Teaming up for fire safety

The Noblesville Fire Department (NFD) is teaming up with State Farm and the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) to promote this year's Fire Prevention Week campaign, "Cooking Safety Starts with YOU. Pay attention to fire prevention."

This year's campaign, which runs Oct. 8 to 14, works to educate families about simple but important steps they can take to keep themselves and others safe.

NFD and local State Farm Agent Cory Shook encourage all residents to cook with caution. In support of those efforts, Agent Edge recently donated a Fire Prevention Week kit to the fire department, which includes home fire safety and prevention activities and information for children and adults.

"State Farm encourages homeowners to make fire prevention an important part of their overall home safety plan," Shook said. Douglas wrote that among straight couples, even when men do equal work carrying out household chores, women still disproportionally bear the mental load of keeping track of those chores. This creates a kind of continuous partial attention that takes up energy and raises stress. It also forms an invisible hierarchy where men feel like employees running afoul of the boss.



you can relieve your part- clothes I used to have to take small fire starts, slide the lid ner's stress and feel less like an underling," he writes.

Douglas goes on to share tips on how to do just that.

The first thing a partner can do is anticipate needs. "Don't just do the laundry," Douglas says, "Monitor the hamper and take the initiative to run a load. Examine when your tasks usually need to be done, and plan ahead for them.'

The second step is to write things down. Nowadays you don't even need a pen and paper for this. Many people have smart phones where they can just set numerous reminders and they are off and running!

The third step is to automate things.

"Turn your phone into your manager and eliminate the mental load altogether. Add alarms to those calendar events. Set location-based notifications that remind you, when you're passing the drugstore, to stop in. Move regular shopping trips onto Amazon Subscribe & Save," advises Douglas.

He also says that you need to learn the skills for what you don't do so you can serve as a backup when your partner is ill or traveling. For example, if you don't typically do laundry, have your partner show you the basics such as sorting colors, different washer and dryer cycles and their purposes, etc.

Douglas suggests holding family meetings on Sundays to keep everyone apprised of what responsibilities each person has for the coming week and to discuss potentially swapping tasks if needed. And speaking of family, he dedicates a whole paragraph to putting kids to work, saying you can hand off some of the mental load by teaching them to self-manage.

He goes on to share that Lifehacker writer Beth Skwarecki asks her kids to "be the boss of cleaning the table," telling her what to pick up while she does all the work. "They love their little power trip, but I love that they're actually paying attention to what the mess is and how to clean it." This management-only outsourcing even helps kids learn how to cook before they're old enough to do dangerous tasks themselves.

All these techniques are especially important when major life changes hit such as an illness or injury, a new job, or having a child. "The more flexible you are with your partner, and the more chores you both feel comfortable swapping, the more you can handle in a crisis," Douglas concludes.

Very often lately when friends ask me how I'm doing, I tell them, "Just ridin' the Geezer Train." Reactions vary from laughs to mildly sorrowful 'awws' to being startled

The fact is it is a fairly true statement. The run up to becoming 75 on Oct. 9 was very much a ride through various stations of endings, changes, happinesses, enlightenments, reassessments, and nonsense.

It occurs to me that 75 years is a LONG TIME, 55 years of which have been as an adult with all the delights and struggles which that lengthy stage brings. Now it is time to be a certified 'old man' (see: geezer) and so to celebrate this lofty plateau I thought I'd reflect on just what that means to me.

Primarily, becoming 75 means I am totally lucky to still be walking the face of the earth – or at least the face of Indianapolis; many have not had the good fortune to be here at this age. It's a wonderful gift. One learns along the way that health is all important. That doesn't mean I haven't had problems to endure – but nothing has put me down, yet, and I am happy to be able to say that my mind still operates at an acceptable level and my body is very mostly okay.

I have no idea what my over/under is.

> As far as I can recall, loss of memory is one of those issues that is always related to getting older and my powers of recall have certainly been affected. I often walk into a room forgetting what my reason was for going there. (The bathroom is an exception.) Also, I may be reading or surfing online sometimes and come across a topic I wish to explore further and by the time I open a new browser tab moments later and settle into the search bar, I have completely lost any idea of what I hoped to study. I think the Geezer Train somehow negates the Train of Thought.

> Most political interest has left me, and it's probably a good thing. As crazy and mendacious as it all is now, I cannot fathom taking either side very seriously. As I age, I have become aware that not much that they ever do in Washington (or in the Statehouse) ripples out to affect me directly anyway, so why lose sleep over it?

> Finally, I happily note that reaching the age of 75 puts me on track for even more birthdays - more new changes, more valuable time to spend with my wife and family, more forgetfulness, more miles on the Geezer Train. Here's to longevity – which seems to be quite the in-fashion thing these days of medical miracles and discoveries.

> So – all aboard and onward ... to 80 please!

Attorney General Todd Rokita secures restitution from landlord for survivor of domestic violence

Rokita "Our works to combat domestic never happens again," AG violence at every opportunity," AG Rokita said. "We aim to involve all Hoosiers in efforts to assist survivors and bring perpetrators to justice. Landlords, for their part, certainly need to be part of the solution."

An investigation conducted by the Attorney General's Homeowner Protection Unit found that a survivor first contacted her leasing office for assistance in the summer of 2022 after being physically abused by her co-tenant. Allegedly, employees of TRI-TWG Lakewood Holdings LLC provided erroneous information about her ability to terminate her lease or exclude the abuser from the leased unit.

The survivor alleged that consumer totaling \$12,000; she was told she would need to pay an early termination fee or qualify for an apartment using her own income for them to be able to assist her. As a result of this misinformation, the survivor experienced additional alleged abuse over the course of several more months. Timing in these circumstances can be critical to allow for including the protections afphysical separation from alleged perpetrators.

"A lack of training and understanding of the law violence put this woman and her children in serious danger," AG Rokita said. "She eventually got her lease terminated with the assistance of an attorney from Indiana Legal Services, but it should never have taken as long as it did."

Shall Carmel Clay Schools continue to impose increased property taxes paid to the school corporation by homeowners and businesses for eight (8) years immediately following the holding of the referendum for the purpose of retaining and attracting teachers, educational staff, and other support staff and fund educationally related programs at the current maximum referendum tax rate of \$0.19 per one hundred dollars (\$100) of assessed valuation?
