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# Dave Mundy: Sheridan Schools prepared for community's growth

Topics at State of the Schools included enrollment, safety, facility upgrades

**The REPORTER**

"I believe that a key to Sheridan Community Schools' success is partnering with this great community." That's what Superintendent Dr. Dave Mundy said as he opened his "State of the Schools" presentation. In the spirit of that partnership, Dr. Mundy held his first community meeting on Aug. 30 in the Sheridan Elementary School cafeteria. In Sheridan, a big topic of discussion is always growth, and Dr. Mundy

presented data of current enrollment, comparing it to enrollment over the past 10 years, as well as what is projected by professional demographers. Based on the statistics presented, the demographic studies have been accurate in predicting enrollment. The current SCS enrollment is 1,066, which represents consistency to a slight decline over the past 10 years, while projections indicate slow and

# County officials debating \$63M fairgrounds project

The Hamilton County Commissioners are proposing a fairgrounds improvement project costing upwards of \$63 million. The plan came because Phase 2 of Noblesville's Pleasant Street Expansion Project ([reimaginepleasantst.com/project-info](http://reimaginepleasantst.com/project-info)) will demolish the O.V. Winks Building and other county municipal buildings. "The proposed project to fully build it out was approximately \$63 million," Commissioner Mark Heirbrandt said. "Obviously, that is a lot of money and we wouldn't be able to afford to do all of that

at once." This fairgrounds improvement plan is broken into three phases. The first is the most costly and includes infrastructure updates to improve storm-

Fortunately, the gun did not fire. The victim was then pistol whipped before the suspect left the area shouting racial slurs at the two men.

# Noblesville senior Nicole Liu speaks at statewide conference

Noblesville High School Senior Nicole Liu has been busy this summer. In June, she was named a Youth Ambassador to VOICE Indiana. VOICE is Indiana's youth initiative whose mission is to engage, educate, and empower teens to live, promote, and celebrate tobacco- and nicotine-free lifestyles. VOICE Youth Ambassadors will coordinate efforts between chapters throughout the state of Indiana and be the statewide youth leadership team for the VOICE program. In July, Liu participated in the Indiana Black Expo Youth Leadership Summit as a representative of VOICE Hamilton County. The Youth Leadership Summit gives Indiana youth a platform to hear and learn from professionals regarding academics, decision-making, and advocacy, and it takes place annually in conjunction with the Indiana Black Expo. Then, on Aug. 29, Liu was invited to the Indiana Commercial Tobacco Control Partner X-Change to present on her experiences with VOICE, specifically her trips to the Indiana Statehouse to meet with policy makers and to present a mural project to legislators on behalf of VOICE Hamilton County. She was the only youth to appear at this statewide adult educational and networking event, and she was chosen due to her dedication to VOICE and her passion for keeping the youth of Indiana tobacco- and nicotine-free. # S&P affirms county's 'AAA' credit rating

S&P Global Ratings recently affirmed its 'AAA' long-term rating of Hamilton County, which is the highest rating that can be given. In addition, the agency assigned its 'AAA' to the county's bridge improvement bonds that are scheduled to close in September 2022. The outlook is stable. The bond proceeds will be used to finance a new bridge project over the White River. This will be done in conjunction with the City of Noblesville. The bridge is the critical component to Noblesville's Pleasant Street project, which city officials say will provide traffic congestion relief on State Road 32.

This is the second year the county has received a AAA rating, and it is still the only county in Indiana that holds a AAA rating from S&P. "This rating not only saves our residents money, but also signals a sound and stable economic climate," Commissioner Mark Heirbrandt said. "It certainly speaks to the hard work and teamwork of our county commissioners, county council, and finance team." In its report, S&P analysts noted that the county has "[a] very strong economic profile, characterized by robust economic growth . . . wealth

levels that are among the highest in the state, [and] robust tax base growth and strong budgetary management practices..." "To improve our credit rating, while we continue to recover from the effects of the pandemic and ramp up numerous projects is simply exceptional," Heirbrandt said. "Our county is fiscally strong, disciplined, resilient, and poised for more growth in the future." Analysts further elaborated that the county's financial position will remain very strong and will be supported by its proactive budgetary management.



