscar. Most of us would, or should, be proud of such a legacy.

Dole's "Democrat wars" quip during his Vice-Presidential debate against Walter Mondale didn't convince me that he was as mean as his (or his debate coach's) choice of words. Often, his biting wit was used to poke fun at himself. In later years, I detected more wit than bite in his public comments.



Carmel leaves MIC, applies to HCC

school athletics was dealt a significant shakeup on Monday afternoon, as two big schools are out one of the biggest conferences in the state - and have an eye on joining one of Indiana's other power-

house leagues. Carmel and Center Grove high schools are leaving the Metropolitan Intersholastic Conference (MIC). Both schools were charter members of the league since its founding in 1996, but are now former members. Hours after the announcement, both Carmel and Center Grove announced they have formally applied for membership to the Hoosier Crossroads Conference (HCC), which contains four other Hamilton County schools: Fishers, Hamilton Southeastern, Noblesville and Westfield. Other schools in the HCC are Avon, Brownsburg, Franklin Central and Zionsville.

At 3:09 p.m. on Monday, Indianapolis Star reporter Kyle Neddenriep posted principals then "made the difficult decion Twitter that Carmel and Center Grove

The MIC later released a statement on the changes. The statement said that during the fall "it came to our attention that for athletic reasons, as well as a desire to 'culturally align' (as reported in the media) with surrounding suburban schools, Carmel and Center Grove were seeking placement in a different conference. We value the historical relationships with these two communities, and while this news was sad to those of us who understand the rich history, we also understand that these two schools no longer share the vision that we are more than an athletic conference, that athletics should not drive our decisions, and that our unique characteristics are what make us strong."

The statement said that the remaining sion to vote Center Grove and Carmel

removal of other schools with a unanimous vote of the remaining schools and just cause. This vote will allow these two schools to seek a confernce that aligns with their visions."

Once the news broke, speculation immediately began about one or both schools joining another conference, with all signs pointing to the HCC. Later that afternoon, Carmel High School athletic director Jim Inskeep sent out a joint statement from Carmel and Center Grove confirming that both schools had formally applied to join the HCC.

The statement reads:

"Center Grove High School and Carmel High School have submitted a formal petition to join the Hoosier Crossroads Conference (HCC). We respect the coaches, faculty, administrators, and student-athletes of the MIC Conference. We have had long-standing and positive relationships with the MIC Con-

The Indianapolis-area world of high principals of the conference's six other 4 of the MIC Constitution allows for the collaboration and competition with the MIC schools. The decision to request to change conferences is rooted in the belief that this move would provide our schools with the collaboration, competition, and support necessary to grow our

programs over the next 20 years." The contracts between Carmel and Center Grove and the six MIC schools will be honored through the 2022-23 school year, but the MIC will begin as a six-team conference in the spring of

Carmel and Center Grove were both charter members of the MIC. When the league formed in 1996, the other six schools in the conference were Ben Davis, Lawrence North, North Central, Terre Haute North, Terre Haute South and Warren Central. The Terre Haute schools left the MIC in 2013, with Lawrence Central and Pike joining from Conference Indiana that same year.

Prior to the founding of the MIC, Carmel had been a charter member of the Sagamore Conference when it began in 1967. The school left the Sagamore in 1974 to join the Olympic Conference, and stayed a member of that league until the MIC began.

Cami Cass part of 2022 Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame Women's Induction Class

Cami Cass, a 1988 graduate of Noblesville High School, is among the 10 people announced as the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame's 2022 Women's Induction Class.

Cass was a member of the Millers' 1987 undefeated state championship team, which itself was inducted into the Hall of Fame earlier. Cass will join teammates Courtney Cox Cole and Krissi Davis in the Hall of Fame when the 2022 class is honored on April 30.

The Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame wrote the following on its website about Cass:

"Cass was the starting point guard for Noblesville's 1987 undefeated state championship team and 1988 state runner-up squad. Her senior season, she was the team's leader in assists and 2nd in points, rebounds and steals, teaming with 2015 Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame inductee Courtney (Cox) Cole. During Cass's career, Noblesville teams were 100-7, including four sectional titles, three regional titles, and two semi-state championships. A four-year starting point guard at Fordham University, she led their teams in steals all four seasons and was their leader in assists for three years. She completed her career with the program record in career steals (188), remains 2nd in career assists (487) and remains tied for the single-game steals record (8). A senior on the Rams' first Patriot League championship team in 1992, in 2021 she was one of five players named

to Fordham's 1990's all-decade team. A member of the United States' 1997 Deaf Olympics gold medal team in Copenhagen, Denmark, she was a teacher at the Indiana School for the Deaf and coached in their girls basketball program."

The website also said Cass "has received numerous awards and recognitions as a deaf athlete" and in 1989 was a featured athlete in *Sports Illustrated*.

The inductees will be honored at the 20th Women's Awards Banquet on April

30, with an afternoon reception at the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame museum in New Castle, and an evening banquet at the Primo Banquet Hall in Indianapolis.
