The end of the Brainard Era

Carmel mayor announces he will not seek eighth term in office

"Thank you, Carmel, for one of the greatest honors of my life – the opportunity of a lifetime."

Those were the sentiments of long-time Carmel Mayor Jim Brainard.

Brainard announced that he will not seek re-election at a press conference held at 2 p.m. Tuesday outside Carmel City Hall.

The seven-term Republican mayor took office in 1996. A municipal election for mayor and all nine seats on the Carmel City Council will be held in 2023. The mayor humbly and gratefully thanked all the citizens of Carmel, all city employees and all other elected officials for helping to make Carmel the premier destination city that it is today.

During Brainard's time as mayor, the city's population has quadrupled. Carmel is considered one of the fastest growing cities in the United States (and the fastest growing in Indiana). Mayor Brainard is known for his efforts to revitalize central Carmel through the creation of the Arts & Design District, City Center and Midtown areas, the Center for the Performing Arts, the development of the Monon Greenway and Central Park and the installation of more than 140 roundabouts, the most per capita of any city in the world.

Mayor Brainard's vision has helped create a vibrant, thriving, walkable city where companies want to locate, where employees want to live and where families want to raise their children. The mayor is frequently asked to speak around the world about city planning, climate change, redevelopment, and innovative infrastructure.

Mayor Brainard says he is most proud of turning the old rundown Monon Rail into the new Monon Trail – Carmel's "beachfront" property – for providing trails and sidewalk

Sheridan's solar-powered schools about more than saving money

Solar panels are becoming more prevalent as a source of energy, and many schools are embracing the model as a cost-saving strategy, as well as a way to model stewardship for students.

A little over four and a half years ago, Sheridan Community Schools was one of the first schools in the state to begin the move to solar power. As the district nears the five-year anniversary of the implementation of the project, Superintendent Dave Mundy reflects positively of the decision.

Over the past several years the cost of energy has gone up at a fairly significant rate. Mundy explained that due to the decision to go to solar power, Sheridan has not seen any of these increases as they are locked into a consistent rate and will have this rate until

Climate Protection Awards from the U.S. Conference of Mayors and many awards for being bicycle friendly and a "Tree City."

The mayor also implemented hybrid or flex-fuel vehicles for city operations and instructed the City's Utilities Department to develop the technology to use recaptured methane gas to power its wastewater treatment facility as well as repurpose its biosolid waste into high-quality fertilizer.

Park land, greenspace, and trails have increased from 40 acres to more than 800 acres during the mayor's tenure. Currently, Mayor Brainard is serving as a Trustee and Co-chair of the Energy Independence and Climate Protection Task Force for the U.S. Conference of Mayors.

In 2015, he was instrumental in spearheading the passing of Carmel's anti-discrimination ordinance, which is one of the most comprehensive in the state.

The city and the mayor himself has received many accolades and awards, locally, nationally, and internationally, for excellence during his tenure. The City of Carmel has been recognized for excellence in many aspects of its planning, development, implementation, and service. Carmel's workforce is well-trained and dedicated to providing the highest level of service to residents, businesses, and visitors to the community. Because of its low crime rates, low cost of living, excellent schools, availability of high-paying jobs and appreciation of community amenities such as arts, culture, parks and recreational opportunities, Carmel continues to appear on national, data driven 'Best' lists where cities' rankings are assigned based on job market, net migration, and quality of life markers.

Carmel is among *Money* magazine's Best Places to Live in America at spot No. 3 in 2014 and No. 1 in 2012. In 2015, Carmel was recognized as Community of the Year by the Indiana Chamber of Commerce.

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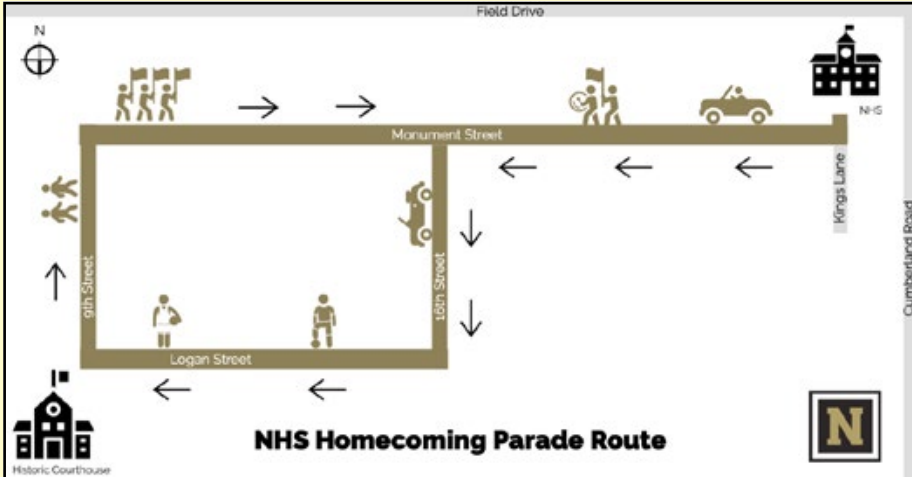

AG Todd Rokita wins settlement with company over alleged deceptive emails

After filing a lawsuit over alleged misconduct, Indiana Attorney General Todd Rokita has secured an agreement from a Nevada-based company to cease solicitations to Indiana public employees.