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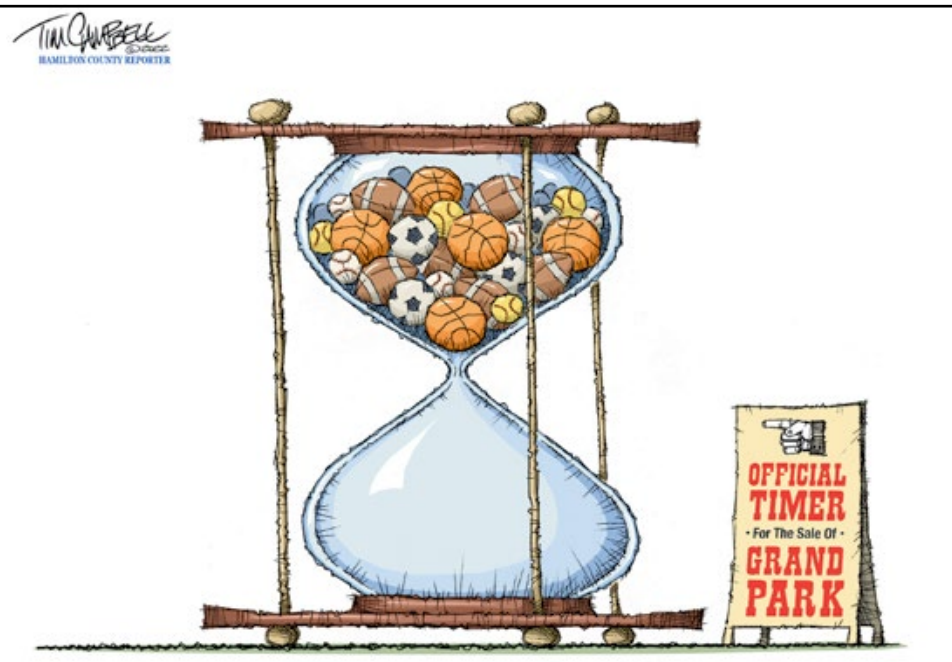

Jill Olecki of Carmel, a mother of five, has battled Diffuse Large B-cell Non-Hodgkin’s Lymphoma since February 2019, resulting in the amputation of her right leg. She is now facing the amputation of her remaining leg. The St. Nicholas Neighbor in Need Foundation recently raised the \$125,000 needed to donate the van to the Oleckis and for home renovations to make it more accessible for Jill. The van was presented to Jill and her family on Aug. 28 at BraunAbility, 645 W. Carmel Drive, Carmel. Jill has endured years of chemotherapy and hospitalizations, and now another leg amputation. Through this, Jill, along with her husband Dave, remain positive and steadfast in their faith. “Although it has been incredibly difficult, the blessings I’ve received from the outpouring of love and charity from others have been amazing,” Jill said. Instead of focusing on her struggles, Jill turns to her faith, perseverance and fortitude to carry her through her health problems. # Hamilton County launches online portal for county-appointed boards

Streamlined process meant to encourage community engagement

The Hamilton County Council has a new online process for nominating appointments to county-run boards. In the past, appointments have been made through word of mouth. "During our last meeting, we had the opportunity to showcase the ineffective nature of the current process as we filled a position on the newly formed consolidated Board of Zoning Appeals and the Hamilton East Public Library board," said Ken Alexander, Vice President of the County Council. "The appointments sparked a spirited debate about recommendations and the qualifications

of the nominated individuals. These are items that could be automated if done correctly." The new online process will list each of the county-appointed board seats along with their roles and responsibilities. Anyone interested in filling county-appointed board seat will need to complete an online form with their credentials and experience. When any of the seats on the county-appointed boards need to be filled, the Council can easily review the applications in the online portal.

Nicolich and her smart, sassy and mischievous 5-year-old Golden retriever, Makena, will be among more than 100 fellow dog owners and walking enthusiasts at the sixth annual Strut 2 Save Lives on Sunday, Sept. 11. "I'll be walking to honor my donor hero and his or her family," Nicolich said. "I think about them and thank them every day because of the incredible gift of life they gave to me."

