School board shakeups

Foursome slate finds success in Fishers, all three incumbents unseated from HSE board

Four times as many people voted in the general election in Hamilton County than showed up during the May primary this year. A total of 130,355 registered voters cast their ballots, most of them doing so before Tuesday. That is a 48.12 percent turnout. By way of comparison, only 30,993 voters – a dismal 11.72 percent – came to the polls for the May primary.

School board races were clearly a big draw for voters across the county. In those races – as well as a newly-drawn Indiana House District 32 with no incumbent, and redrawn State Senate District 21, which now pushes down into Westfield – there were some surprises when the votes were tallied.

School board races were largely billed as slates of candidates running together on common platforms.

In Fishers, Hamilton Southeastern's school board races saw major upsets with all three incumbents losing Tuesday and the four-person slate of Tiffany Pascoe, Juanita Y. Albright, Dawn Lang and Ben Orr all coming out on top.

Conversely, in Westfield, all incumbent school board candidates on the ballot will retain their seats.

In Noblesville's at large school board race, the "M&M" team of Melba Kiser and Misti Ray were clear and vocal about their

desire to be elected together in opposition to current board member Joe Forgey and hopeful Chuck Haberman. They got half of what they wanted with Ray winning a spot on the board. Forgey will retain his seat.

The Carmel team of

Brake, Brown and Sharp only picked up one of the three seats they set out to gain as Greg Brown won the District 3 seat over Jake Nichols.

The Hamilton Heights school board White River Township incumbent Doug

Ozolins lost to newcomer Benjamin Lehman.

On the partisan portion of the ballot, most of the results are red.

Following Greg Garrison's ousting of current

Sen. Buck on his decisive victory: “Hamilton County has always been kind to me”

When The Reporter spoke with State Senator Jim Buck during the final minutes of Tuesday night, all of the numbers showed him as the presumptive winner, but the race had not been officially called by any state media outlet. One TV station was even showing him in District 23 instead of 21.

“It appears I’ve won and I’m just grateful that people in State Senate District 21 have placed confidence in me to represent them,” Buck said. “We worked very hard, and we had an enormous amount of help from all three counties. I was very grateful for that. We had a

lot of good volunteers. Mario has done a tremendous job of rallying up the base. At the same time the school

board races — that’s the big draw here. Parents — and in a lot of cases teachers — are fed up with it. “

Buck said he is both humbled and proud to represent his district in the years to come, and he knows he works for the citizens in District 21.

“Hamilton County has always been kind to me,” Buck said. “I’ve been blessed that no matter where my district has been drawn, they’ve always been very kind and very helpful to me. I really appreciate serving them. My employers have always treated me well.”

An hour before polls closed Tuesday, a long line of voters waited outside the Carmel United Methodist Church to cast ballots. Those in line at 6 p.m. were allowed to vote. A record vote for an off-year election appeared likely as interest in school board races fueled the big turnout.

Hamilton County Prosecuting Attorney D. Lee Buckingham II in the May primary election, the Republican attorney and former talk radio host went on to handily defeat Democratic challenger Jessica Paxson with just under 57 percent of the vote.

At the state level, the redrawn Indiana Senate District 21 was won by incumbent Republican Jim Buck over Democrat Josh Lowry of Westfield.

Indiana Senate District 31 goes to incumbent Republican Kyle Walker over Democrat Jocelyn Vare, who currently serves on the Fishers City Council.

Indiana House District 24 will stay in the hands of Republican Donna Schai-bley, who defeated both challengers: Democrat Jol-ellyn Mayer and Independent Kenneth Ticker.

Then we come to the new Indiana House District 32, which caused so much trouble in the May primary due to a recount arising from the Marion County portion of the district. Once more, our neighbors to the south in Marion County were the hiccup in these results. Marion did not report even their initial results until long after midnight.

While Republican Fred Glynn won the Hamilton

County portion by 443 votes over Democrat Victoria Garcia Wilburn, at press time Wilburn appears to have won by 232 votes once the Marion County totals are added in.

In the race for Indiana Senate District 29, it appears JD Ford will retain

his seat with a 1,267-vote majority over Republican challenger Alex Choi.