Rokita alleged that PERA LLC sent more than 70,000 deceptive email solicitations to Indiana public employees giving the misleading impression that the communications came from the Indiana Public Retirement System (INPRS) or an approved INPRS provider. PERA is an acronym for Public Employee Retirement Assistance.

"Indiana's Deceptive Consumer Sales Act protects Hoosiers from the very kind of misconduct that we have alleged in this case," Rokita said. "Hoosiers should be able to trust that companies are providing accurate information in an aboveboard, honest, legal and straightforward manner."

Under the agreement, PERA admits to no wrongdoing — but it relinquishes its ability for seven years to solicit, sell or coordinate appointments, discussions, or other similar communications to public employees on behalf of, or in connection with, third-party financial representatives in the State of Indiana.

In the emails sent to public employees, PERA offered to provide consultations with financial representatives to discuss each

employee's personal retirement fund. Whenever a public employee agreed to the consultation, PERA then sold the appointment to a seller of various financial products.

Neither INPRS nor any approved INPRS provider had anything to do with the emails.

In the agreement, PERA pledged to pay a \$7,500 penalty to the State of Indi-

ana, with an additional \$92,500 penalty suspended conditioned on compliance with the consent judgment. If PERA chooses to resume such business in Indiana after seven years, it must

advise the Attorney General of its intention to do so.

Rokita's Consumer Protection Division investigated this matter after receiving complaints from the Indiana Public Retirement System.

2048. According to Mundy, to date, Sheridan's solar array has produced 11,536,693 kilowatt-hours (kwh) of power, which equates to approximately \$1,361,329 of deferred cost savings and energy sell-back for the district.

Mundy explained that making solar work for a school requires collaboration and planning. Mundy was the superintendent at Sheridan when the solar project took place five years ago. (He left for a stint at Noblesville and now is back as superintendent.) He commented that Johnson Melloh Solutions (now Veregy) and Duke Energy have been great partners in this process.

Because of the precision in the construction and

When Sheridan moved to solar, state law required power companies to buy back extra power that is produced during non-peak hours and use it on the grid. The law has changed greatly and reduced the buy-back price, but fortunately early projects were grandfathered in.

"Fortunately for Sheridan, its board and administration's vision in renewable energy has secured major financial net metering benefits," Mundy said. "Sheridan's early adoption will

get a one for one credit on kwh solar power when solar overproduces what the schools' load is until 2048."

Saving money is certainly important for schools, but Mundy also commented on the importance of modeling good practices for students. Students walk past the solar fields daily. They are safe behind fences, but they are very much part of the landscape. In addition, Mundy shared that the project could create a real-life learning opportunity as Sheridan High School explores starting a Renewable Energy Pathway for students as part of its curriculum.

Golf event raises \$150K for children of fallen Marine

Last Thursday honored Corporal Humberto Sanchez who was killed in a bombing attack at the Kabul airport in Afghanistan in 2021.

Kevin Rankel, a member of the Marine Corp, said the event was on track to raise \$100,000 in scholarship money for children of Marines.

Last Wednesday night, an organizer for the golf outing told News 8 the group raised \$150,000 for the Marine Corp Scholarship fund.

Rankel told News 8 he approached the Sanchez family because he has a similar story to them.

"In 2011, the first year this initiative started, the honoree was my son. He was killed in action in Afghanistan in 2010," Rankel said. "We liked what we saw, and we continued

to be involved. It's been a great experience for us just because we've been able to hook up with other gold star families."

Since 2007, Tyler Mensch, another Marine Corp member, said he's helped organize events honoring fallen Marines.

"It's been heartwarming and impressive for 15 years to see how people will come together to put this thing on," Mensch said. "It's about using networks and it's about communicating what we're trying to do and providing this opportunity. Once you provide it, you'd be amazed how it comes together."

Sanchez, originally from Logansport, was the first in his family to be born in the United States and serve in the U.S. military.

Rankel said 72 different teams honored Sanchez at Pebble Brook Golf Club in Noblesville.