The one-mile Strut 2 Save Lives returns to Noblesville's Dr. James A. Dillon Park, located at 6001 Edenshall Lane on 146th Street, about a quarter mile east of Hazel Dell Road. Registration begins at 10 a.m. and costs \$25 for adults, \$12 for children ages 12 and younger, and \$65 for families up to five participants. Last year, 111 individuals and five teams participated to raise awareness about organ donation and transplantation. All proceeds from Strut 2 Save Lives benefit Indiana Donor Network Foundation's Bryan Clauson Legacy Fund ([driven2savelives.org/bc-legacy-fund/](https://driven2savelives.org/bc-legacy-fund/)), which supports donor families before, during and after their loved one's donation by providing financial assistance for transportation, accommodations, food and other necessities before and during the donation process.

buildings bordering Pleasant Street, and the start of improving various buildings. "The fairgrounds are used by numerous county offices for training, such as the sheriff's office, emergency management, the health department," Heirbrandt said. The first phase of the project will relocate the maintenance and storage barn, improve the Llama Barn, and build a new Bicentennial Pavilion. The plan also calls for expanding and improving the Exhibition Center and creating a new show arena. Heirbrandt said the plan will "change some of the uses to make it more educational for people in our community as well as rental space and looking at a potential return on investments whether it's weddings or other family events."

going to choose that plan, it's incumbent upon the fairgrounds and that leadership to fill that gap." Alexander says the council asked the commissioners to come up with a plan to finance the rest of the project. He suggests using a bond anticipation note to fund moving the fairgrounds to a new location, then using the tax dollars from private development to finance it. The fairgrounds are tax-exempt because they are county-owned, so by allowing them to be privately developed and taxed through tax-increment financing, also called a TIF bond, the county could use that money to build a fairground in a new location. "My opinion was not to move the fairgrounds but to find a financial plan that got the fairgrounds built," Alexander said. "We have a unique opportunity with it being on tax-free land to maybe turn it into a 'TIF-able' area."

Heirbrandt says it is important the fairgrounds remain in a central part of the county. "It was overwhelmingly supported to keep the fairgrounds in that location," Heirbrandt said. "One of my jobs is to listen to the people, especially the people that utilize that facility."

Bier Brewery has been working with the City of Noblesville to open a new 6,000 square-foot taproom at 1618 S. 10th St. Located on four acres of property, the new family-friendly establishment will serve BIER, wine, cider, cold brew coffee, wine slushies and food. The plan includes a dog park, kids’ playground, covered outdoor seating, a private room, and a large outdoor green space with bike access to the Allisonville Road Trail. It will have a focus on working with the community, local farmers and sustainable environmental practices throughout the operation. The space also will be welcoming as a coworking office space with plenty of room to accommodate staff, guests and families. “Bier Brewery is known for its quality and taste, and I know their commitment to excellence will make them a success in No-

blesville,” Mayor Chris Jensen said. “Our administration has invested heavily into our city’s gateways, including a new trail and road improvements along the South Tenth Street corridor. I’m excited for our residents to have Bier Brewery as a new dining and recreation option in this area of the community.” This will be the third and largest location for Bier Brewery, which also has taprooms at 5133 E. 65th St., Indianapolis, and 13720 N. Meridian St., Carmel. This is a multi-million-dollar investment for Bier Brewery to complete the project. “We are very excited to be adding our third location in No-



blesville,” said Ryan Connor, Director of Sales and Distribution for Bier Brewery. “The City of Noblesville has been a great partner and very welcoming to our ideas and goals. We are anxious to get started as soon as we tie up loose ends.” Bier is a local family-owned and operated brewery that opened in 2010. The operation started out small by Jerry (father) and Darren Connor (son) as a small-scale nano brewery. It has since evolved to include Darren’s siblings, Ryan Connor and Leah Keene, and expanded in 2015 to a 20-barrel system in order to keep pace with growing demand for its product, which

now consists of more than 130 beer selections. It opened the 4,300 square-foot, all-ages taproom location with food service in Carmel in 2018. With a steadfast focus on crafting quality brews, Bier Brewery is a perennial award-winner in statewide and national craft beer competitions. Bier Brewery was awarded the Indiana Brewers Cup Champion award in both 2011 and 2012, and has garnered over 110 medals at state, national, and international competitions. Bier Brewery has been involved with the Noblesville Chamber of Commerce as a Taste of Business vendor and featured in their Birdies & Brews Golf Outing fundraiser along with numerous other fundraisers in the Noblesville area. The taproom also plans to host community organizations and local musicians on their outdoor patio. The new taproom is expected to open in summer 2023.

# County Surveyor appointed to five national committees

so many amazing professionals and advocates about what my county is doing,” Liu said. Erica Strahm, Youth Coordinator for VOICE Hamilton County, said, “Nicole is always among the first to participate

and isn’t afraid of new experiences. Her maturity and presence, lengthy VOICE resumé, and knowledge about the topic made her the perfect choice to present to Indiana’s adult Tobacco Control Partners.”

