



Help local cadet squadron hit their 800 Veteran wreath goal

On Dec. 16, National Wreaths Across America Day will be an opportunity for more than two million volunteers and supporters to remember, honor, and teach about the service of Veterans across the United States.
One local service organization is involving young people in this mission and they have set a challenging goal to honor local veterans in Hamilton County and beyond.
The Fort Benjamin Harrison Composite Squadron of the Civil Air Patrol is based in northern Hancock County and includes both young people and adults from Hamilton, Madison, Hancock, and Marion counties. The 20 cadets (12 to 18 years old)

and the 20 adults are working together with Gravel Lawn Cemetery in Fortville to sell and place wreaths on as many Veteran graves as possible. The cemetery has over 800 Veteran graves and although they have participated in the Wreaths Across America program before, they have never been able to place wreaths on all the Veteran graves.
This year, with the help of both local volunteers and the CAP squadron, they are hoping to honor more Veterans than ever before.
On Dec. 16, there will be a ceremony at Gravel Lawn Cemetery with Veterans, cadets, and volunteers coming together to

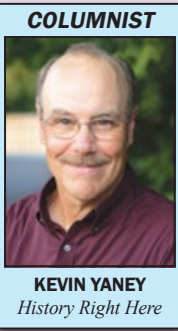

A look back at our Civil War past

The history of Hamilton County leading up to the American Civil War is quite remarkable. We are surrounded by the historical evidence of the most tumultuous time our nation has faced, but often, it has become so familiar that we don't recognize it.
A good example is the Civil War Monument that is inside Crownland Cemetery in Noblesville.
If you are ever wondering where Noblesville's Monument

Street got its name, take a look behind the giant pine trees that grow in the cemetery near the corner of Monument and Harrison streets. There you will find the 28.5-foot marble "Register of the Heroes of Hamilton County," who volunteered to go to war to put down the "Rebellion of 1861," as they referred to what we commonly call the Civil War.
The tribute was dedicated on July 4, 1868, a mere three years after the war ended. The

ceremony included speeches by the governor of Indiana, Conrad Baker, and other dignitaries. One person who spoke would be quite familiar to everyone in attendance that day: Major John D. Evans. If you can make out the carved names on the weathered marble of the shrine, you will find Evans' name among the officers, but he was much more than that to those in attendance. He was the man who recruited men from Noblesville to enter this war shortly after the opening shots were fired at Fort Sumter.

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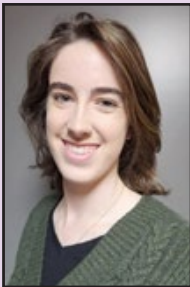

One community theater is ready to gaslight you this weekend. The Attic Theatre is staging Patrick Hamilton's play, *Gaslight*, Oct. 26 to 28 at True North Homeschool, 8203 E. 249th St., Arcadia. The Reporter spoke to Director Bethany Worrell about this 1938 thriller that has become a household word.
"Gaslight was original-

ly written by Patrick Hamilton around the 1930s, and it's really what sparked this cultural phenomenon of gaslighting individuals," Worrell said. "It came from this play where a man is slowly driving his wife insane in order to cover up a past crime as well as make profit from the past crime."

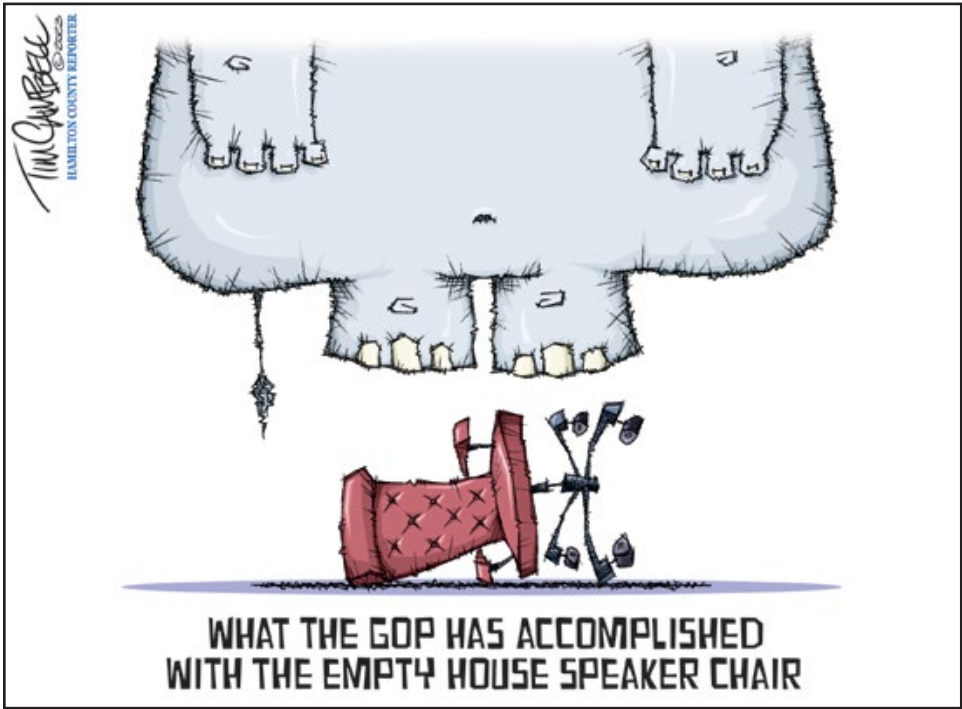

Duke Energy gives \$10K donation to Roberts Settlement’s Legacy Walk

Roberts Settlement Imagine Black Pioneers fundraising campaign re-

ceived \$10,000 from Duke Energy for its Legacy Walk exhibit, a self-guided outdoor experience that will tell the story of Indiana’s Black pioneers who settled in northern Hamilton County in the 1830s.