The event started at 11:30 a.m. last Thursday.

Woman arrested for attempted murder after Fishers shooting

Fishers police have arrested a woman for attempted murder.

Shortly before 3 p.m. on Saturday, Fishers police responded to Interstate 69 north of 116th Street to check on the welfare of an individual. When officers arrived, they observed an SUV parked along the shoulder and an adult male and female standing outside.

As officers approached, the man told them he had been shot. The woman, Shaalea Davis, 38, McCordsville, was taken into custody without incident and officers assisted the man until paramedics arrived. The man was transported to

an area hospital and Davis was transported to the Hamilton County Jail.

Fishers Police Detectives and Evidence Technicians responded to process the scene, collect evidence, and interview witnesses. The handgun used in this incident was recovered.

Davis was charged with Attempted Murder, Level 1 Felony; Battery, Level 3 Felony; Domestic Battery, Level 4 Felony; Criminal Recklessness, Level 5 Felony; Intimidation, Level 5 Felony; and Pointing a Firearm, Level 6 Felony.

A charge is merely an accusation, and the arrested person is presumed innocent until proven guilty.

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Indiana police, fire fighters & fire chiefs all endorse State Senator Kyle Walker

State Senator Kyle Walker's campaign announced Monday that he has received

endorsements from several statewide public safety organizations, including the Indiana State Fraternal Order of Police, the Indiana Fire Chiefs Association and the Indiana Professional Firefighters PAC.

These police and fire organizations noted Walker's leadership on several initiatives to support first responders and strengthen public safety.

The Indiana State Fraternal Order of Police, which represents over 16,000 law enforcement professionals serving all of Indiana's communities, thanked Walker for his commitment to supporting police officers and the communities they serve.

"Senator Walker has led several efforts at the Statehouse to support law enforcement and the work our officers do every day to keep Hoosier communities safe," said Bill Owensby, President of the Indiana State Fraternal Order of Police. "He's advanced innovative solutions to strengthen public safety, give more tools to law enforcement, and provide additional resources, training and support for police officers."

In 2022, Walker authored legislation to improve electronic monitoring of offenders to prevent them from going on to commit additional crimes while under surveillance (SEA 9). He also authored bills to create the Marion County Crime Reduction Pilot Program to encourage law enforcement collaboration to tackle violent crime in the region (SEA 7), and to protect the identities of child crime victims (SEA 117).

In 2021, Walker co-sponsored landmark, bipartisan law enforcement legislation that provided expanded training for police officers (HEA 1006), and supported the state budget which gave raises to state police and excise officers and increased funding for the Indiana Law Enforcement Academy and for other crime reduction programs (HEA 1001). He also sponsored legislation to create and fund the Indiana Crime Guns Task Force, enabling regional law enforcement agencies to work together to track guns used to commit crimes across Central Indiana and bring violent criminals to justice (HEA 1558).

The Indiana Fire Chiefs Association, one of the state's leading organizations in representation, education, and support of Indiana's

fire and emergency medical services, praised Senator Walker for being a leading voice on public safety issues and his strong record on improving the access, strength, and efficiency of Indiana's first responders.

"Senator Walker has earned the trust and support of the Indiana Fire Chiefs Association because we believe our members and all citizens throughout Indiana can rely on the Senator to be an advocate for our state's fire and EMS services," said Dan Sink, Goshen Fire Chief and President of the Indiana Fire Chiefs Association (IFCA). "We thank him for his continuing efforts to strengthen those services and improve the quality of life for his constituents."

In 2022, Walker authored legislation to improve the state's EMS response process between the 911 system and municipalities to ensure that the closest emergency response agency is notified, regardless of jurisdictional lines (SEA 247). Walker also sponsored legislation (HEA 1314) that will provide more tools and resources to retired, professional, and volunteer firefighters.

In its endorsement, the Indiana Professional Firefighters PAC noted Walker's support for issues that affect firefighters, paramedics and EMTs which make up their membership.

"Senator Walker's commitment in the General Assembly to improving training standards, safety standards, and protecting our retirement and disability funds for firefighters and EMS professionals and their families makes us proud to offer him our support," said Anthony Murray, President of the Professional Fire Fighters Union of Indiana (PFFUI) and the Indiana Professional Firefighters PAC. "This commitment makes it possible for our members to provide a high standard of care and service to the Hoosier communities we serve."

"Our law enforcement officers, fire fighters, EMS and all first responders risk their lives to save others every day and they will always have my steadfast support," Walker said.

Walker has also been endorsed by the Indiana Chamber of Commerce, the Indiana State AFL-CIO and the Indiana State Pipe Trades Association.
