Nathan Carithers, a Sheridan High School student, recently won two medals in the Special Olympics competition. The athletic medals are symbolic of the way he excels in other areas of his life as well.

According to teacher Michael Moore, “Nathan’s work ethic is unmatched. He has lots of energy and is a positive and fun person to be around – always willing to help others.”

In addition to being a student at Sheridan High School, Nathan works as a part-time custodian both during the school day and after school. Nathan works two-and-a-half hours during middle and high school lunch. He then works three hours as a custodian after school. He prefers the custodian job because he’s not just in one spot and he likes cleaning.

Despite never competing at the Special Olympics in skiing, Nathan won two silver medals – one in slalom and one in the giant slalom. Nathan said that winning the

medals made him feel, “unbelievable, especially the second one.”

Nathan’s classmates also see the good in Nathan as he was named “most inspirational” in senior superlative voting.

In addition to his work at Sheridan High School, Nathan has a side business of mowing grass, mower repair, power washing houses, vacuum repair, and sales. As Moore explained, “His creativity in ingenuity is something to behold. He is a master at fixing vacuum cleaners, ice machines, dishwashers, coffee makers, and space heaters.”

He believed in me. I just had no idea at the time. It was not easy being the only female salesperson; 48 years old and a naive church lady didn’t help either.

As many car guys do, he moved on. Don’t tell him I had to take the day off after he left. I knew I was going to miss him, even with his grouchiness.

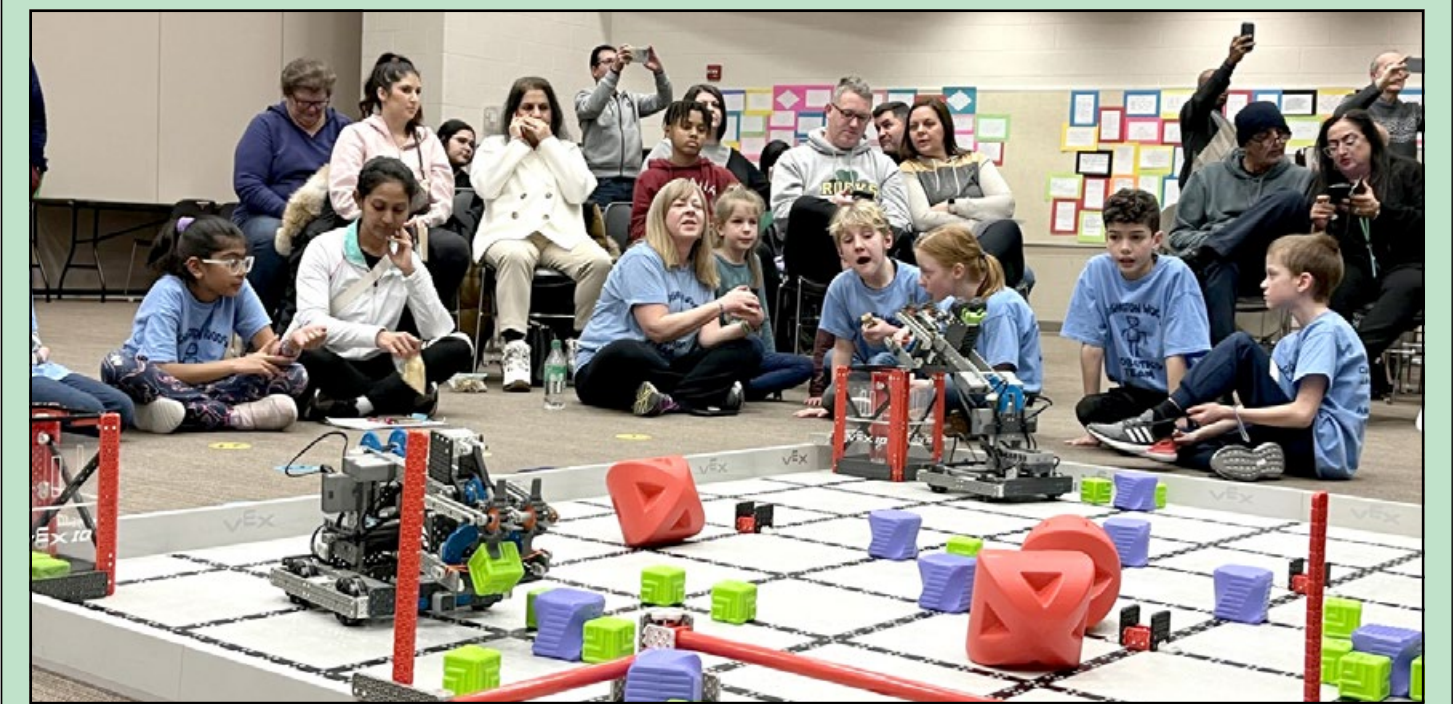
Over the years, we kept in touch. When my book came out, his wife sent me a picture of her sitting in her beautifully manicured backyard, as only Michelle could do it. She was reading my book.

I had no idea that a few weeks later, she would pass from an aggressive cancer. She didn’t want the last chapter of her life to be about cancer, so she kept the news from anyone except those in her closest circle.