“This exhibit will be a place to learn and reflect on the Black pioneers who settled in northern Hamilton County before the Civil War and are part of the rich heritage and extraordinary history of our county and the state,” Duke Energy Government & Community Relations Manager Mark LaBarr said.

When complete in mid-2024, visitors will be greeted by the State of Indiana Historical Marker and “Morning Light,” a dazzling entry feature symbolizing exploration, discovery, opportunity, and ownership. Beyond, the legacy walk meanders through four separate interpretive-themed stations dedicated to Roots & Migration, Progress & Perseverance, Faith & Education, and Legacy & Footprints. Each station includes a title monolith, a bench, and a graphic reader rail with interpretive content. Structures are fabricated from Corten-style steel and faux stone. It is intended that the Roberts Settlement Legacy Walk as well as the surrounding grounds are open to the public to enjoy as an inspirational spot to enjoy and embrace the rich history of Hamilton County.

“We are extremely

grateful to have corporate partners like Duke Energy who support the historical significance of our family’s legacy to Hamilton County enabling us to share our story,” Roberts Settlement Board President La Vella Hyter said.

About Roberts Settlement
Roberts Settlement was established in 1835 by free people of color who migrated mostly from North Carolina and Virginia to escape deteriorating racial conditions. Their goals were the pursuit of economic, educational, and religious aspirations with greater freedom and fewer racial barriers. For 100 years the descendants have gathered annually for the family Homecoming to celebrate their shared history and renew family bonds.

In 2023, Roberts Settlement publicly unveiled plans for the Roberts Settlement Legacy Walk with support from the Lilly Endowment Inc. This project was funded in part by a grant from the African American Cultural Action Fund of the National Trust for Historic Preservation.

Carmel forms sister city partnership with Rueil-Malmaison, France

Last Wednesday, Carmel Mayor Jim Brainard and Rueil-Malmaison Mayor Patrick Ollier signed an official Memorandum of Understanding establishing a formal sister city partnership between Carmel and Rueil-Malmaison, France.

In addition to serving as Rueil's Mayor, Ollier is President of the Metropolis of Greater Paris and he was also a National Assembly deputy for Hautes-Alpes' 2nd constituency.

Rueil-Malmaison, or simply Rueil, is in the western suburbs, about 20 minutes from the center of Paris. It has a population of nearly 80,000 and is one

of the wealthiest suburbs of Paris. Rueil is famous for the Château de Malmaison, home of Napoleon Bonaparte's first wife, Joséphine de Beauharnais.

Several major French companies have their world headquarters in Rueil-Malmaison, which has an extensive fiber optics network in its business district. Many large international companies have also located their French headquarters in Rueil-Malmaison.

“We are very excited to welcome Rueil-Malmaison, France, as Carmel's sixth sister city, and we are looking forward to developing better relationships with its people and learning more

LOOK BACK

To get a picture of what was happening in April of 1861, you have to go back to November 1860. That’s when the Republican, Abraham Lincoln defeated three other candidates and was elected to be the 16th President of the United States. Lincoln’s election was polarizing. Although he won the popular vote in Indiana (winning Hamilton County with over 70 percent), the Republican’s stance on slavery kept him off the ballot in many southern states. After his victory, seven states voted to leave the Union. By February 4, 1861, they began meeting to draw up a new constitution. Just 39 days into Lincoln’s presidency, a South Carolina militia fired upon Fort Sumter in Charleston harbor. Three days later, on April 15, 1861, Lincoln issued a call to arms for 75,000 volunteers to help quell the rebellion. He asked them to volunteer for military service for three months (little did anyone know this war would last for four years). Lincoln’s action was divisive. Virginia, North Carolina, Tennessee, and Arkansas all left the Union rather than take military action against the Confederacy. The Kentucky legislature declared itself neutral over the issue and refused to send any volunteers to aid the cause of the Union. However, in Indiana, the response was quite different. Each state was given a quota of fighting volunteers to raise up for the Union’s cause. Indiana’s portion of the 75,000 volunteers was to be 4,683. Within one week, over 12,000 men showed up in Indianapolis to volunteer for the military service – nearly three times what was required! That’s where we meet John D. Evans. Evans had been born in slave-holding Kentucky but

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regiments from Indiana began with the Indiana 6th. The Indiana 6th was sent into what is now Philippi, W.V., to oust a Confederate militia, which they did in some of the earliest engagements in the war. By the end of July, they had ended their three months of service and were welcomed back to Indianapolis. However easy these military operations in West Virginia were, the same could not be said for a larger engagement on July 21, 1861, about 30 miles southwest of Washington in a small place called Manassas Junction. 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National Drug Take Back Day set for Oct. 28

Drop off unused & unwanted prescription drugs

In honor of National Drug Take Back Day, the Hamilton County Council on Alcohol & Other Drugs (HCCOAO) will host a take-back event on Saturday, Oct. 28 in the far east parking lot of Riverview Health in Noblesville. The drop off location is directly across from Federal Hill Commons on State Road 32.

“Most people who misuse prescription drugs get them from family, friends, and acquaintances,” HCCOAO Executive Director Monica Greer said. “We know prevention starts at

home. The simple step of clearing out medications that are no longer needed makes our homes safer, prevents prescription drug misuse, and can help save lives.”