Wilburn and Ford will be the only Democrats representing any portion of Hamilton County come 2023.

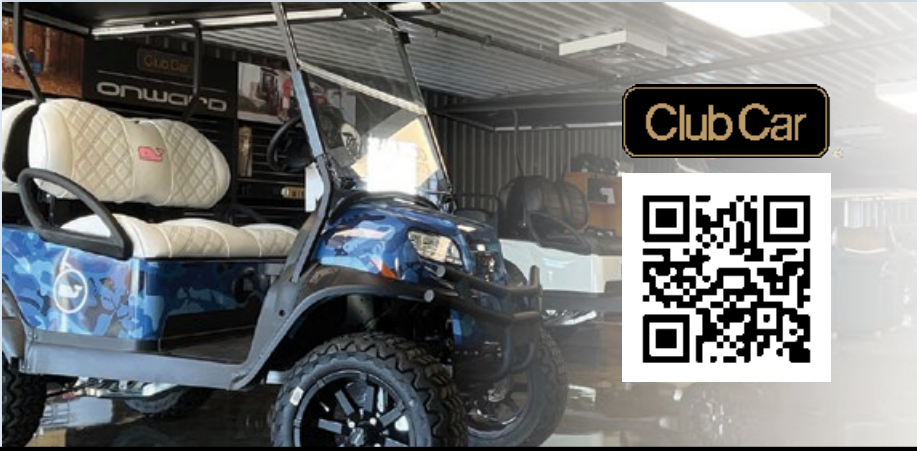

Heights students gain insight on election process from seasoned public servant

Kathy Kreag Williams, Hamilton County Clerk of Circuit Court, recently spent time educating fifth graders at Hamilton Heights on the voting and election process. This timely program gave students an insightful lesson from a seasoned public servant.

“In social studies, students have been learning about the election process including: the system of government in the United States and Indiana, methods of voting, political party structures, election laws, and responsibilities of citizens,” explained Kelly Stroup, fifth-grade English and Social Studies teacher at Hamilton Heights. “It was an engaging and insightful civics learning opportunity for our students.”

“I learned that in order to be a candidate, you have to do many different things,” Nolan Kakasuleff said. “Another thing is that you have to register to vote, and you can do this in many different ways. Also depending

on the population, the town may have more precincts. I think it is important to teach kids about voting because if they are interested in running when they are older, they will know the process.”

Ava Guffy said she learned plenty of new information about voting she didn’t know.

“I learned that it is important to vote because it helps the entire country get a new and maybe a better leadership than the last,” Guffy said. Like Kakasuleff, Guffy learned that you must register to be able to vote and there are different ways of voting, like through a paper ballot in person, online, and through the mail.

In her role, Williams serves as a member of the County Election Board and oversees the day-to-day operation of elections with Election Administrator Beth Sheller, as well as Election and Voter Registration staff. It is office’s responsibility to stay up to date on election laws and best practices to run

efficient and fair elections.

Williams also looks for opportunities to find ways to educate voters and poll workers on the entire election process and how to get

residents involved.

Williams served 26 years as a member of the Indiana House of Representatives, over 10 years (1982 to 1991 and again from

2019 to 2022) as Hamilton County Clerk and has been

employed by the county for over 45 years.