- Plan to safeguard parking lots, buildings, and other spaces. People will park, camp, and gather where they can watch the sky change.
- Be aware that internet and cell phones may be slow or completely unusable.

MSP takes audiences to 1942 & asks them to get lost

Starting this Thursday, Main Street Productions (MSP) is taking audiences back to 1942 in the Neil Simon hit, *Lost In Yonkers*, staging at Basile Westfield Playhouse, 220 N. Union St., Westfield.

Director Jen Otterman was not inclined to talk about the story itself, instead referring The Reporter to various online summaries. Rather than send our readers on that quest, here is what MSP’s website has to say about the plot:

Set in *Yonkers in 1942*,

this memory play is about Bella, who is thirty-five years old, mentally challenged, and living at home with her mother, stern Grandma Kurnitz. As the play opens, ne’er-do-well son Eddie deposits his two young sons on the old lady’s doorstep. He is financially strapped and taking to the road as a salesman. The boys are left to contend with Grandma, with Bella and her secret romance, and with Louie, her brother, a small-time hoodlum in a strange new world called *Yonkers*.

When asked why she wanted to direct this particular show, Otterman told The Reporter, “I submitted two

shows. I submitted this one and *The Boys Next Door*, and this is the one they [MSP’s board] selected.”

of life," Otterman said. "I've actually worked it twice before. I taught high school at Hamilton Southeastern in speech and theater for 30 years. I directed it and then later I used to act at the Red Barn Summer Theatre in Frankfort, Ind., and I acted the part of the grandmother in that production."

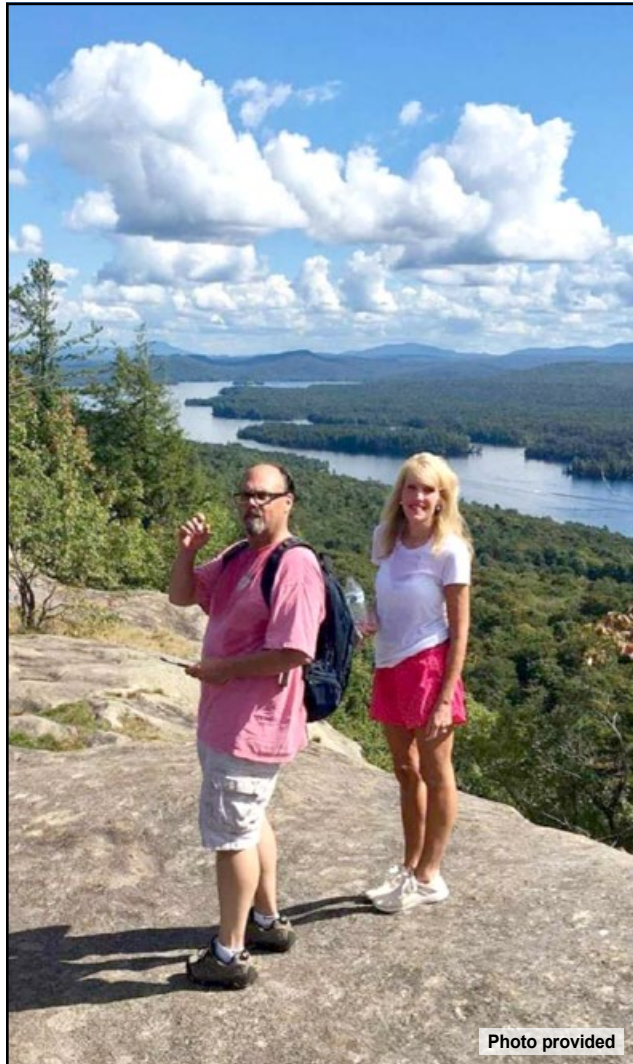

My heart broke for her family, most of all her husband. They had been together since she was 15 and he was 17.

In the past few weeks, Rich has been reading my columns. He sent me a text this week ...

Sometimes, you're tested, and it is more than you can handle. She was my everything. I wouldn't be the man I am today without her; neither would my kids.

What a beautiful tribute to a wife and mother who was so well-loved. I wrote back to him, *Grief is brutal. There is no time limit on when it will stop or even lessen. Then it sneaks up on you again.*

Anger is part of the roller coaster grieving process. The more someone is loved, the greater the grief. Yes, even being angry at God is part of it. It's not like He doesn't know we are angry.

The Lord is close to the brokenhearted: he rescues those whose spirits are crushed. Psalms 34:18 NLT

The thing is, we may feel angry, and we may push God away. He waits patiently for us to recognize His presence. I believe he even brings people alongside us to bring comfort.

Rich told me he is not happy with God right now. I understand. Having faith isn't about sitting around in a circle singing "Kumbaya."

It's more like listening to Anne Wilson sing "Strong." The part where she sings *I can't do this on my own* gets to me every time I listen. The world around us goes on, but we struggle to do so. We still have love, but it has no place to go. I call it **floundering love**.

I told Rich that he still

holds the love that Michelle had for him and the kids. His kids need that love. He has that gift to offer. Michelle made him the man he is, who will carry on her legacy by loving his kids.

Rich, I believe the love Michelle left you with will give you the strength to face the future. And God? Well, He's right there beside you. Tell Him how you feel. He will bring others into your life to talk about Michelle and who will encourage you. Her memory and love will live on. What a beautiful legacy she has left for her family.