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention estimates 100,306 people died of drug overdoses in the United States last year, marking the largest number of drug-related deaths ever recorded in a year. With close to 5,000 collec-

tion sites nationwide, the United States Drug Enforcement Administration, along with its law enforcement partners, have removed more than 15.2 million pounds of medication from circulation since the inception of National Drug Take Back Day in 2010.

“The only safe medications are ones prescribed by a trusted medical professional and dispensed by a licensed pharmacist,”

Greer said. “Old and unwanted medicine too often becomes a gateway to addiction. Events like these are a critical effort to curb the historic surge in U.S. overdoses.”

Hamilton County residents are encouraged to drop off their expired or unused medications between 9 a.m. and noon. No liquids, sharps, or needles will be accepted. For those who cannot make it, there are opportunities to safely dispose of unneeded medications at local pharmacies, hospitals, and police departments throughout the year.

Fishers announces \$3.7M 96th Street revitalization investment

Mayor Scott Fadness has unveiled plans to invest \$3.7 million in infrastructure upgrades to the 96th Street corridor, just east of the Interstate 69 interchange.

Investments include additional streetlights, median and landscape construction along North by Northeast Boulevard, and façade improvement grants for commercial properties along the north side of 96th Street.

“My vision is to con-

tinue to bring vibrancy to every square mile of Fishers and as a major gateway to our city, the 96th Street corridor will get the reinvestment it deserves,” Fadness said. “There is so much momentum along 96th Street with private and public investment creating a dynamic commercial center that prioritizes safety, walkability, and aesthetics.”

Since 2021, private investments along 96th Street include CRG Residential’s \$135 million River Place mixed-use development at the northwest corner of Allisonville Road; Patch Development’s \$27 million flex office building at Masters Road; Andretti Global’s \$200 million headquarters and museum at Hague Road.

Public investments include the city’s acquisition of nearly 100 acres of parkland along the White River and the completion of the Nickel Plate Trail to 96th Street with a pedestrian bridge planned for 2025 to the Indianapolis segment of the trail.

Residents along the corridor will be invited to a town hall in November to hear more about the investments being made and have the opportunity to provide feedback.

HSE teacher Becky Schroeder honored by Indiana Department of Education

“Sometimes being new in a country and not knowing the language is really hard, and she like helps us a lot,” said Zara Leal, a student at HSE High School.

“I love because the teacher all the time say you can improve yourself and your English,” said Jose Charris, a student at HSE High School.

Schroeder says these students and their families face various challenges.

“A lot of our students come from warmer climates, and as they get here, it’s just teaching them about the proper clothes, what’s lotion about, why are my hands cracking, and just helping them with that, plus adapting to the food, and just the challenges of healthcare,” said Schroeder.

However, Schroeder says having the ability to speak another language is a powerful tool that is creating a positive impact.

“It’s important to see how we’re growing, how we’re changing, and just the incredible stories that these kids have to share.”

Overall, Schroeder says she is thankful for all the students and teachers who have supported her in her journey.

Girl Scouts of Central Indiana prioritizes mental wellness with new programming

Girl Scouts of Central Indiana recently announced the launch of three new mental wellness patches within the Movement’s Mental Health Initiative, which was launched in 2021 in response to the mental health crises today’s young women face. Designed for girls in grades 4 through 12, these new patches provide useful tools to help them safely identify and explore their feelings, seek support, and find resources for help, if needed.

“In September, Girl Scouts of Central Indiana proudly shared the Indiana Girl Report commissioned through the Indiana Youth Institute in collaboration with Girl Scout councils from across the state and the Girl Coalition of Indiana,” Girl Scouts of Central Indiana CEO Danielle Shockey said. “The groundbreaking report provided data that calls attention to the critical state of mental health for Hoosier girls, and these new Girl Scout patches are

perfectly timely for girls in our state.”

The patches include: *Knowing My Emotions*, *Finding My Voice*, and *Showing Up for Me and You*.

Each patch program includes an adult facilitator guide to help adults approach girls in a sensitive way, prompt important conversations, and guide them through difficult moments. Resources are also available to the public on the Girl Scout Activity Zone, where people can explore and download free wellness curriculum and activities.

These patches, made possible by the HCA Healthcare Foundation and developed in partnership with the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) and the Girl Scouts of the USA (GSUSA)

Program Advisory Committee, including HCA Healthcare behavioral health experts, are part of GSUSA’s continued commitment to providing solu-

tions to the national mental health crises young girls are facing. To date, GSUSA has released research, including Girls Speak Out About Mental Health in 2020, and programming like Resilient. Ready. Strong. and Youth Mental Health First Aid/ Mental Wellness 101.

“We are proud to continue partnering with Girl Scouts on this research-based mental wellness program,” said Joanne Pulles, vice president of community engagement at HCA Healthcare and president of the HCA Healthcare Foundation. “Girls need support now more than ever, and thanks to the reach of the Girl Scouts model, we know that these resources have the potential to make a positive impact on countless young women.”

Studies show that girls are disproportionately affected by the increasing mental health crisis in America and National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) data reveals that nearly 90 percent of parents are prioritizing their

child’s mental health over academic achievement.

“NAMI is proud to support Girl Scouts’ effort to raise awareness for mental health and well-being with the patch program,” NAMI CEO Daniel H. Gillison, Jr. said. “The reach and ability to support girls across age groups with tailored resources and activities is incredibly valuable not only for the girls but also for parents and caregivers. We hope by making it easier to talk generally about mental health with a trusted adult, girls will feel more at ease sharing concerns or asking questions.”

