## **Dave Mundy: Sheridan Schools** prepared for community's growth

Topics at State of the Schools included enrollment, safety, facility upgrades

#### The REPORTER

"I believe that a key to Sheridan Community Schools' success is partnering with this great community."

That's what Superintendent Dr. Dave Mundy said as he opened his "State of the Schools" presentation. In the spirit of that partnership, Dr. Mundy held his first community meeting on Aug. 30 in the Sheridan Elementary School cafeteria.

In Sheridan, a big topic of discussion is always

The Hamilton County Commissioners are proposing a fairgrounds improvement project

S&P Global Ratings recently year the county has reaffirmed its 'AAA' long-term rating of Hamilton County, which is the highest rating that can be given. 



Proceeds support Bryan Clauson Legacy Fund, racecar driver who gave gifts of life through organ donation

Jill Nicolich was given a second chance at life in 1997 when she received a kidney donation from an organ donor in Philadelphia.

"I was young and scared, just filled with so many emotions," said Nicolich, a Noblesville resident and retired administrator for F.C. Tucker. "Everything with my transplant went very well. The kidney was practically a perfect match for me. I know how grateful and lucky I am to have had my new kidney for 25 years now. It is very overwhelming to think about."

Nicolich and her smart, sassy and mischievous 5-year-old Golden retriever, Makena, will be among more than 100 fellow dog owners and walking enthusiasts at the sixth annual Strut 2 Save Lives on Sunday, Sept. 11.

"I'll be walking to honor my donor hero and his or her family," Nicolich said. "I think about them and thank them every day because of the incredible gift of life they gave to me."

The one-mile Strut 2 Save Lives returns to Noblesville's Dr. James A. Dillon Park, located at 6001 Edenshall Lane on 146th Street, about a quarter mile east of Hazel Dell Road. Registration begins at 10 a.m. and costs \$25 for adults,







# **Every plot** has a story

Have you ever walked through a cemetery and thought about the stories that lie in the plots of the gravesites?

My childhood and now growing older together friend - Cathy Swank Fuqua, gave

me this idea for a column. I celebrated my 67th birthday on September 3. Have I told you that I love birthdays? I celebrate all month long. Just ask my husband.

A few years after my dad passed, my mother told me she wanted to buy me a "special" birthday present. I was excited to hear what she had in mind. It was a cemetery plot at Crownland Cemetery. I could not quit laughing. Now that is SPECIAL!

She wanted to know where I would be when I died. I told her I'd be with her in heaven. She laughed and said, "Janet, I mean your earthly body." We both laughed. I now own my house, my mom's house and a cemetery plot. All are within six blocks of each other in old Noblesville. I'd say prime real estate. My parents paid \$6,500 for their house in 1951. I paid \$17,500 for my house in 1975. Mom paid \$600 for my burial plot. It would be a safe bet to say they have all appreciated, even my cemetery plot.

Now I'm thinking I need to pick out my headstone. I want my final decisions made now, so my family will not have to make any difficult decisions later. Honestly, I don't mind thinking about death, but don't worry, I plan to dance at my grandson, Thomas' wedding reception. He was born on August 16. That would make me in my early nineties then. I hope I



I've always been fascinated the cemetery. I grew up riding my bicycle through Crownland. The plot where I will "live" (doesn't that sound better than "be buried"?) is in a row behind

and two plots south of my parents. The lane to get there is lined with the plots of my friends and the parents of my friends. I like to say that my plot will be in the same "neighborhood" as my friends.

When people pass by my grave, I know there will be stories told. I want the stories to be one of "her words made a difference.'

We all have a story, and we all will have a legacy.

What will people remember about me? Did I love well? Did my words encourage? Did my testimony tell of my faith? Was I kind to those who hurt me? Did I love enough so that I will be missed by those I leave behind? Will people smile when they remember me?

People grieve because the person is no longer in their life, and they miss the love that was there. The truth is that the love will always be there. It will just look different. The love will go on.

I miss my mom and my dad, but wonderful reminders are left of their love for me ... one just is very special ... my cemetery plot. I still have to

Yes, my stories have a plot, and ... my plot has a story. Stay tuned ... I have more memories to make and more stories to tell.

## Reeling in the years with a cane pole boy

I was a cane pole boy.

Bamboo sticking out the backseat window, cork bobbers bobbing in a counbreeze, the crunch and grind of Goodyear on gravel, a day's dust drying our throats, our Sundays mea-

sured by cousins' smiles and country road miles.

Creek, spillway, river, lake, and pond.

Crappie and catfish and lumbering carp.

Bluegill and bass. The squirm of live bait in rusty Folgers cans. The worms: slimy, nightmarish creatures unearthed from sewer soil by us wee lads as our grandfather watched from a taskmaster's higher stinky, slippery worm bed that sat like a bruise on a steep hillside.

To this day, I have not seen a worm like those my grandfather bred, skinnier than the hooks they were put on, more vein than worm, pink, putrid, little, wriggling, writhing live-wired things, sun stunned when pulled by the handfuls from the black muck, while we cursed the smelly slop squishing between our toes, a cancerous ground that I swear stunted my growth, left me prematurely bald.