Yes, Rich, I see your heart, broken yet so big and full of love. You took a chance and hired a naive church lady and made her into a pretty good truck-selling lady. You also invested in a friend for life. My writing journey includes you. You knew back then I had lots to say. You just had no idea you would be reading my words all these many years later.

Life is hard. I don't have answers to the hard questions about grief. I only know that God has been close to me when I have been brokenhearted. I can't do it on my own.

Rich, thank you for believing in me, even if you scared the bejeebers out of me.

These are the thoughts this week from the church-going truck lady.

BTW, this column has been approved by Rich in the hope that it will help others who are on the grief rollercoaster.

The HELP program assists Indiana communities in acquiring essential equipment through a standardized and streamlined lease-purchase process. The program provides standard term leases. Flexible repayment is available with competitive rates offered. The HELP program exempts entities from the need to bid financing. Since July 1, 2023, over \$18 million in essential equipment has been financed through the HELP program.

Growing old . . . & older

My mother had this story.

Daughter is twisting my arm. “Write your memoirs,” she says. That sounds too final, too complete. Besides, what interesting memoirs do I have to write?

Must’ve been back in the dark ages when I was born. You young one should remember Grandpa’s dining room. That was once the bedroom and I was born there. Mother and Father were happy enough to give me a name meaning “Gift of God.” Not so the three oldest boys. They thought a new baby most unnecessary, and if there had to be a baby, why a girl? Already there was one girl. That was enough.

Grandma Howard lived nearby. She was raising a granddaughter who was then nearly four years old. She and Grandmother came to help. Little Brother was also near four. He cried because Father was holding Little Cousin who was crying because Grandmother was holding New Baby who was probably crying because of the uproar. Mother called Little Brother to her bedside. She tried to comfort him by calling him “Mama’s Little Man.” The hurt was too deep. Between sobs he announced, “I ain’t nobody’s little man!”

Brother number four remembers running to a neighbor’s house after school. Father had gone to help a hay bailing crew. Brother wanted to tell him about the new baby girl. Father didn’t seem particularly surprised. Big Sister, who was six years old, treated New Baby like a doll. She didn’t seem too upset by being deposed from her “only girl” status.

The year of the flu epidemic, six – probably only five – family members came down with flu. (Oldest Brother

er was in the Army by then.) Brother number three and the two youngest escaped. Brother could cook beans and fry potatoes so that’s what they ate. Like he could cook anything. He was born May 15, 1905, so he couldn’t have been more than 13 or 14.

Baby had mumps and whooping cough plus an abscess. No one remembers if Baby had mumps on one or two sides. Mother had mumps at the same time and didn’t feel like remembering much. Probably near the same time, Oldest Brother also had mumps. He was overseas.

When Baby was five, she broke out with a red rash. She still remembers Dr. Kirk coming to the house. He held her on his lap and said, “She has the prettiest case of scarlet fever I ever saw.” She felt miserable and didn’t care whether it was pretty or not. In those days no one knew that scarlet fever and strep throat were caused by the same germ. Strep was not quarantined but scarlet fever patients were quarantined for two weeks along with all the exposed family members. The patient was required to stay in an extra 10 days.

During the isolation period no one was supposed to go in or out of the house. In our case the first and third sons were allowed to take their clothes and leave. They found a place to room and board in town. The second son was away at college. Father was permitted to use a bedroom which had an outside door. He could not come into the other part of the house. That left mother with children aged about 13, 11, 9, and 5.

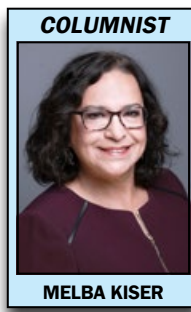

Why does NHS addition include unisex bathrooms?

In my November column, I wrote about the Noblesville High School academic addition. As readers may remember, that project was approved by the board and ground has already broken on the project. That column included a link to the 11-page rendering of the addition. (Go to tinyurl.com/NHSDacademicaddition and see pages 10 & 11.)

The public meetings and school board meetings of this addition had detailed discussions of the size, cost, staircase design, café area, and additional classroom space this addition would provide. What was never discussed was the design in its entirety which includes the proposed gender-neutral/shared re-

strooms instead of separate facilities by sex.

The design for the gender-neutral facilities consists of a large room, with sinks on the left and the right, and five stalls on both the left and right of the room. The resolution of the drawing was poor enough to not allow for a detailed reading of the description of the architectural design. Thus, no questions were ever raised on the design of the restroom facilities.

The general rule for the construction of a facility, such as a school, is that there should be separate facilities by sex. To proceed with this project, a school official had to apply for a variance.

BathroomVariance. You can see the design of the “all-user restroom” on the left side of Pages 3 & 4 of the document.

Such was the case for this project. The CFO for Noblesville schools applied for a variance on behalf of Ralph Gerdes Consultants and CSO Architects. The variance specifically asks whether public safety and welfare are protected. The request shows that the response stated, “Non-compliance with the rule will not be adverse to the public health, safety or welfare.”

As stated above, the original architectural drafts were not clear enough to allow the public, or the board members, to see the design for the restroom facilities. Who, then, made the decision that our students’ safety and welfare are protected?