The identification of Livingston was the result of the dedication of many forensic experts working

collaboratively in an effort to identify nearly 10,000 human remains recovered from Fox Hollow Farm.

Livingston was reported missing to the Indianapolis Police Department in 1993.

“I would like to thank the entire team of law enforcement and forensic specialist that have come together to support this effort,” Jellison said. “A special thanks goes to the hardworking people at the Indiana State Police Laboratory whose expertise in DNA led to the identification of Allen Livingston.”

12. Go put on a clean dress – smooth hair with side combs – brew a cup of tea – and sit & rest & rock a spell & count your blessings.

I suspect if I had to wash clothes that way I'd be going around in filthy tattered clothes. I have an automatic washing machine in a heated and cooled laundry room. I can get by not washing too often because I have multiple changes of clothing, not to mention shoes.

Count your many blessings ... how can our tongues contain our thanks!

Heart of a pantry host

Pantries 56 and 57 were placed in service this past week. Both were loaded in the back of a Gaylor Electric truck, driven to their permanent locations, and set up in Westfield along high-traffic roads.

Driving away from the second deployment, I was caught up reflecting on all the families that are a part of [FeedingTeam.org](#). Families who donate, volunteer, stock, organize, clean, fundraise and especially those that shop from one of the pantries. What occurred to me is that there is something I’ve not communicated very well over the years. Each pantry must be hosted by someone. We are so very grateful for those who host our pantries.

This month’s column focuses on a critical part of [FeedingTeam.org](#): our pantry hosts.

Our first host, Hamilton County FOP Lodge 103 in conjunction with Hamilton County Parks, will always be special because they took the first pantry years ago in Morse Beach Park. Since those beginnings pantry hosts include schools, businesses, parks, local government, churches, property owners, and civic organizations.

The hearts of people who host a pantry are special. They recognize that hunger is real in central Indiana and agree to help us in our mission to provide 24/7 no-questions-asked meals to hungry neighbors. In very practical terms, pantry hosts give their permission to locate a pantry on their property. While some hosts become involved with or adopt a pantry, many do not. Many of our busiest pantry locations are managed by [FeedingTeam.org](#) volunteers but hosted at locations generously offered by people from the community.

Over the years we have been told “no” many times when we ask to locate a pantry at a particular location. We have heard, “we don’t want to attract that element,” “it’s not safe,” and even “we don’t have hungry people around here.” With each no, we’d politely show the data and attempt to tug on a heartstring or two. We’d show folks we have a data-driven approach to map areas where families could become food challenged. If it was still a no, we moved on to the next potential location.

We look at several data points for pantry locations:

1. Is the location near neighbors who fit the “gap family” demographic? These are families whose income level exceeds the level for public assistance but whose income level isn’t such that a financial problem wouldn’t impact their ability to secure regular meals for their family.
2. Is the location near where gap families frequent?
3. Is the location of moderate or high traffic volume?

visibility, shelter from the elements, density of other pantry locations, anchoring ability, ease of access, and the amount of criminal activity in the immediate area. It’s not unusual for a pantry to be located a few blocks away from a challenging area rather than directly in that neighborhood.

Suggestions of locations and pantry requests now drive much of our new deployment processes. In addition to requests from the community, over the coming months it is our intention to deploy more pantries in Westfield, Sheridan, and the northern portion of Hamilton County before returning to work more on additional locations in Fishers and Carmel in the spring of 2024.

If you have a suggested location or if you would like to host or adopt a pantry, please reach out to us directly.

With over 47,000 food-challenged neighbors in Hamilton County, [FeedingTeam.org](#) is a registered 501(c)(3) not-for-profit organization that provides outdoor 24/7/365 no-questions-asked free food pantries throughout the county.

The pantries exist to meet the food insecurity needs of gap families, neighbors who may not qualify for public assistance and could use a few meals before payday. The pantries serve as many food-challenged neighbors as possible, and our hearts are with those who, like my family, could not always make ends meet.

Thank you for supporting the pantries. We love serving with so many neighbors across Hamilton County. In future columns, we will share more stories about how your generosity served neighbors in times of need. The face of hunger in Hamilton County is not what you may think.

In practical terms, this straightforward way to help neighbors is having real impact on lives, families, and our communities. Thank you. A few meals can change the course of a person’s life. A can of green beans means so much more when you have nothing to feed your kids.

If I were a butterfly...

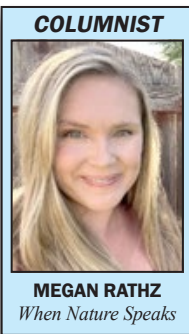

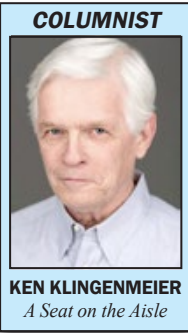

In my opinion, the results didn’t meet expectations.

While *Coping with Autumn* was “powerful, pointed, creatively fresh, and structurally innovative,” this script is straight from the popular television sitcom genre. By that I mean it plays to a common denominator, repeating the formula

we might see in a *Big Bang Theory* episode. There are broadly drawn characters, in ridiculous situations, with over-the-top reactions. I can presume that *Amused* came from an earlier period in Ms. Jacob’s development as a writer.

I was thus disappointed in what I sat through. In my opinion, the uneven production lacked any concise, solid, or meaningful structure. The jokes fell flat to Mrs. K and I – although I will say the audience laughed loudly at many questionably funny actions, lines, and situations – led by the playwright and a section of her well-wishers. It was very similar to a laugh track one hears on a television program.