According to Liu, she found VOICE through a Purdue University Extension leadership program called A Chance To Serve. Upon graduation from the program, ACTS students are matched with a Hamilton Coun-

ty organization where they can continue building on the leadership skills they’ve learned. Liu plans to attend college after graduation, and she would like to make advocacy and helping others a career someday.

steady growth over the next 10 years, with an estimated a total K-12 increase of 200 students by 2032. Although there is often talk about potential housing additions in a small community, Mundy shared that there are currently only three developments that are in the town pipeline. Dr. Mundy explained that another factor in enrollment is transfer students. SCS is one of the two districts in Hamilton County that accepts transfer students from other districts. The data presented showed 159 transfer students from 15 different school districts, with the majority coming from Westfield and Clinton Central. In response to a parent question, Mundy added, “We absolutely enjoy our out-of-district students. They are an integral part of our daily culture, and we look forward to continuing to increase our number of out-of-district students over the next few years.” To be ready for the controlled growth coming to the community, Mundy presented short- and long-term planning for facility upgrades in three

phases. Phase I has begun with the construction of a fieldhouse that will provide two additional gyms for athletic and classroom use, as well as an upgraded fitness center that will be used for classes and after school. Phase I also includes two additional classrooms for the high school and upgraded concessions and locker rooms for football. Phases II and III are in the cost estimating phase, as the board and administration with community input is exploring auditorium upgrades, bringing softball and soccer on-site, and other general building upgrades. Long-term planning also includes exploration of the best place for a new school when the time comes to build one. Mundy explained that a strength of Sheridan has been small class sizes, and he provided data showing that the elementary still has room to keep class sizes relatively small. He also shared that the elementary was designed to expand wings to build capacity at a relatively low cost and maintained the SCS commitment to quality education, which includes small class sizes.

Moving to another topic that is a great concern to parents, Dr. Mundy introduced Dr. Melissa Hampton, High School Assistant Principal and Corporation Safety Director, who shared information about safety updates at Sheridan. She explained that SCS has moved to a four-level safety system that allows it to be consistent with other Hamilton County school districts and first responders. She shared that students and staff will be trained in the A.L.I.C.E. method in response to a violent intruder. Hampton also said that that through the generosity of the Hamilton County Council on Alcohol and Other Drugs, vape sensors are being installed in high school bathrooms and will likely be added at the middle school in the future. Other safety activities include a camera audit, re-keying the district, and replacing card readers. The importance of not propping open doors is being stressed to students and staff and signs are posted on doors as a constant reminder. She added that the safety team is reviewing several safety policies, and it will develop a three-year plan

for multiple safety initiatives to be implemented at SCS. Dr. Mundy then addressed the topic of the large number of new teachers this school year. He shared data about the 18 new teachers to the district, as well as data about why teachers have left SCS over the last five years. The data suggests that the departures are for a variety of reasons, ranging from retirement (30 percent) to leaving education (5 percent), and many reasons in between. “We really are being successful,” Mundy said. “For the most part, teachers are not leaving to go to other districts – they have many different reasons. We believe we are staying competitive with our teacher salaries and have a culture where teachers want to teach. That also showed up in the hiring process, and we were very pleased with our pool of outstanding candidates.” Mundy closed on an enthusiastic note, thanking the audience for taking time to attend and noting that there are a lot of great things happening at Sheridan, and expressing his appreciation for the great community support and partnership.

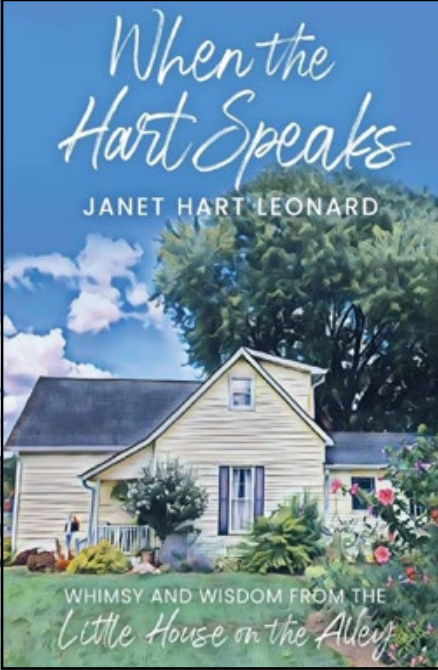

# Examining my adoption records

As my adoption and reunion story continues, I’ve changed some names, places, and dates.

Imagine my excitement two weeks later to come home for lunch and find an envelope in the mailbox from the State of Ohio. I practically flew up our steep stairs to my husband’s office to share the news with him. I couldn’t bear to open the envelope up alone and was grateful John was home for lunch that day. His eyes widened in surprise at what I held in my hand.

