School board shakeups

Foursome slate finds success in Fishers, all three incumbents unseated from HSE board

Four times as many people voted in the general election in Hamilton County than showed up during the May primary this year. A total of 130,355 registered voters cast their ballots, most of them doing so before Tuesday. That is a 48.12 percent turnout. By way of comparison, only 30,993 voters – a dismal 11.72 percent – came to the polls for the May primary.

School board races were clearly a big draw for voters across the county. In those races – as well as a newly-drawn Indiana House District 32 with no incumbent, and redrawn State Senate District 21, which now pushes down into Westfield – there were some surprises when the votes were tallied.

School board races were largely billed as slates of candidates running together on common plat-

In Fishers, Hamilton Southeastern's school board races saw major upsets with all three incumbents losing Tuesday and the four-person slate of Tiffany Pascoe, Juanita Y. Albright, Dawn Lang and Ben Orr all coming out on top.

Conversely, in Westfield, all incumbent school board candidates on the ballot will retain their seats.

In Noblesville's at large school board race, the "M&M" team of Melba Kiser and Misti Ray were clear and vocal about their

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Heights students gain insight on election process from seasoned public servant

Kathy Kreag Williams, Hamilton County Clerk of Circuit Court, recently spent time educating fifth graders at Hamilton Heights on the voting and election process. This timely program gave students an insightful lesson from a seasoned public servant.

"In social studies, students have been learning about the election process including: the system of government in the United States and Indiana, methods of voting, political party structures, election laws, and responsibilities of citizens," explained Kelly Stroup, fifth-grade English and Social Studies teacher at Hamilton Heights. "It was an engaging and insightful civics learning opportunity serves as a member of the for our students.'

"I learned that in order to be a candidate, you have to do many different things," Nolan Kakasuleff said. "Another thing is that you have to register to vote, and you can do this in many different ways. Also depending

on the population, the town may have more precincts. I think it is important to teach kids about voting because if they are interested in running when they are older, they will know the process."

Ava Guffy said she learned plenty of new information about voting she didn't know.

"I learned that it is important to vote because it helps the entire country get a new and maybe a better leadership than the last," Guffy said. Like Kakasuleff, Guffy learned that you must register to be able to vote and there are different ways of voting, like through a paper ballot in person, online, and through the mail.

In her role, Williams County Election Board and oversees the day-to-day operation of elections with Election Administrator Beth Sheller, as well as Election and Voter Registration staff. It is office's responsibility to stay up to date on election laws and best practices to run



Into the Breeches! shows how women always step up when the going gets tough

A Seat on the Aisle

Last night I drove down to Lawrence to see the final production of this year's Bard Fest, Into the Breeches! at Theatre at the Fort. This was my first time to see a show in this venue and I hope it will not be the last.

The play, written by George Brant, was first produced in 2018 and is a touching comedy about life activities that have come to a halt while many of the local men have gone off to fight in the war leaving the women to hold it together here at home. The play is set in the early 1940s, but it feels like we're watching through a 21st-century lens.

The director of the local theatre has gone off to war, leaving his young wife Maggie Dalton (Madeline Dulabaum) to convince the President of the Theatre Board, Ellsworth Snow (Kelly Keller) not to cancel the theatre's season and instead to let her direct a cast of women in the roles that would have been played by

Snow reluctantly agrees and Maggie jumps into the production process with her lead actress, Celeste Fielding (Susan Hill), her Stage Manager (Kaya Dorsch), and her costumer, Ida (Anja Willis). Now all she has to do is hold auditions and hope someone shows up to play the 30-some parts in Shakespeare's Henriad (a word that I had to google to be sure it is real ... and turns out it is), which is a combined production of Shakespeare's Historical Henry plays.

The struggle to bring the production to the stage is full of laughs and some tears. It was a perfect end to

A show like this might be a slog without a great cast – and this cast delivers.

Madeline Dulabaum is our comedy straight woman and anchor as the director of the Henriad. She believes in the theatre and its place in our society even when things are hard and pushes many boundaries to make it happen. Susan Hill as Celeste, the theatre's diva, is laugh-out-loud funny through the whole play. She is ridiculous, self-centered, and wise all at once. Kelly Keller gives one of the best performances I've seen from him as the board president who gets blackmailed into agreeing to the all-woman cast when his wife is cast in

the show. Tracy Herring as Winnifred Snow, the board president's wife, is a delight from beginning to end. She wrings every laugh possible out of the material. Kaya Dorsch as Stuart the Stage Manager is equally funny and heart breaking in his role. Dani Gibbs plays Grace Richards, a young woman with little experience but a lot of talent. Watching her confidence grow as the play goes on was inspiring as was the journey of costumer, Ida, well played by Anja Willis. And finally, Michelle Wafford wonderfully rounds out the cast as June Bennett, a wife turned actress who is also all-in on supporting the war effort.

Director Max McCreary has put together a wonderful show that celebrates the love we all have for theatre and art. The show is remarkably timely. Written just before the pandemic, it's almost prescient about the role of art in our lives and





what happens when everything stops.

McCreary notes that, "While many younger creators do not know war on the scale of WWII, we do know what it is like to see the world come to a halt. To be changed. Full stop. And also what it means to bring a world back to life in the wake of that interruption."

Beyond that, the play deals with people struggling against the limitations placed on them by society. The issues this play explores include pay inequity, racial inequity, and gender/ identity questions. And it tackles those issues with wit - sometimes bawdily, sometimes just silly – and pathos. My 20-year-old daughter and I loved the whole expe-