I always appreciate the

efforts of the cast, especially a community theatre cast, and I give my best to these players. They all worked very hard to come up with their characterizations. I have seen Joe Wagner (Sebastian, the muse) onstage a number of times and have always thought he is a talented performer. The remaining cast is unfamiliar to me, but I think there is some very good potential in each of them. Director Kelly Keller staged the piece.

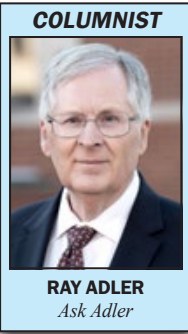
Bottom line: As you might tell, I was disappointed with this production. As always – expectation breeds disappointment.

About two years later, he closed his eyes for the last time.

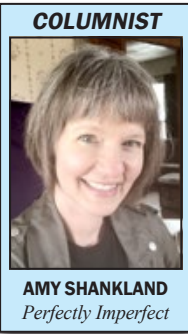
But he wasn’t afraid. He knew where he was going.

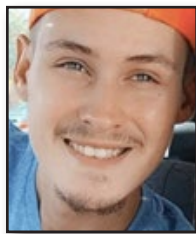

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Gov. Holcomb & Indiana National Guard break ground on Hamilton County Readiness Center

The Indiana National Guard held a groundbreaking ceremony last Thursday for its newest readiness center near Atlanta.

During the ceremony, Gov. Eric J. Holcomb and Maj. Gen. Dale Lyles, Indiana’s adjutant general, spoke and broke ground on the new facility.

“In May, I proudly signed a budget including \$8 million in funding for the Indiana National Guard’s new Hamilton County Readiness Center,” Gov. Holcomb said. “Indiana will continue to invest in supporting the men and women who answer a call to serve at home and abroad, respond to state emergencies and secure our peace and freedoms.”

The facility, scheduled to open in 2026, will include approximately 66,000 square feet of space on an existing, state-owned 55-acre plot of land in Hamilton County.

The center will house the 38th Sustainment Brigade headquarters company, its detachment and special troops battalion, and the 338th Signal Company and approximately 300 Hoosier Guardsmen. The new facility will meet current code, American Disabilities Act and Anti-terrorism Force Protection requirements.

“The three units that will be supported here work together to support approximately 10,000 soldiers in support of large-

scale combat operations and state active duty,” Maj. Gen. Lyles said. “Ensuring we’re always ready means ensuring our training and our facilities are modern and that we attract talent to the thrilling and fulfilling multitude of part-time careers we offer.”

In addition to the Hamilton County readiness center, which will to be a home for Indiana National Guard units in the decades ahead, the State of Indiana has invested more than \$9 million since 2019 to modernize the Bluffton, Danville, and Martinsville readiness centers.

Millers making their return to state

Boys win another PK shootout, girls run past Crown Point Bulldogs

KOKOMO – The Noblesville soccer teams are going back to the state finals. The paths they took were a little different. Both teams competed in the Class 3A north semi-state at Kokomo’s Walter Cross Field last Saturday. The Millers boys were pushed to another penalty-kick shootout, but Noblesville pulled through again, edging out Lake Central 3-2 in PKs to make it to state for the third consecutive year. After that, Noblesville’s girls team took to the field against Crown Point. The Bulldogs led 1-0 at halftime, but a flurry of goals within a three-minute span sent the Millers past Crown Point 3-1 and into the state finals for the fourth time in five years. Noblesville will play both state championship games on Saturday. The boys will go first, taking on Cathedral at 4 p.m. The girls will follow, playing Bloomington South at 6:30 p.m. All state champion-

ship games will be played at IUPUI’s Carroll Stadium. **Penalty kicks again** Noblesville’s boys, sponsored by Tom Wood Volkswagen, should be used to penalty kicks by now. The semi-state game was the third consecutive contest where the Millers needed a shootout to claim victory – both of Noblesville’s regional games had been decided with PKs. It didn’t look like it would be that way at first. The Millers put in a goal just three and a half minutes into the game, as Sam Holland found the back of the net. But Lake Central tied the game during the 25th minute on a goal from Michael Miljevic. The score was 1-1 at halftime, and stayed that way throughout the second half and during the two overtime periods, so it was on to penalty kicks. Both teams made their first kick, with Holland putting one in for the Millers. But the Indians missed their second attempt, then Noblesville goalkeeper Cole Thompson blocked

LC’s third and fourth kicks. Meanwhile, Caden Rice put a kick in, giving the Millers a 2-1 lead through four rounds. Lake Central made their fifth and final kick to tie the shootout at 2-2, but Alex Pursch clinched the semi-state by making his kick at the end of the game. Pursch said he and the team are “always confident” in Thompson, calling the “best keeper in the nation.” See Soccer . . . Page B2

Several cross country teams qualify for state

SHELBYVILLE – There’s always much at stake at an IHSAA regional in any sport, but that was amplified for cross country this year. The semi-state round is discontinued in cross country as of this year, so that means the regional is the stepping stone to state. Several Hamilton County teams made that step, thanks to their performances at the Shelbyville regional last Saturday at Blue River Park. Local teams triumphed in both the boys and girls races. The Fishers’ boys team used a 1-2 punch from Sam Quagliaroli and Matthew Kim to score their sixth consecutive regional title, while the Noblesville girls also defended their trophy thanks to consistent running from their top four. **Top two** Quagliaroli and Kim jumped ahead of the back right away and never relinquished their hold on the top two positions. Quagliaroli would go on to win the race in 15 minutes, 17.1 seconds, over 21 seconds ahead of his teammate. “Really, what we wanted to do was just get through this meet, qualify for state and then really just set our sights towards state,” said Quagliaroli. “That’s what we want to do. We want to put some medals around our necks and that’s really the goal here.” The Tigers closed the scoring by getting three other runners in the top 40. Nate Thomas placed 27th, Bryson Slagle was 30th and Parker Melling took 38th. “We won, so there’s not a lot to be upset about,” said Fishers coach Nathan Warnecke. The Tigers claimed their eighth overall regional title in program history; they also won in 2007 and 2015.