I noticed that the envelope wasn’t too bulky and wasn’t certain what that meant. Surely it would be bigger if it contained medical records. I sat down across from John and shook as I opened it.

The first thing I saw was my original birth certificate. Of course, I had viewed my other one many times with my mother and father’s names on it. But this was the real deal, and nothing was whited out.

The name my birth mother had originally given me was the first thing on top – Autumn Sun. I thought it sounded absolutely beautiful. I saw my birth mother’s name next – Linda Ann Fitzgerald. The certificate listed her address in Cleveland, Ohio, along with some surprising information such as what month she began prenatal care (second) and when her last period had started.

It was obvious to me that Linda had taken good care of me in the womb and my heart flooded with gratitude. I was disappointed to see nothing

under the section for information for my birth father. The next page did have a section showing each of their races, which was “white,” and how many years of school they had completed.

The third page was a triplicate copy of my record of adoption from the Indiana State Board of Health, with my maiden name typed at the top. The next portion had my parents’ names, dates of birth, address, and employment information. My eyebrows rose at what I saw in the second section. Linda’s name was listed, along with my birth father’s name – Jack Richer.

The Certification of Clerk of Court showed that my adoption was final on March 19 the year after I was born. I thought about what my mother and father must’ve gone through as they waited six months to be certain I could truly be theirs. That wait must have felt long and agonizing. The final page was the Ohio Department of Health Division of Vital Statistics Listing Information Concerning Adoptive Parents. This information was used to establish a new birth certificate for me. It showed both my name at birth and my name after adoption. I felt my heart melt seeing my mother’s handwriting and then a bit of sadness.

Mom had listed that she had two living children and one child that had been born alive and was now deceased. I thought of Laurie up in Heaven at that moment and wondered if she had been watching over me all these years. She was the other big sister that I never got to meet.

Need tech advice? Look no further than Hamilton County’s own Noble Geeks.

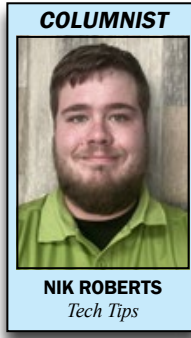
My name is Nik Roberts, and I am the owner of Noble Geeks located in Downtown Noblesville. I have over 15 years of experience in the tech field.

This week, I am going to share a recent experience with a customer’s HP printer issue.

I got a call that a customer’s printer would not work. All they ever did was replace the ink. Other than that, they had no idea about how to diagnose it.

When I arrived at the customer’s house, the printer was confirmed to be not working. I begin to perform basic troubleshooting.

The computer says it’s printing, and the printer is silent. I eventually perform a factory reset, and behold I now get an error! E9, which means the internal printer software was corrupt after a quick lookup. At this point, I called to get HP on the phone. I am expecting this thing to

I am then informed that because her subscription for ink had been suspended, she cannot use her printer in the meantime.

HP essentially has taken this very kind customer’s

This customer spent well over \$200 for this printer, and all because of a \$4.99 per month ink subscription unpaid you are going to disable the customer’s printer – their own property!

cartridge from Instant Ink.

I caught a mud puppy once, hauled from the murk, all rusty brown, mad, and mucus snorting. (The hellish salamander hiss still gives me chills as I write about it.) Pulling it up the steep creek bank was half the chore, for it then ran wildly across land,

eternally hook-mouthed, as if searching for a tree to scale and escape. I cut the line, not wanting to deal with what the devil had dealt. I cut the line, too, for river eel and pond snake – satanic aquatic astonishments that kept this wild-eyed cane pole boy wide-eyed during his water hole days. The snapping turtles did their own line-cutting, which was a good thing, for you didn’t want to risk a finger – I was told he wouldn’t let go until a full moon.

My grandfather kept everything he caught, even the smallest of sunfish. Catch and release was a real eye-roller to him. “It’ll make a fine sandwich,” he’d say with each catch attached to the stringer. We’d hatchet the heads, scale the bodies, slit the bellies, thumb-gut them. We’d coat them with crumb, fry them, and once the meat was in our mouths, use our tongue tips to tease, test and tunnel the meat to find stray bone. I feared the fish bone choke, a slain fish’s final revenge. Karma. Balled bread loosened the bone from the gullet, dropped it safely to the belly. I have reached my fifties, in part, thanks to dough balls of my youth.