Even the birds wouldn't eat those worms. I think they were scared of them. The devil's worms.

homegrown, worm, not the costly worm found in the Main Street bait shop where you were somehow calmed by the doomed crickets' chirps and fascinated by

the juicy, chilled, fat night crawlers caged in waxed cardboard and sold by the dozens like doughnuts.

Crouching behind cattails, sworn to silence so as not to scare the fish, even your legs (which they did), staring intently at that cork bobber, as if trying to psychically will it to bob, to begin a dance between an surface, refusing to blink the blink being a fisher boy's biggest sin—so as not to miss the sinking of the bobber and the cue to pull back on the pole, tightly set the hook and lift a deep-water dweller to daylight, all scaly and tail bent, gilled, finned, floppy, and frown faced. I lived for the cane pole bend, the airlift of frightened fish. It was my oxygen.

I caught a mud puppy once, hauled from the murk, all rusty brown, mad, and mucus snorting. (The hellish salamander hiss still gives me chills as I write about it.) Pulling it up the steep creek bank was half the chore, for it then ran wildly across land,

frugal eternally hook-mouthed, as wanting to deal with what the devil had dealt. I cut the line, too, for river eel and pond snake - satanic aquatic astonishments that kept this wild-eyed cane pole boy wide-eyed during his water hole days. The snapping turtles did their own line-cutting, which was a good thing, for you didn't want to risk a finger – I was told he wouldn't let go until a full moon.

My grandfather kept everything he caught, even if a snake shoots between the smallest of sunfish. Catch and release was a real eye-roller to him. "It'll make a fine sandwich," he'd say with each catch attached to the stringer. We'd hatchet the outdoorsman and a denizen heads, scale the bodies, slit swimming just beneath the the bellies, thumb-gut them. ground. We harvested the cumulous-cloud-reflected We'd coat them with crumb, fry them, and once the meat was in our mouths, use our tongue tips to tease, test and tunnel the meat to find stray bone. I feared the fish bone choke, a slain fish's final revenge. Karma. Balled bread loosened the bone from the gullet, dropped it safely to the belly. I have reached my fifties, in part, thanks to dough balls of my youth.

Before all that, I was a creek bank baby, left behind on a blanket while my young, lovey-dovey parents fished and cavorted beside a Perry County creek. My father once lifted my squealing mother and pretended to toss her into the drink, except he didn't pretend well enough.

. . my infant ears soon heard if searching for a tree to scale the big splash of two bodies. and escape. I cut the line, not I could've become an instant orphan, the perfect bait for the infamous bobcat slinking around that summer, but then I heard my parents laugh and splash and bob together (they were in love like that), and everything was A-OK.

I graduated from cane pole to rod and reel. I lived for Zebco summers: river hooks baited with drippy liver slime, standing sure-footed on riverbank, lost in catfish fever; casted Rapalas and rubber worms from boat decks, hoping to fool a bigmouthed bass; mined crappie beds with the shine of minnow and corpse of cricket.

In my 20s, I experienced a sea change. I started feeling sorry for fish - even worms. Cricket choruses gnawed at my conscience. I lost the thrill of the gill, sold my poles and tackle in a yard sale. I became a repentant fisherman. Somehow, though, when I catch myself reeling in the years, like now, I think fondly of the carefreeness of a cane pole boy whiling away warmaired days near creeks, spillways, rivers, lakes, and ponds, thinking of nothing else but crappie and catfish and lumbering carp, bluegill, and bass, way back before the adulthood hooks of worry and regret sunk in and, sadly, my jaw became tightly set.

On Aug. 31, Sheridan Elementary School's (SES) service dog Perry Winkle Doyle turned 8 years old. This will be his sixth school year at SES. The Golden Retriever/Labrador cross is a working dog – his job is to help students in speech therapy, as well as spread comfort to all students.

In speech class where he works with his owner Cathy Doyle, Perry motivates students to correctly articulate their target sounds or use completed sentences while interacting with Perry. If the student wants him to "get," which is the command for Perry to pick up something off the ground, and they do not correctly articulate the /g/ and they say "det," Perry will not be able to do the command. They work very hard to get that correct/g/ sound.

Perry greets students when they enter the building every day. Students feel unconditional love from Perry, and it is a great way to start their day. Students come and read to him; he is a great listener, and he never judges anyone who reads slowly or incorrectly pronounces a word.

Perry is even able to play Jenga with the students, but it isn't all fun and games. Perry is a highly-trained service dog from Canine Companions. Cathy graduated from team training with Perry on Sept. 29, 2017. Canine Companions is zes and homework assignments. a leader in the service dog industry, promoting greater independence for owners with their dogs. The organization provides service dogs to adults, children and veterans with disabilities and facility dogs to professionals working in healthcare, criminal justice and educational settings. He also participates in the annual talent show, game nights, and the school carnival. Perry dressed up as a lion and jumped through a ring of fire, which was a huge hit at the carnival.