Quagliaroli

The top five teams advance from the regional to the state meet. Hamilton Southeastern finished a close second to the Tigers, scoring 89 points. The Royals’ top five runners all placed in the top 31, with Liam Powers taking 11th and Andrew Smith placing 12th. Noblesville took third place with 104 points and also punched a ticket to the state meet, which takes place Saturday at LaVern Gibson Cross Country Course in Terre Haute. Two Millers placed in the top 10: Samuel Rink finished seventh and Caden Click was right behind him in eighth. The Royals qualified for their 18th state meet in program history. Fishers and Noblesville both advanced to their 13th state meet. Guerin Catholic placed eighth as a team, but qualified Luke Moster on to state as an individual. The top 15 individuals not on an advancing team move on to the state meet. **Closing early** The Noblesville girls closed the door on the team championship early by scoring their first for runners in the top 15. Summer Rempe led the way with a ninth-place finish, followed by Riley Flynn in 12th, Ansley Applegate in 13th and Nadia Perez in 15th. Kennedy Applegate then finished the Millers’ scoring by placing 28th. With the victory, Noblesville defended a regional title for the first time ever. It was the Millers’ third regional title; they won their first in 2016. “They ran quite well,” said Noblesville coach Aaron Becker. The coach said his team “ran with confidence” and “made the team statement that they needed to make. They kept up a winning streak that

they’ve had for about a month now.” Four of the top five girls teams were from Hamilton County, which means they all advance to Saturday’s state meet. 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A true four-sport athlete, Mike Swaynie

Noblesville High School has had many great athletes and many great athletic achievements down through the years. I am always glad to be able to say I grew up in Noblesville, Indiana. All the athletes who have done great things have had a wonderful support system from the community, great coaches who have inspired, taught, coached, and helped us to do great things. I want to apologize upfront if I did not remember someone’s contribution.

It is rare in this day to find an outstanding four-sport athlete because of the specialization for one sport. From 1969 to 1973 Noblesville had a great four-sport athlete, Mike Swaynie. It was my privilege to watch my friend Mike Swaynie play, run, compete, and improve each year. We played sports together from Little League through High School. I got a front-row seat to see a great athlete! Mike excelled at the sports he played as he got better each year. Mike played football, basketball, baseball, and ran track.

Mike also played Little League and Babe Ruth Baseball. When we were 15 years old and playing baseball for Hall of Fame Sports Editor Don Jellison, we finished second in the State of Indiana. Mike led the team in stolen bases with 22 stolen bases in a row! Never thrown out! In 1972, Mike was part of the first State Championship baseball team in Noblesville history as Noblesville won the Advanced Babe Ruth State Championship and went on to play in a seven-state playoff against other state champions where we defeated the Kentucky State Champion. The population of Noblesville was about 7,400 at the time. Quite an accomplishment!

As we entered high school in 1969, it was certainly a year of wondering where we fit in. Mike found his spot in sports. One thing that makes a great athlete is speed. Mike sure had that! On June 6, 1972, the Kansas

City Royals held a tryout camp for major league baseball at the Noblesville High School diamond. One of the things that major baseball wants is speed. Mike Swaynie, from a standing start was clocked running the 60-yard dash in 6.3 seconds! The scout came running over to Noblesville Baseball Hall of Fame Coach Don Dunker all excited saying, “Mike was one of the fastest players he had ever clocked!” He said, “Wow he did that from a standing start!” Let me put that in proper perspective for you. Major League baseball considers anything under 7.0 seconds in the 60-yard dash fast. The fastest time in baseball that has ever been run was by the Angels superstar Mike Trout at 6.08 seconds! The fastest 60-yard dash in the world clocked by Major League Baseball was run by the track superstar Carl Lewis who holds the record of (an unreal time) of 5.98 seconds. So, you can see that is the class that Mike Swaynie ran in high school! Unheard of!

A baseball outfielder often has to run over 100 feet to catch fly balls. Batters that hit doubles or triples are running at least 180 feet. When Mike took off it was like he was flying to the ball! As a pitcher I always appreciated Mike being in the outfield!

In 1973, Mike Swaynie, Rick Taylor, Mark Hood, and Terry Coomer were the four seniors on the Noblesville baseball team. From 1970-1973 the Noblesville

baseball team won a record four sectional titles in a row. No baseball team in Hamilton County has ever done that before or since. Mike Swaynie in 1973 was a big part of winning the record baseball sectional. It was like a picture of art when a baseball went up in the air and Mike Swaynie took off after it. He ran balls down that no other person would ever get to. If he hit the ball on the ground, you better have a rocket for an arm to throw him out. When he took off to steal a base no one could throw him out. Real speed!