Further in the variance

request is a checked box that states that imposition of the rule, meaning separate facilities by sex, would impose an undue hardship because of “major operational problems” with the use of the building. Interestingly, what is not checked, is that imposition of the rule would result in undue hardship because of physical limitations or excessive costs.

With a building addition that has just broken ground, is slated to be approximately 70,000 square feet, and for \$37 million – can we believe that any changes to the design would impose undue hardships?

The realization of the proposed restroom facilities design has received enough attention from the board that it has been added to the agenda

County Councilman Mark Hall’s January Timesheet

Welcome to the Timesheet. This column is a report of work done on behalf of the people of Hamilton County. It’s to be informative, too – a place to learn about projects and how our county government works.

As your employee, it’s important to me that you know what is being worked on as transparently as possible in government. You hired me as your County Councilman, and my hope is that you’ll choose to be informed by regularly reading this column, getting involved, and by asking questions. Council meetings are at 7 p.m. the first Wednesday of every month at the Judicial Center in downtown Noblesville. Meetings are also available to watch online for those unable to attend in person.

Here is where my time this past month has been spent.

January’s work involved normal county business, collaborating with Cicero and the northern parts of our county, and the Redevelopment Commission. Neighbors in Jackson Township are considering reorganizing into a new town. This could include the township along with one or more of the other municipalities (Cicero, Arcadia, and Atlanta). The residents’ information meeting was well attended and edu-

cational. Should two of the four governing authorities in Jackson Township agree to reorganize, and a majority of the voters approve, a new town would be created. Residents’ concerns include annexation, maintaining the present quality of life, and the continuity of government services. Meetings concerning water and wastewater utilities, the use of eminent domain, and constituent questions required many additional hours this month.

My committee assignments are now insurance, finance, and personnel along with now serving on the County Regional Development Commission. January’s personnel committee meeting was completed by an electronic poll of the members. Personnel requests are voted on as they occur, at the next regular council meeting. We did not have a Finance meeting in January. The RDC meeting was largely organizational and included electing officers, setting meeting dates, establishing agenda items, and approving funding for the first phase of design for a public safety training center.

In addition to the County Council public meetings, January’s work included attending a Board of Commissioners public meeting, meetings with Noblesville Mayor Jensen and Nobles-

ville Councilman Aaron Smith, attending a Noblesville City Council meeting, a Cicero Town Council meeting, a Jackson Township reorganization informational meeting, and a quarterly joint County and Cicero planning meeting.

Normal County business included another update on the Wastewater Treatment Plant construction. We were happy to hear that Phase I is on schedule and under budget. This month there were seven constituent service requests. Usually, requests require research with a county department, securing the correct answer and then following up with the taxpayer. January’s taxpayer questions included the HEPL budget, retiree drug benefits, county employment opportunities, the use of eminent domain, the county workforce housing project, and construction progress at Koteewi Park.

Of note this month was spending hours auditing our county appropriations that carried over from 2023; the council must approve these amounts. After reconciling the totals with the county financial data, I pulled three different vendors’ information and called them to verify that what we show is due to them is accurate with their records. Happily, each amount was accurate.

January included delving into the use of eminent domain. This is the right of a government or its agent to take private property for public use, with payment of

compensation. The council was asked to transfer our eminent domain authority to a city for their use in negotiating the purchase of a parcel of land. While being supportive of the project I voted against the transfer of the authority over the relatively quick timing of the request.

It was an honor to represent you at the Serve Noblesville Celebration, and at tours of the new Wastewater Treatment Plant and the Hamilton County Humane Society facility.

This is my timesheet. This is where my time went during month 13. There are quite a few projects in the queue for 2024, and while my job is primarily the financial oversight of the county budget, it is important to understand the Board of Commissioners’ priorities and balance them with the stewardship of taxpayer dollars. That is the job, and I am excited to do the people’s business.

As a taxpayer myself, and listening to so many of you, our employers, it’s important for the taxpayers to have access to all the information you want. I work for you and although you may not choose to do a deep dive into what your County Council does, it’s important that you can always do so.

Many of my earliest memories are of being at a doctor's office or recovering from surgery at a hospital.

If you are someone who has spent time seeing doctor after doctor, year after year, you know the familiar feeling of feeling you are just a number. Just someone else for them to check off their list for the day was how it often felt. Too rushed with their own agenda to have time to really listen to mine.

Those experiences didn't exactly leave me feeling dignified or promote feelings of self-worth. Neither did being referred to as unidentified for 44 years of my life.

I did have a few heaven-sent doctors over the

years. The doctors who encouraged me to realize I did, in fact, have a place for self-worth in my life. They saw the real me, and by that, I mean they saw how I was reacting to living with my disability.

My drive to live well. They saw the whole me, not just a piece. Though not in their job description, they made time to basically say, "Hey, you matter." For me, since those times were a huge part of my life, that was important to developing self-worth. It felt like it really mattered.

Living disabled, there are so many times when I feel like I don't matter, or my needs are a nuisance. I understand that most of you reading this couldn't fathom treating someone with

a disability this way, but it's real and it happens often. Lesser than.