During his time off, Perry has visited residents at nursing homes, Janus Developmental Services, and people in local hospitals. A visit with Perry can bring joy and happiness to people everywhere.







## Fishers pulls away late to secure HCC opener

**FISHERS** – The Fishers Tigers beat the Noblesville Millers 49-25 as both Hamilton County teams met at the Fishers stadium last Friday to open Hoosier Crossroads Conference play.

Both teams got off to a strong start with great offensive plays and key stops in the first half. The second half was a different story as sophomore JonAnthony Hall and senior Carson Dunn powered Fishers to pull away by outscoring Noblesville 28-8 in the second half.

"I'm proud of our kids' effort, we preach effort. It is important to us and it is a staple of our program and our kids brought effort for all four quarters," Fishers head coach Curt Funk said after the win on Friday.

Fishers started off what would be 74 combined points from the Hamilton County foes with a five-play, 64-yard drive which was capped off by a 25-yard touchdown run by Dunn. The drive featured a pass from Lucas Minns to Joe Syrus to start and was powered by runs from Dunn and junior Khobie Martin.

"Khobie and Carson are elite, elite, elite - they are the best in the state and are tables turned as Dunn was able to turn small gains into big gains," said Noblesville head coach Dave Sharpe after the game.

Sharpe's Millers were quick to respond on the following drive as they marched right down the field with a 11-play, 76-yard drive of their own. Noblesville's rushing attack was crisp and the offensive line got a great push on the Tigers with a rushing attack that featured several different running backs and ended with junior Blake Widget marching in for a two-yard score.

The Millers were able to keep momentum on the defensive side of the ball and stopped the following drive from Fishers with a turnover on downs. Junior Austin the Hastings anchored the Millers defense with nine tackles on the night including being in 28-25 Fishers. on the action for the fourth down stop, but it wasn't enough as the Millers fell short on off 87 yards to the Millers three-yard line the following drive.

Junior Logan Shoffner started the drive off strong for the Millers with a 20-yard run. ## **Hamilton Heights** breaks in new turf with shutout over Rensselaer Central

ARCADIA - Last Friday night's home opener was special for Hamilton Heights for numerous reasons. The Huskies had waited long enough to join the trend of high school football teams across the country and now they can say they have a new turf field at Husky Stadium.

The Huskies made sure that they were the only team that scored during their first game on their new field turf, keeping the visiting Bombers off of the scoreboard in a convincing 21-0 win.

"We have been waiting and waiting and waiting for this night," said a satisfied fifth-year Hamilton Heights head coach Jon Kirschner.

we probably had our best practice all year on the turf last night. We had our best Thursday night clean up practice, under the lights and it's the most focused we've been," continued Kirschner on a change in the Huskies having a new surface to practice and play on.

"Physically, mentally, emotionally, it all just plays into it," stated Kirschner on the impact the turf has had on the Huskies just this week in preparation for Conference opponent. (The Bombers are in a different division, so it does not count in the conference standings.)

Hamilton Heights students were moved from the old Jackson Central to the current Heights campus during Spring Break toward the end of the 1992-93 school year. The first football season on the grounds of Husky Stadium took place in August 1993. Now, it's 30 seasons later and the surface has been converted from natural grass to field turf.

This was one of those games where it took both squads some time to feel each other out and figure out what they can do and how.

The Bombers started off the game with an 11-play drive that resulted in a turnover on downs at the Huskies' 10 on a botched snap that quarterback Corbin Mathew had to dive on.

The Huskies resembled the same, but took 14 plays just to turn it back over to Rensselaer Central on downs at their 22.

The new five possessions were three Bomber punts and two Husky punts. Then Heights was able to get something going on their

was capped off by a Bodie Derrer 19-yard touchdown strike to Tyler Champion for a 7-0 Husky lead.

"Getting that first touchdown and on the board first was a big deal, but typically speaking, we haven't always been a team that can go in and get the score right before half," said Kirschner on his team's first scoring drive.

Hamilton Heights wasted no time at all when it got the ball to start the third

They marched down the field again in 10 plays, but just 61 yards this time, taking six minutes off the clock. They had a 4th down and six at the Bomber 35 and Derrer went to the air again. He found junior Jaylyn Pugh for a 35-yard TD, pushing the lead to 14-0.

"We came out in the second half and we hit that second touchdown. Not only that, but to run six minutes off of the clock, on a team like Rensselaer Central. where they are methodical with everything they do, putting two touchdowns behind the eight ball is a big, big deal," Kirschner continued on the Huskies' ability to wear down the Bombers all night.

The next Bomber drive this game against a Hoosier had the visitors in position pushing for a score, but a sack of Mathew and a holding penalty took them back to a fouth down and 23 at the Heights 29. Rensselaer Central went for the end zone and Mathew threw an interception right to Pugh.

"He (Pugh) has done that twice this year," said Kirscner of Pugh on his second big interception in just three games.

Two drives later, running back Diego Hernandez-Reyes fumbled at the 11-yard line, giving the Huskies an extremely short field to work with.


After a penalty and another miscue, Heights faced a fourth and 12 at the Bomber 13.