But Mike excelled at other sports as well. Mike likes to tell the story that the Junior High basketball coach cut him from the team and said, “You will never amount to anything in basketball!” In 1972, he was the only underclassman on the Noblesville basketball team. In 1973, as a senior power forward, he led the team in rebounding and scoring, averaging 17 points a game with a high game of 33 points against Frankfort! Mike was named All County and All Sagamore Conference in basketball in 1973. With Mike’s speed and huge jumping ability at 6 feet tall, he played like a 6 feet 6 inch or 6 feet 7-inch player! The junior high coach came back and told Mike, “Well I guess I was really wrong about you and basketball!” That was an understatement! Telling Mike Swaynie, he could not do something, well, that just lit his fire!

In football, Mike played defensive back and in his se-

nior year played as a receiver and halfback. Mike likes to tell the story that he told Coach Jim Belden that he could outrun the fastest halfback on the team in the sprints in track. Coach Belden told him he could not beat the other player. Mike asked Coach Belden, “If I outrun him in the track sprints, will you let me play halfback in football?” Coach said yes. It was not a contest as Mike outran him with ease, and started playing halfback in his senior year. Keep in mind speed wins games.

In 1972, Coach Belden was watching me throw a baseball in the gym and came up with an idea for a fullback pass. In a tight game the ball was handed off to me and I ran to the right and was immediately swarmed with defensive players. Mike ran about 45 to 50 yards down the field, which only he could do in the time allotted. My thought was whatever I do, do not get tackled for a loss behind our 20-yard line. So, I threw the ball as hard and as long as I could off-balance down the field. I was just trying to throw it

away with no possibility of anyone catching it! Laying on the ground I saw Mike Swaynie make an unbelievable play. He jumped way up in the air over everyone and caught the ball for a 50-yard gain! A lot of luck on my part and pure athletic ability on Mike’s part! In 1973, Mike Swaynie was named All County and All Sagamore Conference in football.

Probably Mike’s strongest sport was track and why not with the speed and jumping ability. Mike participated in the high jump, low hurdles, sprints, and the long jump. In 1972, in the regional track meet, Mike had a high jump of 6 feet 4¼ inches in that event. The Noblesville High School record at the time was 6 feet 4¾ inches. His best in the long jump was 21 feet 8 inches! As a senior in 1973, Mike won the long jump, and some sprints. He won the sectional, regional, and was a state finalist in the low hurdles. Mike was named All County and All Sagamore Conference in track in 1973.

Mike Swaynie was a true four-sport athlete who

excelled in all four sports. While at Noblesville High School Mike lettered a total of eight times. In 1973, he was all Sagamore Conference and All County in basketball, track, and football. He was a big part of the record fourth baseball sectional championship in a row. Noblesville had never won a baseball sectional until the class of 1973 entered Noblesville High School. We are the only class who had a player on all four sectional championship teams. Mike Swaynie, a true four-sport athlete who had blinding speed, could jump over the building, who led Noblesville to championships, played hard, and excelled in four sports! In 1973 Mike received the highest award a Noblesville athlete can receive, the Miller Blanket!

Congratulations to Mike Swaynie, an inspiration and a true four-sport athlete who made history at Noblesville High School! It was a pleasure to watch him play and compete!

Royals take down two teams to defend their regional championship

The Hamilton Southeastern volleyball team repeated as regional champions last Saturday.

This year’s regional took place at Homestead, and the defending Class 4A state champion Royals beat two Fort Wayne-area schools to take home the trophy. Southeastern swept Homestead 25-18, 25-13, 25-13 in its semifinal match, then got past a tough challenge from the regional host Spartans in the championship, prevailing in five sets, 23-25, 25-9, 25-15, 22-25, 15-7.

The Royals’ victory over Harrison gave HSE its 30th win of the season. Lindsey Mangelson played lights out, hitting 19 kills. Tiffany Snook and Lauren Harden both put down nine kills, with Harden also hitting three aces. Macy Hinshaw dished out 23 assists, with Ava Hunter handing out 14. Sophie Ledbetter collected 16 digs. Breonna Goss dominated the net with four solo blocks, while Mangelson had three.

Southeastern had only dropped two sets for the entire season coming into the regional championship, so Homestead definitely got everyone’s attention when it edged out the Royals 25-23 in the first set. Southeastern came back and rampaged

through the second and third sets, but the Spartans took the fourth set 25-22 to force a winner-take-all fifth set. The Royals were able to take control of that set early and that sent them to the regional trophy.

Harden and Mangelson both stepped up, hitting 18 kills each for HSE. Madison Schicker served four aces. Hunter handed out 26 assists, followed by 24 for Hinshaw. Ledbetter had 23 digs.

The Royals are now 31-0 for the season and won the program’s fourth regional title. Southeastern will play La Porte Saturday in the 4A North semi-state, which takes place at 5:30 p.m. at Frankfort’s famed Case Arena.

Huskies fall in final

Hamilton Heights made its way to the championship match of the Class 3A Monrovia regional last Saturday.

The Huskies won a five-set match over Northview in the semifinals, beating the Knights 23-25, 25-11, 13-25, 25-19, 15-10. That sent Heights to the championship, where it dropped a four-set match to Tri-West, 24-26, 25-23, 25-21, 25-18.

The Huskies finished their season with a 24-7 record, along with the program’s first sectional title since 2018.

North Central did so in 1994-95-96 (the first three years of IHSAA soccer), with Fort Wayne Canterbury making it to the final match in 1996-97-98.

Dolaske said that the first two Noblesville teams to make state were special groups, “and this is a very special group, too,” he said. “And every group has been special for different reasons. I like being a part of it.”