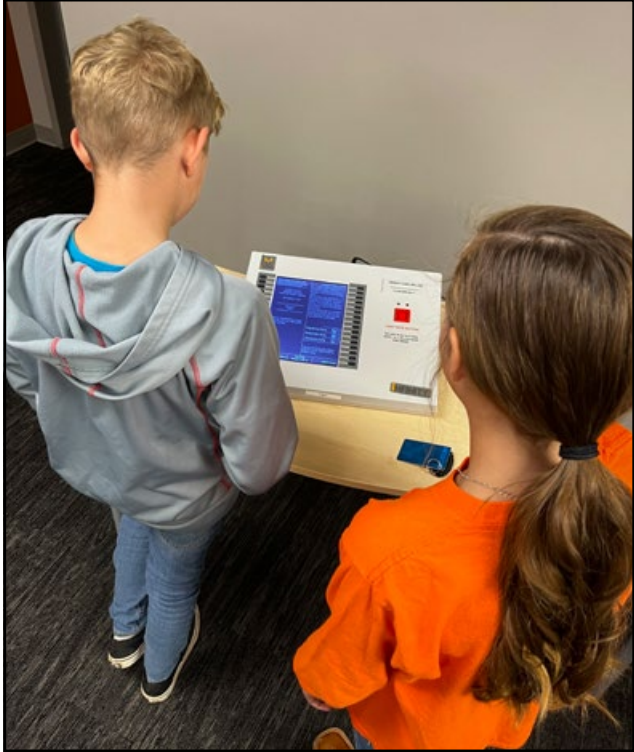

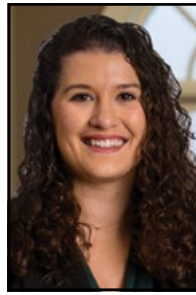

Man arrested after portion of downtown Noblesville closed down

One man has been arrested after an attempt to serve a warrant led to a portion of downtown Noblesville being closed down Tuesday afternoon.

The Noblesville Police Department has arrested David Vu, 27, Noblesville. He had been wanted for

felony counts of domestic battery and strangulation after being charged on Nov. 2.

Around 4:45 p.m. Tuesday, the Noblesville Police Department announced it was conducting an "active police investigation" in downtown Noblesville and asked people to avoid the area around 8th and Hannibal streets. That's a few

blocks south of the Hamilton County Courthouse.

Police said they believed Vu was armed with a knife.

"Several attempts were made to get the subject to surrender but all were unsuccessful," police said in a statement. "After all attempts of negotiations were exhausted, tactical officers forced entry into

the residence and took the subject into custody."

After being taken into custody, Vu was hospitalized with "minor injuries," according to police.

He will face a new charge of resisting arrest.

At 7:02 p.m., Noblesville police tweeted that the "investigation has concluded and traffic is now back open."

Gov. Eric Holcomb declares Nov. 6-12 Winter Weather Preparedness Week

While temperatures may be mild right now, winter weather is on the horizon. The Indiana Department of Transportation urges Hoosiers to be prepared for when snow starts to fall.

Gov. Eric Holcomb proclaimed Nov. 6 to 12 Winter Weather Preparedness Week in Indiana. Along with the [National Weather Service](http://NationalWeatherService.gov) and other agencies, INDOT is encouraging the public to use this week as a reminder to take steps to prepare for potential hazards that come with winter weather.

For safe travel, INDOT offers the following tips:

- Slow down and adjust travel to conditions, especially on snow covered roads.
- Never tailgate or drive beside a snowplow, as the

driver's visibility may be limited.

- The safest place on the road during a winter storm is behind a snowplow, but if you must pass, do so carefully.

- Be prepared in case of a crash and becoming stranded; always carry an emergency kit in your vehicle with food, water, a phone charger, sand or cat litter, flares or bright LED alternatives, a flashlight, and blankets.

- Keep your vehicle full of gas.

- Keep a shovel in your car to dig out around your tires and your tailpipe if needed.

- Make sure your vehicle battery is strong, fluids are at the appropriate levels, and your spare tire is properly inflated.

According to the National Weather Service, there are over 66,000 variations of winter storms. Snow, ice, freezing rain, and fog all present challenges for winter travel. Roads can become slick, even after pre-treatment and regular treatment during and after a storm. It's important to know the facts about INDOT's winter operations.

Maintenance crews monitor forecasts several weeks out and prepare for a winter storm based on the type of precipitation, conditions leading up to an event, and extended forecast following the storm. If conditions allow, roads are pre-treated with salt brine and are regularly treated with rock salt. In colder temperatures, salt and brine alone take longer to activate,

so environmentally-friendly chemicals are used to boost effectiveness.

Snowplow drivers typically work 12-hour shifts during a storm and on average take two-to-three hours to complete a full route. INDOT is getting ready for winter operations by hiring seasonal snowplow drivers, completing training with current staff, inspecting and preparing equipment, and securing materials, like salt.