Before all that, I was a creek bank baby, left behind on a blanket while my young, lovey-dovey parents fished and cavorted beside a Perry County creek. My father once lifted my squealing mother and pretended to toss her into the drink, except he didn’t pretend well enough .

... my infant ears soon heard the big splash of two bodies. I could’ve become an instant orphan, the perfect bait for the infamous bobcat slinking around that summer, but then I heard my parents laugh and splash and bob together (they were in love like that), and everything was A-OK.

I graduated from cane pole to rod and reel. I lived for Zebco summers: river hooks baited with drippy liver slime, standing sure-footed on riverbank, lost in catfish fever; casted Rapalas and rubber worms from boat decks, hoping to fool a big-mouthed bass; mined crappie beds with the shine of minnow and corpse of cricket.

In my 20s, I experienced a sea change. I started feeling sorry for fish – even worms. Cricket choruses gnawed at my conscience. I lost the thrill of the gill, sold my poles and tackle in a yard sale. I became a repentant fisherman. Somehow, though, when I catch myself reeling in the years, like now, I think fondly of the carefreeness of a cane pole boy whiling away warm-aided days near creeks, spillways, rivers, lakes, and ponds, thinking of nothing else but crappie and catfish and lumbering carp, bluegill, and bass, way back before the adulthood hooks of worry and regret sunk in and, sadly, my jaw became tightly set.

# Debunking the spending myth in Carmel

When the words “spending” and “Carmel” are used in the same sentence, it is often in the context of someone trying to criticize the city and use scare tactics about how the sky is falling.

It’s not uncommon to see a local TV station report on a \$25 million investment by a private company coming to Indianapolis. Yet in Carmel, \$200 million in private investment is just another routine series of major economic announcements. Why do companies like GEICO, Allied Solu-

tions, Republic or any of the other 118 corporate entities now in Carmel want to invest their money here?

It’s because Carmel has invested in itself.

When looking to move or build

a corporate headquarters, almost every company emphasizes the ability to attract and retain employees as a primary objective. Over the last 20 years, Carmel has prioritized enhanced amenities that do just that. Roundabouts, cultural attractions, streetscapes, public spaces, free parking, and access to nightlife are the kinds of things companies searching for a new location are looking for. Add

in great schools, a safe community, and low taxes (we’ll get to that in a minute), and you get a winning recipe for success – one that leaders from across Indiana and throughout the country have been trying to replicate.

But why does this private investment matter? LOW TAXES! In Indiana, commercial property taxes are capped at 3 percent of assessed value, three times that of residential property taxes. When you figure that a typical retail strip mall might generate \$120,000 in annual tax revenue but a corporate headquarters on the same piece of land can easily generate \$400,000 in tax revenue, it’s obvious to see how attracting private investment positively impacts the tax owed by

residential property owners. The extra dollars go to support police, fire, parks, streets, etc., all while ensuring residential taxes in Carmel are the fifth-lowest in Indiana. This doesn’t even take into account the increased income and sales taxes that come along with the jobs filling the corporate HQs.

In Carmel, the investments the city has made have paid off time and time again as private companies have invested their money into our community. The result is a world-class city with quality amenities and low taxes for our residents.

Spending in Carmel isn’t a problem; it’s the reason for our success.

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# Perry turns 8: Sheridan students love this hardworking canine companion

Happy birthday, Perry!  
On Aug. 31, Sheridan Elementary School’s (SES) service dog Perry Winkle Doyle turned 8 years old. This will be his sixth school year at SES. The Golden Retriever/Labrador cross is a working dog – his job is to help students in speech therapy, as well as spread comfort to all students.

In speech class where he works with his owner Cathy Doyle, Perry motivates students to correctly articulate their target sounds or use completed sentences while interacting with Perry. If the student wants him to “get,” which is the command for Perry to pick up something off the ground, and they do not correctly articulate the /g/ and they say “det,” Perry will not be able to do the command. They work very hard to get that correct /g/ sound.

Perry greets students when they enter the building every day. Students feel unconditional love from Perry, and it is a great way to start their day. Students come and read to him; he is a great listener, and he never judges anyone who reads slowly or incorrectly pronounces a word.

Perry is even able to play Jenga with the students, but it isn’t all fun and games. Perry is a highly-trained service dog from Canine Companions. Cathy graduated from team training with Perry on Sept. 29, 2017. Canine Companions is a leader in the service dog industry, promoting greater independence for owners with their dogs. The organization provides service dogs to adults, children and veterans with disabilities and facility dogs to professionals working in healthcare, criminal justice and educational settings. Since its founding in 1975, the dogs and all follow-up services are provided at no cost to clients.