Sudden scoring

The Millers’ girls team found itself in an even more precarious situation during its semi-state game. Crown Point

scored a goal with 7:17 left in the first half, putting the Bulldogs ahead 1-0 at halftime.

How would Noblesville respond? By scoring three goals in three minutes. Lily Ault tied the game during the 46th minute with a header, then put in another goal with 32:54 left. Just like that, the Millers led 2-1.

“It was definitely a wake-up call,” said Ault. “We had to recollect as a group and just get our minds in the right spot.”

But just to be sure, Noblesville’s Kaydence Fleck blasted another goal into the net 90 seconds after Ault’s second goal. All of a sudden, the Millers were in the driver’s seat and they would stay there until the game was done.

“We knew we had it in us,” said Ault. “We just had

to keep pushing and keep finding those areas where we could penetrate. The momentum had to keep going and we had to find our moments where we could finish.”

Millers coach Mike Brady said that he had never seen goals scored that quickly, “and certainly not in a game as important as this one. But you could tell that we were going to come out and battle.”

Noblesville won its sixth semi-state championship and improved to 16-1-3 with the victory. The Millers have certainly come a long way since the beginning of the season.

“We graduated seven starters from last year,” said Brady. “We only start one senior this year. So we were young. We took bumps

early on. I still think we’re improving as a team and I really think we still need another week of practice to prepare for next weekend.”

Golden Eagles reach 2A final

The Guerin Catholic girls soccer team will be back in the state finals for the first time since 2020 after winning the Class 2A south semi-state last Saturday at Evansville North.

The Golden Eagles beat Evansville Memorial 1-0 in the championship game. Guerin Catholic scored its goal with four minutes left in the second half, with Alex Soucie finding the back of the net.

The victory was the fourth semi-state championship for the Golden Eagles, who will play Leo in the 2A state finals at 6 p.m. Friday.

ORDINANCE NO. 43-10-23
AN ORDINANCE AMENDING RATES AND CHARGES FOR WATER TREATMENT COMPANIES FOR THE USE OF AND SERVICES RENDERED BY THE CITY OF NOBLESVILLE, INDIANA SEWAGE WORKS

(a) The schedule of rates for the discharge received from the City’s Water Utility Customers is based on the quantity of water discharged to the sewer, plus a base charge for each Customer operating one or more water treatment plants. Each Customer as defined above will be billed a base charge of \$2,002.20 each month and a usage fee at the rate of \$3.37 per 1,000 gallons.

(b) For the purpose of billing and collecting the charges for the sewage service, the sewer meters shall be read monthly. The City may average monthly usage for the preceding twelve months based on actual readings. These readings shall be averaged and the users shall be billed monthly (or a period equating a month).

(c) The schedule of rates shall be adjusted biannually on the first day of January of each year based on changes in the City’s operational costs.

(d) The City shall provide written notice of any changes to the schedule of rates to the Water Utility Customers at least sixty (60) days prior to the effective date of the change.

At the November 14, 2023 meeting of the City Council and prior to final adoption of Ordinance No. 43-10-23, any property owners, ratepayers, or anyone else interested in the proceedings may appear and be heard concerning the proposed rates and charges. HUD will accept objections to its release of fund and Hamilton County’s certification for a period of fifteen days following the anticipated submission date or its actual receipt of the request (whichever is later) only if they are on one of the following bases: (a) the certification was not executed by the Certifying Officer of the RE; (b) the RE has omitted a step or failed to make a decision or finding required by HUD regulations at 24 CFR part 58; (c) the grant recipient or other participants in the development process have committed funds, incurred costs or undertaken activities not authorized by 24 CFR Part 58 before approval of a release of funds by HUD; or (d) another Federal agency acting pursuant to 40 CFR Part 1504 has submitted a written finding that the project is unsatisfactory from the standpoint of environmental quality. Objections must be prepared and submitted in accordance with the required procedures (24 CFR Part 58, Sec. 58.76) and shall be e-mailed to HUD administration at CPD_COVID-19OEE-IND@hud.gov. Potential objectors should contact HUD to verify the actual last day of the objection period.

NOTICE OF ADOPTION OF ORDINANCE NO. 09-11-23-A

Notice is given that the Board of Commissioners of Hamilton County, on September 11, 2023, adopted Ordinance No. 09-11-23-A (“the Ordinance”). The Ordinance restricts the placement of fences, planting of trees, and the placement of other structures within regulated drainage easements regulated by the Hamilton County Drainage Board, unless the owner of the land has obtained a non-enforcement permit from the Hamilton County Drainage Board. The Ordinance also provides for payment of costs of removal or repair of drainage structures within drainage easements; and imposes penalties for failure to remove structures prohibited within drainage easements. The penalties provided in the Ordinance are up to Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500) for a first offense and up to Seven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$7,500) for the any subsequent offense by a landowner and/or contractor who violates the Ordinance.

The Ordinance prohibits landowners, contractors, or other persons from constructing or maintaining any improvement, including buildings, structures, fences, trees or shrubs, or other improvements within a regulated drainage easement within Hamilton County, Indiana, without applying for, and receiving a Non-Enforcement Permit from the Hamilton County Drainage Board.

The Ordinance also defines procedures for landowners to seek Non-Enforcement Permit.

The Ordinance shall be effective on or after December 1, 2023.

Copies of the Ordinance are available for review and copies may be purchased from the Hamilton County Auditor in the basement of the Historic County Courthouse at 33 North 9th Street, Suite L-21, Noblesville, Indiana.