For example, the times when I'm in my scooter at a cross country meet, trying to watch my son cross the finish line along with all the other spectators. Time after time, I pull my scooter up to a space where I think a person couldn't possibly step in front of it, so that I too can watch my son finish his race. Then, it happens. Someone steps right in front of me, completely blocking my view. It's truly unbelievable and sad how often things like that happen. I feel invisible when that happens.

You may be thinking, "Why don't you just say, 'please move, you just blocked my view'?" That sounds like an easy thing to do, but it's not for me. Also, whether it's intentional or not, it's still upsetting. It's

easy to feel your self-worth dwindling down to nothing in those moments. Instantly.

Another thing that stands out to me is when I'm being pushed in a wheelchair, for instance, at an airport where someone other than a family member is required to push me. So many times, I've been parked facing a wall, my back towards all the other passengers. That makes me feel like I'm disposable. It is a terrible feeling. Again, even if it's not intentional, it hurts. I question my self-worth while trying to maintain my dignity in moments like these. It's painful.

These are just a couple of examples of many.

Maintaining my dignity and self-worth is ultimately on me, not based on what others do to me. Their actions don't have to affect my self-worth. I used to think they did, but they don't. It didn't really matter

Counseling may be key to being more joyful at work

As I thought about last week's column on taking steps to be a more joyful person a couple of days ago, something hit me like a ton of bricks. My tips were fine if you weren't experiencing anything out

of the ordinary physically, mentally, or emotionally. But what if you needed more?

I know that I personally have needed help to be a more joyful person in the past. Some readers who know me well may be surprised to read this. I'm naturally an enthusiastic, positive person.

But even people like me encounter challenges in life (who doesn't?), and I had a major one recently that made me decide to get some counseling. It's been one of the best decisions I've made in a long time.

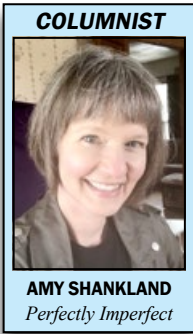
Thankfully, every time I've needed to talk to a therapist/mental health counselor, I've found someone who is a good fit for me. I started to see a local woman in December and have already felt much better about my original challenge and others I hadn't even thought of in life.

Father Block was a huge help to me years ago when I struggled with taking care of my mother. He and I took a long walk circling the church on a warm spring morning. I left that conversation feeling lighter than I had in a long time. Perhaps you attend church and can talk to a priest or pastor as well.

The most important thing, whether you seek a counselor or someone religious, is to find someone you're comfortable with. Sometimes an individual just isn't a right fit for you. If they're truly professional, they'll understand if you need to look elsewhere.

I've been so pleased to see our society be more accepting of people seeking therapy or other paths to healing their mental health. It's truly a game changer for both our personal and professional lives!

A history lesson on The Feeding Team

Like any company, city, state, church, or charity, Feeding Team has a history. This month we are telling our story. How did the Feeding Team come to be?

Jump in the way-back time

machine with me for a few minutes and let's head back to 1986. Gas cost 93 cents a gallon on average, eggs were 87 cents a dozen, the median price of a home was about \$76,000, Ronald Reagan was our president, and reactor No. 4 of the Chernobyl Nuclear Power Plant exploded in a devastating accident. Meanwhile, living in a three-bedroom ranch home in the southern tip of Noblesville, Ind., was a young married couple raising two daughters.

Like most of our contemporaries, these were the beginnings of our salad days. With seven years of wedded bliss behind us we had the world by the tail – until we didn't. You see, what we didn't know was that the world can be a very tough place when you are struggling to make a life ... when you're struggling to make a living.

Both of us worked. We did not know anything about public assistance, food pantries, trustees, or for that matter what to do when everything we did was not enough. What we knew in our self-reliance was that when something went bump in the night, we would simply power through. Like most people in their 20s in the 1980s, we took things day by day. Life was a great blessing and when times got tough, we'd get tougher – until effort wasn't enough.

Looking back on it now,

we didn't realize how close to the line we were living. What we experienced, like many families, was a struggle to make ends meet when something didn't go according to plan. We lived one dentist bill, one blown tire, one unexpected annual premium away from not knowing how we'd feed ourselves and our two, later three, daughters.

We were what is today referred to as a gap family. These are our neighbors who make too much money to qualify for any form of public assistance, BUT who don't make enough money to not become food insecure when something goes wrong.

In short, there were more meals than I'd like to admit that featured Kroger cost-cutter beef stew as the entrée and a baked potato as the side dish.

During the next three-plus decades, supporting a food charities was always at the front of the list of our charity support. As we opened our first business in 1993, donating to support families who were food-challenged was part of our annual mission. For years, along with our employees, we would support Shepherd Community Center on the Near East Side of Indianapolis with donations for food, volunteer hours preparing and serving meals, and doing what we could to support families each holiday season with meals.

Jump back in the time machine and journey ahead with me to 2019. These same two formerly food-challenged parents are praying through what

they are to do headed into 2020 and cannot escape the embedded need to do something in their local area.

After living in Hamilton County for 33 years, we knew what was supposed to happen. We knew we were to turn our attention to our local neighbors here in Hamilton County. But what to do?