Poll worker removed from Carmel voting site denies GOP claims of electioneering

A Hamilton County poll worker removed from an early voting location last week is responding to claims that he unlawfully encouraged people not to vote for certain candidates. Republicans in Hamilton County say the worker, identified by the county's Democratic Party as James Zheng, was removed from the polling place at Mercy Road Church on Thursday because he pressured voters not to support Republican-endorsed candidates for Carmel Clay School Board. "I have been in communication with local election officials to make sure poll workers are reminded that such activity, called electioneering, is illegal," Mario Massillamany, chair of the Hamilton County Republican Party, said in a statement.

State law forbids elec-

tioning — including campaign apparel, buttons, stickers, signs, and campaign literature — within a polling place and within 50 feet of the entrance. The Hamilton County Democratic Party responded in a statement Monday accusing county Republicans of "dirty tricks" in an attempt to "sow last-minute doubt into the integrity of our elections." "We believe voters deserve honesty and truth," the party said in a statement Monday. "This is desperation and retaliation politics at its worst." Zheng, in a statement provided Monday by Hamilton County Democrats, says he saw people wearing T-shirts of Republican-endorsed candidates just outside the windows of the polling place at Mercy Road Church and reported them to the inspector. Zheng says that the same inspector later said "one of

the poll workers" told voters not to vote for the Republican-endorsed Carmel school board candidate "because they don't care about diversity," which Zheng denies. Zheng's full statement, in which he says he is willing to testify under oath about what he witnessed and experienced, follows: "I was an early voter poll worker at the Mercy Road Church early voting site on Thursday, November 3, 2022. Mercy Road Church's voting machines are placed right in front of outside clear glass windows to the north and west. I observed persons just outside the windows with red t-shirts containing the names of Republican-endorsed Carmel school board candidates. I reported this issue to Christine DeKeyser who agreed this was not right and agreed to discuss this issue with the Inspector, Sheila Puckett. The Inspector did not take any action and did not ask

these people just outside the clear glass window to move. At the end of the day, the Inspector indicated there was a problem today: one of the poll workers who was alleged to have told voters not to vote for the Republican-endorsed Carmel school board candidates because they don't care about diversity and a poll worker cannot tell a voter to vote straight-ticket Democrat. The Inspector did not name me as the person who did that. I returned home about 7:30 PM. At around 7:40 I received a call from Beth Sheller who told me that the Inspector had made the above allegations against me and that I would not be allowed to work as a poll worker the next two days. I categorically deny these allegations and would point out that at no time during the early voting on the 3rd did the Inspector call me aside and confront me with these false allegations. I am willing to come forward and testify, under oath, consistent with the above.

The Hamilton County Democratic Party said it would support the filing of a complaint to the county's election board. County Clerk Kathy Kreag Williams said Zheng did file such a complaint but later withdrew it. The board discussed the incident during a meeting this morning. Hamilton County Sheriff Dennis Quakenbush said his detectives also are interviewing anyone with knowledge of the incident. He said his investigation would proceed independently of the board's. "We take criminal allegations very seriously and I want to assure the public that this complaint will be reviewed with the utmost diligence in conjunction with the Hamilton County Elections Board," Quakenbush said.

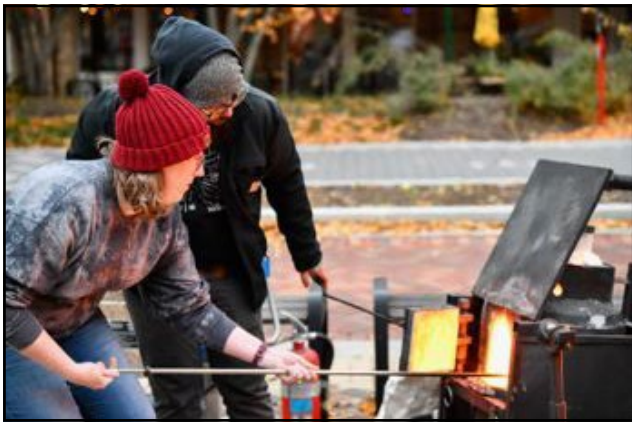

Into the Breeches! shows how women always step up when the going gets tough

Last night I drove down to Lawrence to see the final production of this year's Bard Fest, *Into the Breeches!* at Theatre at the Fort. This was my first time to see a show in this venue and I hope it will not be the last.