Perry was raised by a family in Chicago. When he was about 2 years old, he went to Canine Companions in Ohio to begin his advanced training. While there, he learned some basic

tasks like how to pick up objects and open and close drawers and cabinets. Perry knew over 40 commands when Cathy met him at team training. Once Perry was trained, Cathy had to attend a two-week team training in Ohio to learn how to work with him, which included quizzes and homework assignments.

Canine Companions wants to make sure that the new team will have all the skills needed to be successful. Cathy and Perry have to get recertified as a team every two years and are required to send a vet report annually. Canine Companions wants to make sure the dogs are healthy, up to date on all vaccines, and that they remain at their ideal weight. It costs about \$50,000 to \$60,000 to raise and train a service dog, so Canine Companions wants to make sure the dogs are taken care of by the recipients.

The list of Perry’s benefits to students at SES is long.

He is very helpful with stu-

dents with autism during emergency drills by decreasing the children’s fears and anxiety. SES Principal Valerie Roberts said, “Many times when a student is upset or having a tough day, Perry can accomplish things we can’t! Something about the comfort and unconditional love of a dog just puts the students right at ease and helps transition them back to the classroom! Perry has been a huge asset to the mental health of our entire building!”

Reflecting on her years with Perry, Cathy recalled one story that particularly melted her heart. A student who struggled with reading was coming down to read with Perry for 10 minutes twice a week. After a few weeks, the student announced to Cathy that he was the best reader in the school. He may not have been the best reader in the school, but Cathy knows that increasing confidence in reading is a crucial step to being more successful in reading.

Perry has helped many children who are struggling to leave their mom or dad in the mornings. The student will take Perry’s leash and have Perry walk them to class, providing a great distraction and comfort for separation anxiety. He also participates in the annual talent show, game nights, and the school carnival. Perry dressed up as a lion and jumped through a ring of fire, which was a huge hit at the carnival.

During his time off, Perry has visited residents at nursing homes, Janus Developmental Services, and people in local hospitals. A visit with Perry can bring joy and happiness to people everywhere.

“Having Perry at school with me has been one of the greatest joys of my life,” Cathy said. “I love how the children and the staff interact with him. He has changed our school in so many more ways than I ever thought possible.”

# “Feel-good” Margaritaville is “thoroughly enjoyable”

Let’s start with this premise: Nobody doesn’t like Jimmy Buffett ... oh, I guess there may be someone somewhere who dislikes the easy-going feeling of Buffett’s tunes and lyrics, but I’ve never run across them, or even heard of such an unhappy person.

Given that premise – what a brilliant idea to take Buffett’s song catalogue and weave them into a story of an island, an entertainer on that island, and the visitors who are come there to recharge. Thus, we have *Escape to Margaritaville* which opened Aug. 18 on the B&B stage.

Shaped by director Douglas E. Stark, with musical direction by Ter-

ry Woods and choreography by Ron Morgan, the show is a pleasing romantic romp which entertains with an interesting set of love stories, plenty of humorous situations, and many colorful displays of music and dance.

Kyle Southern and Amanda Tong star as rakish island musician Tully, and work-bound island visitor Rachel. Both give excellent performances full of musical and acting dexterity. Their story arc is set along the lines of Boy meets/wins/loses/regains Girl, but they make it an interesting journey with apt and original characterizations.

A similar story is offered in a more comedic vein by

Brett Mutter and Hannah Elizabeth Boswell in their featured roles as hotel bartender Brick, and Rachel’s best friend – visiting bride-to-be Tammy. Tammy’s prenuptial situation of being engaged to a clueless heel (played by Logan Moore) while being attracted to Brick leads to lots of fun situations that this duo presents peppered with jocosity.

A strong supporting cast, led by B&B regular Jeff Stockberger as island old-timer J.D., and Rachel Bibbs as hotel owner Marley, brighten the proceedings. Additionally, Ray Gleaves has several very nice moments as hotel worker Jamal. A large ensemble of players/dancers covers a long list of small roles and while filling the stage with Ron Morgan’s lively combinations.

*Escape from Margaritaville* is a bit sexier than other B&B shows I’ve seen (given the hardy audience participation for “Let’s Get Drunk and Screw”), and the playful sexual humor comes off well enough, but parents – be aware of what’s here.

