



Westfield reader to Feldman: all science is not settled

This letter is in response to Dr. Feldman's opinion piece, "Whatever happened to RFK Jr.?," published in the Oct. 2 print edition of the Hamilton County Reporter.

Regardless of your perspectives on RFK, Jr., I suggest that you should be disgusted by Dr. Feldman's observation of the American People as expressed in paragraph four. Dr. Feldman states that "a significant proportion of Americans are gullible enough to embrace outrageous falsehoods."

Now, I won't dispute that there are gullible Americans; I'd indeed be gullible to disagree with that. However, Dr. Feldman purports that a significant proportion of Americans are gullible. Apparently, we should be thankful for people like Dr. Feldman who are ready to sort everything out so nicely for us – you know, gullible (stupid) citizens.

Dr. Feldman purports in his opinion piece that many of the issues that RFK advocates for or against have been "soundly debunked as baseless and overwhelmingly determined as invalid by high-quality studies." He

indicates that Kennedy has departed "from evidence-based science." These statements indicate that Americans should believe that we will never gain new insight from science once something has been evaluated to a "conclusion." Obviously, he believes, science will never demonstrate anything new; we know everything that could be known.

As a former Indiana public health official, Dr. Feldman will likely know that our understanding of science has frequently been revised for the better always done, we'll always get what throughout time.

Remember Dr. Semmelweis; they thought he was crazy when he told medical staff to wash their hands. Between the 1930s and 1950s it was customary for doctors to encourage smoking tobacco for good health; that was settled science. Or maybe Dr. Feldman will recall when in the 1940s and 1950s performing lobotomies, particularly on women, was decidedly effective treatment for depression and other mental health disorders. Don't forget how opioid pain medication was promoted as non-addictive. Look how that's going now! Many current

health protocols are based strictly on scientific studies on men alone - yes, ignoring the differences of the female body. All settled science, huh?

Voters should sort out the pros and cons about each candidate for themselves, but I respect that RFK has the courage to ask questions, explore new aspects on a wide variety of concerns and is challenging professionals to look deeper. Are we sure that the science IS settled? As the saying goes, when we always do what we've we've always gotten, and sometimes, that isn't what's best for everyone.

While I am not saying I support RFK, I would much rather support someone who is courageous enough to ask tough questions and converse with Americans about important issues than politicians like Dr. Feldman who considers us too gullible (ignorant) to be able to explore important issues on our own.

All science is NOT settled, Dr. Feldman, and the majority of Americans are not gullible.

Humane Society cites Aasen's efforts for animal protection in its support for his reelection to Carmel City Council

Election Day is approaching and though we aren't voting for our statewide and federal representatives this year, municipal elections are just as important when it comes to getting folks in office who will legislate to stop animal cruelty at the source.

Carmel City Councilman Adam Aasen is someone who understands these stakes and is a candidate we can count on when it comes to protecting our furry and feathered friends.

Councilman Aasen has repeatedly acted on his commitment to

animal protection. You're driving down the road when suddenly you get a call to investigate a potential theft. The wouldbe-thief is still at the scene and is "acting strange." You arrive ... now what do you do?

This exact scenario was one that I was able to experience

first-hand thanks to an opportunity to learn about the VirTra training system owned by the Noblesville Police Department (NPD). The equipment uses real firearms loaded with magazines filled with carbon dioxide to simulate recoil and lasers mounted into the barrels that detect shot placement. This allows NPD, and other police departments who train on the system, to practice firearms training nearly risk-free on a virtual firing range.

The system envelopes the trainee in a closed reality where the trainer can dictate how the people in the simulation react. It reminded me of a "choose your own adventure" storybook, except you are the one living it. Your actions have consequences – for better or for worse.

While an expensive roleplay machine can seem silly, the experience is invaluable. It places a new perspective on what police officers go through every day. You don't know what to expect, but you have to be prepared to expect everything. It can be stressful, but the skills it develops in officers improves safety across the board.

Public servants can easily be dehumanized. They are tools of the government that act on government authority. But the reality is that they are normal people too. Putting myself in their shoes for an hour and having to make the same decisions they make every day is humbling. I'm no one special, leaves a (simulated) situation safely.

Immediately before the scenario, I was able to simulate giving commands to people. However, some of the people would pull out a firearm to shoot me or they would pull out something like a driver's license instead. It's nerve racking since you can't tell what it is until they pull it out. This prompted me to become cautious whenever anyone reached into a pocket or bag.

The boy began to reach into his pocket. Admittedly, I flinched and instinctively placed my hand to my holstered weapon which I was using for the scenario. But I hesitated to escalate, and the boy pulled out a contact card that stated he had autism and in case of a situation to call his dad. The situation ended positively, with the boy's dad showing up, the boy paying for his candy with money he had the entire time, and everyone leaving safely.

I was later told by the trainer that had I but here I am trying to make sure everyone reacted differently, he could have changed the situation to go south very quickly.







Sen. Young opposes reinstating FCC internet regulations

U.S. Senators Young (R-Ind.) and John Thune (R-S.D.), along with more than 40 of their colleagues, sent a letter to Federal Communications Commission (FCC) Chairwoman Jessica Rosenworcel urging her to abandon her proposal to reinstate what they say are the "failed, heavy-handed Obama-era regulations" on the internet.

In their letter, the senators note that following the repeal of the Obamaera rules in 2017, partisan claims – most notably that Americans would get the internet one word at a time – were debunked and proven to be completely false.

"Re-imposing heavy-handed, public-utility regulations on the internet

would threaten the progress our country has made since 2017, and would steer our country out of the fast lane and into a world of less competition, less choice, less investment,



On Sunday evening, the 3A, 2A and 1A are scheduled to begin on Friday, Oct. 20. Classes 6A (32 teams) and 5A (31) have an off week and state with semifinals on Oct. 27, because they have half the number of teams in their respective classes.

There are 311 schools that will amount to 305 total games being played in the six classes for a six week span that culminates with the six state championship games taking place Thanksgiving weekend at Lucas Oil Stadium.