The play, written by George Brant, was first produced in 2018 and is a touching comedy about life activities that have come to a halt while many of the local men have gone off to fight in the war leaving the women to hold it together here at home. The play is set in the early 1940s, but it feels like we're watching through a 21st-century lens.

The director of the local theatre has gone off to war, leaving his young wife Maggie Dalton (Madeline Dulabaum) to convince the President of the Theatre Board, Ellsworth Snow (Kelly Keller) not to cancel the theatre's season and instead to let her direct a cast of women in the roles that would have been played by men.

Snow reluctantly agrees and Maggie jumps into the production process with her lead actress, Celeste Fielding (Susan Hill), her Stage Manager (Kaya Dorsch), and her costumer, Ida (Anja Willis). Now all she has to do is hold auditions and hope someone shows up to play the 30-some parts in Shakespeare's *Henriad* (a word that I had to google to be sure it is real ... and turns out it is), which is a combined production of Shakespeare's Historical Henry plays.

The struggle to bring the production to the stage is full of laughs and some tears. It was a perfect end to this year's Bard Fest; both Lysistrata and Falstaff get a shout out.

A show like this might be a slog without a great cast – and this cast delivers.

Madeline Dulabaum is our comedy straight woman and anchor as the director of the *Henriad*. She believes in the theatre and its place in our society even when things are hard and pushes many boundaries to make it happen. Susan Hill as Celeste, the theatre's diva, is laugh-out-loud funny through the whole play. She is ridiculous, self-centered, and wise all at once. Kelly Keller gives one of the best performances I've seen from him as the board president who gets blackmailed into agreeing to the all-woman cast when his wife is cast in the show.

Tracy Herring as Winnifred Snow, the board president's wife, is a delight from beginning to end. She wrings every laugh possible out of the material. Kaya Dorsch as Stuart the Stage Manager is equally funny and heart breaking in his role. Dani Gibbs plays Grace Richards, a young woman with little experience but a lot of talent. Watching her confidence grow as the play goes on was inspiring as was the journey of costumer, Ida, well played by Anja Willis. And finally, Michelle Wafford wonderfully rounds out the cast as June Bennett, a wife turned actress who is also all-in on supporting the war effort.

Director Max McCreary has put together a wonderful show that celebrates the love we all have for theatre and art. The show is remarkably timely. Written just before the pandemic, it's almost prescient about the role of art in our lives and

what happens when everything stops.

McCreary notes that, "While many younger creators do not know war on the scale of WWII, we do know what it is like to see the world come to a halt. To be changed. Full stop. And also what it means to bring a world back to life in the wake of that interruption."

Beyond that, the play deals with people struggling against the limitations placed on them by society. The issues this play explores include pay inequity, racial inequity, and gender/identity questions. And it tackles those issues with wit – sometimes bawdily, sometimes just silly – and pathos. My 20-year-old daughter and I loved the whole experience.

Along with director McCreary, the production team includes Assistant Director Natalie Fischer, Stage Manager Case Jacobus, with Scenic Design by Max McCreary, Lighting Design by Isaac Andrade and Properties

Design by Lucy Fields. The set was spacious and simple. The few changes were quick and easy. The lighting was well done. Props fit the era. Well done, all.

If I were pressed for an appropriate age for this show, I would say 10 and up. There's nothing too shocking. But there are a few moments that will be hard to get out of your head (in a good way!). I cannot

imagine any theatre-loving audience member not being delighted by this show. Go see it. Strong recommendation!

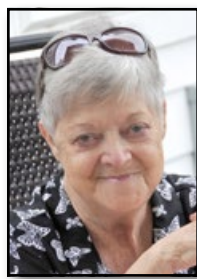

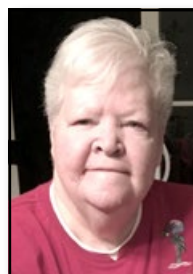