The costumes by Travis M. Grant are bright and “island appropriate.” Plus, Grant provides a generous number of wigs for the production. Terry Woods and his small orchestra do excellent work with the familiar score. The set design by Michael Layton covers the show’s needs for hotel, hiking trail, volcano, beach, plus assorted off-island locations.

**Bottom line:** This is a surprisingly well-done, feel-good show. Talent-levels are high, and the story

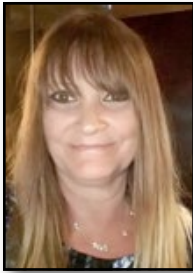

## Hamilton Heights breaks in new turf with shutout over Rensselaer Central

ARCADIA – Last Friday night’s home opener was special for Hamilton Heights for numerous reasons. The Huskies had waited long enough to join the trend of high school football teams across the country and now they can say they have a new turf field at Husky Stadium.

The Huskies made sure that they were the only team that scored during their first game on their new field turf, keeping the visiting Bombers off of the scoreboard in a convincing 21-0 win.

“We have been waiting and waiting and waiting for this night,” said a satisfied fifth-year Hamilton Heights head coach Jon Kirschner.

“We probably had our best practice all year on the turf last night. We had our best Thursday night clean up practice, under the lights and it’s the most focused we’ve been,” continued Kirschner on a change in the Huskies having a new surface to practice and play on.

“Physically, mentally, emotionally, it all just plays into it,” stated Kirschner on the impact the turf has had on the Huskies just this week in preparation for this game against a Hoosier Conference opponent. (The Bombers are in a different division, so it does not count in the conference standings.)

Hamilton Heights students were moved from the old Jackson Central to the current Heights campus during Spring Break toward the end of the 1992-93 school year. The first football season on the grounds of Husky Stadium took place in August 1993. Now, it’s 30 seasons later and the surface has been converted from natural grass to field turf.

This was one of those games where it took both squads some time to feel each other out and figure out what they can do and how.

The Bombers started off the game with an 11-play drive that resulted in a turnover on downs at the Huskies’ 10 on a botched snap that quarterback Corbin Mathew had to dive on.

The Huskies resembled the same, but took 14 plays just to turn it back over to Rensselaer Central on downs at their 22.

The new five possessions were three Bomber punts and two Husky punts. Then Heights was able to get something going on their next series.

Heights put together a 10 play, 87-yard drive that

was capped off by a Bodie Derrer 19-yard touchdown strike to Tyler Champion for a 7-0 Husky lead.

“Getting that first touchdown and on the board first was a big deal, but typically speaking, we haven’t always been a team that can go in and get the score right before half,” said Kirschner on his team’s first scoring drive.

Hamilton Heights wasted no time at all when it got the ball to start the third quarter.

They marched down the field again in 10 plays, but just 61 yards this time, taking six minutes off the clock. They had a 4th down and six at the Bomber 35 and Derrer went to the air again. He found junior Jaylyn Pugh for a 35-yard TD, pushing the lead to 14-0.

“We came out in the second half and we hit that second touchdown. Not only that, but to run six minutes off of the clock, on a team like Rensselaer Central, where they are methodical with everything they do, putting two touchdowns behind the eight ball is a big, big deal,” Kirschner continued on the Huskies’ ability to wear down the Bombers all night.

The next Bomber drive had the visitors in position pushing for a score, but a sack of Mathew and a holding penalty took them back to a fourth down and 23 at the Heights 29. Rensselaer Central went for the end zone and Mathew threw an interception right to Pugh.

“He (Pugh) has done that twice this year,” said Kirschner of Pugh on his second big interception in just three games.

Two drives later, running back Diego Hernandez-Reyes fumbled at the 11-yard line, giving the Huskies an extremely short field to work with.

After a penalty and another miscue, Heights faced a fourth and 12 at the Bomber 13.

Derrer then found Champion with ease for the 13-yard touchdown, making it what wound up as the final score of 21-0.

“We were able to keep the pedal on and they were gassed,” stated Kirschner on Heights wearing down the Bombers’ defense, keeping them on the field so much.

“Beating a quality opponent like Rensselaer Central, we played them twice last year, because of how our conference is set up. We went up there twice. It was nice to play here for a

Southeastern stayed on the ground for its remaining scores. Chandler Weston went 31 yards into the end zone midway through the third quarter, then Azariah Wallace took a three-yard run to score late in the period. Sam Forrest completed HSE’s scoring with a 13-yard touchdown as the clock ran out in the fourth quarter.

The Royals’ defense played well, making a goal-line stand in the third quar-