Enter Jay Height, the Executive Director of Shepherd Community Center. Understanding where we were being led to put the effort, he tells us about these outdoor pantries modeled after the small book lending libraries. He sent us an article from the Courier Journal in Louisville, Ky.: an article that describes in detail how the Nazarene church has 40 of these outdoor, no-questions-asked food pantries deployed all around Bullitt County, Ky. Two phone calls later and we have the materials list and plans in our email. Boom, The Feeding Team is born.

Taking that model, we added our business as a funding source and launched the first six pantries in the middle of the pandemic. All we had to give neighbors was Gatorade and microwave popcorn. It didn't matter. We were beginning, and hungry neighbors were starting to get food that they desperately needed. Today, 58 pantries are in service with a plan to launch another dozen.

Now you know our story. Now you know where Feeding Team came from. If you feel led to help, please join us in our mission to provide meals to hungry neighbors.

With over 47,000 food-challenged neighbors in Hamilton County,

Too much pain. Too many medicines. We even made a trio of visits to a chiropractor.

I made the dreaded phone call to the vet after taking Delaney to school. She had finally reached the surrender point of not asking me not to do it. Animal smart, she knew the score. In one sitting, I dialed the vet's number thrice. The first two attempts, I couldn't get any words out.

I fed him a half pack of sliced ham, this after the popcorn chicken Delaney

had dumped into his bowl earlier, something neither of us would have done before. I wondered if this had tipped him off about his fate.

In the parking lot, I hesitated to exit the car, considered one more get-out-of-jail-free card. Whimpers filled the backseat cage. Once out of the car, instead of getting Skooder, I took a short walk through a stout breeze, the day overcast, wet and cold. I heard muffled howls behind me, something he always did when sensing abandonment.

I blubbered by the vet's roadside mailbox, gathered my composure and removed the cage. I saw the grim-faced receptionist. She knew the score, too. With one foot inside the clinic, I set the cage down despite my dog's whiny protest – please tell me it is back pain causing

these sounds, I thought – and returned outside without a final look.

I let the vet do her job without me.

My son and I wrapped him in his favorite tie-dyed blanket with his favorite stuffed animal minus the stuffing (he had long ago taken the insides out of his stuffed dog, something he did with any stuffed toy, one of his missions in life).

"He had a good life," my son said, his shovel hitting dirt, something he retold his sister later – and I'm sure his own self.

"It is all for the best," I said, spade in grip.

We capped the hole with sod and topped that with the red dog bowl, four Milk Bone treats inside, one for each Skooder year. At times like this, multiplying seven "dog years" to the human

doctor removed the quarantine sign from our door. Parents were given instructions about fumigating our house. Formaldehyde had to be used. The next day my parents took me to Father's grocery store. He had very few customers that day as the neighbors were all afraid of me. I presume the other three went to school as I can't remember them being at the store. Next day Dr. Kirk came again and backed the sign up. Leslie had broken out. Two more weeks! Then another fumigation, and how stinky the house was! That time we spent the day with Aunt Dora.

Before bedtime Owen was sent home to fire up the old Florence heater. The rest of us waited a little so the house would be warm. (Dad must have been at the store.) When we got home, Owen was lying on the floor behind the stove, and broke out all over! Mother said, "I'm not going to call the doctor tonight. No one will come to see us anyway."

Scarlet fever was a dreaded disease. There wasn't much one could do but let it run its course. Owen had to learn to walk after he got well. All three of us "peeled off" and practically got a new skin. Ruth didn't feel well most of the time but didn't have a rash. My Grandpa Howard was the only one brave enough (except Dr. Kirk) to come to our house. Of course he couldn't come inside.

When Russell came home for Christmas vacation, he probably stayed with Uncle Will and Aunt Dora. I remember Mother opening our front door so he could see our big, beautiful tree. He laid a handful of coins on the floor for me.

One marvels that a mother with so many sick ones could take time for a tree.

Tim Kraft

April 10, 1941 – January 21, 2024

Tim Kraft, who managed the 1976 Iowa Caucus Campaign that played a pivotal role in Jimmy Carter’s successful run for the Democratic Party presidential nomination and later served as a top aide to President Carter, passed away January 21, 2024, at the age of 82.

Born in Noblesville, he graduated from Dartmouth with a B.A. in 1963. While pursuing graduate studies at Georgetown University, he was called to action by President Kennedy’s newly formed Peace Corps. After training in Las Cruces, Tim served two years in the Petén of Guatemala. Fluent in Spanish, upon leaving the Peace Corps he traveled through South America with some fellow Peace Corps volunteers, a trip made on a shoe-string budget in a VW van. Tim returned to the U.S. and found work as a Peace Corps recruiter. He said, “The job didn’t pay much but I got to go to college campuses and meet pretty girls.” The friendships he made in the Peace Corps lasted 60 years.

Tim got the political bug while working for U.S. Sen. Birch Bayh (D-Ind.). Following a job in the Office of Foreign Press Services at the Mexico Olympics in 1968, he worked in Washington, D.C., on various political consulting contracts. Tim came to New Mexico in 1970 to ski, hike, and camp, and he fell in love with the state. He talked then N.M. Democratic Party Chair Mike Anaya into hiring him to be Executive Director. With his organizational and fundraising skills, he served in that role from 1970 to 1974.

In 1975, fellow New Mexican Chris Brown introduced Tim to then Gov. Jimmy Carter, who was running for President. Carter hired Tim as his Iowa Caucus campaign manager. Carter came in second to uncommitted, but well ahead of other candidates. The publicity generated by his unexpected strong showing provided an essential burst of momentum to Carter’s campaign and put the Iowa caucuses on the political map. Tim went on to serve as National Field Director for the Carter-Mondale campaign.

After winning the 1976 election, President Carter asked Tim to serve as Appointments Secretary to the President. He went on to serve in another White House role: Assistant to the President for Personnel and Political Coordination. In 1979 he left the White House to serve as National Campaign Manager for the Carter-Mondale campaign. He met his wife-to-be, the former Molly Manuppelli, who worked in the White House Office of Personnel, and they married in 1981.

They moved to Albuquerque, where Tim started AvanC Ltd., an international consulting firm focusing on political strategy and management, public affairs, and intergovernmental relations. In the 1980s he consulted on presidential campaigns in Panama, Ecuador, and Costa Rica. Tim also enjoyed serving on election observation teams in seven countries. In New Mexico, Tim was a state and local lobbyist; he also worked on ballot proposition management in several states.

Tim’s retirement years were filled with travel, grandkids and keeping in touch with friends all over the country. Anyone who knew Tim knew he was an inveterate collector of all kinds of information. His manila folders were filled with articles he found interesting, ranging from book, art, and movie reviews, to quotations, poetry, restaurant and travel articles and, yes, college football statistics. He filled journals with an eclectic array of interests. When September rolled around, he was a captive of all college football games and loved discussing odds with friends. He kept in touch with fellow political junkies, Peace Corps volunteers, old high school and college friends, and a core group of Carter friends made during the Carter administration.

His grandchildren, Beau (6) and Sloane (3) brought him the most joy.

Tim was predeceased by his parents, Dr. Haldon and Mary Kraft, as well as a brother, Mike Kraft of Washington, D.C. Tim is survived by his wife, Molly, and son, Colt and daughter-in-law Josie, grandchildren Beau and Sloane of Seattle, Wash. He is also survived by brothers Jake and John Kraft of Tallahassee, Fla., and sister-in-law, Betsy Kraft of Washington, D.C.

The family wishes to thank all the kind messages received from friends. The many stories, anecdotes and remembrances shared before Tim’s passing meant the world to both Tim and Molly. Tim was fortunate to hear those sentiments while still with us, and we consider those messages a living tribute to his life. Finally, Tim said his epitaph should be a line from an old Joe Walsh song: “Life’s been good to me so far.”

versations about healthy relationships is a significant protective factor against abusive relationships.

Here are some things you can do:

- Talk early and often.
- Help your

child identify ways to practice self-love.

- Discuss safe ways to express love in a relationship.

- Talk about the key elements of a healthy relationship like respect, equality, trust, honesty, communication, and consent.

- Model examples of honest communication, conflict resolutions, safety, and respect.

- Look for opportunities to talk to your child in a no-pressure, private space with no distractions.

- Listen without judgment or accusations and be open to their ideas.

- Help your child recognize the warning signs of an unhealthy or abusive relationship.

It can be tricky for young people to understand that relationships exist on a continuum from healthy to abusive, with unhealthy relationships somewhere in the middle. Unhealthy relationship behaviors and dating abuse can

be hard to spot.

See some warning signs for unhealthy and abusive behaviors in teen dating relationships in the graphic above.

If you worry that a young person is experiencing dating violence, one of the first steps you can take is responding to what you are observing. Youth want connection and support, but it is important to not jump to conclusions. We suggest you approach the conversation from a supportive and non-judgmental place by listening, approaching them with curiosity, and asking open-ended and strategic questions. For example, “I noticed you haven’t been hanging out with your friends much lately. I have missed seeing them. Is everything okay?”

If they do report unhealthy or abuse behaviors,

be supportive, validate their feelings, and believe them. It can be helpful to focus on the behaviors, not person or persons involved. You will want to talk about their safety in a non-judgmental, supportive way and decide on next steps together. Prevail is also a free and confidential resource for you and your teen.

It is important we discuss teen dating violence by providing the opportunity for young people to have open conversations with the adults in their life. As a community we must do better for our teens!

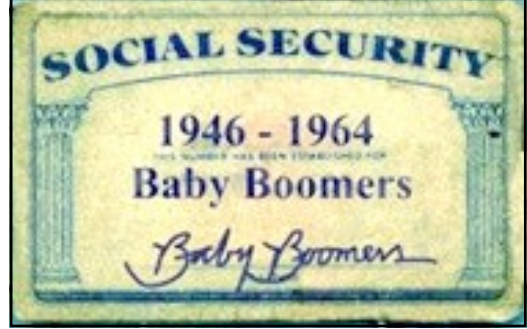

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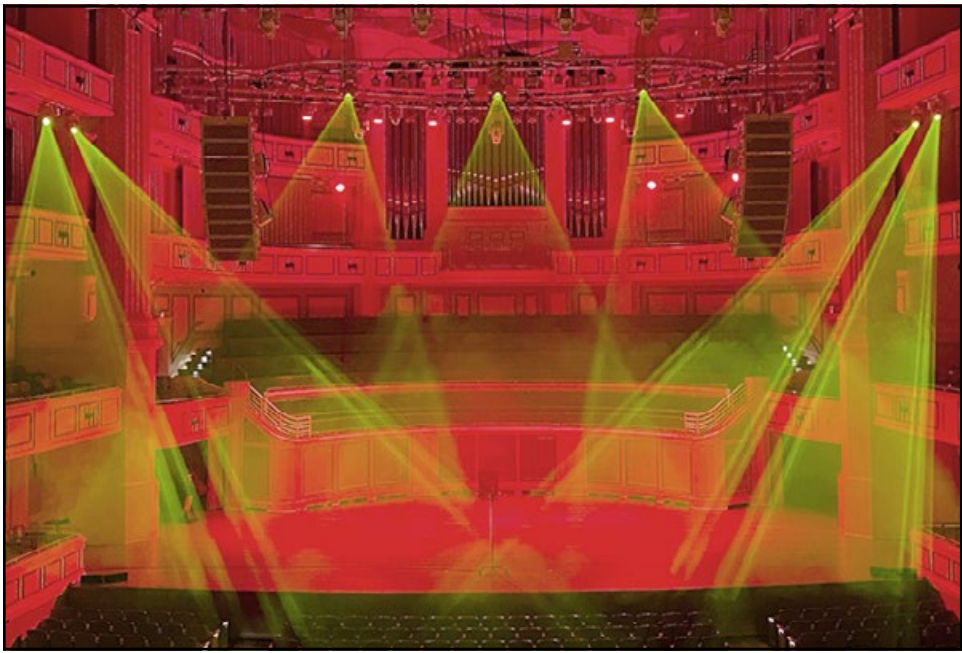

FISHERS — “We’re three for four. That’s pretty good.”

Noblesville senior Ava Shoemaker was talking about how many sectional championships the Millers have won over the course of her high school career. That fact was so wild, she repeated herself.

“Man, we just got our third one in four years,” she said. “That’s crazy.”

With her team up 11-10, Makalusky added a layin, then junior Kennedy Holman hit two free throws to put Southeastern up 15-10.

Sophomore C.C. Quigley scored for Noblesville to close the quarter and cut the HSE lead to 15-12. Kenley Johnson made a free throw to put the Royals up 16-12, the first point of the second quarter.

Noblesville took off af-

“Talk about growth,” said Noblesville coach Donna Buckley. The coach said there were situations in earlier games where unguarded players wouldn’t be shooting the ball.

Noblesville finished second as a team with 417 points. The Millers had one victory: Ellie Hayward, Julia Santerre, Mia Field and



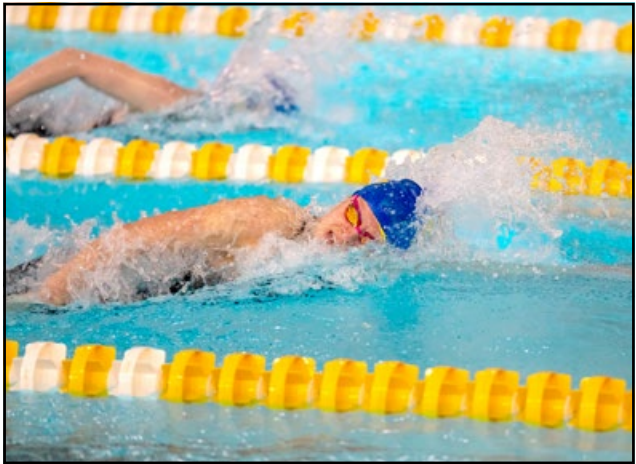
Fishers won its sixth consecutive sectional championship last Saturday, scoring 531 team points.

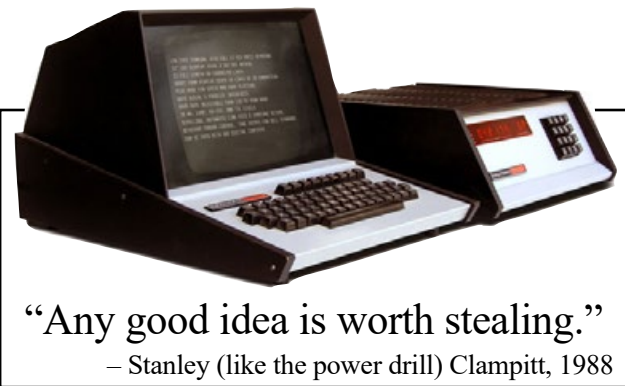

Franciosi & 1996-97 basketball team join Millers Hall of Fame

Noblesville High School inducted a legendary athletic trainer and one of the Millers’ best-ever teams into its Athletic Hall of Fame last Friday during halftime of the Noblesville-Hamilton Southeastern boys basketball game.

The first inductee was Jeff “Doc” Franciosi, the athletic trainer for the Millers from 1985 to 2009. Franciosi was named the Indiana High School Athletic Trainer of the Year in 1992 and was inducted into the Indiana Athletic Trainers Association Hall of Fame last year. He is currently an athletic trainer at Guerin Catholic.

Franciosi also is a teacher at NHS and his sports medicine class has produced numerous student assistant trainers who have gone on to become physicians, physical therapists and other medical professionals.
